Homemaker Hints Making the most of the food dollar

Using your food money wisely means more than cutting your food bill. It also means making sure you get good nutrition and eating pleasure for the money you spend on food. Wise use of food dollars is a challenge requiring planning and the use of basic tools to make sound comparisons. Here are some tips to help you sharpen your food money management skills.

- Plan meals first, then make a shopping list. Use your list to save trips to the supermarket and help you avoid buying items you don't really need.
- Shop at a store that gives you the best price and quality for products you typically buy. Make sure the cost savings from shopping at several stores justifies the extra time and transportation cost.
- Try to avoid shopping when you're tired, hungry or rushed.
- Use itemized receipts from computer-assisted checkout systems to help track food costs. This is especially helpful when prices aren't marked on products.
- Make substitutions for items on your shopping list if you can save money or get a higher quality product, and if the item will fit into your meal plans.
- Use coupons for products you usually buy. Stock up on store specials in reasonable amounts.
- Buy store brands and generic items when their taste and quality suit your needs.
- Salad bars can be costly - buy only those items you need in small quantities. Pick up basic ingredients - lettuce, cabbage, celery, cucumbers, onions - elsewhere in the store.
- Buy bulk foods (when available) for high quality, a lower price, and the exact amount you want.
- Make sure convenience foods are worthwhile buys. Some packaged goods, canned vegetables and frozen juice concentrates are good buys, while others (frozen dinners) cost much more than home-prepared versions.
- Avoid over-buying (particularly perishables) to minimize food waste.
- To protect food quality while you shop:
 - Pick up perishables (salad bar ingredients, frozen vegetables, meats, dairy products) last.
 - Pack frozen foods and meats in insulated bags. Keep cold items to go.
 - Minimize time foods are in the car. Keep perishables out of direct sunlight.
 - Put foods away promptly.

Cookoff honors Best

LONGVIEW — A chili cookoff held in Longview on Saturday, April 8, was held to honor the memory of Tyler County native Kenneth Best, who died Dec. 29.

Members of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, Longview Aerie No. 4125, sponsored the First Annual Ken Best Memorial Chili Cookoff to help raise funds for the Texas Eagle's state project, the Coastal Bond Youth City at Corpus Christi.

The Youth City program helps physically or emotionally neglected or abused children to succeed by providing them with residential and community-based care, education and counseling services.

Best was the son of Mrs. Edna Best and the sister of Gladys Riley, both of Woodville. He died in Longview shortly after Christmas following a battle with cancer.

Blinded by a 1950 automobile accident in Woodville, Best received special training from the Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children in Kerrville and from the State Commission for the Blind. He was trained as a masseur and worked for a number of years at the Beaumont YMCA.

He later returned to the Longview area and worked as a radio-graph processing technician at Parkland Hospital in Dallas. He moved to Longview over 14 years ago where he was employed at the Good Shepherd Medical Center.

While in Longview, he joined the Fraternal Order of Eagles and worked with the non-profit organization to help raise funds for various causes, including repair work to the Lions Camp from Crippled Children where he was the first special training officer after losing his eyesight.

Cited as being one of the hardest working members in the area, the abused child, he died in Longview, Texas, on Dec. 29, 1984. The Eagles decided to honor his memory with the annual chili cookoff.

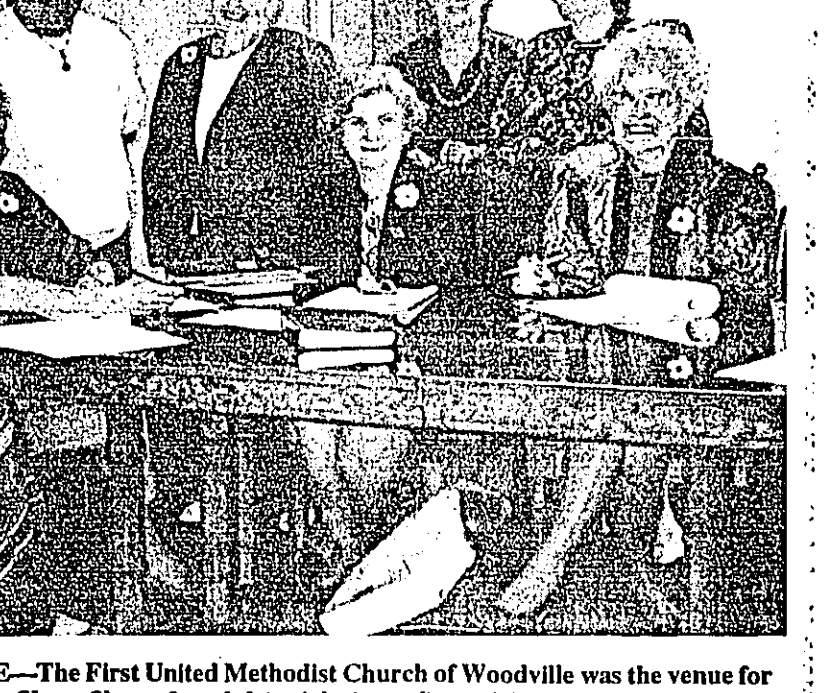

Woodville girls win District 21-AAA track title

ORANGEFIELD — Getting points in 14 of the 16 events, the Woodville Eagles girls track team captured their first ever district track crown Thursday.

Woodville's third place finish in the 1600 meter relay, the last event of the meet, enabled the Lady Eagles to fly home with a one point win over second place Newton. Woodville totaled 121 points to Newton's 120.

Seven Woodville girls also qualified for the regional track meet to be held at Brenham next week.

Two relay teams took gold medals along with Stefani Byron in the high jump. Jamie Jones, Belinda Shaw, Chastity Goodman and Michelle Foster sped to a 51.59 clocking in the 400 meter relay, two-hundredths faster than second place Newton.

Jones, Goodman, Foster and Katrina Mitchell breezed to a 1:50.40 time in a gold medal performance in the 800 meter relay. Second place was Bona with a time of 1:51.45.

Byron took first in the high jump with a leap of 5-3, seven inches higher than second place Layorra Hadnot of Kirbyville. Byron attempted to set the district record at the meet with a leap of 5-4, but missed on three tries. She had previously leaped 5-4 in another meet last year.

Also going to the regional meet is Warren's Hicks, Gonzales advance to regional meet

Hicks won first place in the 800 meter dash with a time of 2:08.02 and took a silver in the 3200 meter run with a time of 11:06.94.

Gonzales placed second in the 1600 meter dash with a time of 5:01.77 clocking. He also finished fourth in the 800 meter dash with a time of 2:09.62.

Both Hicks and Gonzales will advance to the regional meet to be held in Brenham next week.

Warren, under the direction of athletic director and track coach Mickey Mixon, tallied 62 points in the meet for fourth place finish. Newton and Stephens both took first place with 143 points each. Third place went to Orangefield with 82 points.

Although Hicks and Gonzales accounted for over half of Warren's points, the Warriors also scored in eight other events.

Steve Mitchell and Jeff Mixon just Lady Eagles defeat Kirbyville, Colmesneil

WOODVILLE — The Lady Eagles girls softball team defeated Kirbyville, 12-6, and Colmesneil in district play last week.

The victories gave Woodville an outside shot at the playoffs depending on a Tuesday game involving Kirbyville.

Eryn Byron connected with a home run to highlight the Kirbyville win. Woodville scored five runs in the

Laura Kenesson. The Woodville freshman ran a 13:51.96 for a second place finish in the 3200 meter run. She also just missed qualifying in the 800 meter dash by finishing third with a time of 2:38.28, just over a second slower than Nakisha Samuel of Newton who finished second.

Jones and Foster also qualified for the regional meet in the 200 meter dash. Jones took first place with a time of 26.34, just nipping her teammate who was clocked at 26.85.

Of the seven girls Woodville will send to regional, four are freshmen, including Kenesson, Jones, Goodman and Mitchell.

Woodville girls track coach Doris Dennard said that she was very proud of all of her team.

"The girls ran hard," she noted. "They were pushing themselves so hard that they were falling across the finish line."

"To win the meet we had to have every point," she added. "That's why the sixth place finishers were so important."

Besides Byron's 10 points in the high jump, Woodville got nine more in the field events with fourth and fifth place finishes.

Foster took fourth in the long jump with a leap of 14-9, Belinda Shaw took fifth in the discus with a throw of 86-10, Latesha Mitchell took fifth in the triple jump with a leap of 31-3/4, and Eryn Byron took fifth in the high

jump with a leap of 4-6. Woodville got another point in the distance races besides Kenesson's second place finish in the 3200 meter run. Penny Stuart was clocked with a 13:45.71 for sixth place in the event.

Eryn Byron also helped with a pair of fourth place finishes in the hurdles. She was timed with a 19 flat in the 100 meter hurdles and a 56.10 in the 300 meter hurdles.

In the sprints, Latesha Mitchell took a bronze in the 400 meters with a time of 65.38. Belinda Shaw took a sixth place in the 100 meter dash with a time of 13.55, and Katrina Mitchell took sixth in the 200 with a time of 28.54.

The coach of who was to win the district title came down to the last event, the 1600 meter relay. Newton was almost a shoe-in for first place with the best time going into the event.

With that in mind the Lady Eagles thought that they could finish no lower than third place if they were to win their first girls track title in the history of the school.

The foursome of Latesha Mitchell, Chastity Goodman, Kenesson and Pashun Wooten, although not making it to regional, assured Woodville of the crown with a time of 4:42.89 clocking in the event.

"We knew we had to have it," said Dennard, "and the girls came through." Woodville finished eight seconds back of second place Orangefield, but nine seconds ahead of fourth place Bona. Newton won the event with a time of 23.02.

The seven Woodville girls will now go to Nacogdoches Saturday for the Regional Qualifiers' Meet before the regional meet at Brenham next week.

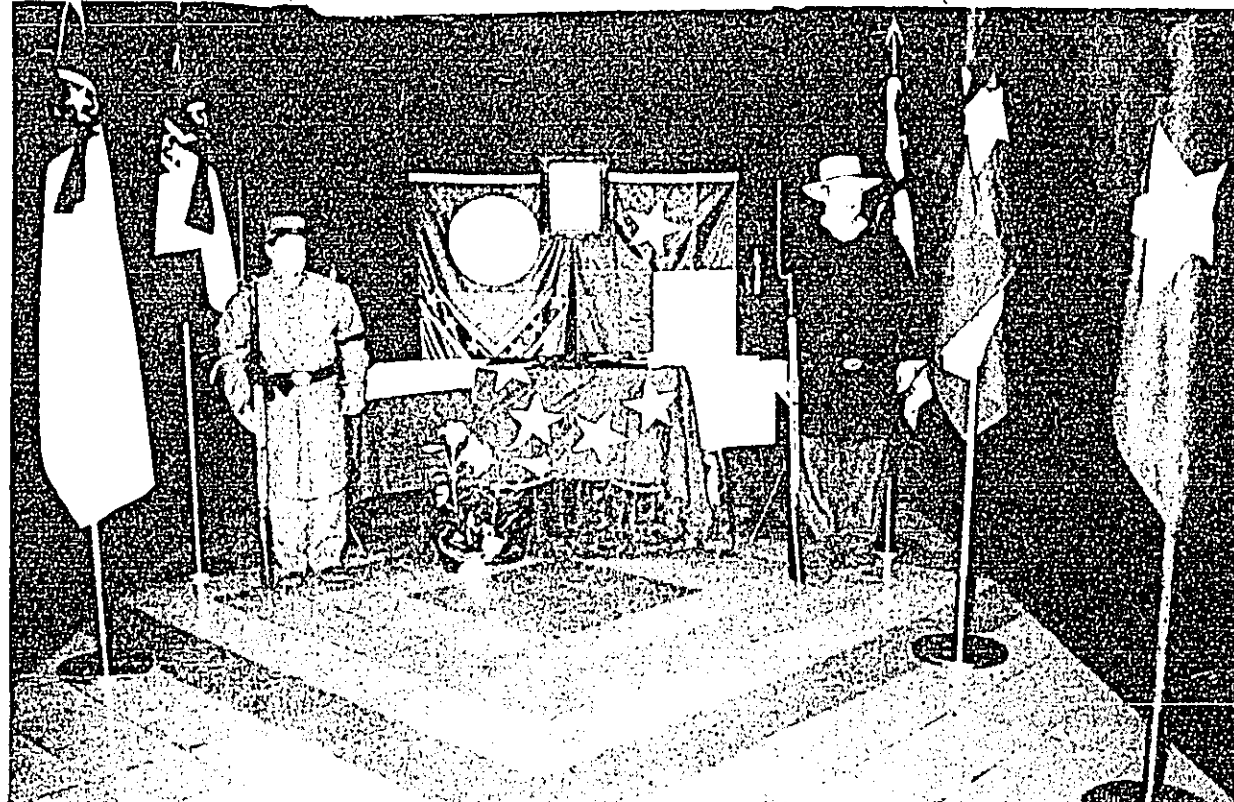

1990 when a 4.9 percent unemployment figure was recorded by TEC. While the local jobless numbers were declining during February, TEC's report shows that the statewide unemployment figures also were falling. The Texas rate dropped from January's 6.5 percent mark to 5.7 percent in February. One year earlier, the Texas jobless rate stood at 7.6 percent. Pointing to the state's 4.2 percent increase in non-farm, salaried jobs from February 1994 to February 1995, Texas Employment Commission Employer Representative James J. Kaster said businesses looking for a growth environment couldn't find a better location than the Lone Star State. "From January to February 1995, Texans created 44,100 new jobs," Kaster said. "That is the kind of job growth that makes this state attractive to businesses."

The largest job increases from January to February occurred in government, with 22,400 new jobs, and in the service sector, where business created 18,400 new jobs. "We assume some job growth is seasonal, public education hiring usually increases as the spring semester gets under way, which accounts for an increase in the government sector. But this job creation activity has been consistent through the winter months, which indicates a strong, healthy economy," Kaster said. The service sector also experiences seasonal growth, as private schools complete spring staffing and amusement, recreation and outdoor services prepare for spring openings. Labor Commissioner Jackie St. Clair noted that the decline in jobless figures during February occurred in almost every region of the state. "Most sub-state areas show lower unemployment rates, and in many areas the rates indicated full employment," St. Clair said. "While job growth is frequently seasonal, I believe these rates show the economic climate for workers is especially good. Metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) recording the lowest February unemployment rates were the Austin-San Marcos MSA at 3.0 percent, the Bryan-College Station MSA at 3.1 percent, the Amarillo MSA at 4.0 percent and the Lubbock MSA at 4.1 percent. MSAs with the highest unemployment rates included McAlester-Edinburg-Mission MSA at 16.5 percent, the Laredo MSA at 12.1 percent, Brownsville-Harlingen MSA at 10.8 percent and the El Paso MSA at 9.0 percent.

since these books do not sell. The library operated on an annual budget of \$69,942 in 1994 and saw a traffic increase of 7,990 over the \$3,014 from the year previous. In 1993 there were 5,000 reference questions and reference backups with 1994 showing an increase of 1,113. New patrons using the library increased from 601 in 1993 to 710 in 1994. The facility hosted 78 meetings in 1993 and jumped to 80 in 1994. Books and magazine usage jumped from 152,253 in 1993 to 195,328 in 1994. Videos and audio use went from 5,000 to 113. The Interloan Books and Videos program saw an increase of 85 over 1993 from 387 to 472. Grants and services from the State Library System include: - \$4,345 for new books and videos - Computer equipment and consultant services - Video Library and Inter-library loan services - Reference - Back-up - Audio books for the blind; - \$500 for reference books. The Allan Shivers Library Museum visitation increased from 2,184 visitors in 1993 to 2,615 visitors in 1994.

Hospice care may be covered by Social Security

LUFKIN — When a Medicare beneficiary needs hospice care for a terminal illness, Medicare Hospital Insurance (Part A) may cover the cost of the required services. Home care, inpatient care - when needed - and a number of other services may be paid for under the hospice benefit.

To receive this coverage, the patient must meet three conditions: (1) a physician certifies that the patient is terminally ill - with a life expectancy of six months or less; (2) the patient chooses to be cared for by a hospice instead of using standard Medicare benefits; and (3) care is provided by a Medicare - participating hospice program. The approved hospice and the beneficiary's attending physician must jointly establish the plan of care.

Generally, the care is delivered in the beneficiary's home. However, Medicare will pay almost the entire cost of the following services if they are provided by a Medicare-approved hospice:

- physician and nursing services;
- drugs, including outpatient drugs for pain relief and symptom management;
- short-term inpatient care, including respite care;
- home health aide and homemaker services;
- physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech/language pathology;
- medical social services;
- counseling, including dietary advice; and
- medical supplies and equipment.

Medicare pays for two 90-day periods of hospice care, one additional 90-day period, and an extension of unlimited duration, if it is needed. There are special rules when a patient changes or cancels hospice programs. There is also Medicare coverage for treatment of a condition that is not related to the terminal illness, even if the patient remains in the hospice.

When hospice care is elected for the treatment of a terminal illness, standard Medicare benefits cannot be used for treatment of a condition related to that terminal illness. Medicare pays the cost of covered services except for the co-payment amounts the patient must pay for respite care and outpatient prescription drugs and biologics (such as vaccines and blood plasma products). The hospice may charge up to \$5 for each outpatient prescription. Except for this charge and the cost of inpatient respite care Medicare will pay the hospice directly. The rate of payment will depend on the type of care given each day.



Bump, who also heads the 4-H adults leaders council, noted that when she said nothing because we knew that it would violate their rights under the state constitution," he said.

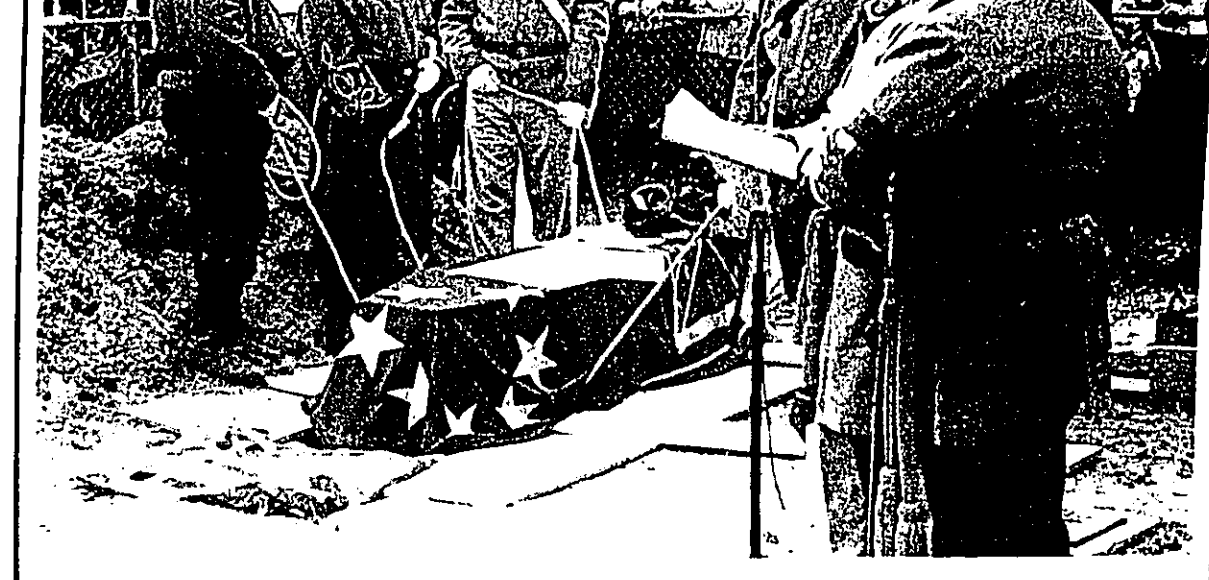

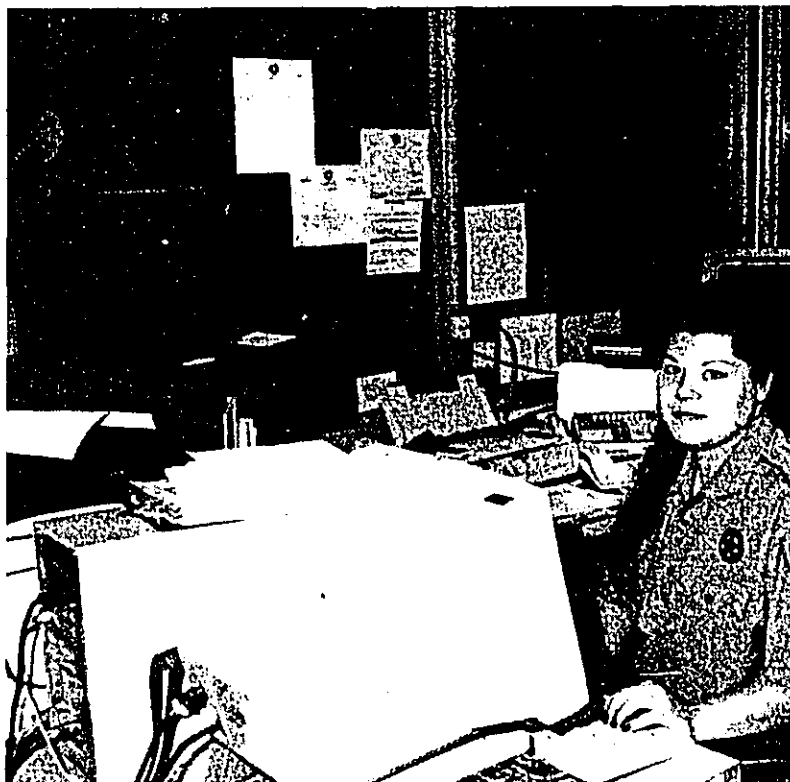
Unemployment rate dips to 8.3%

WOODVILLE — After soaring upward by over two percentage points in January, Tyler County's unemployment rate began to slide back down during February, hitting the 8.3 percent mark.

According to figures released by the Texas Employment Commission, the county's new 8.3 percent jobless rate means that out of an estimated labor force of 6,658 people, there were 555 local residents looking for work during February. This is down from January's 9.3 percent rate in which TEC estimated that out of a labor force of 721, there were 626 people searching for jobs.

February's drop in the local jobless rate from 9.3 to 8.3 percent follows a significant increase in unemployment. The January rate came in 2.1 percentage points over the 7.2 percent figure recorded in December 1994.

The February rate, which is the latest currently available from TEC, is well below the county's five-year high of 11.5 percent unemployment recorded in March 1994 as well as the 11.4 percent jobless mark set one year earlier in February 1994.

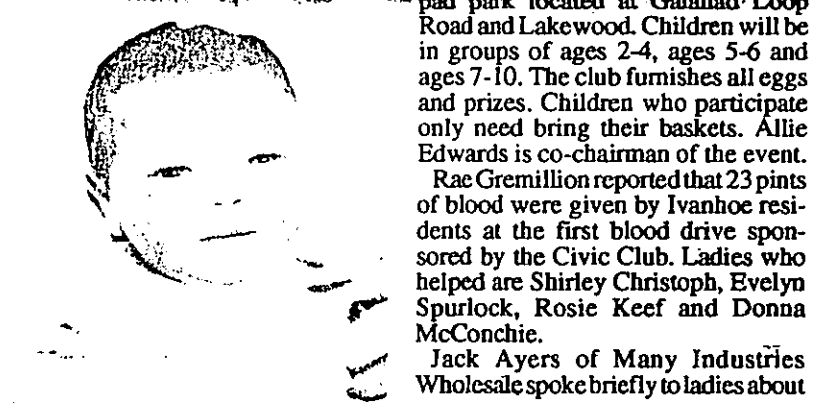
