Speaker appoints Hightower to committees

AUSTIN — House Speaker Pete Laney announced today that he has appointed Representative Allen Hightower, D-Huntsville, to serve as chairman of the House Committee on Corrections. He also will serve on the House Committee on State Recreational Resources.

"I believe Representative Hightower's skills and expertise will be very useful in these committee positions," Speaker Laney said. "I know Representative Hightower will be working long hours to represent constituents' views in the legislative process. Representative Hightower will be a very valuable member of these committees."

The committee process allows House members to closely study legislation before sending it to the full House for a vote. The committee system also lets the public get involved with legislation through testimony on bills and very direct contact with lawmakers as they return concepts into specific proposals.

The 9-member House Committee on Corrections has jurisdiction over the incarceration and rehabilitation of convicted felons and youths, state correctional facilities and several state agencies, including the Texas Department of Criminal Justice and the Texas Youth Commission.

The 9-member Committee on State Recreational Resources has jurisdiction over state parks and preservation of wildlife. Its oversight authority includes the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife.

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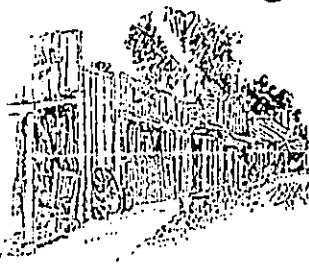

American Heritage, Tyler County resident John Cruse donated two acres here in 1906 to the Moss Hill Community for church and cemetery purposes. According to local tradition, the cemetery was established in the early 1900s because of the rising number of deaths within the membership of Moss Hill's Baptist Church.

Although evidence of several unmarked graves suggests prior burials, the first documented interments were those of Lane Siggers in 1907. Other early burials include those of Harriet Barlow in 1913, Ellis Gilder in 1916, Lottie Blackburn in 1917, Willie Blackmon in 1918, David Rigby in 1922, J. C. McCartney in 1926 and Lizziebeth Cluff in 1926.

Just as we start talking about the need to highlight other communities within Tyler County, comes a query from Fred. Fred who? And who was he? Our questioner was Crystal Cravy, postmaster at Fred Post Office, who called to report a number of calls coming in concerning Fred's history, especially from members of the Fred Woman's Club, who would like to do a history of Fred.

Woodville prepares for critical games

WOODVILLE — After taking care of business with a pair of impressive wins over Warren and Kirbyville last week, the Woodville Eagles now prepare for a couple of key showdown contests that could go a long way in determining their playoff future.

The Eagles defeated Warren, 84-62, and Kirbyville, 84-70, in games that really weren't as close as the final score last week. The victories improved their district record to 6-2.

But looming on the horizon are two

key games that could determine whether the Eagles grab a foothold to the playoffs or get lost in the shuffle.

Woodville will meet Stephen F. Austin at home Friday and play Kountze at home on Tuesday. SFA was tied for second place with the Eagles going into Tuesday night games. Kountze led the district with a 7-1 record.

The Eagles have the advantage of defeating SFA in the first round with a 69-64 road victory, but lost a 69-67 decision to the Lions in another road

game.

"The next four games will tell the story," emphasized Woodville coach John Lamberth, prior to the Tuesday battle at Buna. "Regardless of what everybody else does, we've got to win our ball games."

Following Buna, SFA and Kountze, the Eagles meet Newton on the road. Newton, which is one game back of Woodville and SFA, has the advantage of having beaten Woodville on the Eagles' home court.

While pressure might be mounting, the Eagles enjoyed a pair of comfortable wins last week.

At Warren the Eagles took a 28-7 first quarter lead and never looked back. Four Eagles scored in double figures, including Kendrick Beaty with 16, Demarcus White with 16, Gerod Betts with 16 and Josh Lamberth with 13.

Lamberth also had 18 rebounds, while Juan Mitchell tossed in nine points and had six assists. D.J. Thrower also had six assists, and Aubrey Jackson had four steals.

Warren was paced by Chance Sims' 14 points.

"They just could break our press," said the senior Lamberth. "We were hot, and they weren't."

The Eagles were also hot against Kirbyville in a Friday home battle. In what could have been a tight game, the Eagles dispelled the possibility midway in the second quarter.

After the Wildcats jumped out to a 7-2 lead, Woodville rallied back to go ahead by the end of the first quarter, 16-15.

With Lamberth hitting from both the inside and outside the Eagles pulled away in the second period by out scoring Kirbyville 26-14 and took a 42-29 lead into halftime.

The Eagles moved ahead to a 17 point lead in the third period before Kirbyville cut it to nine. Woodville again pushed it to a 17 point margin in the fourth before the Wildcats cut it to 14 by the end of the game.

Lamberth topped the night with 27 points and 12 rebounds. Betts added 21, while Beaty tossed in 12 more and had four steals along with seven rebounds. Juan Mitchell grabbed 10 rebounds and had 10 pints, with Thrower adding seven assists.

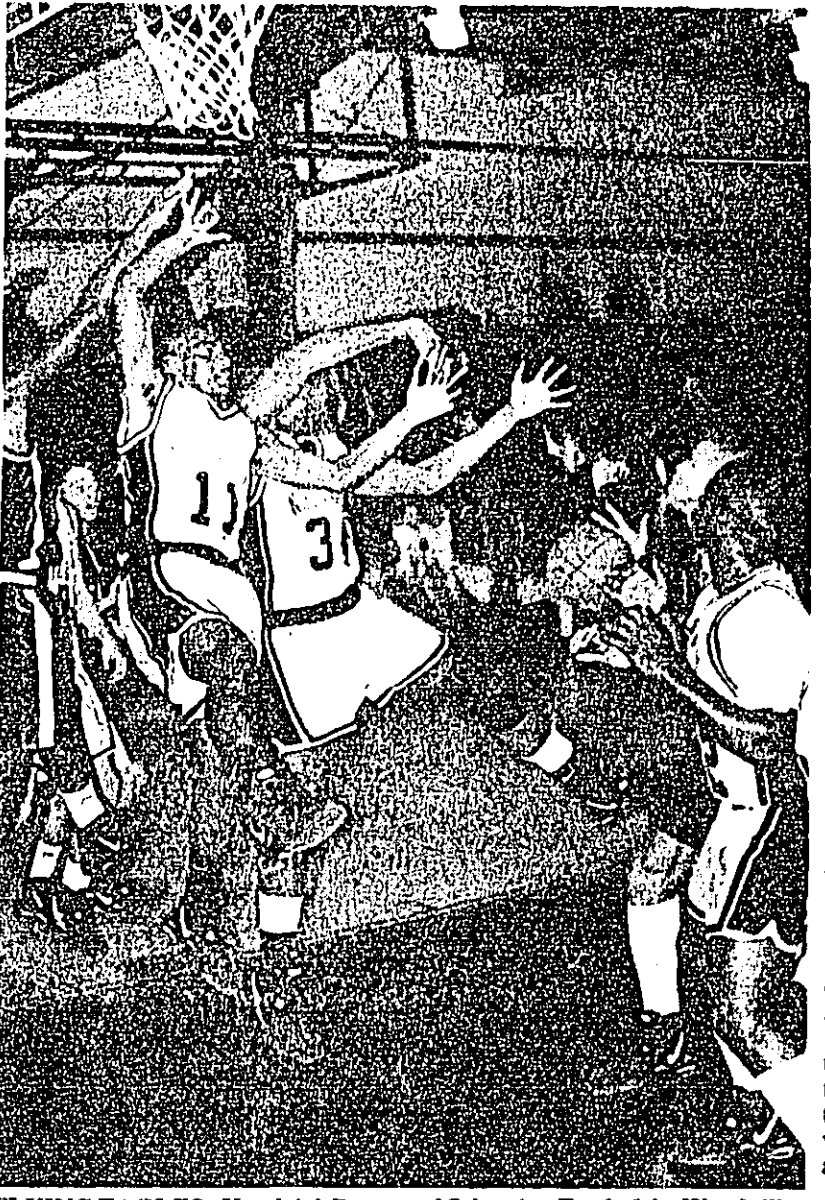

The 9-member Committee on State Recreational Resources has jurisdiction over state parks and preservation of wildlife. Its oversight authority includes the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife.

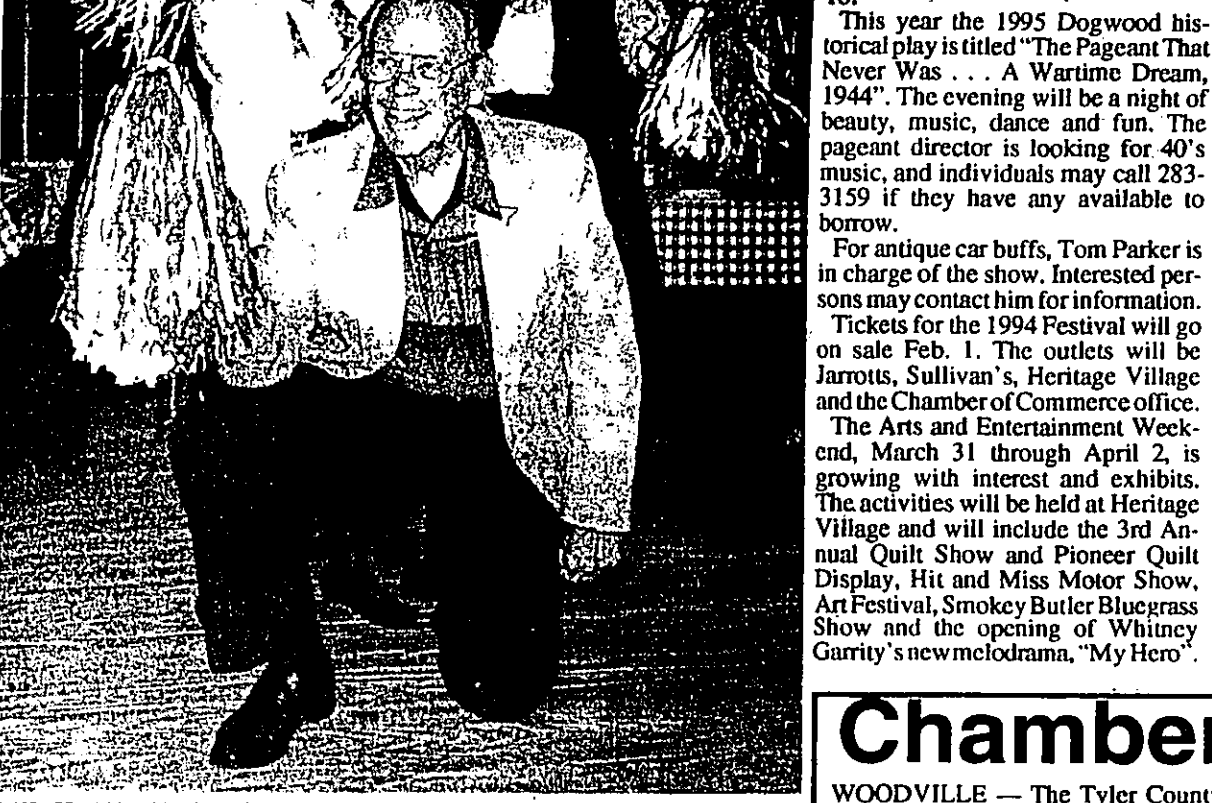

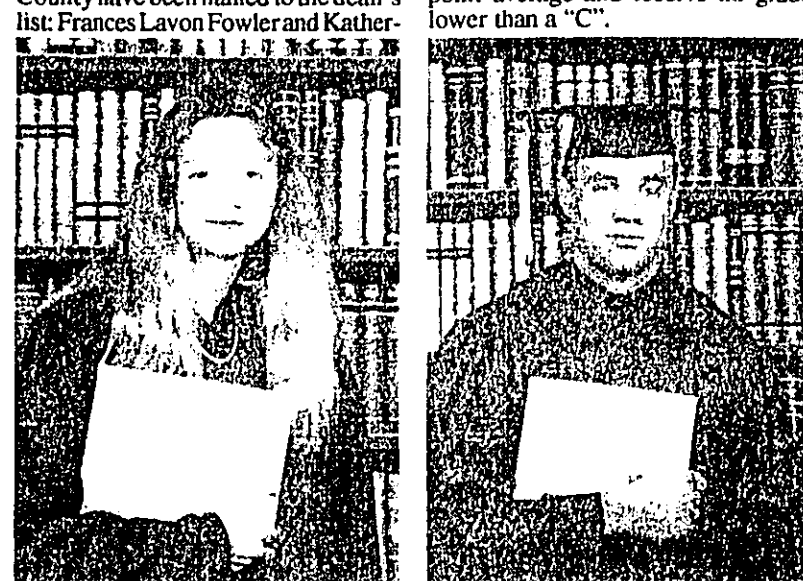

McKinney keys Lady Bulldog win

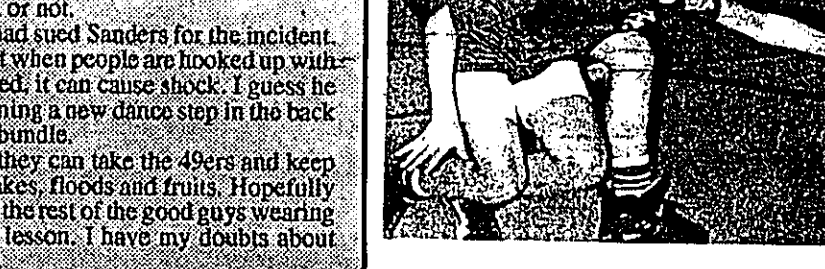

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Vocational teachers working in Texas prisons being honored for efforts to teach trades to inmates

HUNTSVILLE — Sparks fly, hammers pound and saws buzz behind prison walls in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. The noise and activity are signs of learning and change as vocational instructors guide inmate students through the challenge of learning new trades. The targeted outcome: fewer inmates returning to prison.

Vocational instructors within Texas' prison units are being honored for their efforts to help students develop skills that will help them find future jobs. National Vocational Education Week, Feb. 12-18, will include recognition of 250 teachers in the Windham School System (WSS), the state's education program for incarcerated adults.

"More than 18,000 incarcerated vocational students will participate in over 50 different vocational courses during the 1994-95 school year," said

"Our vocational teachers' goal is to provide inmate students with a marketable job skill to improve their chance of avoiding a return trip to prison," Farris said. "These courses aid inmates in developing leadership capabilities and positive self-image, as well as technical ability and safety procedures."

Instructors being honored during National Vocational Education Week include Windham teachers on 53 different prison units scattered throughout the state, including the Gib Lewis Unit in Woodville.

"Along with being teachers, our vocational instructors provide a role model for inmates seeking to change their life-style and become productive members of society," Farris said. Approximately 45,000 inmates attend Windham vocational and academic classes throughout Texas during a school year. Windham was created in 1969 and was the first education system of such scope to be established within a statewide system. It has been accredited by the Texas Education Agency since September, 1970. Administrative offices are located in Huntsville, and school superintendent is Dr. Chris Tracy.

Windham School System was recently recognized by the Texas Board of Criminal Justice for 25 years of service to the state. Former Governor Ann Richards honored the system with a letter of congratulations, and State Representative Allen Hightower and Senator Jim Turner prepared proclamations noting Windham's accomplishments.
