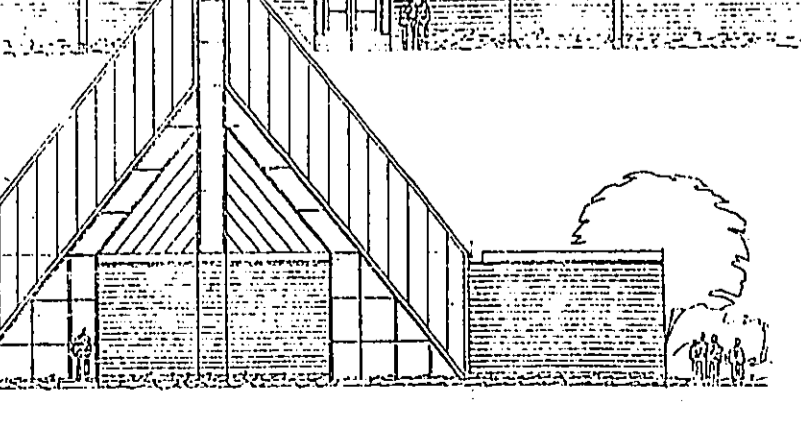
"Our job is to bring the message home to our community and our local churches," said Morrison, quoting Chaplain Solomon who says, "Systems don't solve anything...but community can."

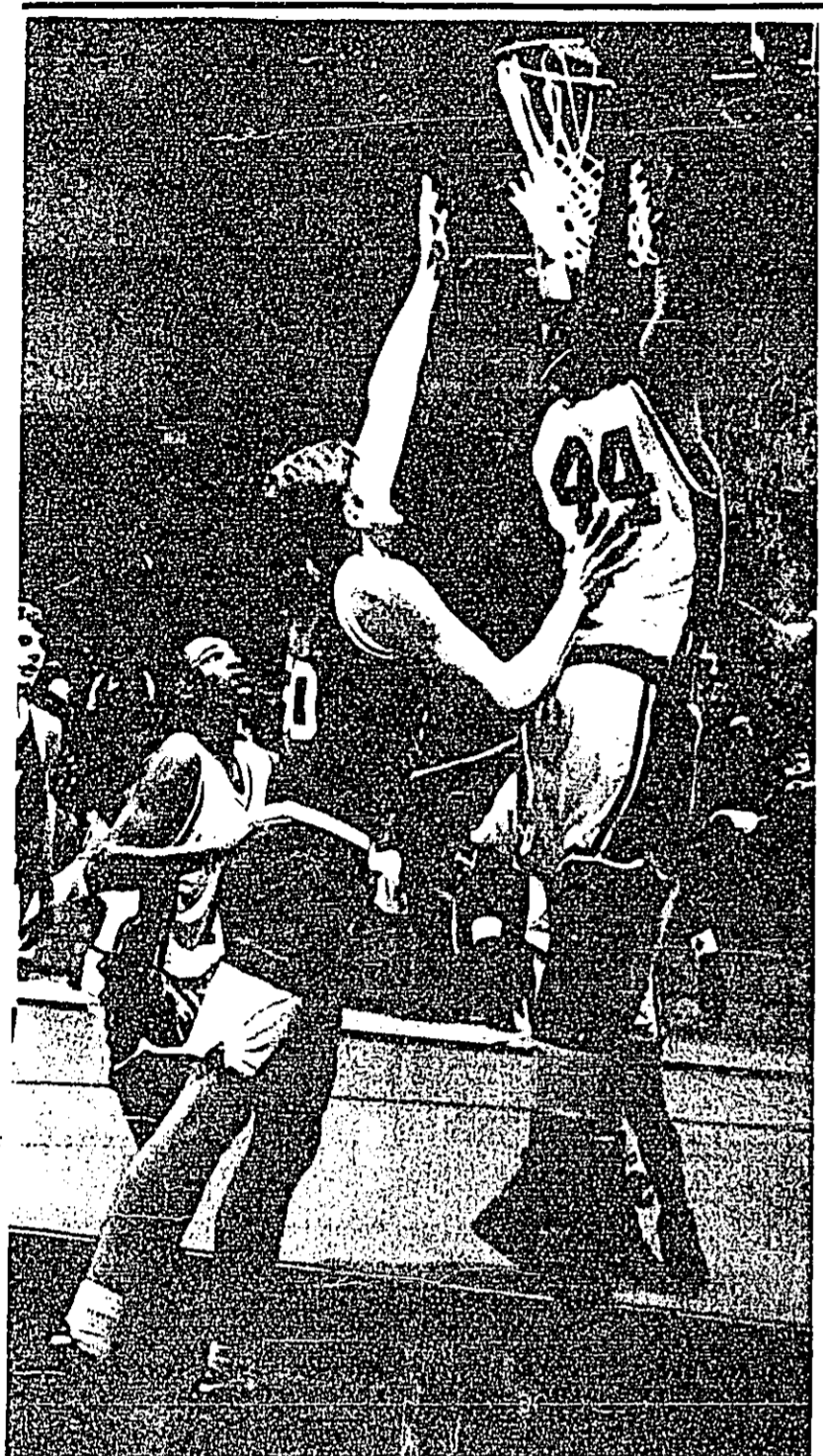

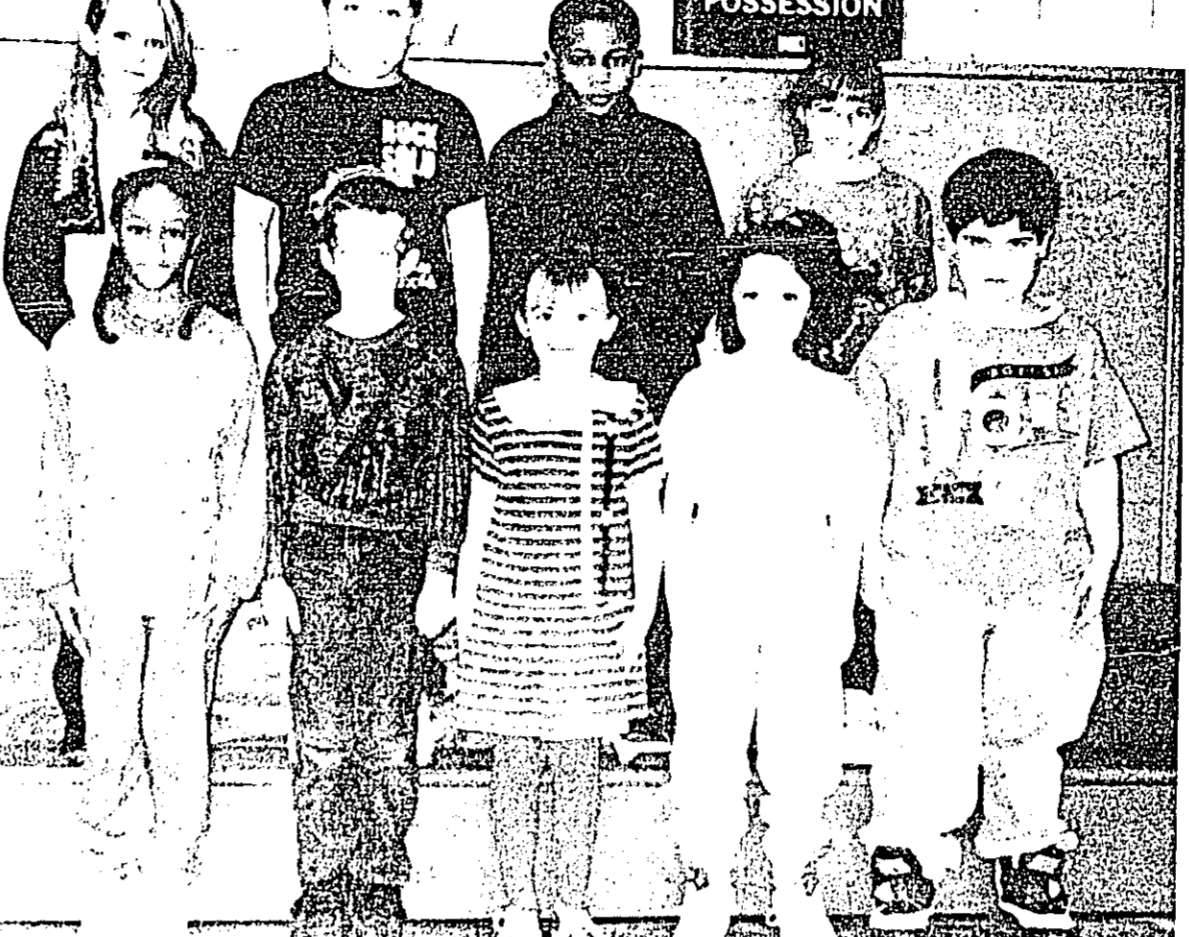

Time running out for WWII vets to find old friends

RIVERSIDE, Ca. — The recent 50-year celebration of D-Day was a somber reminder for many World War II veterans that those wartime buddies who did survive the war are fast succumbing to old age. Many veterans lost touch with their friends upon the war's end and a return to civilian life.

Several search organizations assist vets in finding old comrades. One relatively new and unique one is the Registry of American Veterans (ROAV). It was begun to alleviate the problems veterans encounter in searching for one another and putting them back in touch with each other.

ROAV gathers information from veterans and computerizes their name, current residence, military units they served in and the time periods served in each outfit. Persons who join ROAV will receive an initial and annual print-out of the database information of all veterans who served in the same unit during the same time frame as the joining member. The printout will show the current address and phone number of surviving unit members.

Jack Knight, Executive Director of ROAV, remarked, "The Registry has received thousands of requests from veterans since it was started in May 1993. The majority of letters come from WWII veterans who are searching for old war buddies. The 11-hour plight of these veterans was summed up in a letter from LeRoy Good from Frankfort, Indiana.

Good, who was helped by ROAV, wrote, "I called a name in New York City and it was the one I was looking for. It was a bad situation as his wife answered the phone and she informed me he had just died that morning. One is surely lost for words at a time like that. We hadn't seen each other since the summer of 1943.

Veterans are encouraged to write to ROAV at the following address: Registry of American Veterans, P.O. Box 51148, Riverside, California 92517. Registry information forms will be sent which will enable them to have their information added to the ROAV database.

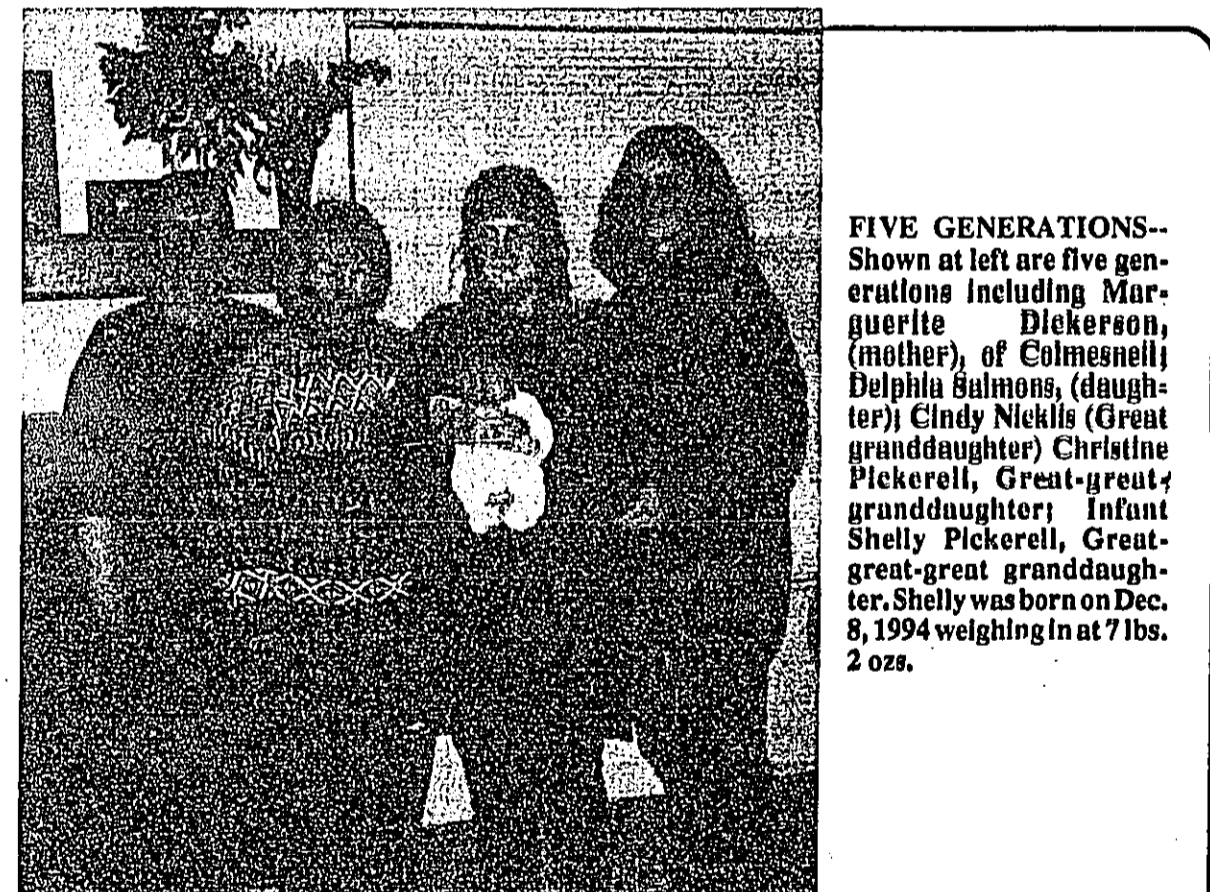

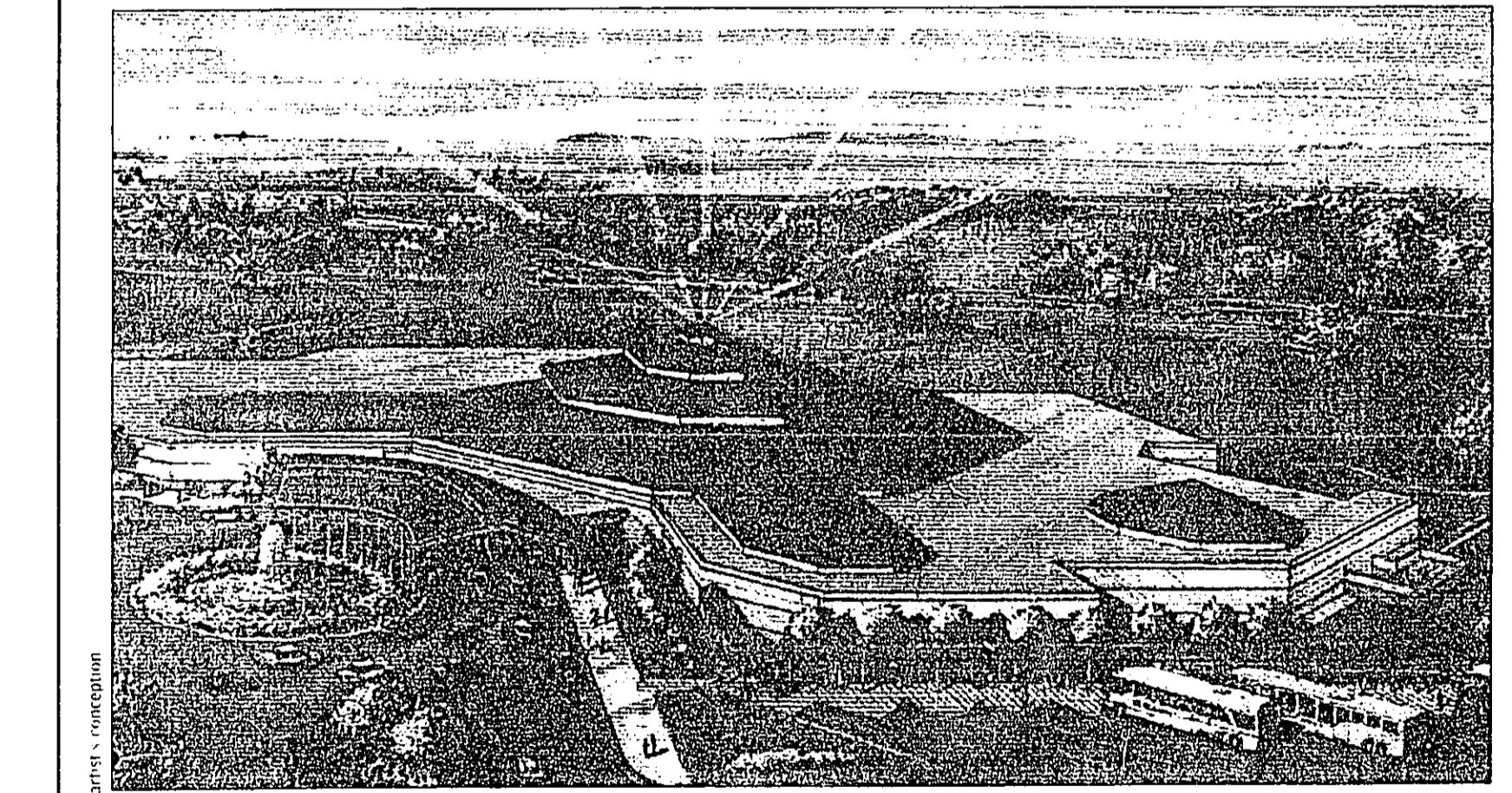
Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is a Federal needs program administered by the Social Security Administration. It provides an economic floor-of-protection for Americans age 65, or over or of any age if blind or disabled, and who have limited income and resources. Benefits and administrative costs are paid from general revenues - not Social Security trust funds. In the seven counties serviced by the Lufkin Social Security office, there are over 5,000 men, women and children receiving about a million dollars per month in SSI benefits. Single persons may have resources valued up to \$2,000 and couples up to \$3,000 and still meet the resource limit. For children under age 18, parents' resources are also considered. These limits appear to be rather small amounts but many things are not counted in arriving at these figures. Some of the most common items which are excluded in part or entirely are:

- A home and joining land which a person owns and makes their principal residence, regardless of its value.
- Personal effects and household goods with a total equity value of \$2,000 or less, if the total equity exceeds \$2,000, the excess value counts toward the above limits. Equity value



USDA weeds out Texas field offices

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will move 74 field offices in Texas and close 34 in a five-year restructuring period designed to cut federal spending. When complete, 35 Texas counties will be without field offices. The remaining 219 on-site service centers will include the offices of the Farm Service Agency as well as the Natural Resources Conservation Service. The USDA will save an estimated \$2.3 billion nationwide when restructuring is complete.

The following counties will lose their USDA offices: Anderson, Borden, Camp, Dallas, Franklin, Glasscock, Gregg, Grimes, Harrison, Hill, Knox, Kowalek, Madison, McKinnon, Menard, Morris, Nolan, Pecos, Rockwall, Sabine, San Jacinto, Tyler, Ward and Zavala.

I reckon it's no mystery why folks enjoy talking over hard times past. Makes the comfortable present look better, for one thing. For another, it revives that spirit of camaraderie that often evolves when people share tough going.

Philip Dozier was here most of the day fixing our septic system. Found the high seas with never a second generation at that. We spent a pleasant half hour swapping yarns about the joys of fighting out during the time of a sand glass. Later, knots were tied at known intervals in the line, from whence the nautical "knot" derived. A knot means one nautical mile per hour, and these daily records of speed came to be known as the Log.

When wells began to go more than a few feet deep, it became desirable to record each day's progress. And the sailor roughnecks called it the drilling log, which it has remained.

Then in 1927 the Schlumberger brothers of Alsace invented a method of making continuous electrical measurements in boreholes. "Diagrams" is what they called these records in French, of course, but the Patch wasn't buying into that. The "diagrams," being plotted vs. depth, resembled graphical drilling logs. Very soon they became universally known as electrical logs, a generic term now carved in stone. In my 25 years with Schlumberger, I recorded, interpreted and wrote about thousands of such logs in many parts of the world. I know of no finer organization anywhere than the world family of Schlumberger companies.

Another of the Patch's language peculiarities is the pronunciation of the Schlumberger name. It does not rhyme with hamburger. Alsace is a province between France and Germany. Its roots and culture are solidly French. "Schlumberger" hence becomes "Schlumber-bear-zhay" roughly speaking, usually slurred to Slumberjay in the Patch. So now you know. Shalom...

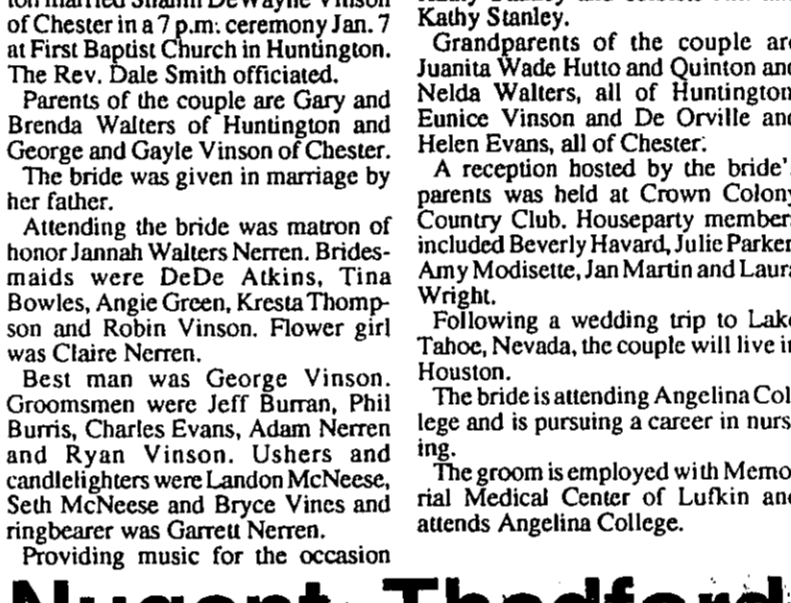

Woodville group building prison chapel that says: 'Our God Is Alive!'

Chapel Life Ministries, of Woodville, is responding to a vision from God to build a freestanding worship center at the 1,300 Gib Lewis Unit, where that says "Our God Is Alive!"

The organization, which began forming in June, 1991, culminated its design concept for the new 3,120 square foot worship center at a meeting of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Board meeting in Gatesville, Tex. at the 52nd District Courthouse on Sept. 11, 1992.

Chairman of the organization, John Morrison, was invited by TDCJ Executive Director James Lynagh, and presented his vision to the board only minutes after the board approved a billion dollar budget for the following year "To help solve the crime problem in Texas."

"We appreciate what you folks in Woodville are doing down there," said Board Chairman Selden Hale, of Amarillo.

That acknowledgment of the board project led to a "blanket approval of donations of buildings, chapels and other structures that will voluntarily promote positive interaction and intervention in the rehabilitation of criminal offenders by developing their moral and spiritual consciousness."

"Our purpose in doing this work," according to Morrison, "is because it is a direct response to the command of Jesus as he spoke in Matthew 25:35-36, 'to visit those in prison.'" In Hebrews 4:13, we are reminded, "To remember those in prison, as if you were fellow prisoners with them."

"We want to show this work to the world as being valid, in the Name of Jesus, by providing an adequate dedicated space for the dignity of corporate worship. And, in prison, it goes without saying, space speaks louder than words."

"And, we will do all of this at no cost to the State. No strings attached," Morrison emphasized. "The State can afford to do what the church should do."

Chapel Life Ministries called in Houston Architect Steve Scott, who was so moved by the work of the group that he took up the assignment of providing the concept design and is now 90 percent complete on the design and development phase. Most profoundly, Scott has also become a committed one-on-one mentor to an inmate at the Central Unit, in Sugarland.

Chapel Life Ministries, when it understood its call, immediately conveyed it's heart to the Prison System of the State of Texas. Emmett Solomon, CLM now works under the watchful hand and eye of Jerry Groom who has replaced Solomon in that important role.

Groom is now the touchpoint for the State, for management and oversight, of several other Chapel building initiatives currently being conceptualized and packaged for State approval and initiated with community and church involvement across the state.

"What makes Chapel Life Ministries organization so unusual is that it doesn't see itself as a fund raising organization."

"We tried that," said Morrison, "and through the prayerful discernment of our board, and the wisdom of board member and Pastor Mike Lobdeter, of First Baptist, of Colmesneil, and because of several stumbling attempts at fundraising in our early days, we recognized that there was power in the faith-step-in understanding that God has truly ordained this project, and he will provide for all aspects of it's completion, including the dollars necessary, as well as the design, the two by fours, the glass, the masonry and the air conditioning, and the blood, sweat and tears of those who would respond similarly with their hands."

The first money received for the project was from a just-released inmate, Scott Goad, who now lives in Florida as a model success story offender. He is now able to share in the vision of the CLM organization because when he was released in

March, 1992, he gave his entire "Disrupt and worship" fund, a \$200 check for \$200. "As my first tithing to the free-world to the Glory of God and to build the chapel," where he was incarcerated at the Gib Lewis Unit. (Now when an inmate is released he gets \$50 upon release and another \$50 when he reports to his parole officer.)

"Most of the people who comprise the operating board of Chapel Life Ministries are, in some way, closely associated with direct prison ministry or are deeply involved with the pastorate of a local church in Woodville, or both."

Pastor Jack Lewellen, of the Mount Carmel Baptist Church, says, "I can hardly get up behind the pulpit on Sunday unless and until I have first gone out to the prison to minister the Word."

Another board member is Secretary Gertben Pierce who plays the piano for Sunday Services at the Unit and whose father was Sheriff of Hardin County, says when he noticed the sign on the inside of the heavy metal door leading to the prison that reads: "NO HOSTAGES TAKEN BEYOND THIS POINT" She says smilingly, "My daily would have been proud of me for being here. 'She looks at inmates as lambs that simply need to be fed.'"

"Jesus, Jesus," she sings, "Come and feed your lambs. 'They love her too!'"

Construction Superintendent and Project Manager for Chapel Life Ministries is Billy Browner, a Methodist, who has extensive construction experience in building all types of building structures including prisons, hospitals, industrial buildings, residences and churches. He will estimate soon the exact cost of the chapel. "Down to the last nail," Morrison says, "because we believe that it is good stewardship and we want to be accountable for everything we do, besides we love telling the story about this work."

"We expect to know the actual cost by the end of January, 1995."

Morrison said the plan is to invite individuals, and area foundations and churches who are part of the community where we live, and who are interested in improving the quality of life here, through solution-based projects to share by being associated with Chapel Life Ministries.

"We want them to, 'partner up' with us. We have a solution to the crime problem that we can demonstrate. We can all share in the message and the work."

"We have a solution," Morrison says, "by assisting the state in something the Church should do, which is to bring more importance and attention to the work of the Chaplaincy program...by raising up more space within which to do the volunteer work necessary to allow for a 'divine intersection' in an inmate's heart with God BEFORE he is returned to society to become a productive citizen."

Emmett Solomon refers to this as: "The Churches precious moment. To assist an offender to understand who Jesus is and how to incorporate Him into their heart WHILE IN PRISON and while the person is in transition."

Chaplain Ed Gates, formerly of the Gib Lewis Unit and now station at the Hanks Unit, refers to the process by saying, "These men need to have a heart change."

Chapel Life Ministries has been directly involved with the construction of offices of Texas Department of Criminal Justice and will present its plans as it now nears 95 percent completion for required security and unit reviews.

In a recent letter to Chapel Life Ministries from the TECJ-ED Engineer Director Design Coordinator Royal Porter Putnam, "On behalf of the TDCJ thank you for the spiritual needs of the people incarcerated in TDCJ. Please feel free to contact me if you need assistance." The letter came with concurrence from Associate Deputy Director for Design Ron Howell.

Emmett Solomon refers to the Chapel Life Ministries design

and retreat center located near the Gib Lewis Unit and sponsored by the Nederland Fellowship Baptist Church. The camp has allowed business meetings to be held in a retreat setting in Northern Tyler County. "Brother Hays, as he was led by the Lord, saw what we were doing even before we gave him a full description. He provided the dollars for our design and development drawings as we were about to sit down and discuss them. What a blessing!"

Other funds have been generously given from various churches across denominational lines and from individuals.

"Our job is to bring the message home to our community and our local churches," said Morrison, quoting Chaplain Solomon who says, "Systems don't solve anything...but community can."

"We ask that people pray to the Lord about the need and then give accordingly as they are moved by the Holy Spirit to do so," Morrison said. "We do not beg for monies for this work, but rather we believe and trust that God will provide. We're glad to receive money or talent, and we will put it to good use in building the Chapel and we'll provide good stewardship in the process. Our records are open and so are our hearts."

According to Emmett Solomon, "What Warden Hays most appreciates in the process is my doubling as they read this story."

The State is recognizing that we need your help. It's all hands on deck!" Chaplain Groom exhorted to a recent conference of Prison Ministry Volunteers.

Vice-chairman Chapel Life Ministries Calvin Harris says with a confident smile, "What we are attempting to do is build the Kingdom of God. And God is blessing us as we do this work."

Harris quotes from the book of Hebrew Chapter 11 verse 1 in the Bible saying, "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see."

Harris, who goes regularly to the Prison Chapel to preach as a Volunteer for Chaplain Mike Maress, also is committed as a one-on-one volunteer mentor to an inmate at the unit.

Treasurer for the organization is Pastor Ron Davis of His Place Family Outreach Church, of Woodville. Voluntary labor will be financial, administrative and prayer resource for the officers of CLM. "He comes in handy at filing the necessary tax returns and keeps track of our receipts and disbursements."

Other members of the inter-denominational board include Bobbie Webber, pastor of the Woodville United Methodist Church who helps refine the questions that come before us at board meeting in simple terms so we can then act. "He is one of the most animated members we have and he helps us get to the answers confidently and cheerfully."

The newest member of our board is Hails "Doc" Taylor who is a person of deep prayer. "Doc helps us quiet down when we need to center with God," Morrison said, "and the inmates love him as he teaches a weekly Bible study at the prison."

Volunteer labor will be used to construct the chapel. The talented and gifted Texas Baptists Men have been contacted through Retired Chaplain Solomon and other interdenominational talents will be resourced from the community of Woodville and from the surrounding community of Tyler County in Deep East Texas.

To date, the organization has received about \$10,000 in financial gifts to build the chapel. The Episcopal Diocese of Texas Department of Human Need and Social Concern has given \$2,000 in grants to the project and another \$1,000 to the INFORMS newspaper, published by Solomon, to spread the word about prison ministry. The Episcopal Churchwomen of the Diocese of Texas added another \$400 along with an equal amount from the Women of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Woodville where CLM Chairman Morrison is a member.

Another generous donation of \$1,000 came from Dr. Steve Hays, president of the Camp Ta-Ku-Layouth

Some resources excluded for SSI

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is a Federal needs program administered by the Social Security Administration. It provides an economic floor-of-protection for Americans age 65, or over or of any age if blind or disabled, and who have limited income and resources. Benefits and administrative costs are paid from general revenues - not Social Security trust funds. In the seven counties serviced by the Lufkin Social Security office there are over 5,000 men, women and children receiving about a million dollars per month in SSI benefits.

Single persons may have resources valued up to \$2,000 and couples up to \$3,000 and still meet the resource limit. For children under age 18, parents' resources are also considered. These limits appear to be rather small amounts but many things are not counted in arriving at these figures. Some of the most common items which are excluded in part or entirely are:

- A home and joining land which a person owns and makes their principal residence, regardless of its value.
- Personal effects and household goods with a total equity value of \$2,000 or less. If the total equity exceeds \$2,000, the excess value counts toward the above limits. Equity value is what an item could be sold for after subtracting what is owed on it.
- Car - regardless of value, if it is used by any member of the household to go to work in, to obtain regular medical treatment, to perform essential daily activities or if it is modified for use by a handicapped person. If it is not modified, it is excluded for these reasons, the first \$4,500 of value will be excluded anyway.
- Life insurance policies with a total face value of \$1,500 or less per person.
- Burial plots - regardless of value, if intended for use by the applicant or their immediate family. Also, up to \$1,500 in burial funds for an applicant, and \$1,500 for a spouse may not count. The rules are very complex and benefits could be lost by attempting to determine one's own eligibility. East Texans who believe they may be eligible for SSI are urged to contact Social Security.
