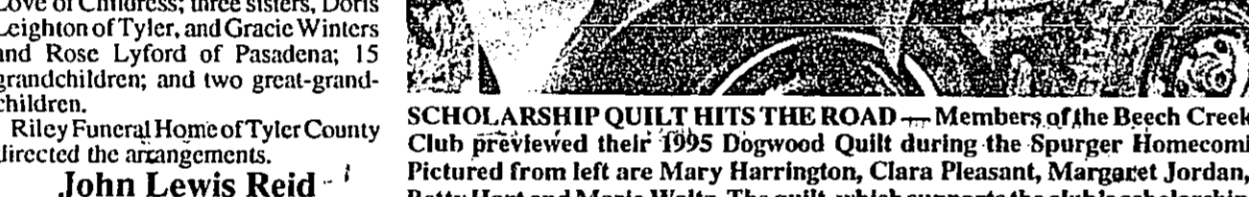

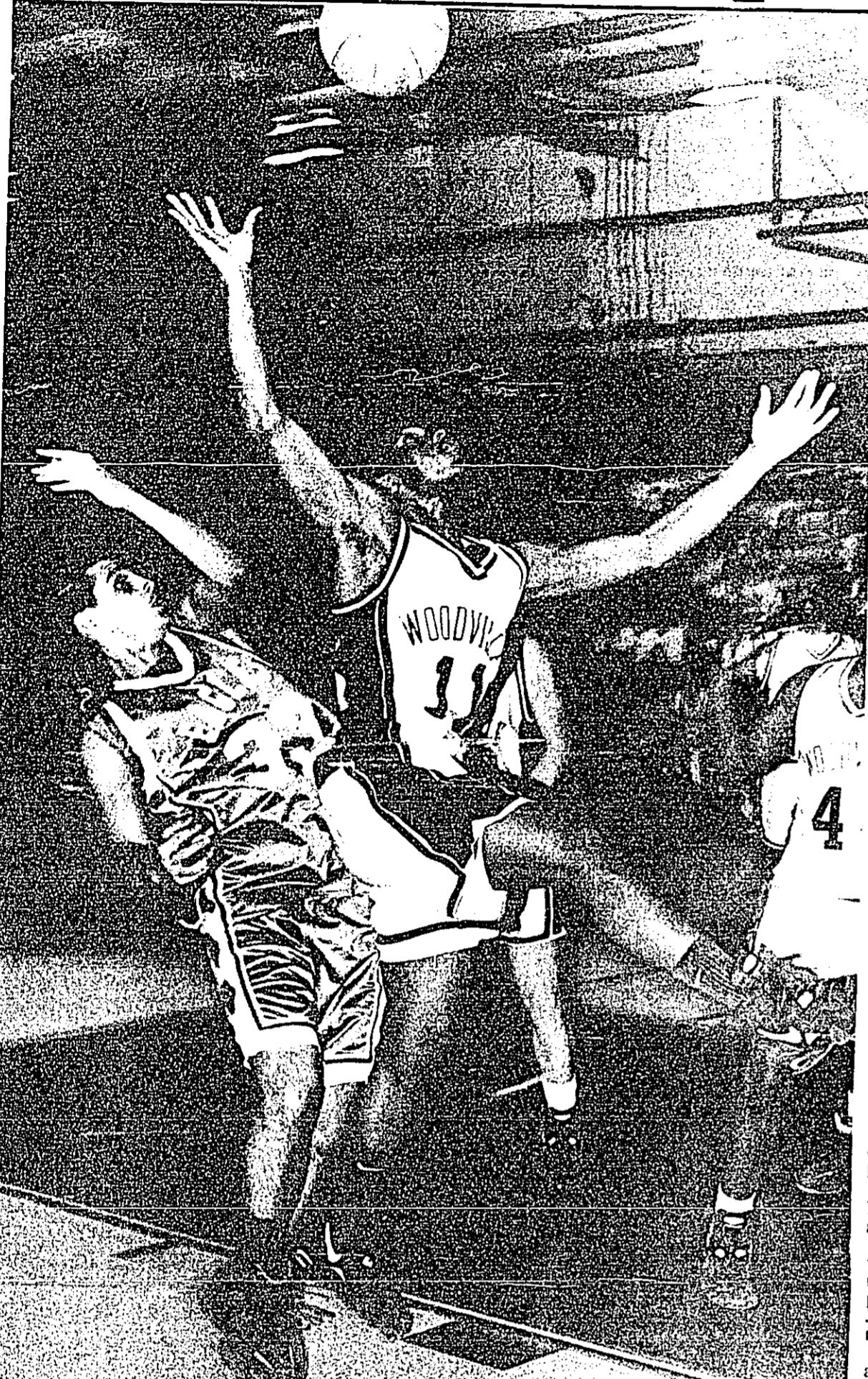

County Little Dribbler programs thriving

COUNTY — Move over, Hakeem Olajuwon and Cheryl Swoopes. Tyler County's Little Dribblers are on their way.

Every Saturday, morning from 8-9, Spurger to Clester they come. Decked out in a rainbow of colored uniforms, these midgets of the court learn the essential basics of basketball and sportsmanship. Along with them are their coaches, proud parents and friends who come to watch basketball being played at its initial step.

It was nine years ago that Little Dribblers first saw action on the county courts. Since that time, every school community in the county has opened the door for its development.

Woodville was the first, coming into existence in 1986. But it has been Warren and Spurger who have gotten attention outside of the county by competing on the national level.

Warren and Spurger are the only two groups in the county that are affiliated with the National Little Dribblers Association. Woodville, Colmesneil and Chester, although having solid Little Dribblers programs, work independent of the national organization.

Warren - Fred Warren's organization is actually a combined Warren-Fred association with, according to president Martin Nash, over one third of the elementary students participating.

Warren-Fred has 16 teams that compete locally, of which six are girls'. The ages are from kindergarten to sixth grade. They also have a senior league that is comprised of 40 seventh and eighth graders.

While the younger teams compete from January to mid March, the older group begins February 11.

Warren has fielded several teams that have played in the national tournament.

Spurger Spurger, under the direction of Willie Gill, also has had teams to compete on the national level.

Says Gill of the Little Dribblers, "It is one of the best programs that can be instituted in the community. It develops skills and sportsmanship."

Spurger currently has 60 players on six teams participating in the Little Dribbler program, equally divided of three boys' and three girls' teams.

The cost of \$10 per player or \$20 for a family. They also have business sponsorships, says Gill.

One of Gill's goals is for Spurger to host a National Little Dribblers Regional Tournament, something that he hopes happens within the next several years.

While Warren and Spurger are tied with the national association, Woodville, Colmesneil and Chester all work independently.

At Woodville, almost 200 boys and girls participate on 23 teams in ages first grade through sixth.

Russ Nalley is president of the organization that begins in mid January and finishes at the first school break of the year, or approximately six weeks.

Nalley, who coached a Huntsville team in the National Little Dribblers championship before moving here some 10 years ago, says that he feels that although the national group is very beneficial, it makes the season too long and interferes with basketball. "We have a fun league," he adds. "We teach basketball skills and we want to make it fun for them so that they will stay."

Colmesneil At Colmesneil, girls high school basketball coach Mike Lannon heads the program where 112 players comprised 12 teams for boys and girls kindergarten through sixth.

This marks the fifth year for Colmesneil, and Lannon says it has been getting bigger each year. "It's a fun thing," he adds.

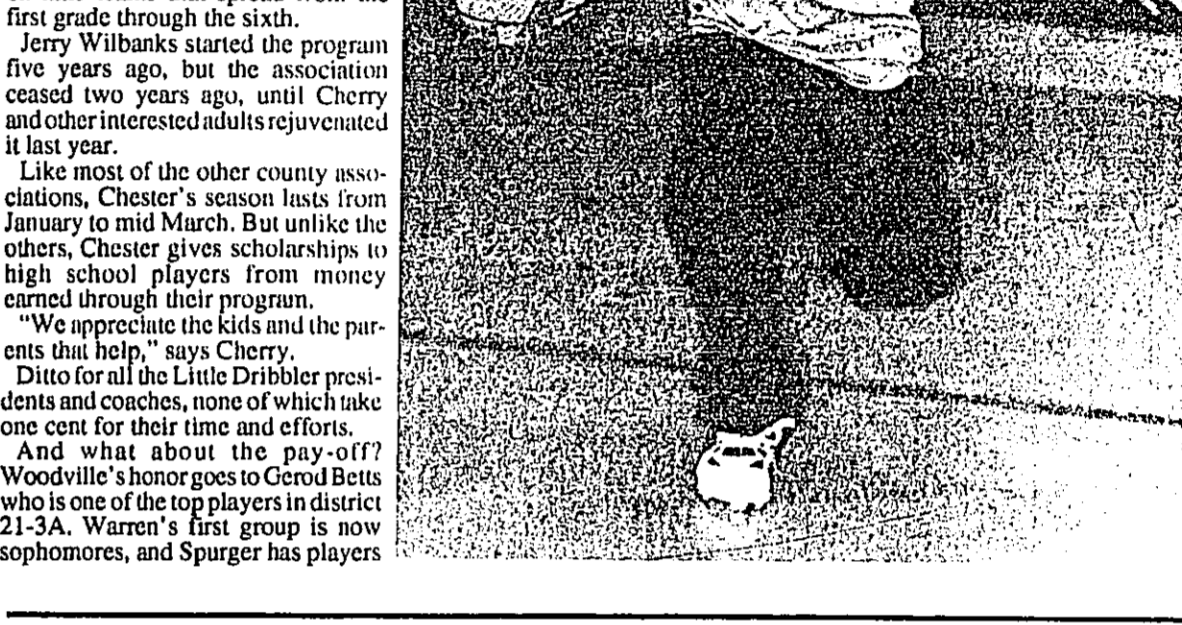
Chester Chester is the only county Little Dribblers Association that has co-ed teams. This is due to the lack of boys, according to league president Jerri Cherry. Chester has 59 players participating on nine teams that spread from the first grade through the sixth.

Jerry Wilbanks started the program five years ago, but the association ceased two years ago, until Cherry and other interested adults rejuvenated it last year.

Like most of the other county associations, Chester's season lasts from January to mid March. But unlike the others, Chester gives scholarships to high school players from money earned through their program.

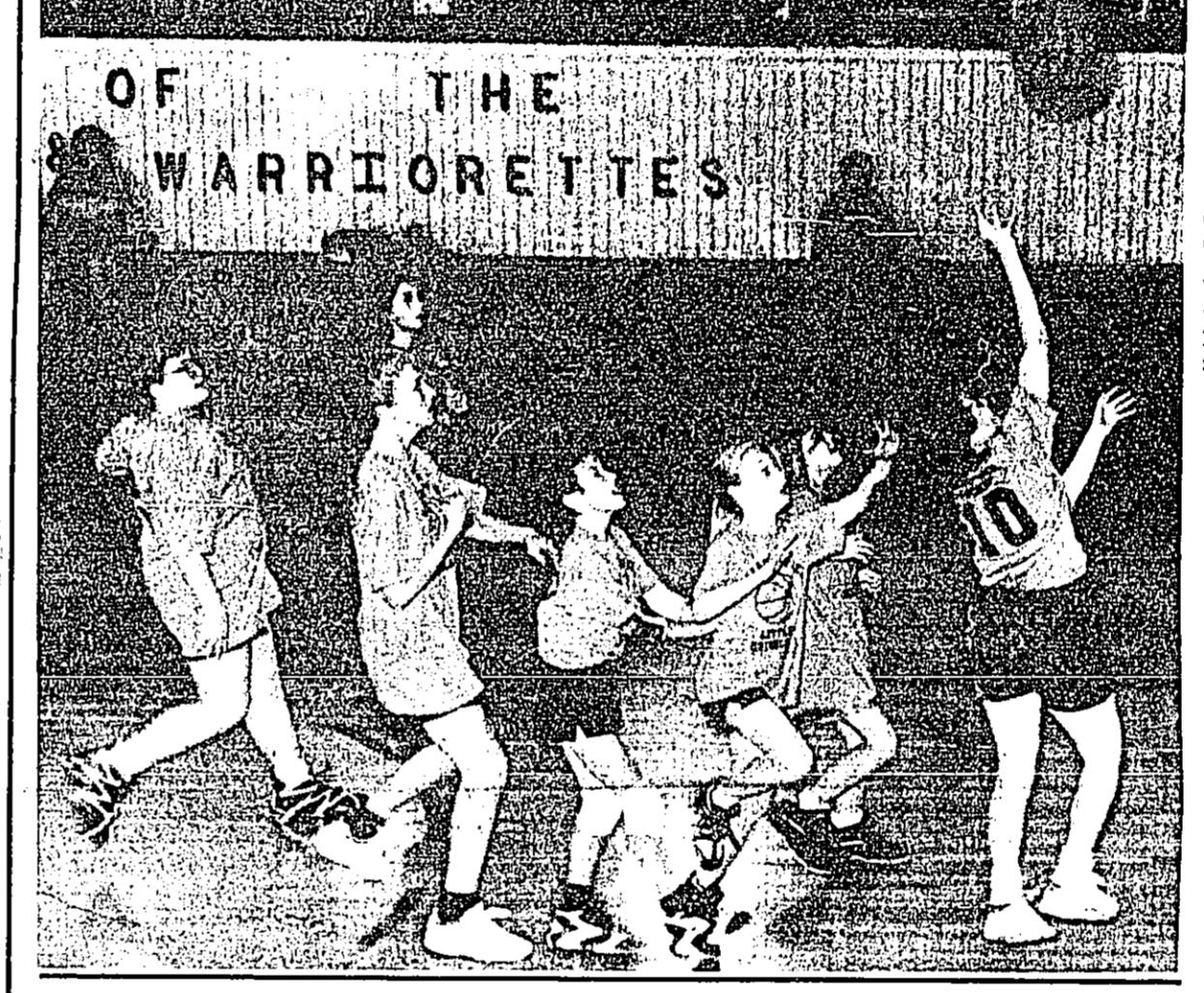
"We appreciate the kind and the parents that help," says Cherry. "Ditto for all the Little Dribbler presidents and coaches, none of which take one cent for their time and efforts."

And what about the pay-off? Woodville's honor goes to Gerod Betts who is one of the top players in district 21-3A. Warren's fan group includes sophomores, and Spurger has players

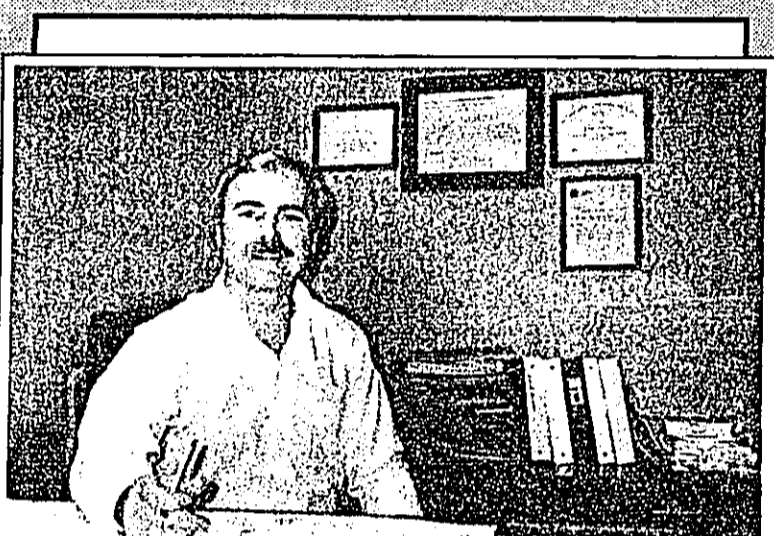

How to discourage teen smoking

HOUSTON — To discourage teen smoking, use three tactics: start early, don't nag and "get them thinking."

"Never, never nag," said Dr. Larry Laufman, a cancer-control education expert at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Nagging is a sure-fire way to keep them smoking."

Others agree. Baylor doctors Rebecca Hill, an adolescent medicine specialist, and Alan Blum, a family physician, both believe that if teenagers have their minds firmly set to smoke, it is difficult to dissuade them. "You cannot make people do something they do not want to do," Hill said. Blum feels even stronger, believing that success can be further hampered by the influences of tobacco advertising.

All agree, however, that parents can begin early to get across the message about smoking's dangers. Hill advocates a family environment that encourages open discussion.

"That may not stop them from smoking, but it will pave the way for honest talk when the time comes," she said. Laufman says to build teen self-esteem, reward success throughout life instead of punishing failure.

"With the tremendous peer pressure to smoke, self-esteem is crucial," he said. "Parents should reward success, not punish failure. This builds the ability to say 'I can do it.'"

Blum believes parents can take steps when children are young to "poke fun" at the idea of smoking.

"We should let them know just how silly smoking looks," he said. "If they see smoking as something 'uncool,' it may help." Blum, Hill and Laufman concur with statistics that show children of smokers are more likely to smoke.

When teens smoke, parents may feel helpless, but, Hill said, parents can let their child become an "informed consumer." If the child is someone who runs left when they say right, then it may seem impossible to dissuade them, but if their child responds to frank talk, then it's worth a try.

Laufman says the "contemplation ladder" may help.

"It's a behavior modification tool in which you get people to change behaviors by moving up a ladder one rung at a time," he said. "The first rung is 'not thinking' about their problem. The second rung is 'thinking about their problem.' From there, they eventually move from thinking about the problem to action."

"To get their thinking may be as simple as a serious discussion, or have them read a brochure," he said. "Even if the seed is only planted, if it's a start, Blum advocates parental involvement by influencing tobacco companies, government officials and lawmakers to prevent tobacco companies from targeting younger smokers.

One thing on which all three agree: Anticipate the problem when and where it occurs, don't ignore it.

Shop for health insurance

Rising health care costs continue to be a major problem for the elderly. However, there are some steps people can take to keep their personal health care costs down.

The first thing citizens should do, is decide to become an "informed consumer." Make yourself aware of the options available to you in selecting health care and make a conscious effort to be more selective.

One of the most important health care decisions made usually involves health care insurance. Most people purchase additional health insurance, known as "Medigap" insurance, to cover those costs that Medicare does not cover. Such costs include deductibles and coinsurance, extended care beyond that covered by Medicare, and drugs or medicines self-administered outside a hospital or skilled nursing facility.

Many insurance companies offer medigap policies in response to the increasing demand for quality health care. However, many people end up purchasing more health insurance than they need, or they duplicate services and coverage, or find out too late that the policy does not really provide the kind of protection they need. There are differences between policies, especially in non-hospital coverage. Recent federal legislation may make choosing a Medigap policy easier. It requires the development of standards for the 10 Medigap policies that will replace the thousands of policies now on the market.

Some excellent tips on shopping for Medigap coverage include:

- Compare policies - Take your time, consult others, and get a variety of

opinions on as many policies as you can.

- Avoid over-buying - A single, comprehensive policy is better than several with overlapping or duplicate coverage.

- Investigate coverage - Find out if the policy excludes pre-existing conditions (health problems that you already have when coverage begins) or only covers them after a certain date.
- Check for a waiting period - If there's a waiting period before the new policy becomes effective, you'll want to keep your old policy in effect until that time.
- Beware of scare tactics - Don't buy a policy just because the sales pitch exaggerates your medical costs or your likelihood of becoming ill.
- Buy from a reputable agent.
- Consider whether or not you need Medigap coverage if you are eligible for Medicaid or you or your spouse have health insurance through an employer.

Questions concerning coverage for specific services should be directed to the Medicare carrier. Names, addresses and phone numbers can be found in the back of the Medicare handbook. Social Security should be contacted for information on entitlement to Medicare, including when to enroll, and for assistance in filing appeals. As of September 1, 1990, doctors and other providers of Part B services were required, in most cases, to file with Medicare - though assignment is still optional.

Tips for retirees

If you're retired and receiving Social Security benefits, you're one of about 26 million Americans receiving monthly retirement checks. Here's a few suggestions - and reminders for retirees:

- Work after retirement is limited if all benefits are to be paid. There are separate limits for those between ages 62-65 and retirees between ages 65-70. These limits change each year, so if you're retired, and return to work, be sure and check with SSA on that year's limit. Retirees age 70 or over throughout a year receive all their benefits regardless of earnings. In the year a worker celebrates his/her 70th birthday the monthly earnings test applies for the months up to the birthday month, beginning with the birthday day month there is no earnings limit. For those under 70, a loss of benefits occurs when earnings exceed the limit. Between ages 62-65 the loss rate is \$1 for each \$2 earned above the limit. Between ages 65-70, the rate of loss is \$1 for each \$3 over the limit. If you work and exceed the limit, be sure and advise Social Security timely so that an adjustment of benefits can be made before an overpayment occurs.
- About 75 percent of retirees are under age 65 at time of filing. The majority retire at age 62. If you are receiving a retirement benefit and become disabled before age 64 1/2 years, you should check with Social Security about filing a disability claim. Disability entitlement can mean earlier eligibility for Medicare.
- Social Security checks are usually delivered the third day of each month. If the third falls on a Saturday, Sunday

or on a National Holiday, the checks will be delivered on the last banking day before. Checks are payments for the previous month - not the month of delivery. Entitlement to Social Security benefits is by the month, thus monthly payments are not made. In made, though checks may be reduced for events such as excessive earnings or for the collection of overpayments. If your check is not received on the delivery day, wait three days before contacting the Social Security office. This is because follow-up with the Treasury Department can't be done until the postal service has had ample time for delivery.

Some events must be reported to SSA. This can be done by mail, telephone, or in person. Timely reporting ensures that benefits are paid correctly. Examples of events that may affect you include: change of address; earnings over the limit; divorce or marriage; child not in care; leaving the US; imprisonment or receipt of a government pension.

Even Tiny Amounts of Lead Can Cause Lead Poisoning

AUSTIN — Federal and state officials recently have intensified warnings that exposure even to low levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially in children. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has issued new guidelines for the states to follow in programs to control lead poisoning.

"Research in recent years has confirmed that almost undetectable lead concentrations in a child's blood can cause serious health problems," explained Dennis Perrotta, at the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

Perrotta is director of TDH's Epidemiology Division. He said that traces of lead in blood can cause permanent learning disabilities, nerve disorders and behavioral problems, especially among young children and the unborn.

Perrotta said that new laboratory techniques for detecting trace amounts of lead have improved researchers' understanding of how little lead can pose a serious threat to human health. "The human body has no known way to get rid of lead," Perrotta said. "For decades, we have known that long-term lead exposure can damage the nerves and brain, as well as the blood, digestive and reproductive systems of both adults and children. But until recently we could not measure how little lead it takes to pose an immediate threat to the very young."

CDC recommends that the states create programs for screening children for dangerous blood levels. It also outlines actions to be taken according to severity of blood levels found.

- Among CDC's recommendations are:
 - Children with blood levels of 20 micrograms per deciliter or more should be given individual medical attention, and the sources of their lead exposure should be found and removed.
 - Children found to have 15-19 micrograms per deciliter of blood should receive individual case management, which should include nutritional and educational help. If their elevated blood levels continue, the source of their lead exposure should be located (as with a home inspection).
 - If many children in a community have blood lead levels of 10 or more micrograms per deciliter, community-wide lead prevention programs should begin.

Perrotta said that lead is "part of the modern environment, mostly because of obsolete uses." The metal is common in old-paint chips and dust, in drinking water from lead soldered pipes, in food from soldered cans and in the air near smelters or buildings where lead paint is deteriorating. Lead can be swallowed, inhaled or absorbed through the skin.

While much of CDC's focus is on children with lead poisoning, it also has renewed warnings to adults, such as construction or demolition workers, painters, welders and others at risk of long-term lead exposures.

Perrotta said, "The problem of preventing lead exposure is massive, and one that will take time, funding, people and legal authority to solve." But he added that progress against lead poisoning is not without precedent.

Since 1979, when lead in gasoline was banned for use in new cars, lead fumes in fuel exhausts have been greatly reduced.

"The requirement that new cars use only unleaded fuel has reduced the average American's blood level by as much as 25 percent. It dramatically reduced lead in the air, one of many common lead sources," he said.

Eagles win key game against SFA

WOODVILLE — With their backs against the wall the Woodville Eagles have Friday night basketball. With less than one second remaining in overtime the Eagles edged Stephen F. Austin, 65-63, on a 15-foot jumper by Jun Mitchell. The win gives Woodville an edge should the two teams tie for second place at the end of district play.

"It was a must win for us," sighed Woodville coach John Lambert following the victory. "If we had lost we would have had to wait on someone else to beat them."

But thanks to the victory Friday night and another at Port Arthur, the Eagles now have an edge should the two teams tie at the end of district play. Going into a Tuesday night game at home against Kountze the Eagles were 7-3 in district play while SFA was 6-4. Kountze led the district standings with a 9-1 record.

From there the two teams rolled back and forth, and with the game tied with seconds to go, Mitchell missed the two pointer that sent the game into overtime.

Both teams had a chance on the overtime session, but it was Mitchell who iced it with a 15-foot jumper from the wing with less than a second to play. The two points gave him 10 for the night along with six rebounds, three steals, and four assists.

Topping Woodville scoring was Gerod Betts with 24 points. He also had 12 rebounds.

Also scoring in double figures was Kendrick Beaty with 14 points. He added three steals and had four assists.

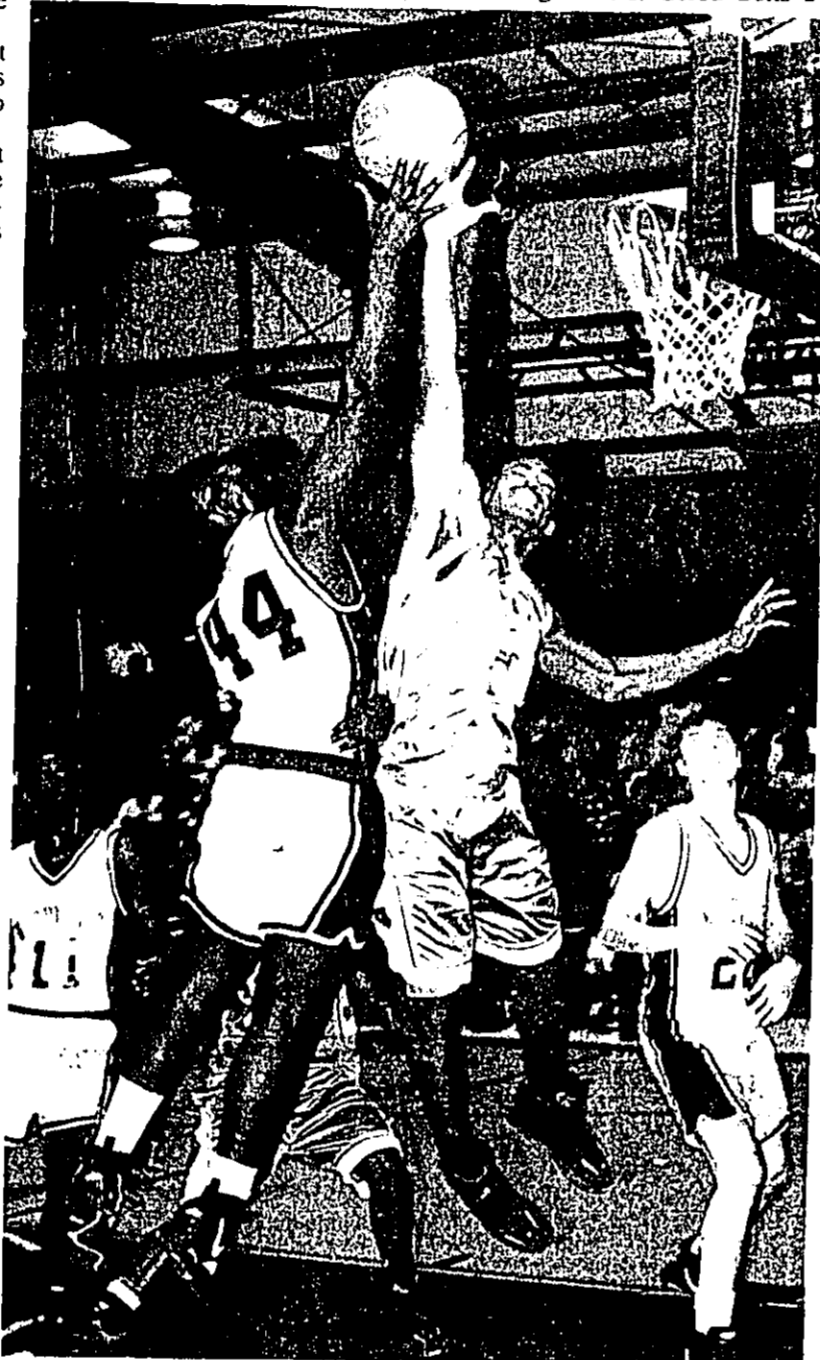

County Little Dribbler programs thriving

COUNTY — Move over, Hakeem Olajuwon and Cheryl Swoopes, Tyler County's Little Dribblers are on their way.

Every Saturday morning from Spurger to Chester they come. Decked out in a rainbow of colored uniforms, these midgets of the court learn the essential basics of basketball and sportsmanship. Along with them are their coaches, proud parents and friends who come to watch basketball being played at its initial step.

It was nine years ago that Little Dribblers first saw action on the county courts. Since that time, every school community in the county has opened the door for its development.

Woodville was the first, coming into existence in 1986. But it has been Warren and Spurger who have gotten attention outside of the county by competing on the national level.

Warren and Spurger are the only two groups in the county that are affiliated with the National Little Dribblers Association. Woodville, Colmesneil and Chester, although having solid Little Dribblers programs, work independent of the national organization.

Warren-Fred Warren's organization is actually a combined Warren-Fred association with, according to president Martin Nash, over one third of the elementary students participating.

Warren-Fred has 16 teams that compete locally, of which six are girls'. The ages are from kindergarten to sixth grade. They also have a senior league that is comprised of 40 seventh and eighth graders.

While the younger teams compete from January to mid March, the older group begins February 11.

Warren has fielded several teams that have played in the national tournament.

Spurger, under the direction of Willie Gill, Jr., also has had teams to compete on the national level.

Spurger currently has 60 players on six teams participating in the Little Dribbler program, equally divided of three boys' and three girls' teams.

The cost of \$10 per player or \$20 for a family. They also have business sponsorships, says Gill.

One of Gill's goals is for Spurger to host a National Little Dribblers Regional Tournament, something that he hopes happens within the next several years.

While Warren and Spurger are tied with the national association, Woodville, Colmesneil and Chester all work independently.

Woodville, almost 200 boys and girls participate on 23 teams in ages first grade through sixth.

Russ Nalley is president of the organization that begins in January and finishes at the first school break of the year, or approximately six weeks.

Nalley, who coached a Huntsville team to the National Little Dribblers championship before moving here some 10 years ago, says that he feels that although the national group is very beneficial, it makes the season too long and interferes with baseball.

"We have a fun league," he adds. "We teach basketball skills and we want to make it fun for them so that they will stay."

Colmesneil At Colmesneil, girls high school basketball coach Mike Lannon heads the program where 112 players comprised 12 teams for boys and girls kindergarten through sixth.

This marks the fifth year for Colmesneil, and Lannon says it just keeps getting bigger each year. "It's a fun thing," he adds.

Chester Chester is the only county Little Dribblers Association that has co-ed teams. This is due to the lack of boys, according to league president Jerri Cherry. Chester has 59 players participating on nine teams that spread from the first grade through the sixth.

Jerry Wilbanks started the program five years ago, but the association ceased two years ago, until Cherry and other interested adults rejuvenated it last year.

Like most of the other county associations, Chester's season lasts from January to mid March. But unlike the others, Chester gives scholarships to high school players from money earned through their program.

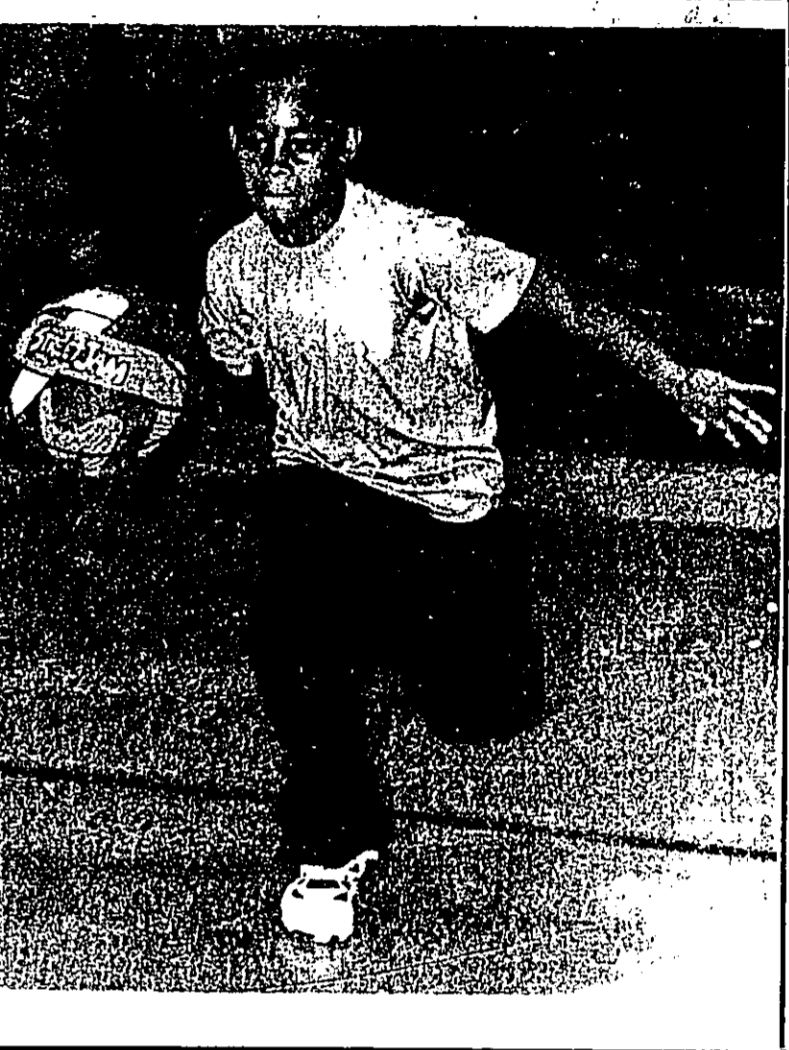

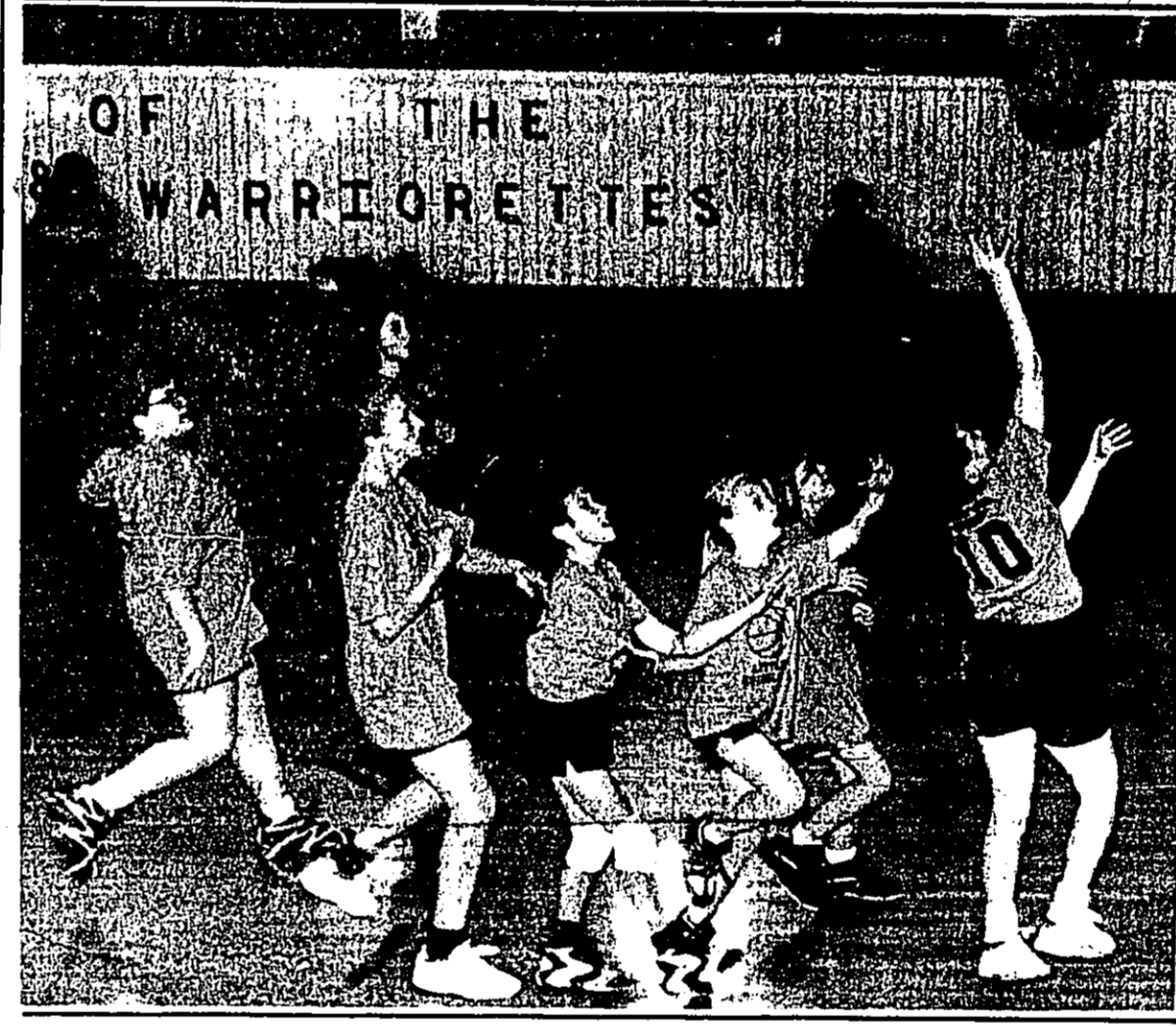

How to discourage teen smoking

HOUSTON — To discourage teen smoking, use three tactics: start early, don't nag and "get them thinking."
"Never, never nag," said Dr. Larry Laufman, a cancer-control education expert at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Enthusiasm is a sure-fire way to keep them thinking."
Others agree. Baylor doctors Rebecca Hill, an adolescent medicine specialist, and Alan Blum, a family physician, both believe that if teenagers have their minds firmly set to smoke, it is difficult to dissuade them. "You cannot make people do something they do not want to do," Hill said. Blum feels even stronger, believing that success can be further hampered by the influences of tobacco advertising.
All agree, however, that parents can begin early to get across the message about smoking's dangers. Hill advocates a family environment that encourages open discussion.
"That may not stop them from smoking, but it will pave the way for honest talk when the time comes," she said. Laufman says to build teen self-esteem, reward success throughout the life of punishing failure.
"With the tremendous peer pressure to smoke, self-esteem is crucial," he said. "Parents should reward success, not punish failure. This builds the ability to say 'I can do it.'"
Blum believes parents can take steps when their children are young to "poke fun" at the idea of smoking.
"We should have them know just how silly smoking looks," he said. "If they see smoking as something 'uncool,' it may help." Blum, Hill and Laufman concur with statistics that show children of smokers are more likely to smoke.
When teens smoke, parents may feel

Shop for health insurance

Rising health care costs continue to be a major problem for the elderly. However, there are some steps people can take to keep their personal health care costs down.

There are differences between policies, especially in non-hospital coverage. Recent federal legislation may make choosing a Medigap policy easier. It calls for development of standardized forms for the 10 Medigap policies that will replace the thousands of policies now on the market.

Even Tiny Amounts of Lead Can Cause Lead Poisoning

AUSTIN—Federal and state officials recently have intensified warnings that exposure even to low levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially in children. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has issued new guidelines for the states to follow in programs to control lead poisoning.
"Research in recent years has confirmed that almost undetectable lead concentrations in a child's blood can cause serious health problems," explained Dennis Perrotta, at the Texas Department of Health (TDH).
Perrotta is director of TDH's Epidemiology Division. He said that traces of lead in the blood can cause permanent learning disabilities, nerve disorders and behavioral problems, especially among young children and the unborn.
Perrotta said that new laboratory techniques for detecting trace amounts of lead have improved researchers' understanding of how little lead can pose a serious threat to human health.
"The human body has no known use for lead," Perrotta said. "For decades, we have known that long-term lead exposure can damage the nerves and brain, as well as the blood, digestive and reproductive systems of both adults and children. But until recently we could not measure how little lead takes to pose an immediate threat to the very young."
CDC recommends that the states create programs for screening children for dangerous blood levels. It also outlines actions to be taken according to severity of blood levels found.
Among CDC's recommendations:
• Children with blood levels of 20 micrograms per deciliter or more should be given individual medical attention, and the sources of their lead exposure should be found and removed.
• Children found to have 15-19 micrograms per deciliter of blood should receive individual case management, which should include nutritional and educational help. If their elevated blood levels continue, the source of their lead exposure should be located (as with a home inspection).
• If many children in a community have blood lead levels of 10 or more micrograms per deciliter, community-wide lead prevention programs should begin.
Perrotta said that lead is "part of the modern environment, mostly because of obsolete uses." The metal is common in old paint chips and dust in drinking water from lead soldered pipes, in food from soldered cans and in the air near smelters or buildings where lead paint is deteriorating. Lead can be swallowed, inhaled or absorbed through the skin.
While much of CDC's focus is on children's lead poisoning, it also has renewed warnings to adults, such as construction or demolition workers, painters, welders and others at risk of long-term lead exposures.
Perrotta said, "The problem of preventing lead exposure is massive, and one that will take time, funding, people and legal authority to solve." But he added that progress against lead poisoning is not without precedent.
Since 1979, when lead in gasoline was banned for use in new cars, lead fumes in fuel exhausts have been greatly reduced.
"The requirement that new cars use only unleaded fuel has reduced the average American's blood level by as much as 27 percent. It dramatically reduced lead in the air, one of many common lead sources," he said.

Tips for retirees

If you're retired and receiving Social Security benefits, you're one of about 26 million Americans receiving monthly retirement checks. Here are a few suggestions - and reminders for retirees:
• Work after retirement is limited if all benefits are to be paid. There are separate limits for those between ages 62-65 and retirees between ages 65-70. These limits change each year - so if you're retired, and return to work, be sure and check with SSA on that year's limit. Retirees age 70 or over throughout a year receive all their benefits regardless of earnings. In the year a worker celebrates his/her 70th birthday the monthly earnings test applies for the months up to the birthday month, beginning with the birthday month there is no earnings limit. For those under 70, a loss of benefit occurs when earnings exceed the limit. Between ages 62-65 the loss rate is \$1 for each \$2 earned above the limit. Between ages 65-70, the rate of loss is \$1 for each \$3 over the limit. If you work and will exceed the limit, be sure and advise Social Security timely so that an adjustment of benefits can be made before an overpayment occurs.
• About 75 percent of retirees are under age 65 at time of filing. The majority retire at age 62. If you are receiving a retirement benefit and become disabled before age 64 1/2 years, you should check with Social Security about filing a disability claim. Disability entitlement can mean earlier eligibility for Medicare.
• Social Security checks are usually delivered the third day of each month. If the third falls on a Saturday, Sunday

or on a National Holiday, the checks will be delivered on the last banking day before. Checks are payments for the previous month - not the month of delivery. Entitlement to Social Security benefits is by the month, thus partial monthly payments are not made, though checks may be reduced for events such as excessive earnings or for the collection of overpayments. If your check is not received on the delivery day, wait three days before contacting the Social Security office. This is because follow-up with the Treasury Department can't be done until the postal service has had ample time for delivery.
• Some events must be reported to SSA. This can be done by mail, telephone, or in person. Timely reporting ensures that benefits are paid correctly. Examples of events that may affect you include: change of address; earnings over the limit; divorce or marriage; child not in care; leaving the US; imprisonment or receipt of a government pension.
