



Exactly 132 years following hi death, Confederate Capt. Isaac N.M. Turner was returned "home" Saturday to lay beside his parents in the Turner family cemetery just over the Tyler County line in Polk County. At 22, he was the youngest company commander in Hood's Texas Brigade. Turner died from a Union sniper's bullet on April 15, 1863 in Virginia and was buried on the Georgia plantation where he grew up. Members of the newly organized Ike Turner Camp of the Sons of Confederate Veterans recently located his burial place and with the permission of surviving family members, arranged for him to be returned to Polk County for re-burial (pictured below). The re-burial fulfilled the captain's dying wish that he be returned to Texas so that he could be near his mother. During ceremonies Sat urday, SCV re-enactors dressed in Confederate grey, escorted Turner's remains in a colorful and moving funeral service. 



The library operated on a annual budget of \$69,945 in 1994 and saw a traffic increase of 7,990 over the 83,014 from the year previous. In 1993 there were 5.000-reference questions and reference backups with 1994 showing an increase of 1,113. New patrons using the library increased from 601 in 1993 to 710 in 1994. The facility hosted 78 meeting in 1993 and jumped to 80 in 1994.

Books and magazine usage jumped from 152,253 in 1993 to 195,328 in 1994. Videos and audio use went from 5,000 to 6,113. The Interloan Books and Videos program saw an increase of 85 over 1993 from 387 to 472. Turner, who was killed by a Union sniper's bullet on April 15, 1863, was finally granted his last wish Saturday when his remains were re-buried in his family's Polk County cemetery located just north of Highway 190 near the Tyler County line. since these books do not sell. The library operated on a annual budget of \$69,945 in 1994 and saw a raffic increase of 7,990 over the 83,014 from the year previous. In 1993 there were 5,000-reference questions and reference backups with 1994 showing an increase of 1,113. New patrons using the library increased from 601 in 1993 to 710 in 1994. The facility hosted 78 meeting in 1993 and umped to 80 in 1994.

Books and magazine usage jumped from 152,253 in 1993 to 195,328 in 1994. Videos and audio use went from 5,000 to 6,113. The Interloan Books and Videos program saw an increase of 85 over 1993 from 387 to 472. Grants and services from the State Library System included:

-\$4,345 for new books and videos -Compute equipment and consultant

-Video Library and Loan service; Reference -Back-up;

Audio books for the blind; -\$500 for reference books. The Allan Shivers Library Museum visitation increased from 2,184 visitors in 1993 to 2,615 visitors in 1994.
