A private pesticide applicator training and testing will be held Dec. 7, starting with registration at 8:30 a.m., at the Newton County Civic Center in Newton. The training consists of a 3.5 hour video tape presentation followed by a test administered by a Texas Depart-ment of Agriculture representative. Persons must pass the test with a score of 70 or better and pay the state \$50 before they will be issued a pesticide license. Anyone planning to go through the training and test would be advised to purchase the study materials for \$14 from the County Extension offices of Tyler, Jasper or Newton counties prior

Anyone who currently has a pesticide license dated prior to 1989 must get 15 hours of continuing education credit before Dec. 31 or lose his power to purchase restricted use chemicals. WASHINGTON D.C. - Sign-up for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Tree Assistance Program (TAP), a disaster assistance program, began on Nov. 21 and will continue through March 31, 1995.

Under TAP, USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will reimburse eligible small and medium scale commercial tree and nursery inventory growers for up to 65 percent, after adjustment for normal mortality.

Eligible trees include commercial trees planted for fait and put appetuation.

Eligible trees include orchard trees planted for fruit and nut production; nursery tree and nontree plants, including vineyards' and forest tree seedlings planted in 1993 or 1994 to produce timber, pulp, or Christmas trees that were ost in calendar year 1994 due to damaging weather and related conditions, ncluding floods, excessive rainfall, freeze, drought, tornado and earthquake To be eligible, each grower of orchard trees must own 500 acres or less, and each grower of forest trees must own 1,000 acres or less. Nursery inventory

has no maximum acreage ownership restriction.

Eligible owners must also have an annual qualifying gross revenue of less than \$2 million in the tax year preceding the year during which the losses occurred. Each eligible owner with 1994 losses may not receive more than

The Farm Service Agency, (which includes the former Agricultural Stabiization and Conservation Service) which administers the TAP, will disburse the payments after applications have been approved by the local FSA offices (formerly ASCS offices). A private pesticide applicator training and testing will be held Dec. 7, starting with registration at 8:30 a.m., at the Newton County Civic Center in Newton. The training consists of a 3.5 hour video tape presentation followed by a test administered by a Texas Department of Agriculture representative. Persons must pass the test with a score of 70 or better and pay the state \$50 before they will be issued a pesticide license. Anyone planning to go through the training and test would be advised to purchase the study materials for \$14 from the County Extension offices of Tyler, Jasper or Newton counties prior to Dec. 7.

Anyone who currently has a pesticide license dated prior to 1989 must get 15 hours of continuing education credit before Dec. 31 or lose his power to purchase restricted use chemicals Also at the Newton County Civic Center on Dec. 7, the County Extension Offices of Tyler, Jasper and Newton Counties will be sponsoring a five hour recertification program. Registration for this event will also begin at 8:30 a.m. Participants in both programs need to

bring a sack lunch. Those planning to sit on the recertification satellite transmission for the five hour credit must pay \$5 per person to help defray the cost of the satellite

WASHINGTON D.C. — Sign-up for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Tree Assistance Program (TAP), disaster assistance program, began on Nov. 21 and will continue through Under TAP, USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will reimburse eli-

gible small and medium scale comnercial tree and nursery inventory prowers for up to 65 percent, after istment for normal mortality. Eligible trees include orchard trees planted for fruit and nut production; sursery tree and nontree plants, including vineyards' and forest tree seed-lings planted in 1993 or 1994 to produce timber, pulp, or Christmas trees that were lost in calendar year 1994 due to damaging weather and related conditions, including floods, exces-sive rainfall, freeze, drought, tornado To be eligible, each grower of or-

chard trees must own 500 acres or less, and each grower of forest trees must own 1,000 acres or less. Nursery inventory has no maximum acreage wnership restriction. Eligible owners must also have an annual qualifying gross revenue of less than \$2 million in the tax year preceding the year during which the losses occurred. Each eligible owner

with 1994 losses may not receive more than \$25,000.

The Farm Service Agency, (which includes the former Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service) which administers the TAP, will disburse the payments after applications have been approved by the local FSA offices (formerly ASCS offices). 


