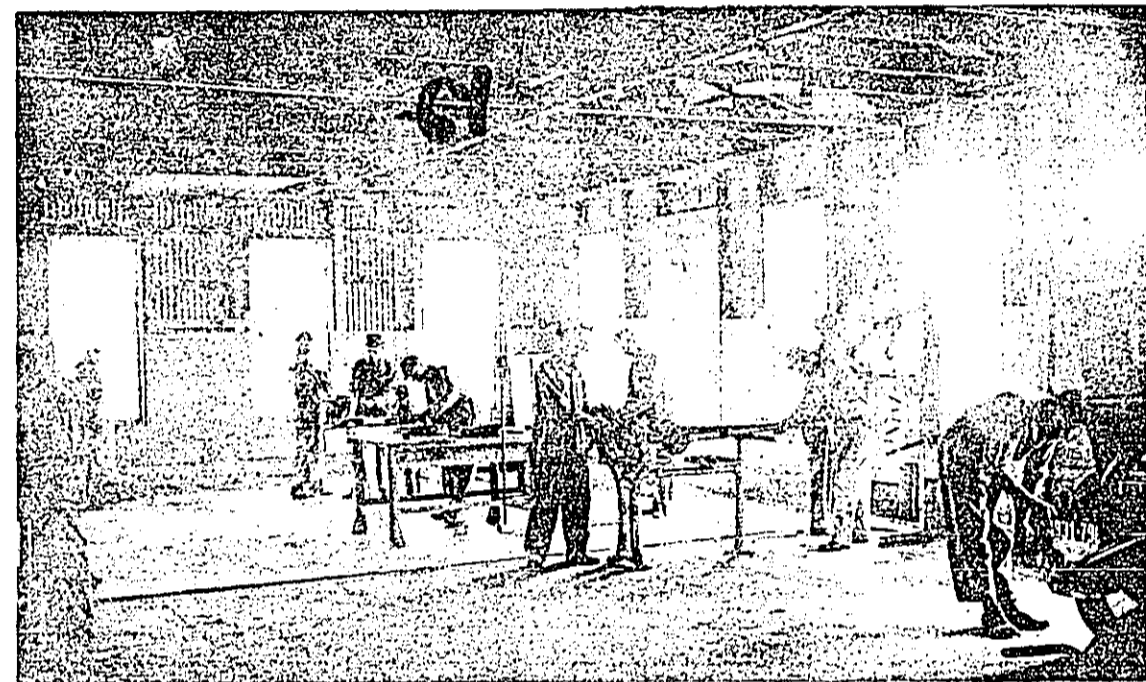


Letter To The Editor

Editor, Tyler County Optimist

Oswego, Kansas, Sept. 4.

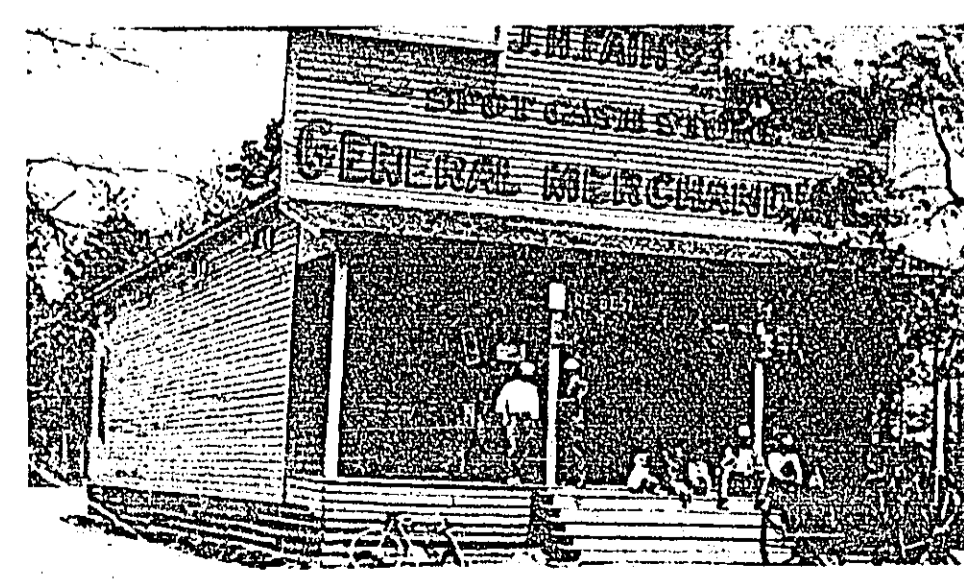
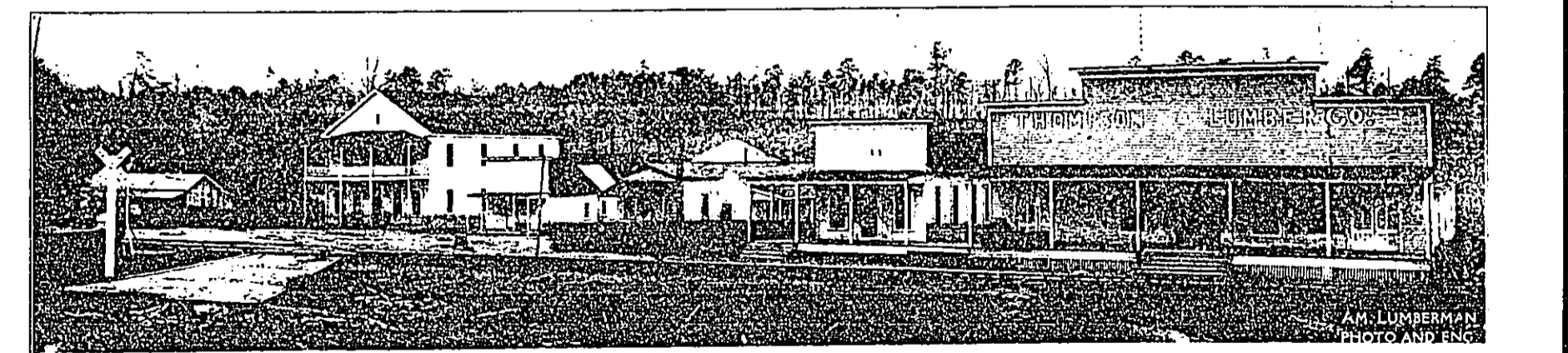

The interest manifested in the opening inspires enthusiasm that will contribute materially in carrying the present term along smoothly and successfully.

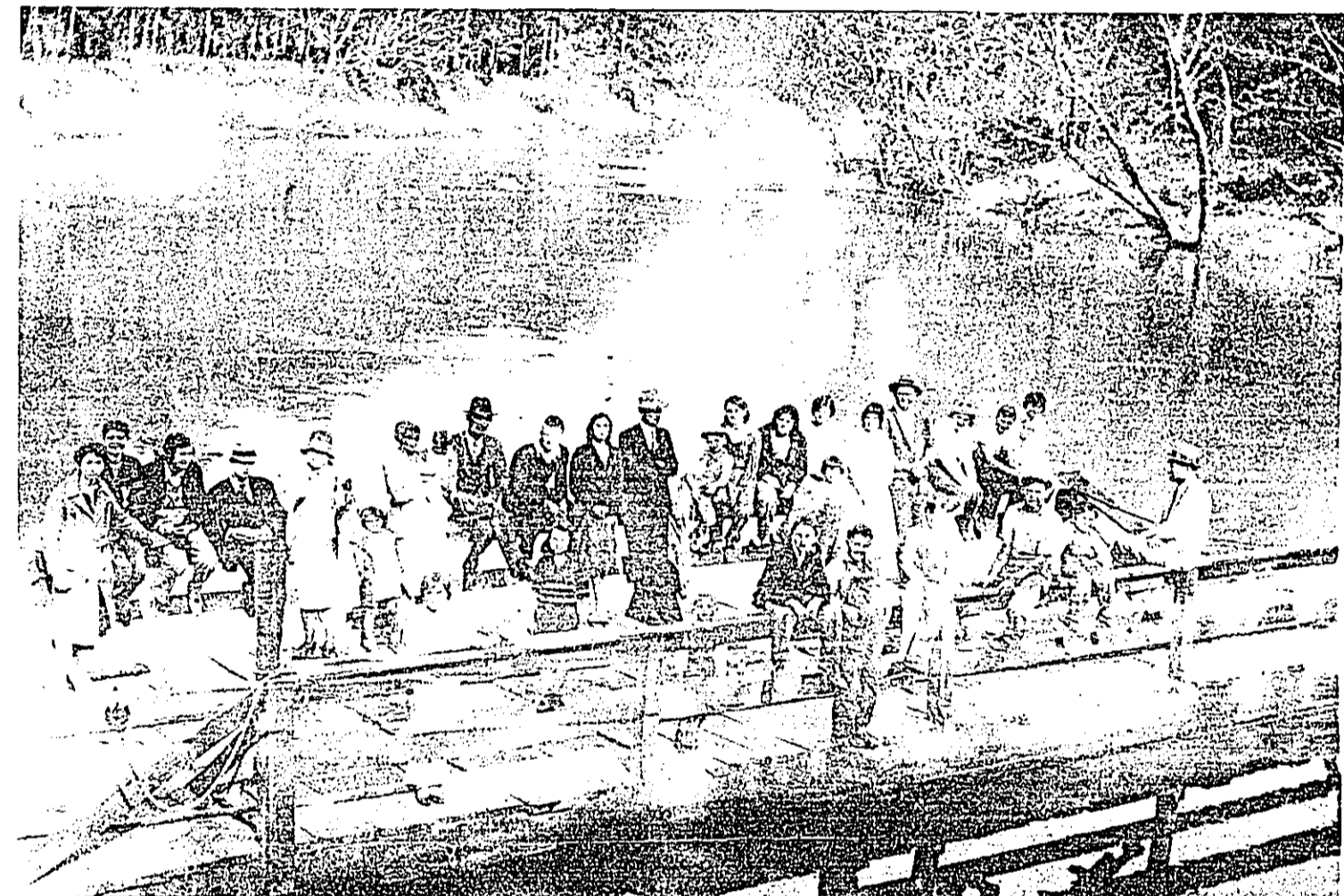

Killed in Houston

W. J. Marshbanks, aged seventy-eight years, who has been making his home in Houston, but who is well known in Woodville, having lived here at different times, was killed by an automobile in Houston last Friday.

The body was brought back here for burial, the funeral services having been held at the home of deceased's daughter, Mrs. R. E. Hurst, followed with interment in the city cemetery.

Mr. Marshbanks was a Confederate veteran and at one time was an inmate of the Confederate home. For the past few months he has been working in Houston and has stepped from a street car there last Friday a passing car struck him and killed him instantly.

Doing Good Work On Town Bluff Road

The county road machines, in charge of a couple of workmen, have been engaged in improving the Woodville-Town Bluff road for several days. Of course, a modern highway is not being constructed, but grades are being made and the worst places along the route are being made passable. The work was started at Town Bluff, and coming this way, they are now only about five miles from town.

The work is being sustained by public contributions. Town Bluff people and those along the route have expended about \$150.00 and a supplementary fund is being made up in town to finish the job. It will take at

least \$150.00 additional, as it will be necessary to build a fifty foot bridge across the bottom of the little creek just across the railroad track. The following amounts have already been contributed on the town fund and it is hoped the remaining \$45.00 will be forthcoming in the next few days:

Asked Too Much For Tires

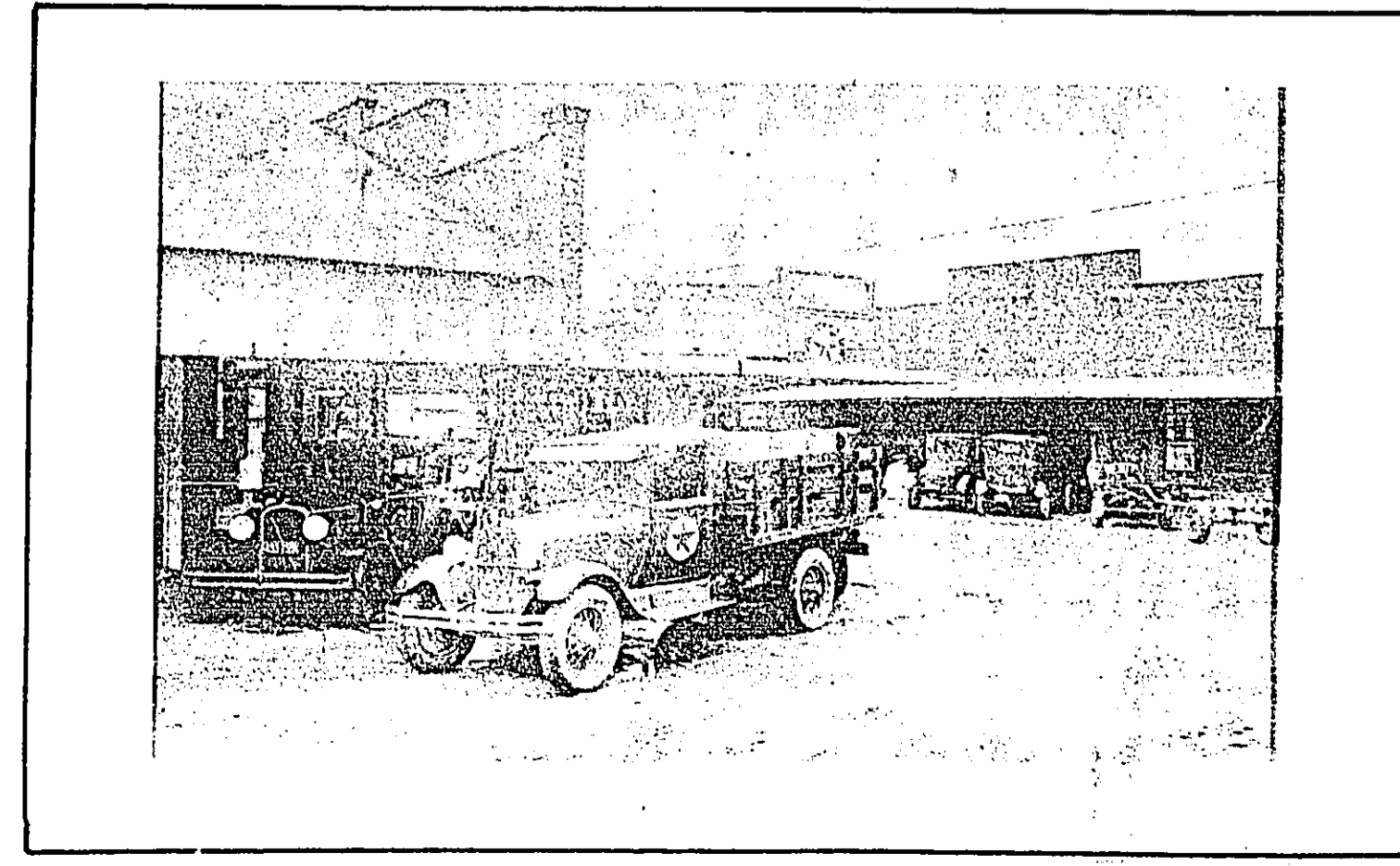

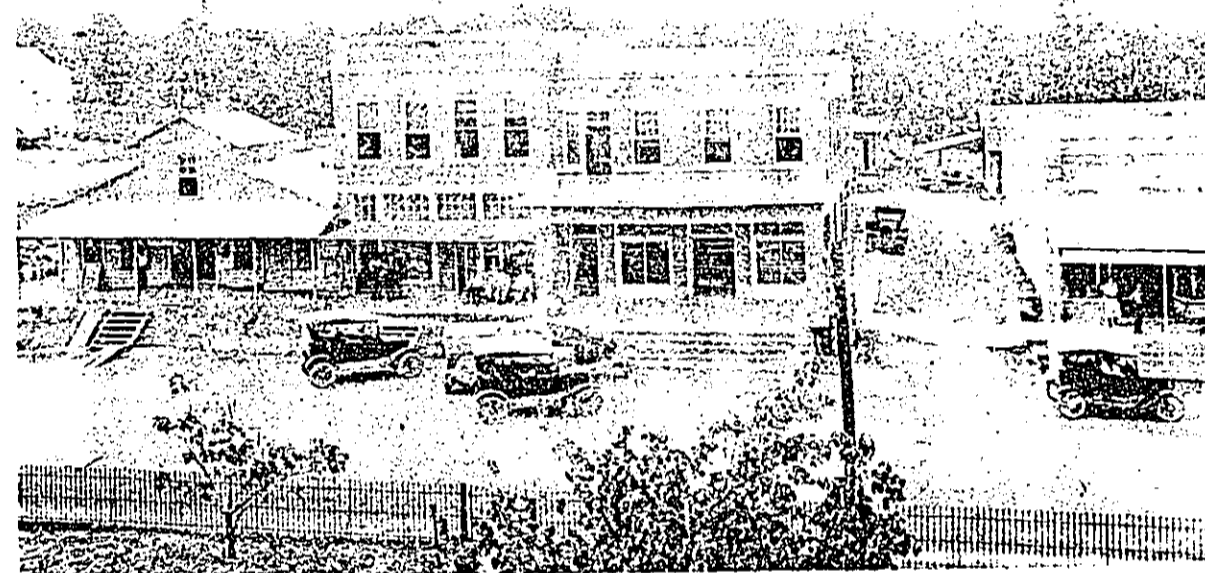
And their wives were not much smaller. Plump didn't really describe them; they were worse than that.

15 Cotton Men Will Be Sued

Dallas, Tex., (Special)--Suits will be filed against 15 cotton growers, who are members of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, Friday, for jumping contracts to dispose of their crop only through the cotton association, according to J. W. L. Hall, secretary of the organization. Four suits were filed Thursday and injunctions were granted restraining the growers from selling their cotton. One of the suits was filed against a farmer in Travis county and alleges that he was selling his cotton against the terms of the contract which he had with the association.

Cases where violations of the contract have been found were investigated by attorneys of the association and legal action will be taken against the members who have disposed of their crop through other organizations contrary to the Sapiro contract, which will stand the test of state courts, according to officials of the cotton organization.

Some resources are excluded for SSI

LUFKIN — Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is a Federal needs program administered by the Social Security Administration. It provides an economic floor-of-protection for Americans age 65 or over or of any age if blind or disabled and who have limited income and resources. Benefits and administrative costs are paid from general revenues - not Social Security trust funds. In the seven counties serviced by the Lufkin Social Security office, there are over 6000 men, women and children receiving SSI benefits. Single persons may have resources valued up to \$2000 and couples up to \$3000 and still meet the resource limit. For children under age 18, parents' resources are also considered. These resources are to be rather small amounts but many things are not counted in arriving at these figures. Some of the most common items which are excluded in part or entirely are:

- A home, including the land on which the home stands and other buildings on that land, which a person owns and makes their principal residence, regardless of its value.
- Personal effects and household goods with a total equity value of \$2000 or less. If the total equity exceeds \$2000, the excess value counts toward the above limits. Equity value is what an item could be sold for after subtracting what is owed on it.
- Car - regardless of value, if it is used by any member of the household for employment, to obtain regular medical treatment, to perform essential daily activities or if it is modified for use by a handicapped person. If it can't be excluded for these reasons, the first \$4500 of value will be excluded anyway.
- Life insurance policies with a total face value of \$1500 or less per person.
- Burial plots - regardless of value, if intended for use by the applicant or their immediate family. Also, up to \$1500 in burial funds for an applicant and \$1500 for a spouse may not count.
- The rules are very complex and benefits could be lost by attempting to determine one's own eligibility. East Texans who believe they may be eligible for SSI are urged to contact Social Security. HOUSTON — A detailed "memory" notebook combined with medication can ease the memory and concentration problems experienced by some HIV patients.

Hospice care may be covered by Social Security

LUFKIN — When a Medicare beneficiary needs hospice care for a terminal illness, Medicare Hospital Insurance (Part A) may cover the cost of the required services. Home care, inpatient care - when needed - and a number of other services may be paid for under the hospice benefit.

To receive this coverage, the patient must meet three conditions: (1) a physician certifies that the patient is terminally ill - with a life expectancy of six months or less; (2) the patient chooses to be cared for by a hospice instead of using standard Medicare benefits; and (3) care is provided by a Medicare-participating hospice program. The approved hospice and the beneficiary's attending physician must jointly establish the plan of care.

Generally, the care is delivered at the beneficiary's home. However, Medicare will pay almost the entire cost of the following services if they are provided by a Medicare-approved hospice:

- physician and nursing services;
- drugs, including outpatient drugs for pain relief and symptom manage-

ment;

- short-term inpatient care, including respite care;
- home health aide and homemaker services;
- physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech/language pathology;
- medical social services;
- counseling, including dietary advice and
- medical supplies and equipment.

Medicare pays for two 90-day periods of hospice care, one additional 30-day period, and an extension of unlimited duration, if it is needed. There are special rules when a patient changes or cancels hospice programs. There is also Medicare coverage for treatment of a condition that is not related to the terminal illness, even if the patient remains in the hospice.

Prostate cancer recurrence study offered

HOUSTON — Patients with clinically localized prostate cancer who undergo removal of their prostates have a 7-in-10 chance of remaining cancer-free the rest of their lives, if they remain cancer-free for six years, they will likely remain so for life.

That's the conclusion of a first-of-its-kind study of cancer recurrence among patients who underwent radical prostatectomy, surgical removal of the prostate, said Dr. Ozdal Dillioglugli of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Since a hazard rate that falls steadily to a negligible level suggests that the cancer was completely eradicated, these results also support the effectiveness of radical prostatectomy in the treatment of prostate cancer," Dillioglugli said.

The study, funded by the National Institutes of Health's National Cancer Institute, is important not only because of the hope it offers men suffering from prostate cancer but also because the information can be used to cut medical costs by helping physicians know at which point continued follow-up care is unlikely to be needed.

"Hazard-rate studies have commonly been used in cancer research of other

kinds," Dillioglugli said. "But to the best of our knowledge this is the first such study of prostate-cancer patients who underwent radical prostatectomies."

The Baylor study involved 436 men with clinically localized prostate cancer. Among the 436, all of whom had radical prostatectomies, only 70 developed a recurrence of cancer, and by the sixth year, there were no recurrences.

In addition, the study indicated that, if there is to be a recurrence, it will occur early.

The study results were presented recently at the American Urological Association's 1995 Annual Meeting in Las Vegas.

The others involved in the Baylor study were Dr. Peter T. Scardino, Dr. Bryan D. Leibman, Dr. Michael Kattan and Carrie Seale-Hawkins.

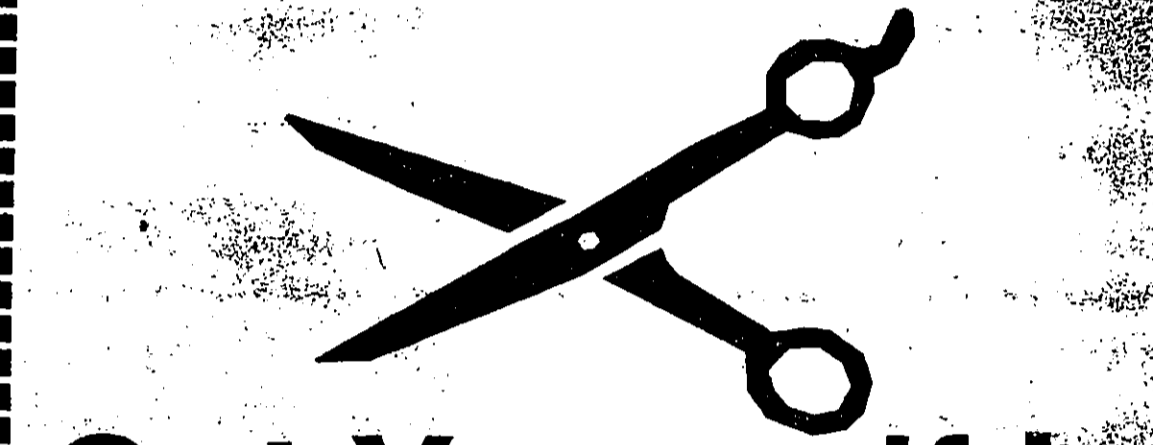

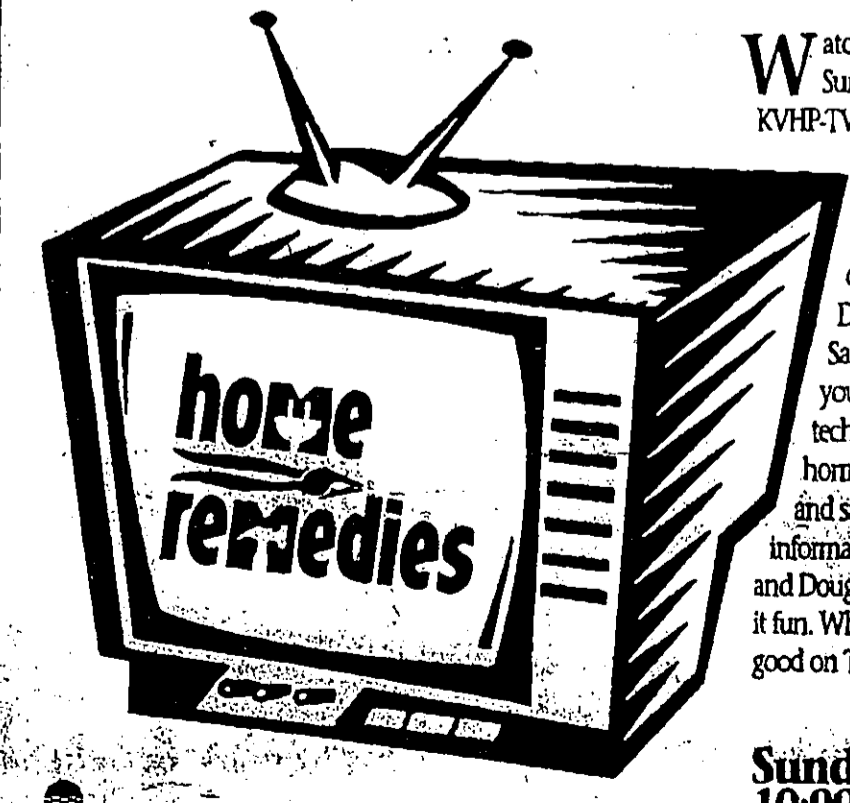

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ALEX THOMPSON

Woodville has a citizen it can be proud of. Alex Thompson, president of the new Citizens State Bank, is truly an educated man and a business leader.

Thompson was born Jan. 6, 1883, in Kilgore. He attended Alexander Institute and then Austin College in Sherman. He earned a Bachelor of Laws Degree from Cornell University in 1905 and then went on to Eastman Business College at Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

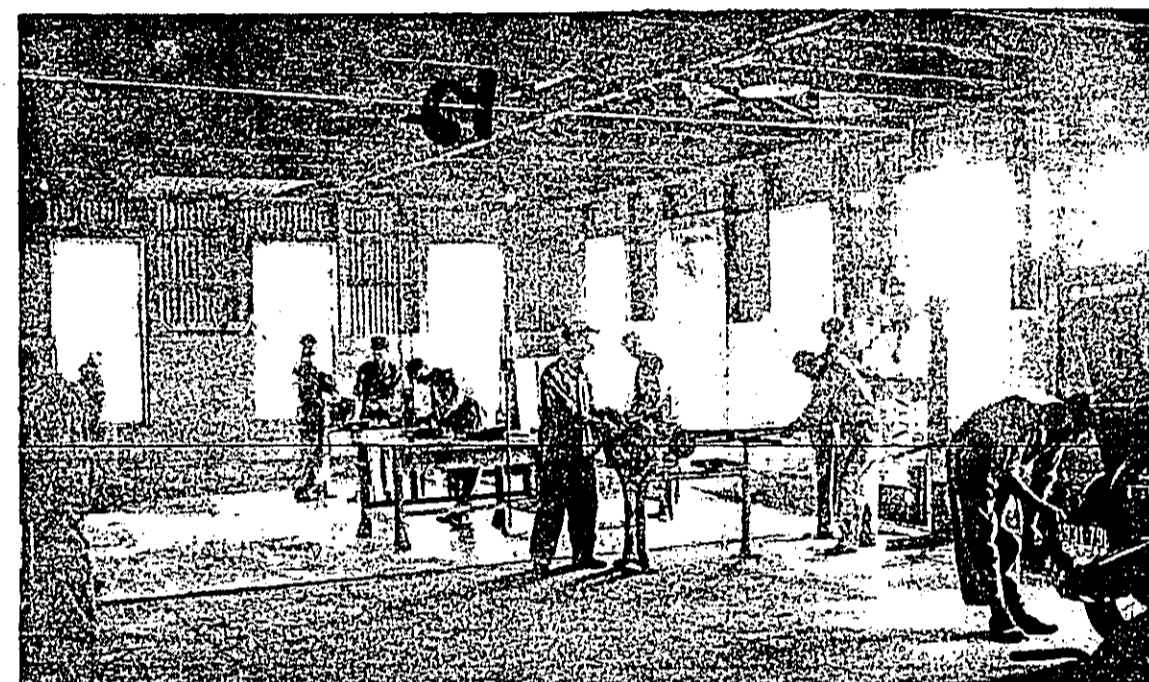

timely and entertaining.

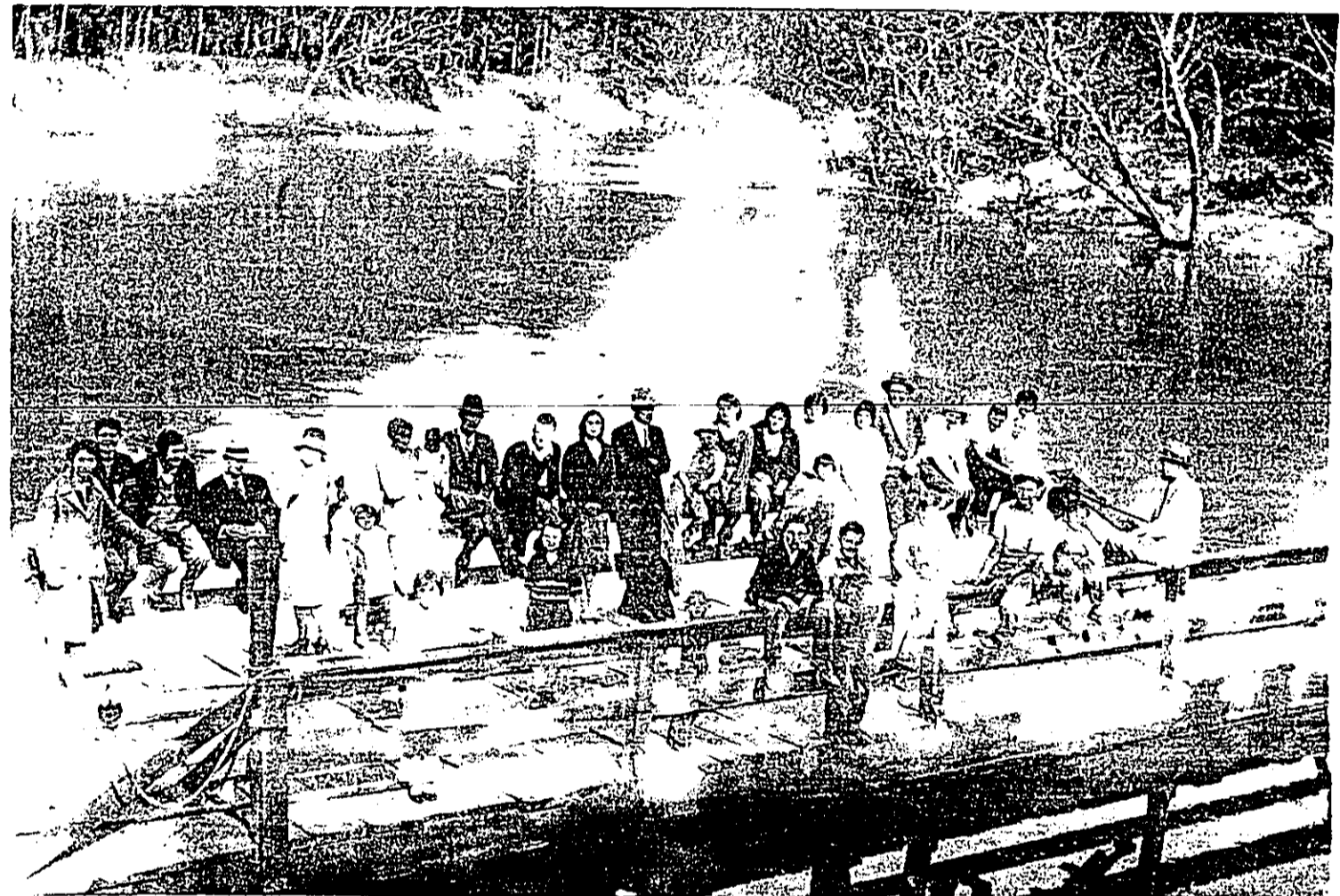
Mrs. Jay Kelley, speaking

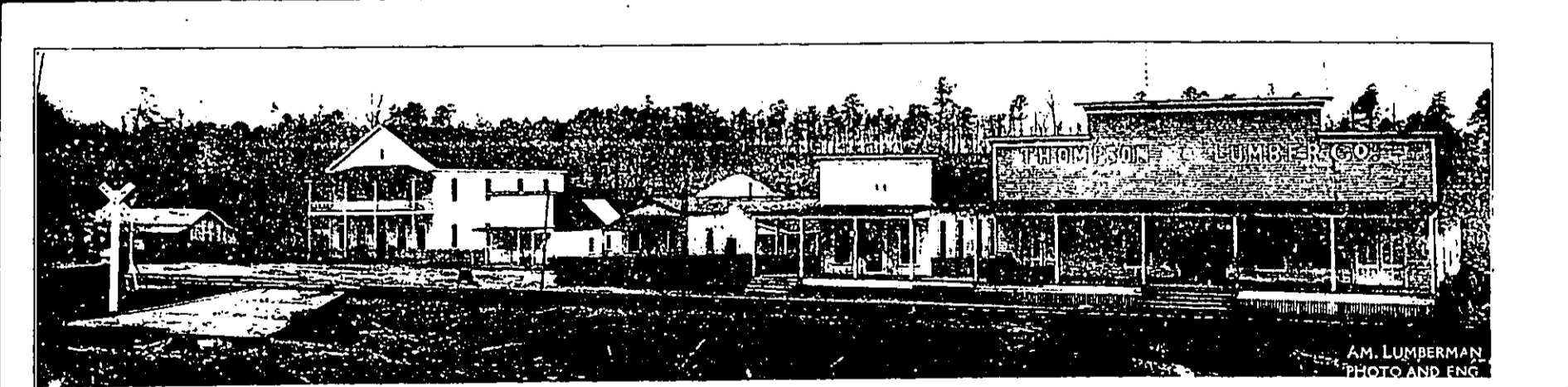

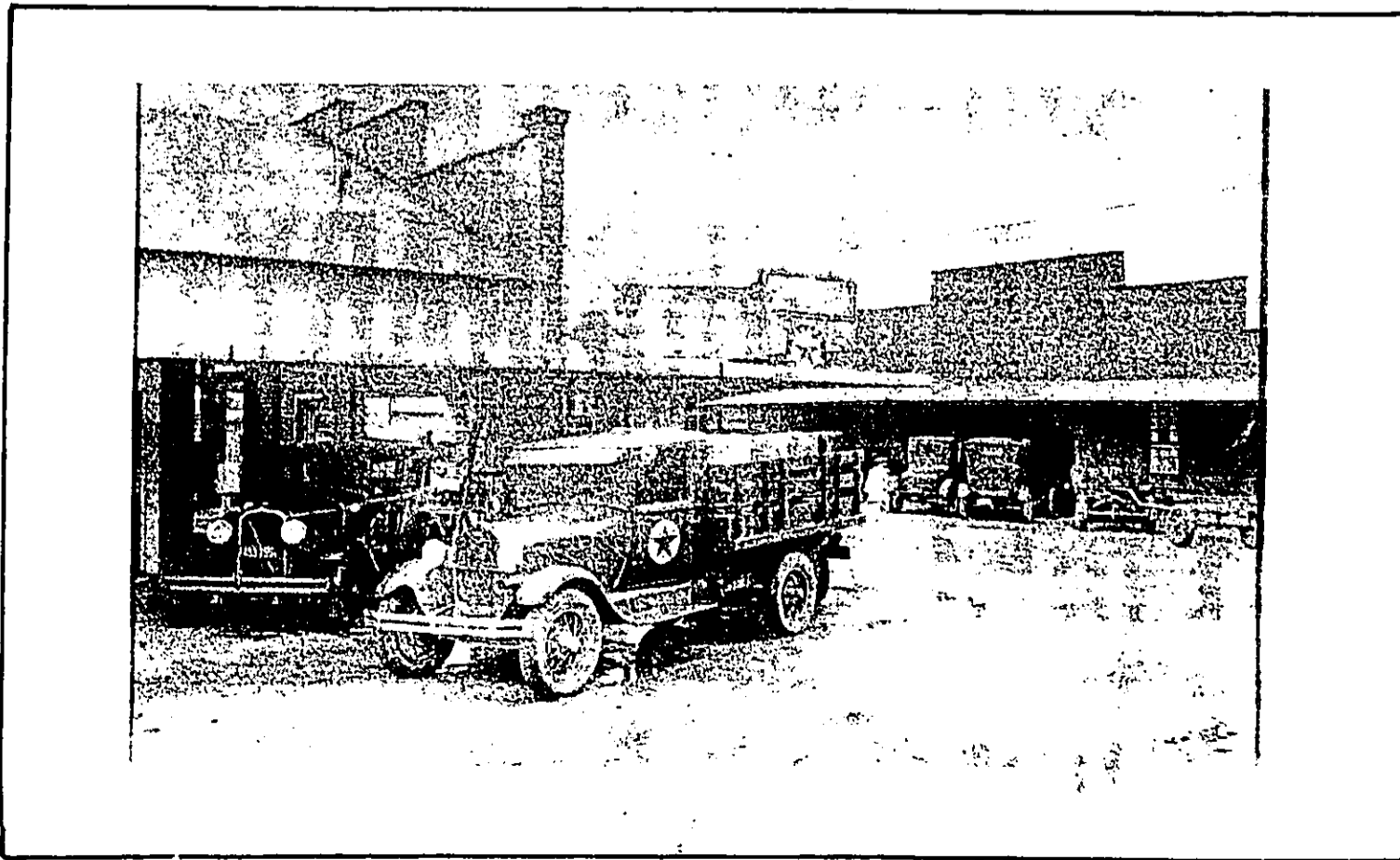

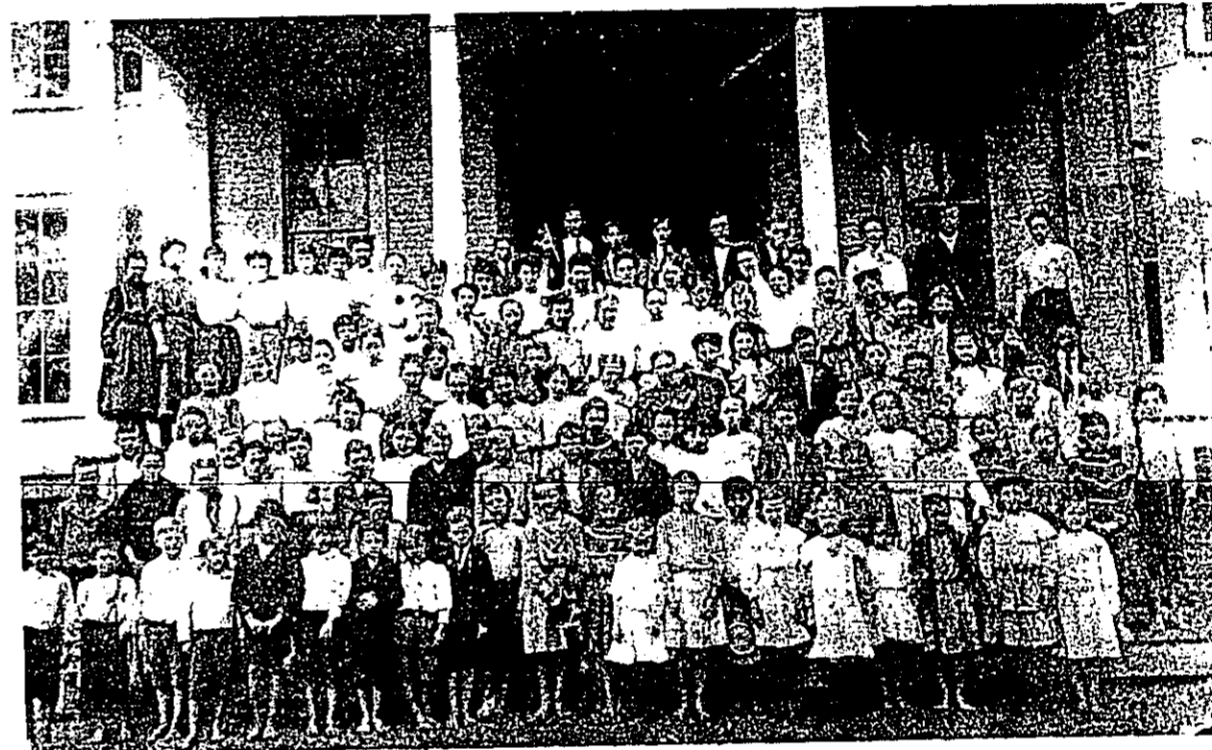

15 Cotton Men Will Be Sued

Dallas, Tex., (Special)--Suits will be filed against 15 cotton growers, who are members of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, Friday, for jumping contracts to dispose of their crop only through the cotton association, according to J. W. L. Hall, secretary of the organization. Four suits were filed Thursday and injunctions were granted restraining the growers from selling their cotton. One of the suits was filed against a farmer in Travis county and alleges that he was selling his cotton against the terms of the contract which he had with the association.

Cases where violations of the contract have been found were investigated by attorneys of the association and legal action will be taken against the members who have disposed of their crop through other organizations contrary to the Sapro contract, which will stand the test of state courts, according to officials of the cotton organization.

Safeguard Education

There is probably no man the world today that realizes more than the man who has been denied the privilege, the value of an education. 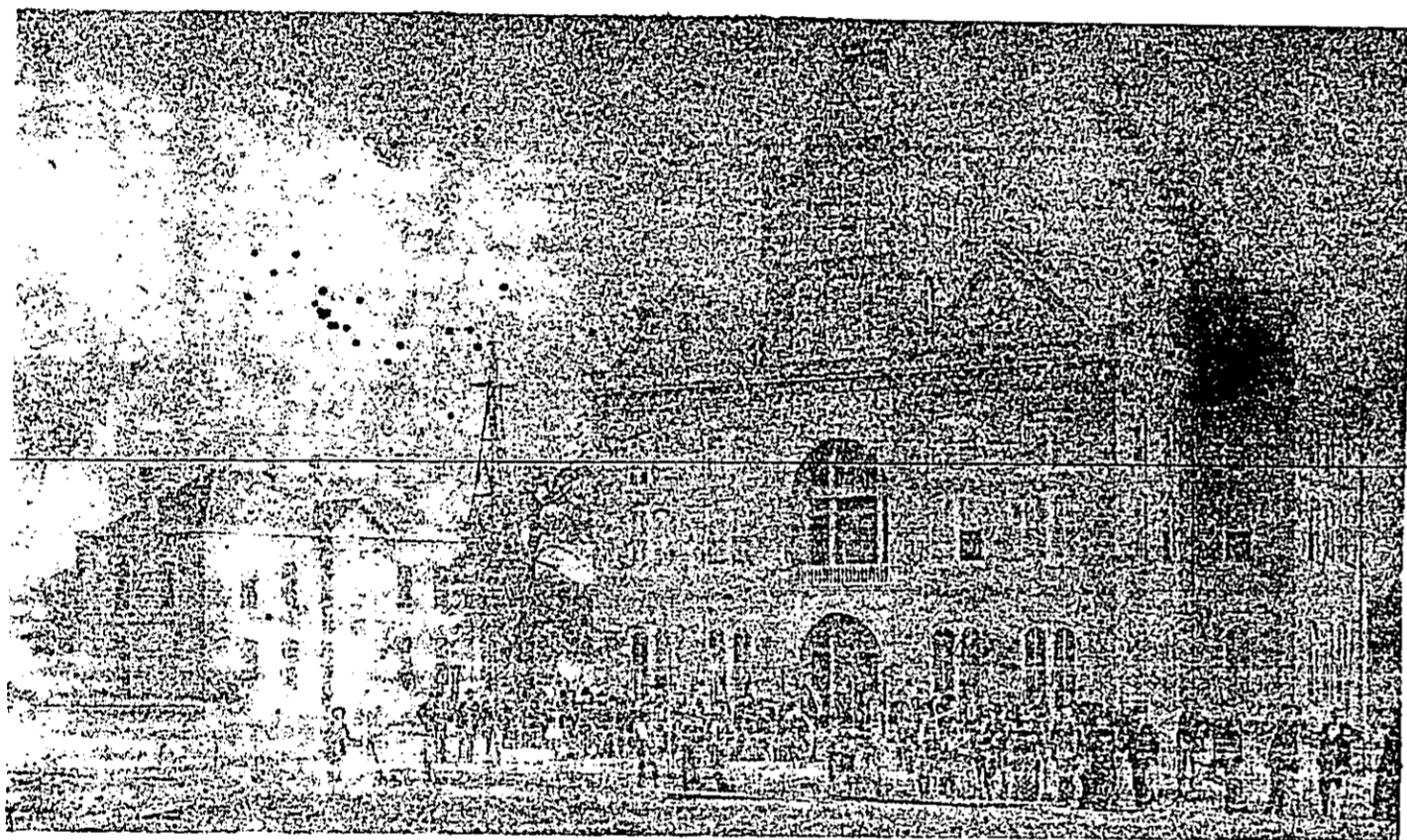

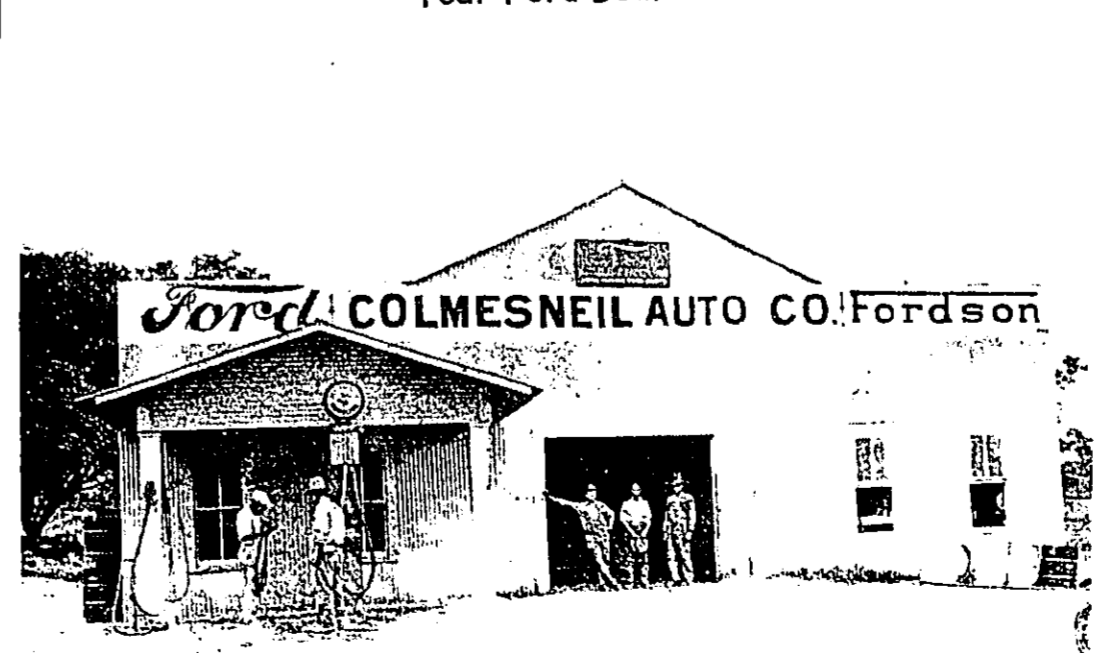
