## Rainbow trout stocking sites include Lake Tejas

AUSTIN — Rainbow trout will be stocked in 73 Texas sites this winter, down from a high of 80 last year because of severe cutbacks in the number of fish available from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Lake Tejas in Colmesneil, Tyler County, will receive trout this year.

Stocking will begin on Dec. 15 with 1,000 trout; then again on January 5, with 1,000 then on Feb. 2 with a final 1,000.

Trout normally are stocked before noon on the day listed.

The number of fish to be stocked and the stocking dates have not been determined, but Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials believe Texas anglers could see 50 percent less trout than last year. The department stocked almost 300,000 catchable-sized rainbow trout in 1993-94.

Last year, 80 locations received trout stockings from December through March. About 170 individual stockings of 280,000 trout were made. Another 18,500 trout were utilized in 16 special children's fishing events. This year, the number will be cut in half because of USFWS budget restraints.

However, 43 cities or organizations have contributed more than \$51,000 to purchase additional trout for this year's stockings.

"It's unfortunate that we'll have a 50 percent reduction in trout from the federal government. A lot of our people won't get trout because of that decision," said Phil Durocher, TPWD inland fisheries director. "We're looking for ways to increase those numbers. Hopefully, we can come up with some ideas or funding for purchasing more trout."

The department's rainbow trout program is supported with funds from the sale of Texas Freshwater Trout Stamps. The \$7 stamps are required, in addition to a valid fishing license, for all those fishing for freshwater trout in Texas waters. Those exempted from fishing license requirements are not required to possess a trout stamp. The department sold 28,781 freshwater trout stamps in 1993-94.

TPWD first stocked trout in 1966 in two cooler, tallrace areas as experimental work, said Pat Hutson, TPWD rainbow trout program leader in San Marcos. By the mid-1970s selected sites received annual stockings. In 1983, some smaller state park lakes were added to the annual stocking list.

The program began to grow in popularity in the 1980s. Because of the growing interest and the increased expense, the Texas Legislature instituted the trout stamp for users to support the program and the state's fisheries. The program has grown from an initial

stocking of 12 sites in 1966 to 80 sites in 1993-94.

"The past few years we've begun to focus more on urban lakes with easy access," Hutson said. "We want to provide a recreational opportunity for people without boats and for people who may not be able to travel. This is inexpensive fishing, and no special equipment is required."

The stamps and fishing licenses are available from department law enforcement offices and many retail outlets across the state. The daily bag limit is five trout and possession limit is 10 in all Texas waters. There is no minimum length limit.

Separate fees are not charged to fish for trout in state parks, only the normal entry and facility use fees. Trout stamps are required as in other public waters.

## The Brookshire history

The Brookshires first came to Texas in 1855 from Giles County, Tennessee. The founders of the Brookshire Brothers Food Stores were sons and daughters of P.J., "Uncle" Jap Brookshire. The sons were Austin, Houston, Tom, Bryan, Lee, Wood and Oscar; the daughters were Annie Berry, Tonnie, Sanders and Abbie Smiley. The history of this family is similar to that of many of the families who first settled in East Texas. Some were born in log cabins, all knew the hard life of being raised on a poor East Texas farm. The old Brookshire home place was about five miles east of Lufkin. The Brookshire boys worked at various occupations and jobs as they grew to manhood before entering the grocery business. They worked farm hands in sawmills, chopped railroad ties, cut logs, laid steel on a railroad gang and taught in various country schools.

At the close of World War I, two of the brothers, Austin and Tom, after being discharged from the service, pooled their money and bought a grocery store on the courthouse square in Lufkin and named it Brookshire Brothers. As they opened the store on September 21, 1921, the brothers adopted the philosophy of "cash & carry", the first grocery store of its kind in Angelina County. The story goes that their father, J.P. (Uncle Jap) got his feelings hurt repeatedly, by trying to get something charged, even when he had the money to pay for it. The "cash and carry" policy allowed the brothers to have the lowest price on groceries, and soon they became the area's largest store.

The building occupied by the first Brookshire Brothers food store is still standing and is used today by the Sheriff's Department. In the early days of Brookshire Brothers, so many men congregated in front of the store to swap tales and visit, that the street became known as "Split and Whittle."

In 1923, Tom left the store to join a half brother who had a store in Corpus Christi, and was replaced by Lee. As the family participation increased, new stores were opened and in 1928 the family, which by now included several cousins and a few friends, decided to form a common group and to work toward a common goal. They did, and the Brookshire Brothers became a business reality.

The business prospered and soon there were 33 Brookshire stores in East Texas. In 1929, Wood and a cousin, W. A. Brookshire, withdrew from the company, taking four stores in Tyler. This was the start of the Brookshire Food Stores which has its offices in Tyler.

In the early days it was decided that a general office and warehouse was needed to meet the needs of administration, accounting and buying. After being in several buildings in 1922, the company purchased Moore Grocery and Lufkin Produce Company business and building located on the north side of the courthouse square in Lufkin. With the purchase of these businesses the company entered the wholesale trade and began to sell to other stores. By 1928, Brookshire Brothers moved out on the West Loop and built a building where it operated for about 10 years until it bought a parcel of land on the North Loop and built a larger building. Upon moving into the new building, they discontinued the wholesaling of goods to others and concentrated on serving only the Brookshire Brothers Food Stores.

During World War II, the people of rural East Texas left the farms to enter the service or work in the factories making war materials. At the close of the war, many of these people did not move back and many of the East Texas farm communities withered to the point they could no longer support a store. The number of Brookshire Brothers stores dwindled to 13.

In the 1950's life returned to East Texas and the company was in a position to take advantage of this new-found opportunity. By 1950, Brookshire Brothers had 63 stores in East Texas and Louisiana and close to 5,100 employees.

Brookshire Brothers has been truly a family affair. It was started by a family, run by a family, and is still held together by the descendants of that family. The philosophies of the original family are still evident in the operation of the company. The leadership of the company has been in the hands of a Brookshire from its beginning until now. From 1921 until 1962 the company operated as a partnership, under the leadership of Austin Brookshire from 1921 to 1948, then Bryan Brookshire from 1948 to 1950, to be succeeded by Lee Brookshire until 1962 when the partnership was incorporated. The first president was Lee Brookshire, who served in that capacity until his retirement in 1966, to be succeeded by Eugene, Oscar and R.A. Brookshire, all three sons of Austin Brookshire.

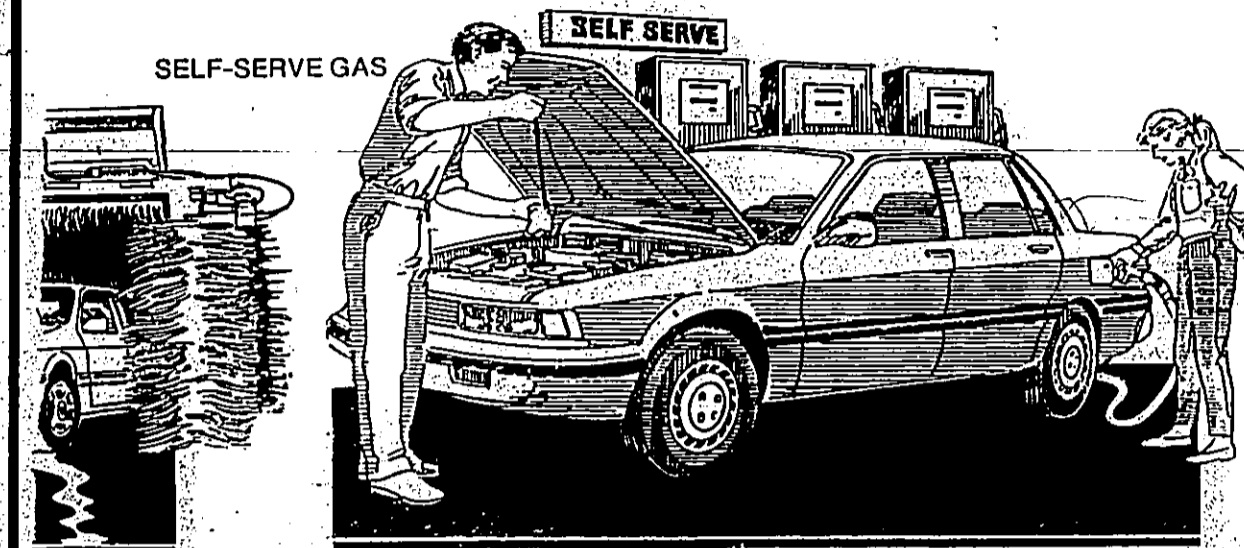

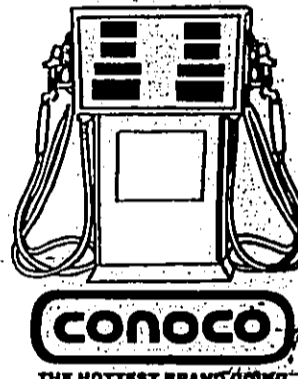

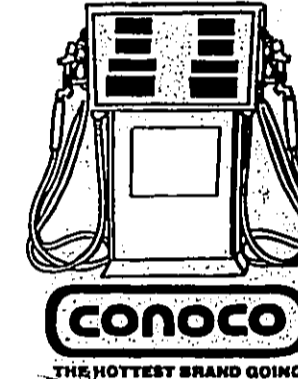

## Reorganization brings new name for Farmers Home Administration

TEMPLE, Texas — The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has a new name under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) reorganization, however, the same work continues, according to George Ellis, FmHA State Director. Ellis is now named the Acting State Director for Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD).

Congress passed a bill authorizing the reorganization late in September, and Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy issued orders making the changes on Oct. 20.

"The entire USDA was reorganized in an effort to provide better service to the public while reducing the number of agencies required to do the same work," Ellis said. "Over the next five years, the agencies will be merged and created under reorganization."

"For the time being, people wanting these important services should go to the local office that probably will still have a Farmers Home Administration sign out front," Ellis said. "As additional changes are made, we will be letting the communities know about them."

The farm lending, rural housing, water and waste disposal, community facility, and business and industry programs, formerly administered by FmHA or RDA will still be available in the newly named RECD offices. The farm loan programs will eventually become part of the new Consolidated Farm Service Agency, which was created under reorganization.

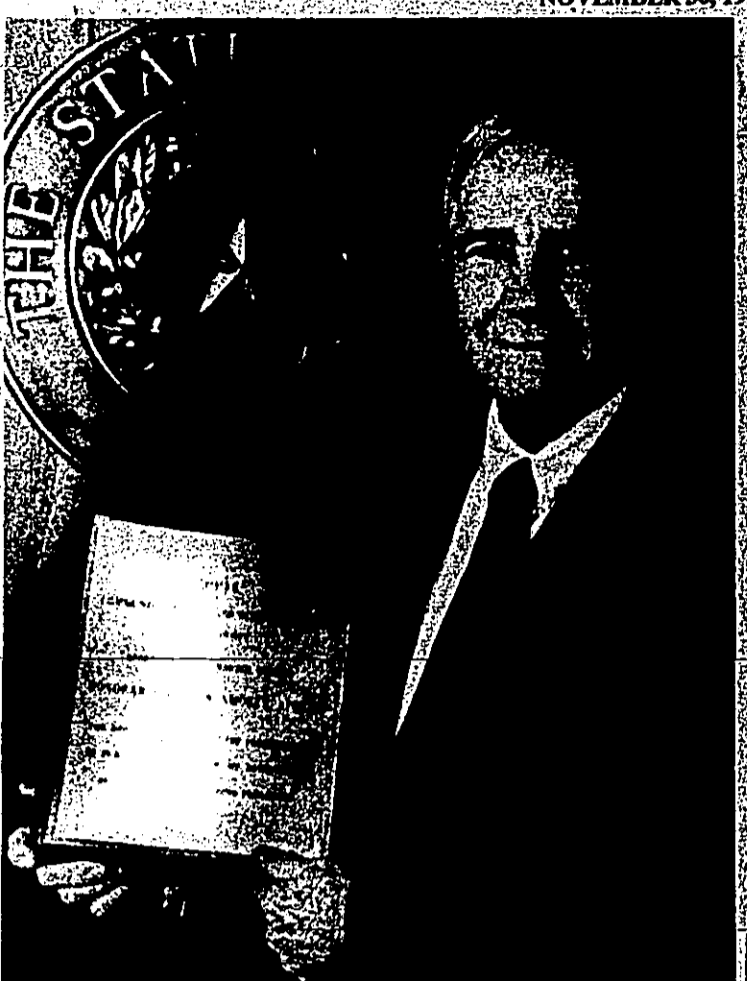
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## Judge 'Smookey' Stover honored

## Gambling expansion not inevitable

 DALLAS — Your rejection of gambling in five states proves that its expansion is not inevitable, anti-gambling spokesmen said.  
 But voter approval of gambling elsewhere shows that it will continue to grow unless the involvement of concerned citizens outweighs the big money of gambling promoters, they added.

In the Nov. 8 general election, two states rejected efforts to legalize casinos outright, two others turned down limited forms of casino-style gambling, and one defeated off-track betting.

Florida rejected legalized casinos by a 62-38 percent margin, even though gambling promoters spent \$16.7 million in an effort to win voter approval — a total larger than the combined gubernatorial campaigns of Lawton Chiles and Jeb Bush.

"The people of Florida were able to see through the most expensive — and we believe the most deceptive — media campaign in the history of Florida," said John Sawinski, campaign director for No Casinos, Inc. "The people of Florida knew a lie when they saw one."

About 50 casinos reportedly were in line to open if the measure had passed. The director of Florida's department of commerce had termed the casino blitz an attempted "hostile takeover" of the state's multi-billion dollar tourism industry.

Casino opponents were outspent ten to one, but they succeeded in putting together a broad-based coalition ranging from slot machines in airports and casinos to other faith groups to Disney World and the hotel and restaurant associations.

"In contrast to what some highly paid gaming industry lobbyists would like Texans to believe, voters in Florida and elsewhere have proven that legal casino gambling is not inevitable in every state," said Weston Ware, executive director of the American Horse Shows Assn.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Sign-up for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Tree Assistance Program (TAP), a disaster assistance program, began on Nov. 21 and will continue through March 31, 1995.

Under TAP, USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will reimburse eligible small and medium scale commercial tree and nursery inventory growers for up to 65 percent, after adjustment for normal mortality.

Eligible trees include orchard trees planted for fruit and nut production; nursery tree and non-tree plants, including vineyards; and forest tree seedlings planted in 1993 or 1994 to produce timber, pulp, or Christmas trees that were lost in calendar year 1994.

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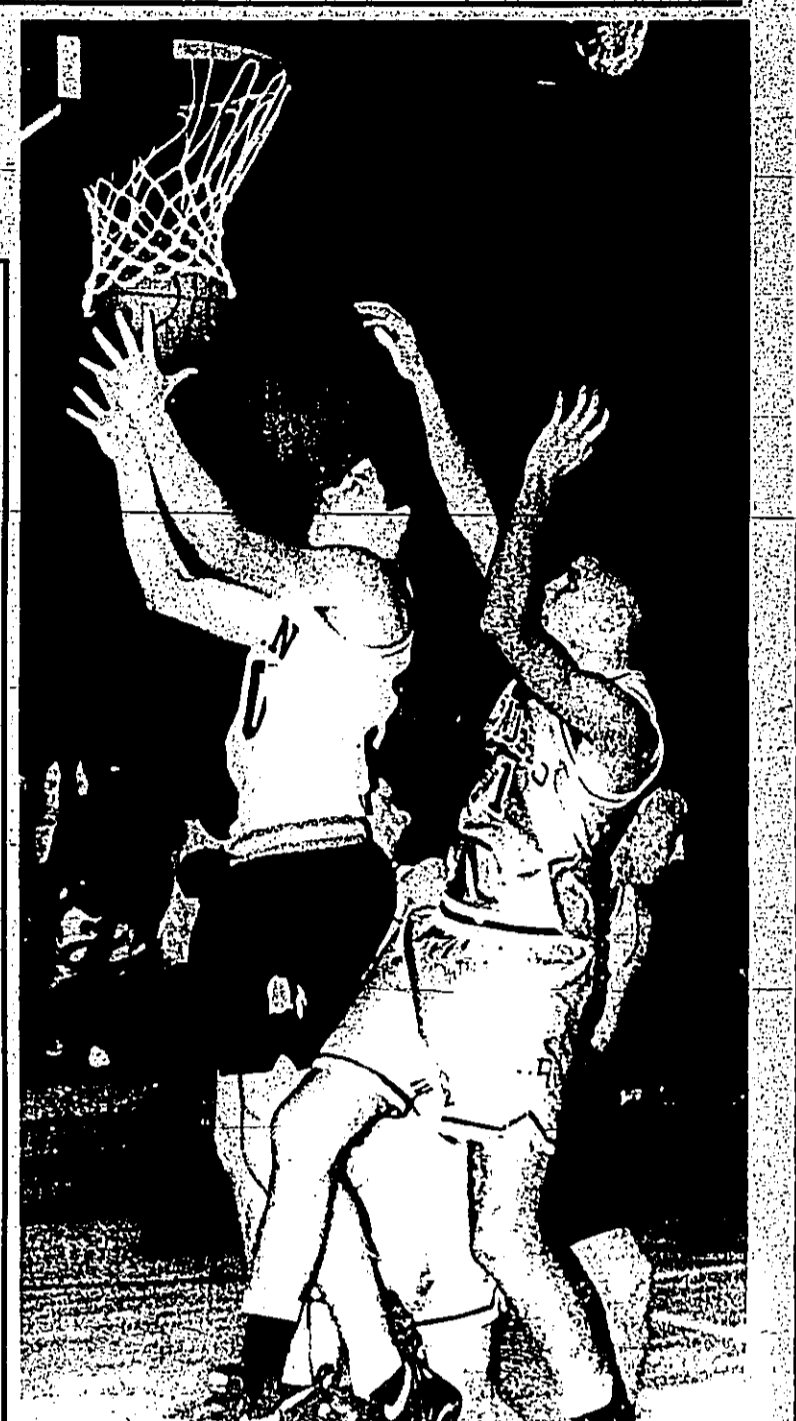

**Cogan's Syndrome corrected with electric ear implant device**  
**NEW ORLEANS**—In September, 1990, Françoise Dove developed an ear ache that gradually worsened. By Halloween night she was completely deaf. Cogan's syndrome, a rare autoimmune condition, was diagnosed as the cause of her deafness. The condition progresses, the individual's immune system becomes confused and the antibodies which attack the virus also attack the inner ear and eyes. Usually triggered by a viral infection, Cogan's syndrome is typically diagnosed during its later stages.  
 Today, however, Dove can hear and communicate, thanks to a cochlear implant, an electronic device that was implanted in the bone behind her ear. A thin, flexible coil containing 22 separate electrodes were threaded through her cochlea, the spiral-shaped auditory chamber of the inner ear.  
 The implant is for someone who is totally deaf, not for the person who has normal hearing in one ear or who wants a replacement for a hearing aid," explains Dr. Timothy Molony, neuro-otologist at the Cochlear Ear Institute who performed the procedure on Dove.  
 Adults and children who develop complete deafness are candidates for the device.  
 Worldwide, approximately one person in a thousand is born deaf, according to the American Academy of Otolaryngology - Head and Neck Surgery, Inc. Nearly an equal number of people who are born with hearing will develop deafness during their lifetime. An estimated 250,000 to 500,000 people in the United States could benefit from a cochlear implant.  
 Deafness may be congenital or acquired. For example, it can be caused by damage to the inner ear. However, the majority of these persons, even those with "nerve deafness," have nerve fibers left in the ear, explains Molony. These nerve fibers may be able to send signals (sound) to the brain if they are stimulated electrically.  
 Sound normally travels along the canal of the external ear and causes the ear drum to vibrate. The middle ear's three small bones conduct this vibration from the ear drum to the cochlea. Fluid waves in the cochlea, initiated by movement of the three small ear bones, stimulate more than 16,000 delicate hearing cells (hair cells). Movement of these cells generates an electrical current to the auditory nerve which in turn sends the current to the portion of the brain that recognizes these electrical stimulations as sound.  
 The implant bypasses the hair cells that are not functioning and provides stimulation directly to the auditory nerve. The implant's electrodes in channels are placed in the inner ear and stimulate the remaining nerve fibers to transmit signals.  
 The brain interprets these signals as useful sounds. After surgery, the electrodes are programmed individually to match hearing and comfortable loudness levels, enabling the user to experience a wide range of pitch and loudness sensations and increasing the capacity for understanding speech.  
 There are different implant models, but all have a microphone and signal processor which are worn outside the body, like a hearing aid; a signal coupler (transmitter and receiver) and one or more electrodes that are implanted in and around the cochlea. The surgery takes from one to two hours, depending on which implant is used. General anesthetics used and an overnight hospital stay is required. Cochlear implants have been available since 1982.  
 Dove marvels about the technology that allows her to hear, remarking, "It is amazing. You are deaf and then you receive the implant and you can actually hear again."  
 The implant does not restore normal hearing. Speech sounds, artificial, similar to robot diction, Dove describes it "much like listening to a computer, very mechanical sounding. But when someone speaks, you pick up the sound immediately."  
 The implant can often improve lip reading. About one out of every three persons is able to talk on the telephone.

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**Should limitation on retiree earnings be eliminated?**

Throughout the years, there have been proposals regarding the elimination of earnings limits for Social Security beneficiaries. Those in favor of eliminating the so-called "retirement test" believe that the restriction on earnings impose a work disincentive, and that its removal will increase the labor supply and tax revenues. People who want to keep the limitations believe that eliminating the retirement test would result in billions of dollars in additional benefits - creating additional stress on Social Security trust funds.  
 Earnings limitations were included in the original Social Security Act to promote the program's objective of partially replacing lost earnings after withdrawal from the labor force. So the retirement test actually began on a philosophical note - and to an extent has been perpetuated on this basis throughout the years.  
 The earnings limitation was originally a flat rate. However, through the years it has been gradual changes - all in all liberal direction. In the 1980's, the law was changed to allow retirees ages 65-70 to earn more wages without losing benefits, than those ages 62 to 65. After age 70 there is no earnings limit, down from age 73 a few years ago.  
 A recent Social Security study concluded that 80% or more of the 9.7 million persons age 65 through 69 would not change their work effort if the limitation on earnings were eliminated. The number of individuals who would modify their hours worked and earnings are fairly evenly split among those who would increase or decrease their work activity.  
 According to the study, economic theory suggests that the elimination of the retirement test should:  
 \* Have little effect on those with no earnings, or earnings below the offset.  
 \* Should lead to increased earnings for those whose earnings are at the threshold, since their benefits will no longer be lost due to excessive earnings.  
 \* Should have a mixed effect on the earnings of those who lose only some benefits as a result of the offset. They would either increase hours of work if the offset no longer applied - or decrease work in favor of additional benefits available.  
 \* Should lead to decreased earnings for those whose earnings are now so large that they now lose all benefits because of the offset. Work could be reduced without decreasing total income - since more Social Security benefits would be payable.  
 The study concluded that the overall net effect of eliminating the retirement test would be minimal, especially as regards more earnings and thus more tax income. Thus, a natural question might well be: will the retirement test be eventually eliminated? The answer is unknown at this time. While the elimination of the test has been proposed many times, to date it has failed to gain favorable support from Congress. An assumption might be that since the test has been liberalized over the years - the chances might be good for repeal - but this is only an assumption.

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Keep moving: activity important for retirees

HOUSTON — Ready to retire? Two experts on aging at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston offer some advice: "keep moving" and find something you like to do. "It's almost as if retirement catches some people by surprise," said Susan Shekelle, senior social worker in Baylor's Geriatric Clinic. "You cannot just walk up to the door on retirement and say 'so what now?'"

As a first step, Shekelle suggests finding some enjoyable physical activity. "A real contributor to aging well is literally keep moving, physically as well as mentally," she said. "Find an activity that keeps the muscles in good working order... like walking at a mall or in your neighborhood. Careful thought as to what will reenergize you is another essential, says Dr. Naomi Nelson, a psychologist in Baylor's Department of Neurology. She advises people to look for activities that fill their needs for achievement and accomplishment, not just for something that fills time. "What works for your friends may not be right for you," Nelson said. "Be creative, and look within yourself to find what is best for you."

Activities and hobbies pursued at earlier times in life, Nelson says, may be good ones to pick up again in retirement.

"Be flexible, give yourself permission to try different things and to fail at some things," Nelson said. "You will find out quickly what you like and dislike."

Acceptance of change also plays a role in positive aging. "Perhaps you cannot move as fast, but accept that and then work to the maximum of what you can," Shekelle said. "Admitting that you need a little help is far different than giving up. Both Nelson and Shekelle advocate short-term counseling around retirement age. "Talking about the changes in life is helpful," Shekelle said. "And for couples there may be additional relationship changes brought about by having more time together."

Therapy also opens healthy discussions of issues families frequently avoid. "Most people will at some time have to modify their living situation. Early discussions about housing and medical care issues will alleviate misunderstandings in later years," Shekelle said.

Sharp says re-inventing welfare will help reduce welfare dependency

AUSTIN — "Public assistance in Texas, as in most other states, is like a treadmill with no 'off' switch," State Comptroller John Sharp said. "Welfare was intended to be a temporary measure to help people who are in a financial crisis get back on their feet. But too many people are forced to remain on welfare because they are unable to get solid footing in a job or decent housing. Welfare regulations discourage self-reliance and encourage long-term dependence, and this has got to stop," Sharp said.

Asthma sufferers should investigate causes of disease

HOUSTON — Asthma sufferers could learn something from Sherlock Holmes, who also was a medical doctor. "Medication alone is not enough," said Dr. Benjamin Interiano, assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Patients can take an active role in the management of their disease by becoming detectives searching for what triggers their asthma."

Late Social Security checks cause problems

HOUSTON — A person whose Social Security check does not arrive on the date it is expected should wait for three more mail deliveries before contacting Social Security. According to David Bennett, district manager of the Lufkin Social Security office, this will allow the postal service ample time for delivery and will take care of most of the delayed checks. If the check still has not arrived after three days, Social Security can begin necessary action for a replacement check.

Some people think it is enough to report their change of address to the post office, Bennett stated. The post office, however, will forward mail to the person's new address only for a certain length of time. After that checks will be returned to the U.S. Treasury. If a person's check is returned and the new address provided, it can take up to several weeks for a new check to be sent. If the check was not returned, a stop payment will be put on it and the mail will be transferred to the U.S. Treasury, Washington, D.C., to determine if the check has been cashed. If it has not been cashed, a new check will be sent. This process can also take several weeks. If it has been cashed, a new check cannot be sent until the person who cashed the check is identified. This procedure is time consuming and for some causes financial stress before another check is issued.

It is very important to promptly report a change of address to Social Security so that payments won't be interrupted. The report can be easily made by using Social Security's toll free number. A change of address should also be reported if direct deposit is being used. This ensures that any letters or notices sent to beneficiaries will be received.

All the inconvenience of not receiving a check can be avoided by having monthly benefits sent directly to a person's financial institution. This method also eliminates having to deposit or cash the check each month or wait on the postman on check day. Social Security and SSI beneficiaries are urged to have their checks sent Direct Deposit.

Texas efforts to reform its welfare programs are examined in the October issue of Fiscal Note, a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division.

As reported in Fiscal Note, more than 2.6 million Texans received \$2.2 billion worth of food stamps in 1993. That same year, more than 250,000 families qualified for \$53.3 million in Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC). In 1995, the cost of medical in Texas is expected to reach \$7.8 billion in state and federal funds.

"We must find ways to ensure that welfare assistance is transitional and does not become a way of life. This means helping families find jobs and earn a living wage, encouraging parental responsibility and reducing adult illiteracy. It means taking a tough look at the current system and admitting that some parts of it don't work," Sharp said.

According to recent surveys, eight of every 10 Americans believe the welfare system is badly flawed. The most frequent criticism is that the system fails to move people off the welfare rolls and into jobs. Other concerns include welfare fraud, inequities in benefits and rewarding out-of-wedlock births.

Even recipients complain about public assistance, saying the system leaves them isolated, frustrated and humiliated.

With this month's implementation of the Lone Star Card, Texas has taken a major step toward solving two problems: food stamp fraud and client inconvenience. Instead of traditional food stamps and welfare checks, nearly 16,000 families in the Houston area have begun using the Lone Star Card, a plastic debit card which permits them to deduct food purchases and AFDC allotments directly from their benefits account.

As of mid-October, Houston area merchants had rung up nearly 42,000 transactions on the Lone Star Card totaling \$1.6 million. "When the Lone Star Card expands statewide by January 1996, we will no longer see food stamps being traded for cash or used to buy illegal drugs and almost anything else you can buy with cash. Food stamp benefits will be used to feed hungry families—period," Sharp said.

"AFDC clients will no longer cash a check and receive their entire monthly allotment. They can use the Lone Star Card to withdraw their benefits in several installments. This reduces the risk and the temptation of carrying cash, and the client saves the large fees charged by some check-cashing establishments," Sharp said. "With the Lone Star Card, Texas has simplified the delivery of benefits, but we still face the enormous challenge of reforming the welfare system itself."

A recent survey by the National Governors' Association showed that 48 states are actively pursuing welfare reform. The reform efforts are as diverse as the states themselves, but they share some common goals: to encourage work by reducing penalties on earnings; enforce parental responsibility, particularly child support; change rules that penalize two-parent families; simplify the delivery of benefits; create jobs for welfare recipients and improve access to health care and child care.

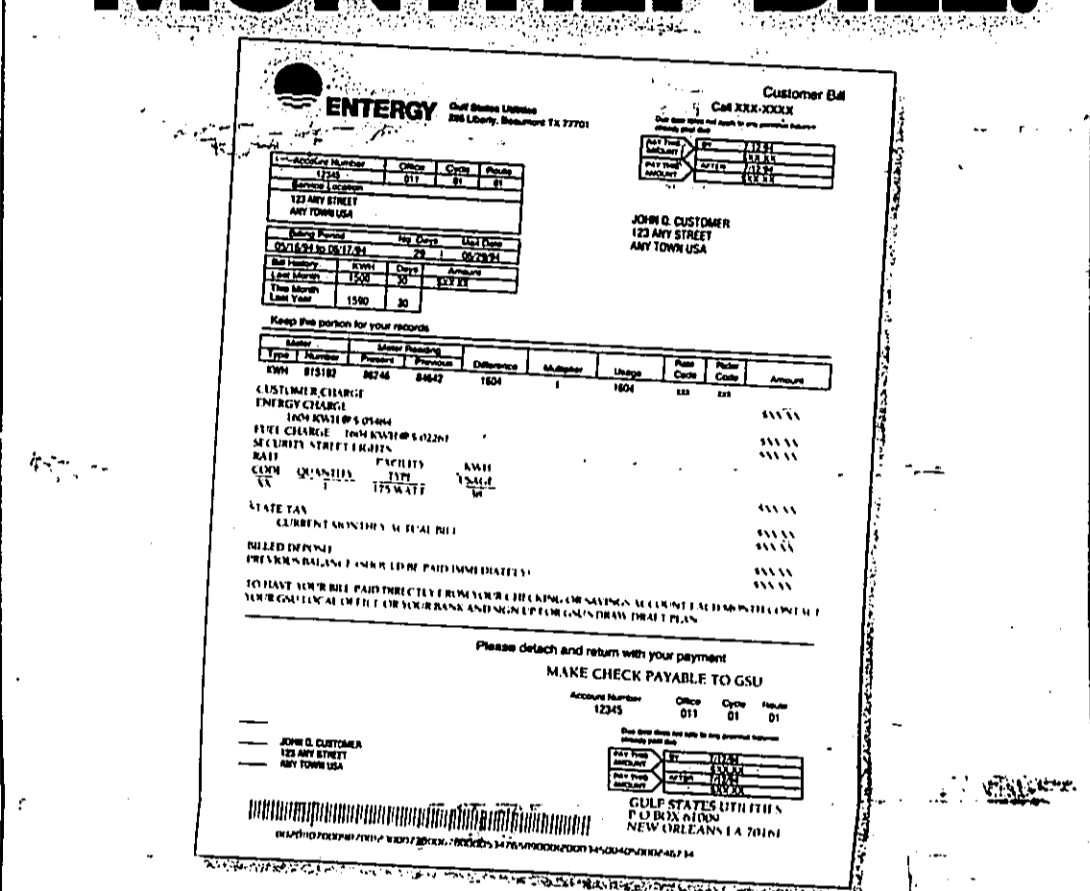
Three welfare reform initiatives are generating the most controversy: time limits on welfare benefits; denying additional benefits when welfare mothers give birth to more children; and "cashing out" food stamps—providing cash or equivalent benefits instead of food stamps.

"Looking at what is going on in other states, it is still too early to tell what works best—welfare reforms which reward recipients for improving their education, work and life-styles, or reforms which penalize people for refusing to change," Sharp said.

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# Social Security while in prison

LUFKIN—An often asked question is whether a person may be paid Social Security benefits while in prison. In general, the answer is "no," but there is an exception. At one time there were no restrictions in the law that prevented an incarcerated person from receiving benefits. If all factors of entitlement were met, benefits were paid. The types of benefits included retirement, survivors, disability and even student benefits, if appropriate.

In 1980 Legislative changes suspended disability payments to those imprisoned for a felony and also student benefits to those in prison. Those were the most common types of benefits paid to inmates. Retirement benefits for inmates age 62 or over were paid by the 1980 legislation. Neither were dependent benefits payable on the work record of a disabled inmate.

Additional language was added to read, in the case of disability, that any impairment that arose or was aggravated during the commission of a felony would not be considered in determining medical severity for entitlement. Further, this change also applied to any impairment that arose or was aggravated while in prison. These laws effectively eliminated disability and student benefits.

In 1983 the law was changed again to exclude retirement and survivor benefits to those in prison. Social Security claims are still processed for inmates who have eligible dependents.

Entitlement must be established for the worker in order to make payment to his/her dependents. The prisoner's benefits are suspended and would be payable beginning with the first full month after release from prison—if all other factors of entitlement are still met.

The only exception to the prohibition against receiving benefits while in prison is if the inmate is found to be entitled to a disability and is actively engaged in a vocational rehabilitation program approved by a court of law. The program must be expected to result in the inmate being able to do substantial gainful work upon release—and within a reasonable time.

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## Nicotine addiction study underway at medical college

HOUSTON—Scientists in Texas are exploring new approaches to the study of drug abuse, focusing on how nicotine addiction develops in the brain.

"Nicotine is a major drug of abuse and a major killer," said Dr. James Patrick, a neuroscientist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "The evidence is in more than 440,000 tobacco-related deaths annually in the U.S. and Canada."

In hopes of developing ways to overcome nicotine addiction, Patrick, himself an ex-smoker, is studying the molecular aspects of nicotine action in the brain.

"People often seem to think drugs of abuse achieve their results through 'magic,'" he said, "but, in fact, they modify the body in some way that causes it to need that drug."

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## Saturday wreck fatal

A Woodville man died as a result of injuries sustained in a car wreck which occurred at about 8 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 26, on Recreation Road 2.5 about 6 miles north of Colmesneil.

Richard Earl Ogden, 57, of Woodville, was driving a 1989 Gray Chevrolet Cavalier that police reports indicate left the pavement and struck the driver's side fender from where the car came to rest blocking the two lane road.

A subsequent accident occurred about 10 minutes later involving a vehicle with four passengers. The second vehicle hit Ogden's car which remained in the road.

Driver of the second car was Shawn Renee Black 27, of Colmesneil. Three other passengers all of Colmesneil included: Jeff Reed, 22; Carolyn Riegles, 49; and a four year old youth. Two were transported to the hospital with minor injuries.

## Rainbow trout stocking sites include Lake Tejas

AUSTIN — Rainbow trout will be stocked in 73 Texas sites this winter, down from a high of 80 last year because of severe cutbacks in the number of fish available from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Lake Tejas in Colmesneil, Tyler County, will receive trout this year.

Stocking will begin on Dec. 15 with 1,000 trout, then again on January 5 with 1,000 then on Feb. 2 with a final 1,000.

Trout normally are stocked before noon on the day listed.

The number of fish to be stocked and the stocking dates have not been determined, but Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials believe Texas anglers could see 50 percent less trout than last year. The department stocked almost 300,000 catchable-sized rainbow trout in 1993-94.

Last year, 80 locations received trout stockings from December through March. About 170 individual stockings of 280,000 trout were made. Another 18,500 trout were utilized in 16 special children's fishing events. This year, the number will be cut in half because of USFWS budget restraints.

However, 43 cities or organizations have contributed more than \$51,000 to purchase additional trout for this year's stockings.

"It's unfortunate that we'll have a 50 percent reduction in trout from the federal government. A lot of our people won't get fruit because of that decision," said Phil Durocher, TPWD Inland fisheries director. "We're looking for ways to increase those numbers. Hopefully, we can come up with some ideas or funding for purchasing more trout."

The department's rainbow trout program is supported with funds from the sale of Texas Freshwater Trout Stamps. The 57 stamps are required, in addition to a valid fishing license, for all those fishing for freshwater trout in Texas waters. Those exempted from fishing license requirements are not required to possess a trout stamp. The department sold 28,781 freshwater trout stamps in 1993-94.

TPWD first stocked trout in 1966 in two cooler tailrace areas as experimental work, said Pat Fulton, TPWD rainbow trout program leader in San Marcos. By the mid-1970s selected sites received annual stockings. In 1983, some smaller state park lakes were added to the annual stocking list.

The program began to grow in popularity in the 1980s. Because of the growing interest and the increased expense, the Texas Legislature instituted the trout stamp for users to support the program and the state's fisheries. The program has grown from an initial

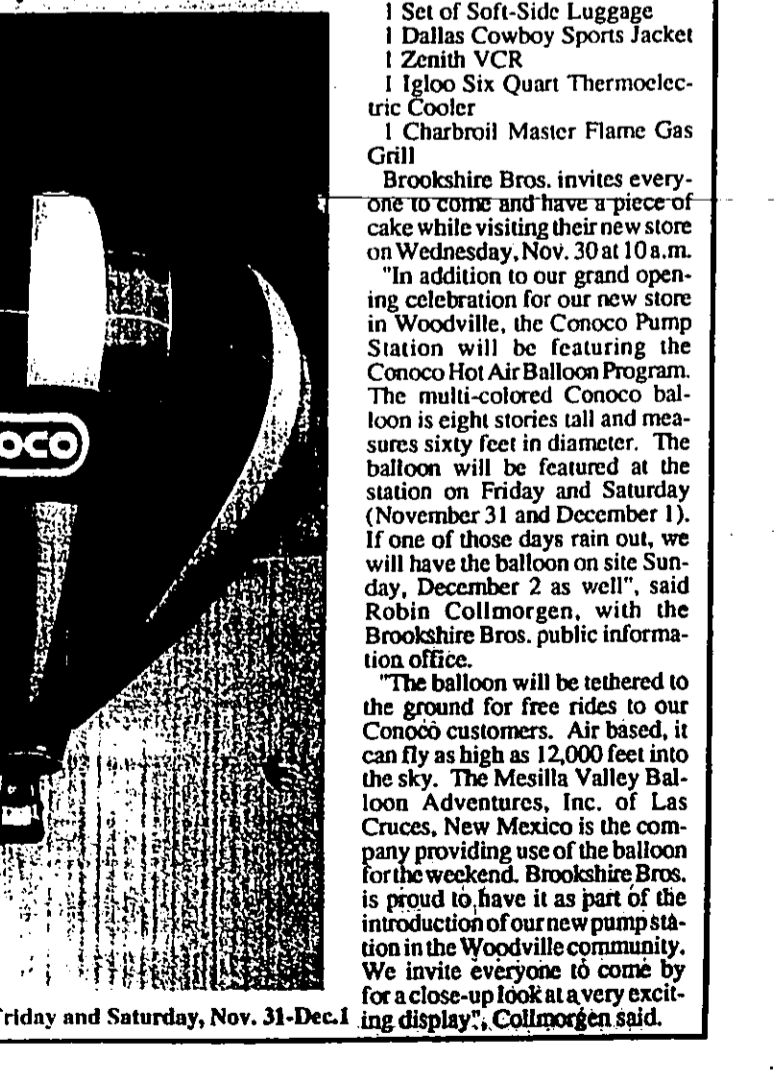

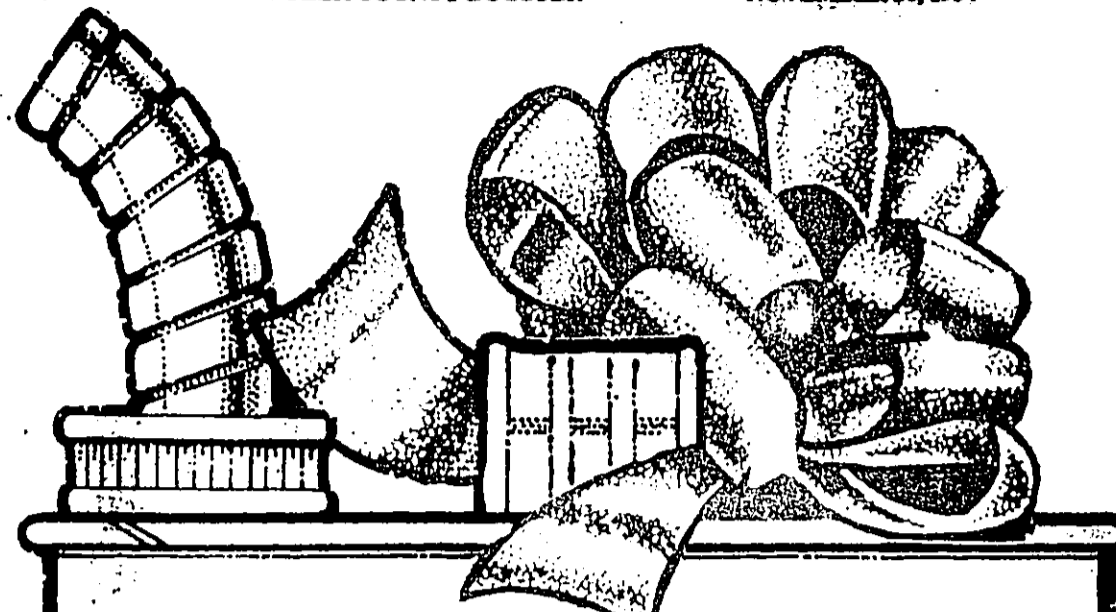

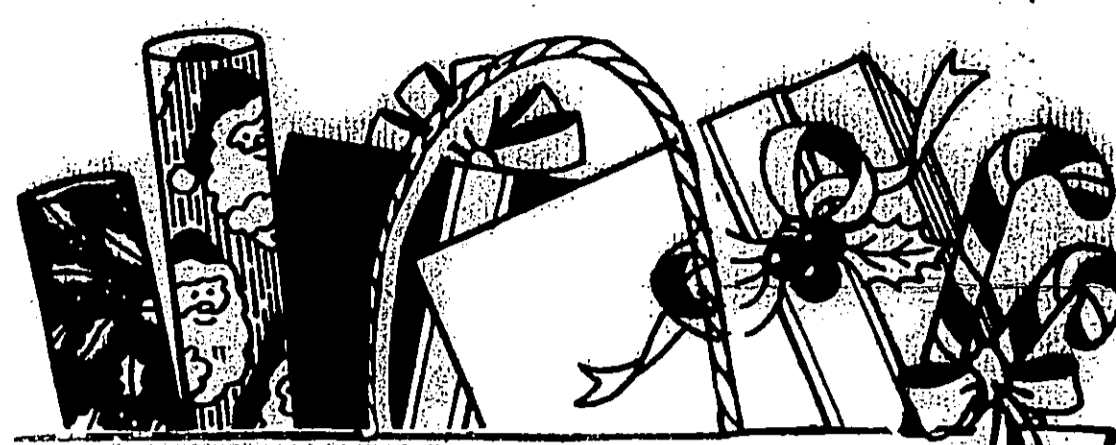

1. Stir lemon peel, lemon juice and butter in a heavy medium non-aluminum saucepan over medium heat until melted. Whisk eggs and sugar in a bowl until blended.

Gradually whisk in hot lemon mixture. Return to heat. Cook over medium heat until thick and smooth, about 8 minutes; do not boil. Transfer to a bowl. Press plastic wrap directly onto surface to keep, and refrigerate. Cool.

**FROSTING**  
8 ounces cream cheese, room temperature  
1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter or margarine, room temperature  
1 cup powdered sugar  
1/2 cup lemon curd (see above)

1. Using an electric mixer, beat cream cheese and butter until fluffy. Gradually beat in powdered sugar and lemon curd and beat just until combined.  
2. \*Prepared lemon curd, available in jars, 1/2 pint. Use 1/4 to 2 cups, reserving 1/4 cup for frosting.

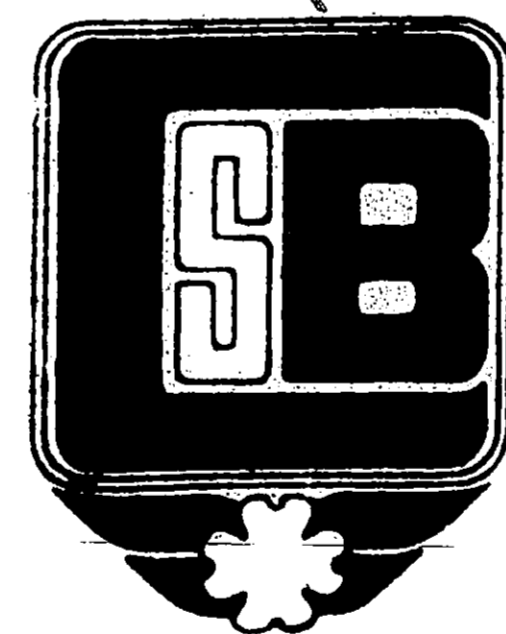

## The Brookshire history

The Brookshires first came to Texas in 1855 from Giles County, Tennessee. The founders of the Brookshire Brothers Food Stores were sons and daughters of P. J. “Uncle Jap” Brookshire. The sons were Austin, Houston, Tom, Bryan, Lee, Wood and Oscar; the daughters were, Annie Berry, Tennie Sanders and Abbie Smelley. The history of this family is similar to that of many of the families who first settled in East Texas. Some were born in log cabins, all knew the hard life of being raised on a poor East

Texas farm. The old Brookshire home place was about five miles east of Lufkin. The Brookshire boys worked at various occupations and jobs as they grew to manhood before entering the grocery business. They worked as farm hands in sawmills, chopped railroad ties, cut logs, laid steel on a railroad gang and taught in various country schools.

At the close of World War I, two of the brothers, Austin and Tom, after being discharged from the service, pooled their money and bought a grocery store on the courthouse square in Lufkin and named it Brookshire Brothers. As they opened the store on September 21, 1921, the brothers adopted the philosophy of “cash & carry,” the first grocery store of its kind in Angelina County. The story goes that their father, J.P. (Uncle Jap) got his feelings hurt repeatedly, by trying to get something charged, even when he had the money to pay for it. The “cash and carry” policy allowed the brothers to have the lowest price on groceries, and soon they became the area’s largest store.

The building occupied by the first Brookshire Brothers food store is still standing and is used today by the “Uncle Jap” monument. In the early days of Brookshire Brothers, so many mechanics regarded in front of the store to swap tales and visit, that the street became known as “Spit and Whittle.”

In 1923, Tom left the store to join a half brother who had a store in Corpus Christi, and was replaced by Lee. As the family participation increased, new stores were opened and in 1928 the family, which by now included several cousins and a few friends, decided to form a common group and to work toward a common goal. They did, and the Brookshire Brothers became a business reality.

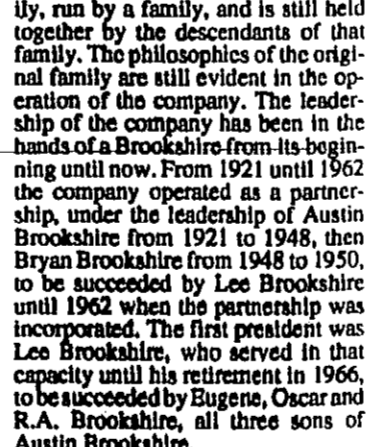
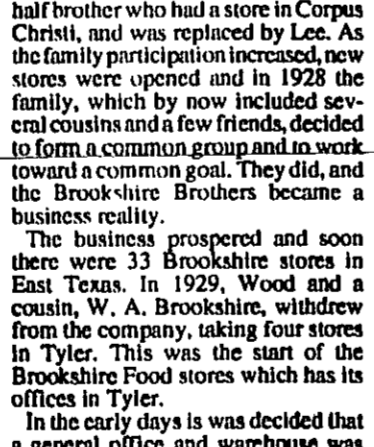
The business prospered and soon there were 33 Brookshire stores in East Texas. In 1929, Wood and a cousin, W. A. Brookshire, withdrew from the company, taking four stores in Tyler. This was the start of the Brookshire Food stores which has its offices in Tyler.

In the early days it was decided that a general office and warehouse was needed to meet the needs of administration, accounting and buying. After being in several buildings in 1952, the company purchased Moore Grocery and Lufkin Produce Company business and building located on the north side of the courthouse square in Lufkin. With the purchase of these businesses the company entered the wholesale trade and began to sell to other stores. By 1958, Brookshire Brothers moved out on the West Loop and built a building where it operated for about 10 years until it bought a parcel of land on the North Loop and built a larger building. Upon moving into the new building, they discontinued the wholesaling of goods to others and concentrated on serving only the Brookshire Brothers Food Stores.

During World War II, the people of rural East Texas left the farms to enter the service or work in the factories making war materials. At the close of the war, many of these people did not move back and many of the East Texas farm communities withered to the point they could no longer support a store. The number of Brookshire Brothers stores dwindled to 13.

In the 1950’s life returned to East Texas and the company was in a position to take advantage of this new-found opportunity. By 1990, Brookshire Brothers had 63 stores in East Texas and Louisiana and close to 3,100 employees.

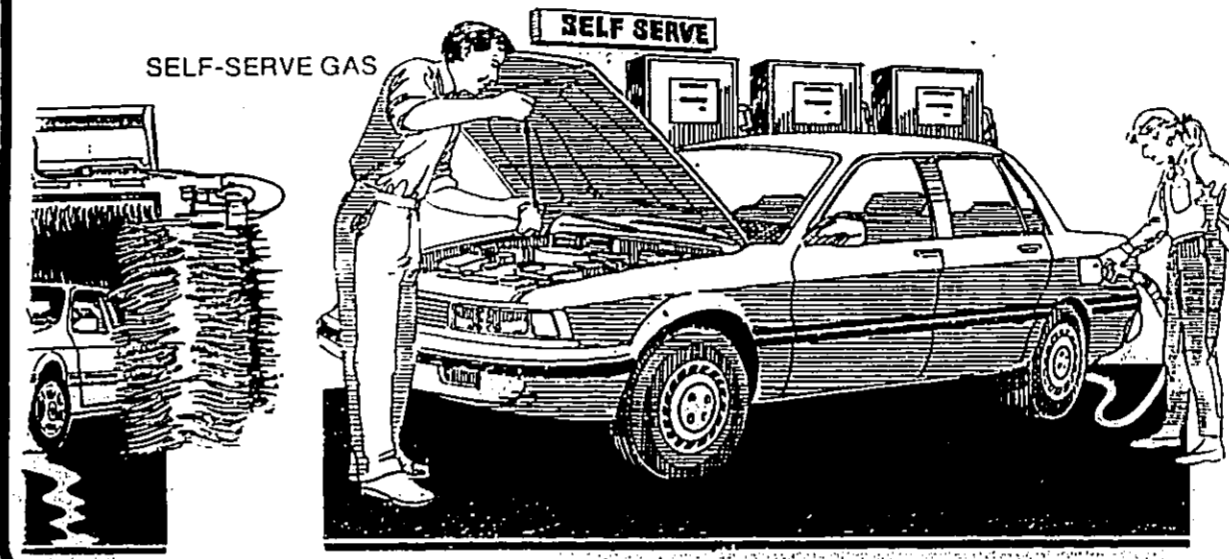
Brookshire Brothers has been truly a family affair. It was started by a family, run by a family, and it still held together by the descendants of that family. The philosophies of the original family are still evident in the operation of the company. The leadership of the company has been in the hands of a Brookshire from its beginning until now. From 1921 until 1962 the company operated as a partnership, under the leadership of Austin Brookshire from 1921 to 1948, then Bryan Brookshire from 1948 to 1950. The company was then succeeded by Lee Brookshire until 1962 when the partnership was incorporated. The first president was Lee Brookshire, who served in that capacity until his retirement in 1966, to be succeeded by Eugene, Oscar and R.A. Brookshire, all three sons of Austin Brookshire.

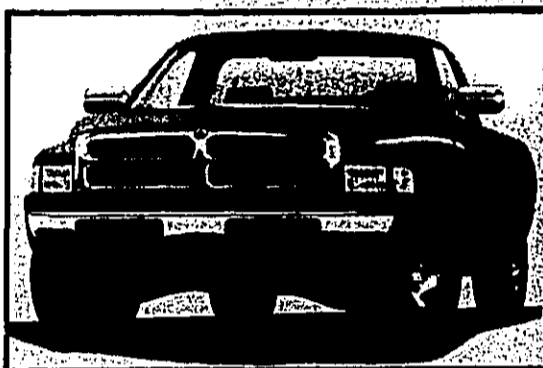

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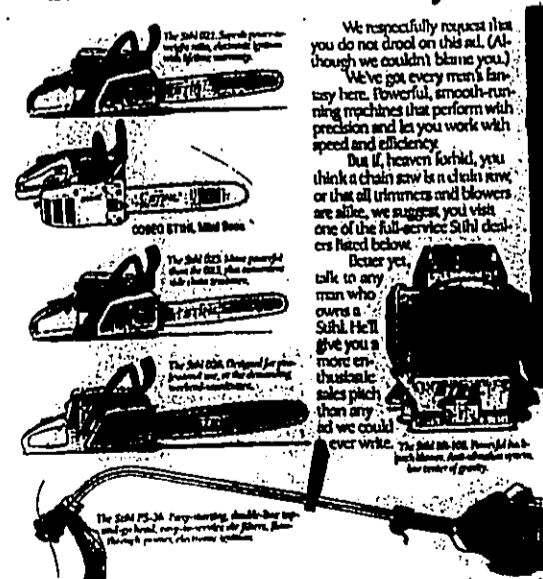

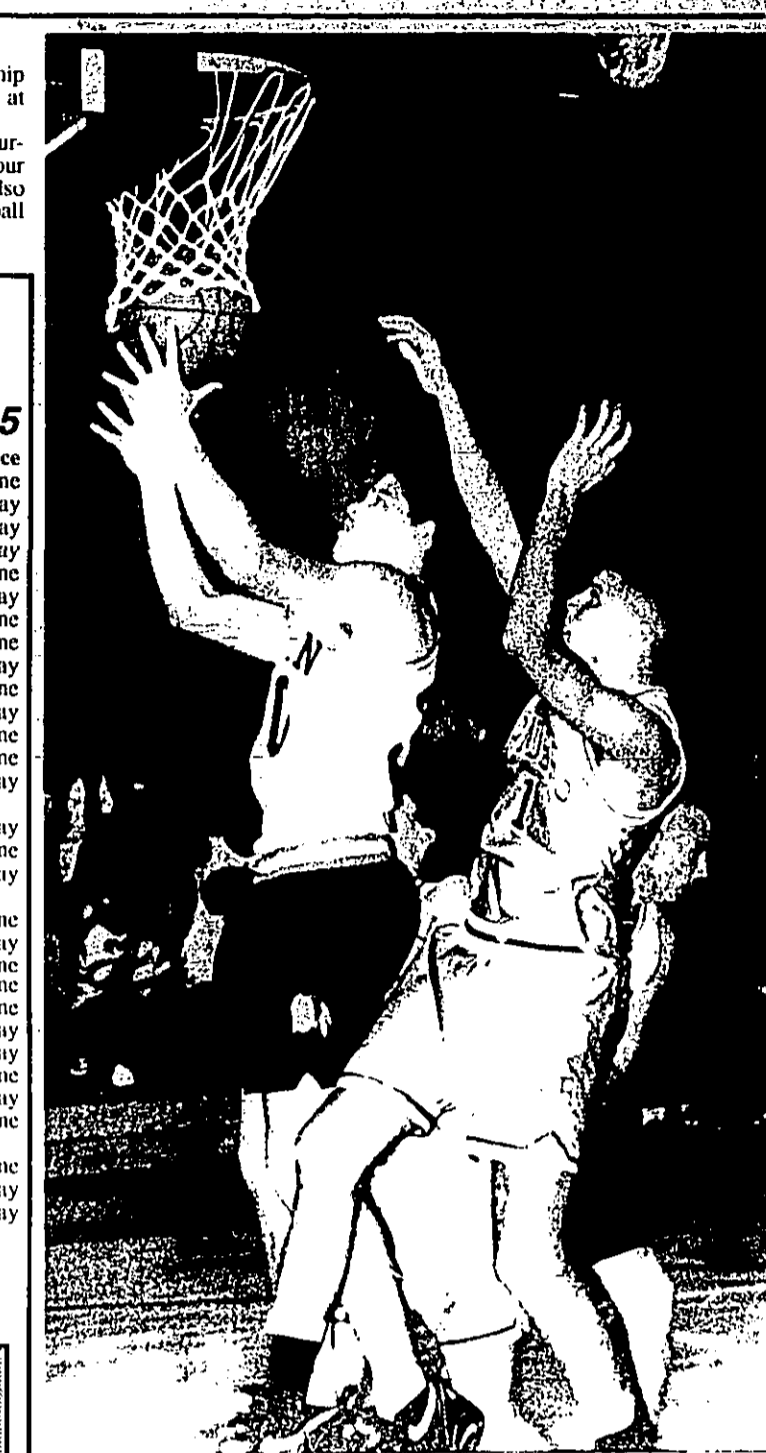

Hybrid sunfish don't pan out for Texas pond owners

OVERTON -- Texas pond owners should just stay to dealers who try to sell them hybrid mixes of bluegill and sunfish, according to a Texas A&M University fisheries expert. Coppernose bluegill are a much better choice for Texas ponds and lakes, according to Joe Lock, fisheries specialist with the TAMU Agricultural Extension Service in Overton. Out-of-state dealers typically advertise that the hybrid panfish will reach weights of 2 1/2 to 3 pounds, but this claim rarely pans out, Lock said. "I guess it's theoretically possible, but I've never seen it happen except where they are intensively fed. In the ordinary pond situation maybe one in 10,000 will get that large," Lock said. If not fed, the hybrids typically grow to about 1 1/4 pound. Some may reach a pound if the pond owner regularly feeds them, according to Lock. Another drawback is the stocked sunfish hybrid's first and subsequent spawns result in degenerate, off-type sunfish. "Like any hybrid, they're what you might call reproductively hindered," Lock said. The reverted sunfish are predators and will compete with young bass for food. Coppernose bluegill, on the other hand, if stocked with bass, will grow to the same size as the hybrid sunfish, but will breed true and serve as a food supply for the bass. Plus, there are many Texas fish dealers who supply coppernose bluegills at a price comparable to that of the out-of-state hybrid sunfish.

Many pond owners are reluctant to stock ponds with bluegill because the species will not only spawn in the spring but also in the fall and winter. Pond owners fear bluegills will overpopulate the pond and crowd out bass and other fish by sheer weight of numbers. Pond owners can easily avoid this scenario by following a few simple management rules, such as not over harvesting bass during the first season of fishing and stocking the right number of bluegill in the beginning. If both species are stocked and managed correctly, the result is vastly improved sport fishing of both. The bass will grow to "keeper" size while they thin out the bluegills. The surviving bluegill population will be larger and healthier. "Bluegill are the only native fish species that can sustain the large numbers needed to provide food for bass. Without them, a quality bass population will probably not develop," Lock said. Ironically, coppernose bluegill can be stocked for about the same price as the hybrid sunfish. Production costs are similar.

Spurger Pirates and Lady Pirates pillage Leggett and Warren

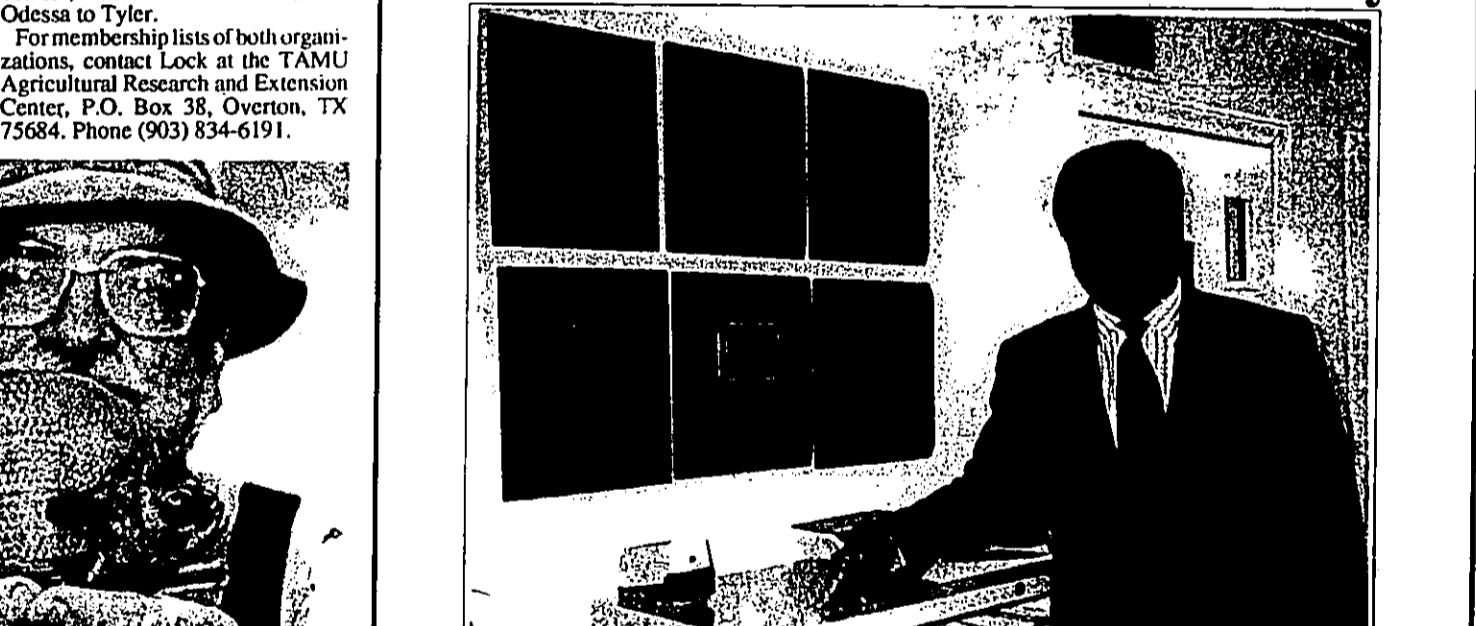

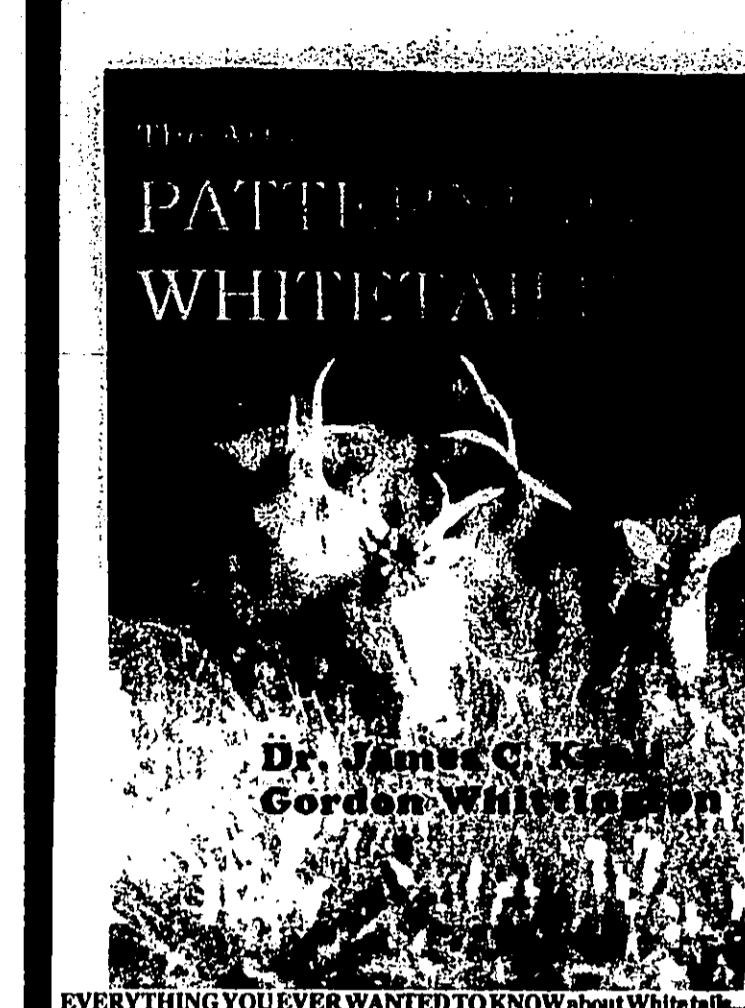

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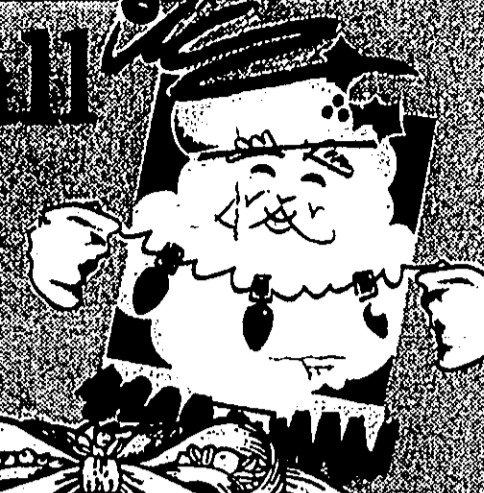

 Cogan's Syndrome corrected with electric ear implant device  
 NEW ORLEANS—In September, 1990, Francine Dove developed an ear ache that gradually worsened. By Halloween night she was completely deaf. Cogan's syndrome, a rare autoimmune condition, was diagnosed as the roof of Dove's deafness. As the condition progresses, the individual's immune system becomes confused and the antibodies which attack the virus also attack the inner ear and eyes. Usually triggered by a viral infection, Cogan's syndrome is typically diagnosed during its later stages.  
 Today, however, Dove can hear and communicate, thanks to a cochlear implant, an electronic device that was implanted in the bone behind her ear. A thin, flexible coil containing 22 separate electrodes were threaded through her cochlea, the spiral-shaped auditory chamber of the inner ear.  
 The implant is for someone who is totally deaf, not for the person who has normal hearing in one ear or who wants a replacement for a hearing aid, explains Dr. Timothy Molony, neuro-otologist at the Ochsner Eye Institute who performed the procedure on Dove.  
 Adult and children who develop complete deafness are candidates for the device.  
 Worldwide, approximately one person in a thousand is born deaf, according to the American Academy of Otolaryngology—Head and Neck Surgery, Inc. Nearly an equal number of people who are born with hearing will develop deafness during their lifetime. An estimated 250,000 to 500,000 people in the United States could benefit from a cochlear implant.  
 Deafness may be congenital or acquired. For example, it can be caused by damage to the inner ear. However, the majority of these persons, even those with "nerve deafness," have nerve fibers left in the ear, explains Molony. These nerve fibers may be able to send signals (sound) to the brain if they are stimulated electrically.  
 Sound normally travels along the canal of the external ear and causes the ear drum to vibrate. The middle ear's three small bones conduct this vibration from the ear drum to the cochlea. Fluid waves in the cochlea, initiated...

**Should limitation on retiree earnings be eliminated?**  
 Throughout the years, there has been a great deal of discussion regarding the elimination of earnings limits for Social Security beneficiaries. Those in favor of eliminating the so-called "retirement test" believe that the restriction on earnings hampers a work disincentive, and that its removal will increase the labor supply and tax revenues. People who want to keep the limitations believe that eliminating the retirement test would result in billions of dollars in additional benefits - creating additional stress on Social Security trust funds.  
 Earnings limitations were included in the original Social Security Act to promote the program's objective of partially replacing lost earnings after withdrawal from the labor force. So the retirement test actually began on a philosophical note - and to an extent has been perpetuated on this basis throughout the years.  
 The earnings limitation was originally a flat rate. However, through the years it has been gradually changed - all in a liberal direction. In the 1980's, the law was changed to allow retirees ages 65-70 to earn more wages without losing benefits, than those ages 62 to 65. After age 70 there is no earnings limit, down from age 73 a few years ago.  
 A recent Social Security study concluded that 80% or more of the 9.7 million persons age 65 through 69 would not change their work effort if the limitation on earnings were eliminated. The number of individuals who would modify their hours worked and earnings are fairly evenly split among those who would increase or decrease their work activity.  
 According to the study, economic theory suggests that the best way to eliminate the retirement test should be to have little effect on those with no earnings, or earnings below the offset. These beneficiaries already have the opportunity to work more without penalty.  
 Should lead to increased earnings for those whose earnings are at the threshold, since their benefits will no longer be lost due to excessive earnings.  
 Should have a mixed effect on the earnings of those who lose only some benefits as a result of the offset. They would either increase hours of work if the offset no longer applied - or decrease work in favor of additional benefits available.  
 The study concludes that the overall net effect of eliminating the retirement test would be minimal, especially as regards more earnings and thus more tax income. Thus, a natural question might well be - will the retirement test be eventually eliminated. The answer is unknown at this time. While the elimination of the test has been proposed many times, to date it has failed to gain favorable support from Congress. An assumption might be that since the test has been liberalized over the years - the chances might be good for repeal - but this is only an assumption.

**Relief is spelled m-o-d-e-r-a-t-i-o-n**  
 HOUSTON -- For people who suffer from indigestion during the holidays, relief is spelled m-o-d-e-r-a-t-i-o-n.  
 "The holidays are a common time for people to get indigestion," said Dr. Alan Buchman, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "You can avoid nursing the festivities by being careful about how, when and what you eat."  
 Acid indigestion, or heartburn, is often caused by a backlog of stomach acid into the esophagus, a long tube connecting the throat and stomach. Buchman says indigestion can usually be avoided by not eating late night meals, eating at a casual pace, and cutting back on certain foods.  
 "If you eat holiday leftovers late at night, the esophagus cannot clear out the acid before you go to sleep," Buchman said. "When you lie down flat, there is no gravity to help the esophagus force out the acid."  
 Holiday revelers should keep fatty foods to a minimum, says Buchman, because they may increase the risk of heartburn.  
 "The fat in creamy sauces and other foods can cause acid build-up," said Buchman, who is also director of nutrition support services at Baylor.  
 Heartburn signs to watch for may include burning sensation in the chest or throat, nausea, coughing, hoarse eating, and difficult or painful swallowing.  
 Antacids usually relieve heartburn symptoms, but if the user takes regularly, they can cause constipation or diarrhea.  
 "Don't put off seeing a doctor if the pain becomes severe," Buchman said. "If the pain is continuous, more pressure than burning or the pain radiates to jaw or arm, seek medical help immediately. You could have ulcers, gallstones, or a heart attack."  
 For a heartburn-free holiday, Buchman recommends the following:  
 • Eat small meals.  
 • Avoid or cut back on caffeine-containing products like cola, coffee, tea, and chocolate, and mints, aspirin, cigarettes and alcoholic beverages.  
 • Refrain from wearing tight belts or other restrictive clothing.  
 • Do not bend over immediately after eating.  
 • Wait at least one hour before lying down after eating.  
 "It's unrealistic to stay away from rich foods during the holidays," Buchman says, "but use common sense and don't overdo it."

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Keep moving: activity important for retirees

HOUSTON — Ready to retire? Two experts on aging at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston offer some advice. "Keep moving" and find something you like to do. "It is almost as if retirement catches some people by surprise," said Susan Shekelle, senior social worker in Baylor's Geriatric Clinic. "You cannot just walk up to the door on retirement day and say 'so what now?'" As a first step, Shekelle suggests finding some enjoyable physical activity. "A real contributor to aging well is to literally keep moving, physically as well as mentally," she said. "Find an activity that keeps the muscles in good working order... like walking at a mall or in your neighborhood." Careful thought as to what will replace work is another essential, says Dr. Naomi Nelson, a psychologist in Baylor's Department of Neurology. She advises people to look for activities that fill their needs for achievement and accomplishment, not just for something that fills time. "What works for your friends may not be right for you," Nelson said. "Be creative, and look within yourself to find what is best for you."

Sharp says re-inventing welfare will help reduce welfare dependency

AUSTIN — "Public assistance in Texas, as in most other states, is like a treadmill with no 'off' switch," State Comptroller John Sharp said. "Welfare was intended to be a temporary measure to help people who are in a financial crisis get back on their feet. But too many people are forced to remain on welfare because they are unable to get solid footing in a job or decent housing. Welfare regulations discourage self-reliance and encourage long-term dependence, and this has got to stop," Sharp said. "At the request of Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, the Comptroller's Office is developing a comprehensive welfare reform plan to present to the 1995 Legislature," Sharp said. Texas' efforts to reform its welfare programs are examined in the October issue of Fiscal Note, a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division. As reported in Fiscal Note, more than 2.6 million Texans received \$2.2 billion worth of food stamps in 1993. That same year, more than 250,000 families qualified for \$53.3 million in Aid to Families With Dependent Children (AFDC). In 1995, the cost of Medicaid in Texas is expected to reach \$7.8 billion in state and federal funds. "We must find ways to ensure that welfare assistance is transitional and does not become a way of life. This means helping families find jobs and earn a living wage, encouraging parental responsibility and reducing adult illiteracy. It means taking a tough look at the current system and admitting that some parts of it don't work," Sharp said. According to recent surveys, eight out of every 10 Americans believe the welfare system is badly flawed. The most frequent criticism is that the system fails to move people off the welfare rolls and into jobs. Other concerns include welfare fraud, inequities in benefits and rewarding out-of-wedlock births. Even recipients complain about public assistance, saying the system leaves them isolated, frustrated and humiliated. With this month's implementation of the Lone Star Card, Texas has taken a major step toward solving two problems: food stamp fraud and client inconvenience. "Medication alone is not enough," said Dr. Benjamin Interiano, assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Patients can take an active role in the management of their disease by becoming detectives searching for what triggers their asthma."

Late Social Security checks cause problems

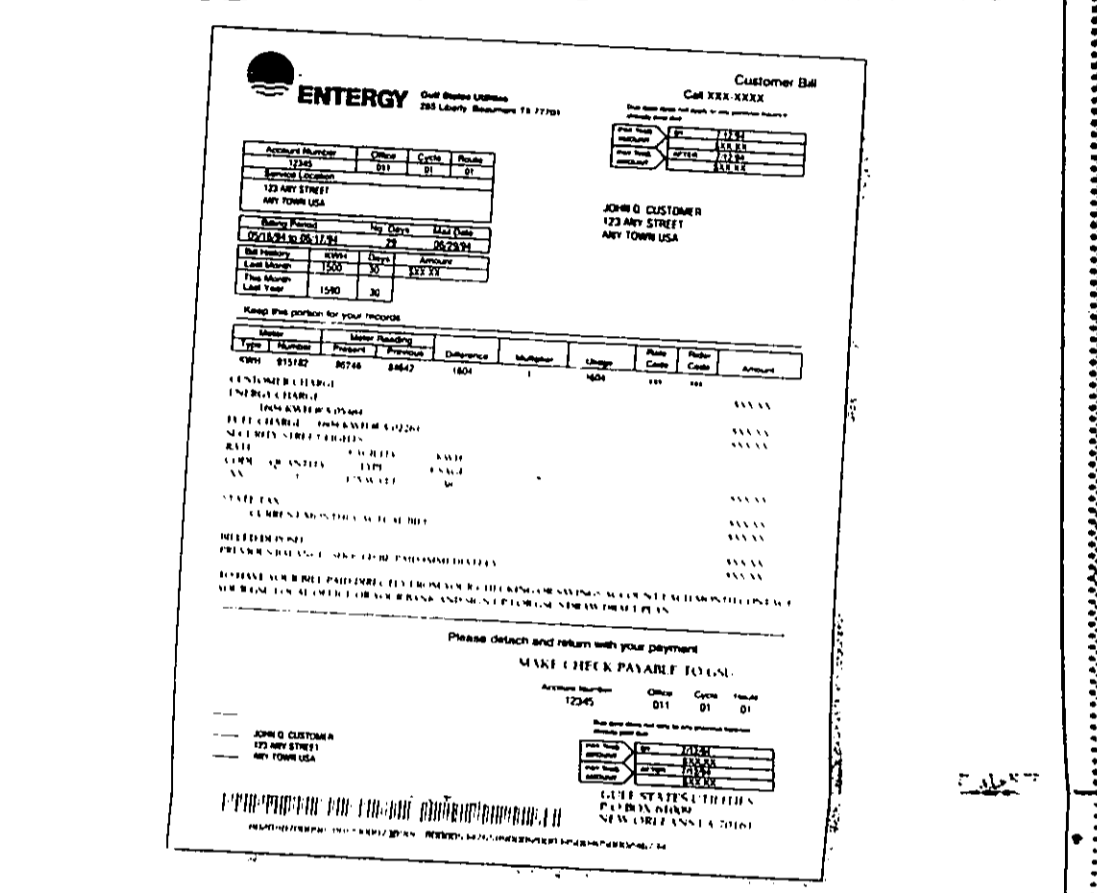
LUFKIN - A person whose Social Security check does not arrive on the date it is expected should wait for three more mail deliveries before contacting Social Security. According to David Bennett, district manager of the Lufkin Social Security office, this will allow the postal service ample time for delivery and will take care of most of the delayed checks. If the check still has not arrived after three days, Social Security can begin necessary action for a replacement check. The most common cause of failure to receive a check is failure to report a change of address. Many people fail to notify Social Security when they move, even though they rely on their Social Security checks as their primary source of income. Some people think it is enough to report their change of address to the post office, Bennett stated. The post office, however, will forward mail to the person's new address only for a certain length of time. After that check is returned to the U.S. Treasury. If a person's check is returned and a new address provided, it can take up to several weeks for a new check to be sent. If the check was not returned, a stop payment will be put on it and the matter will be transferred to the U.S. Treasury, Washington, D.C. To determine if the check has been cashed, it has not been cashed, a new check will be sent. This process can also take several weeks. If it has been cashed, a new check cannot be sent until the person who cashed the check is identified. This procedure is time consuming and for some causes financial stress before another check is issued. It is very important to promptly report a change of address to Social Security so that payments won't be interrupted. The report can be easily made by using Social Security's toll free number. A change of address should also be reported if direct deposit is being used. This ensures that any letters or notices sent to beneficiaries will be received. All the inconvenience of not receiving monthly benefits sent directly to a person's financial institution. This method also eliminates having to deposit or cash the check each month or wait on the postman on check day. Social Security and SSI beneficiaries are urged to have their checks sent Direct Deposit.

physician discover conditions that are aggravating the disease," said Interiano, who is also medical director of the Baylor Methodist Hospital Asthma Institute of Houston. Asthma is often triggered by allergies to pollen, ragweed, the dust, pets, foods and other irritants. "Once these triggers are determined, patients can decrease their chances of an attack," Interiano said. "It can be as simple as watching the pollen count or as difficult as trying to keep dust out of the house." Common non-allergic triggers include smoke, perfumes, air pollution, stress, sudden weather changes, exercise, colds and other respiratory infections. "When triggers are unavoidable, the physician can help the patient alter medication on these days," Interiano said. "Patients with inhaler medications should learn how to use the device properly." Exercise is one trigger that Interiano recommends not be avoided. "Swimming or any aerobic exercise will be helpful to asthmatics," he said. "However, they should avoid activities where they would breathe in cold, dry air, and always have their doctor review their exercise plan." A relatively new tool in asthma management recommended by Interiano is the peak-flow meter, an inexpensive, plastic device that measures breath strength. Patients blow into the device causing a small plastic ball to move up the scale. Good, precautionary and danger zone readings can be established with the help of a physician. "The peak-flow meter is like a thermometer," Interiano said. "By using it at home, patients can give their physician an objective view of how their asthma is behaving, often avoiding an unnecessary visit of how their asthma is behaving, often avoiding an unnecessary trip to the emergency room." Interiano encourages patients to involve not only their physician, but also their family in the asthma management team.

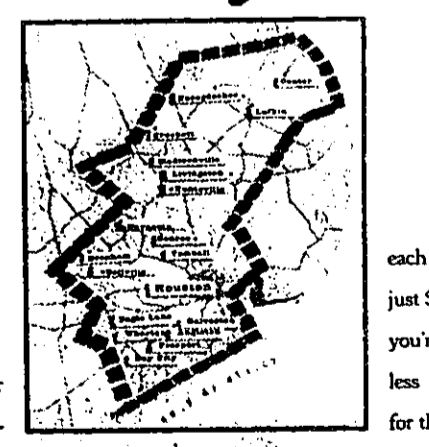

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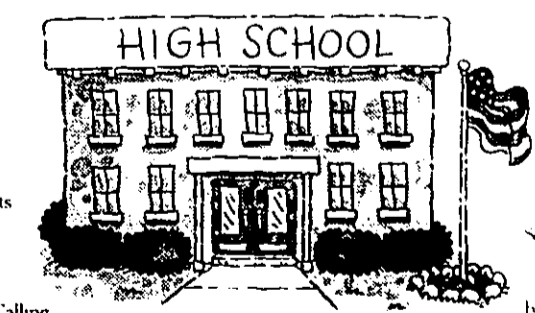


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
