Tyler County Retired Teachers receive award

WOODVILLE — The Texas Retired Teachers Association has awarded the Tyler County Retired Teachers Association the Banner Unit Award as an outstanding local unit. Phillis Hull, of Woodville, was presented the 20th Century Teacher Award for promoting public relations, and the volunteer service award was given to Mae Peace, Colmesneil. During the past year, Texas retired teachers have volunteered in schools, civic and charitable organizations, hospitals, nursing homes and churches for a combined total equivalent to \$20,000,000, based on the minimum wage. The Silver Star Award for TRTA membership promotion was presented to Rachel Sturrock, of Woodville. She has enrolled many retired school personnel in the local and state organization by stressing the importance of combined efforts in obtaining adequate annuity increases and affordable health care services. The teacher retirement system which administers these areas is not allowed by Texas legislative direction to lobby for retired teachers. C. D. Woodrome was awarded the School Bell Award for his outstanding media coverage of news related to retired teachers, and Radio Station KVLV was also named a School Bell Award recipient for its outstanding contribution in keeping the public informed of events related to education and retired teachers. Former State Senator Bill Haley, of Austin, was awarded a certificate of appreciation for his work in the State Senate. In further business at the final meeting of the year, officers were elected and installed during a ceremony led by Phillis Hull. Officers elected for the 1995-96 year were Nancy Jo Jehlen of Warren, president; Lucille Beas of Colmesneil, vice-president; Lucy Gray of Ivanhoe, secretary; and Rachel Sturrock of Woodville, treasurer. The next meeting will be held on September 18, 1995, with scheduled guest speaker Senator Drew Nixon. All area retired school personnel are cordially invited to attend. Commissioners to honor District Judge Bill Beggs

Tyler County Commissioners will honor with a reception the new 88th District Court Judge The Honorable Bill Beggs this Friday, May 26, at 10 a.m. The event will be held in the Tyler County Commissioners Courtroom of the Tyler County Courthouse. Beggs, 38, comes to the court following the vacancy created when Earl "Smookey" Stover was elected to the 9th Court of appeals in Beaumont. He will share the bench responsibility with The Honorable Judge Monte Lawlis currently serving the 88th District Court bench. Beggs is the first Republican to serve as a district judge since the Reconstruction Era following the Civil War. He was nominated by Governor George W. Bush to fill the vacancy in early April. The 88th District Court serves both Hardin and Tyler County. Beggs will fill the post for the next two years. The next regular election to fill the post is scheduled for November, 1996.

Police chief issues warning

Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko issued a warning following a two week rash of burglaries involving push or self-propelled type lawnmowers and bicycles. Yosko said the incidents occurred in the vicinity of Cobb Mill Road. "But, we are asking everyone in the city to keep a lookout," Yosko said. "Information anyone recalls about seeing someone pushing a lawnmower or something unusual that shouldn't be, let us know. Meanwhile, 'Yosko said,' persons are asked to keep their property secure to prevent it from happening in the first place."

Woodville felon sentenced in Federal court

BEAUMONT — United States District Judge Richard Schell sentenced a Woodville man to seven years in federal prison on Monday, May 19, without parole for being a convicted felon in possession of a firearm. Judge Schell also ordered 34 year old Ricky Lynn Addison to pay \$60 in restitution to Phillip's Pawn Shop in Jasper and be placed under supervised release for a period of three years after completing his prison term. Addison is not eligible for parole since parole in the federal system was abolished in 1987. On February 24, 1995, Addison pleaded guilty to the charge. In his plea, Addison admitted that on December 4, 1992, he illegally possessed a .38 caliber revolver and subsequently pawned the firearm. Addison's prior criminal history includes three burglaries, two in Jefferson County and one in Shelby County, dating all the way back to 1983. This case was investigated by agents with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, and deputies from the Tyler County Sheriff's Department. Assistant United States Attorney Lovita Morris Daniels prosecuted this case.

Guest speaker for the day will be a representative from R.S.V.P., the Retired Senior Volunteer Program - of Lufkin, who will outline the benefits for Village Volunteers participating in their program.

Well, Doctor, there are more. In the August 12, 1899 issue of the

If you'd like to work with us in helping Heritage Village interpret Tyler County and East Texas history, join us on Thursday, June 1, at the Hamm House at Heritage Village Museum and at least listen to what we have to say.

It's covered dish, so don't forget. Medically speaking, Dr. Gayle Burton said he didn't realize there had been so many doctors who had practiced in Tyler County.

Well, Doctor, there are more. In the August 12, 1899 issue of the

Tyler County Times, published each Saturday by F. A. Perry in Colmesneil, we found ads for Drs. D. D. Hamilton and A. J. Turner - "NO FEE - NO PAY". Beat that one if you can. Also Dr. J. I. Ellison, Physician and Surgeon, Dr. W. V. (Van) Stewart, Physician and Druggist and W. P. Chapman, M.D., Woodville, who was prepared to furnish board while treating chronic cases. A small hospital, perhaps, which reminded us of Dr. Watt Barfield. Didn't he have the first hospital in Woodville? Yes, of course. Dr. William Cruse Figua, a Beaumont surgeon, called and among other things, told us he used to come to Woodville to do surgery at Dr. Barclay's.

The main reason Dr. Figua called was to tell us he had a copy of the Cruse Family History he wanted to share with us. It was written in the early 70's by Edith Cruse Walker, daughter of Thomas Jefferson Cruse, the youngest son of Squire and Piety Cruse, whose journey to Tyler County has become legendary.

Dr. Figua is the great grandson of Squire and Piety. His grandfather was Judge William W. Cruse of Beaumont. The Cruse History was first published in "Records of East Texas," and an edited version of Squire and Piety's personal story can be found in Lou Ellis Mosley's "Pioneer Days of Tyler County."

As for the Cruse Family History, we found we did have a copy at the Village. I didn't realize it until I saw it, but we're obliged to Dr. Figua for sending us an extra for outside research. We'll be back with more on his Tyler County connections in the very near future.

great-grandson of Squire and Piety. He was "one of the best doctors of Woodville and East Texas, known and loved far and near."

John W. Cruse 1858-1900, brother of R. A., son of John and Elizabeth Barclay Cruse. He married a Turner from Kountze and practiced there. The senior John (1807-1907) was Squire and Piety's oldest child and the only one saved in the Mississippi River tragedy.

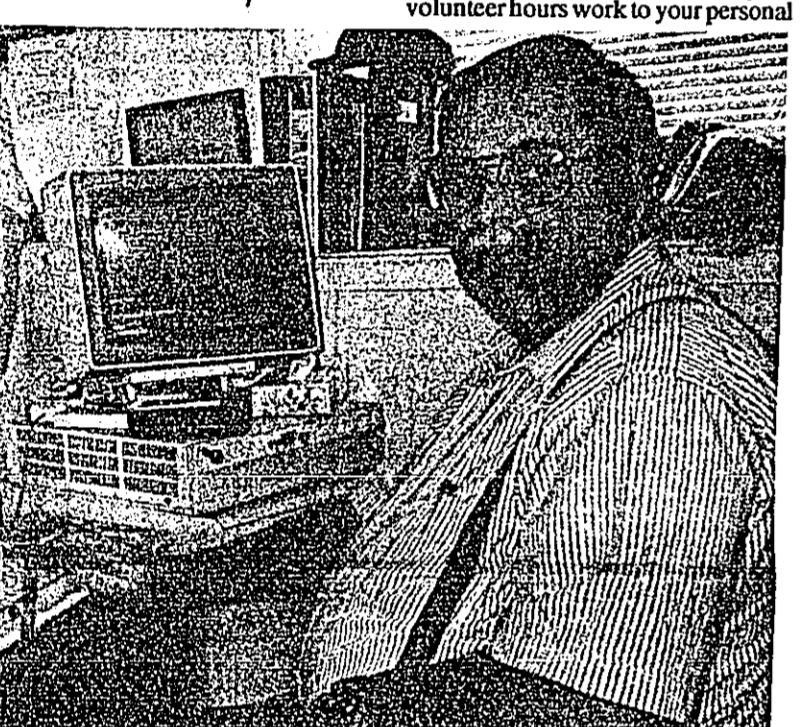
Judge Barclay Cruse 1869-1935, another John and Elizabeth son, lived in Woodville but later moved to Beaumont.

Dr. Anderson Barclay, son of Ellen Cruse, daughter of Squire and Piety. Dr. John Roberts, who married Eliza Cruse, daughter of John and Elizabeth and Dr. Anderson, who married Sara Cruse, granddaughter of Squire and Elizabeth.

Dr. Charles Stewart, "a prominent and beloved East Texas doctor," who practiced in Huntington. He married Fannie Mae Cruse, one of Squire and Piety's many granddaughters. And finally, Dr. Willie Pedigo, who married Ida Cruse, daughter of Anderson P. Cruse and granddaughter of Squire and Piety. Dr. Pedigo and his son Dr. Paul Cruse Pedigo operated the only hospital in Starnw, Texas, for many years.

## Social Security benefits for children

LUFKIN—Some people find Social Security taxes an unwelcome deduction from the family's earnings. They're thinking about how they could use the money to pay bills or plan for the children's college education. At the time, Social Security is a ticket item on the family agenda. But the illness or injury - or even the death of a parent in a family with young children, can suddenly make Social Security a very important part of the family's survival. Those paycheck deductions for Social Security taxes could make it possible for the family to stay together. For example, some families can get as much as \$2,000 a month when the worker is disabled.

When people think of Social Security benefits they usually think of older men and women who are retired or who are widows or widowers. If you find it difficult to picture a small child as a Social Security beneficiary, you may be surprised to learn that more than 3.5 million children receive more than \$1.2 billion each month because one or both of their parents are disabled, retired or deceased. Those dollars are helping provide the necessities of life for the family members and helping make it possible for those children to complete high school. When a parent

Early June, 1944: Hengyang, China was getting frustrated. Here I had about 15 combat missions, and still wasn't an ace. The only Jap planes I had shot down were two wheels-down Army Cooperation types.

I wanted to be a pilot, I'd have taken Zeroes with pleasure, but the really juicy meat was bombers. Alas, the Flying Tiger Sharks had already taught them better than to hit Hengyang by day. But at night? They loved to come over at bedtime, about 15 minutes apart, just to harass us. They seldom hit anything worthwhile, but they'd keep us awake and in the slit trenches most of the night.

There wasn't much we could do about it. With no radar, no searchlights, and no anti-aircraft guns except a pair of aircraft .50's on a homemade mount, we were kind of hamstrung. The Chinese Warning Net would alert us to the raids. However, it was much too slow to be any help for interceptions. We tried a few now and then, but the only damage was to our pride.

This particular night I was tired. I had flown two long missions that day, hot and sweaty hard work. Finally, I was able to get to bed. I had a good night's sleep. I had a good night's sleep. I had a good night's sleep. I had a good night's sleep. I had a good night's sleep.

That was supposed to produce action: man such defenses as we had, every body else out to the trenches. But I was tired!

Reasoning that, what the heck, they never hit our barracks except by accident, I pulled up the cover and went back to sleep. If the "three ball" sounded, I never heard it. The next thing I knew, I was slammed out of sleep by the loudest BLAMMM! I ever heard. At the same time, as best I could tell, the entire base fell in on me. I was swathed and entangled in suffocating folds of something - in the pitch darkness of blacked-out night, I couldn't tell what. I could barely move. When I managed to get a hand more or less free, I felt something like a railing around where I lay. Was I in a coffin? I took some time for me to get sorted out, time that seemed longer than it was. At last it filtered through. A bomb had hit close to the barracks - a 500-KG demolition bomb about 30 feet away, as it turned out. The shock had jarred my bed-frame pegs loose, and the bedspring had fallen through, pulling the mosquito net down on top of everything. The "railing" was the bedstead above me as I lay on the floor.

Not particularly chastened (after all, it could never happen again!), I piled the mosquito net in the corner and went back to sleep on the floor. If there had been mosquitoes, the bomb must have killed them. I never got a whiff of malaria.

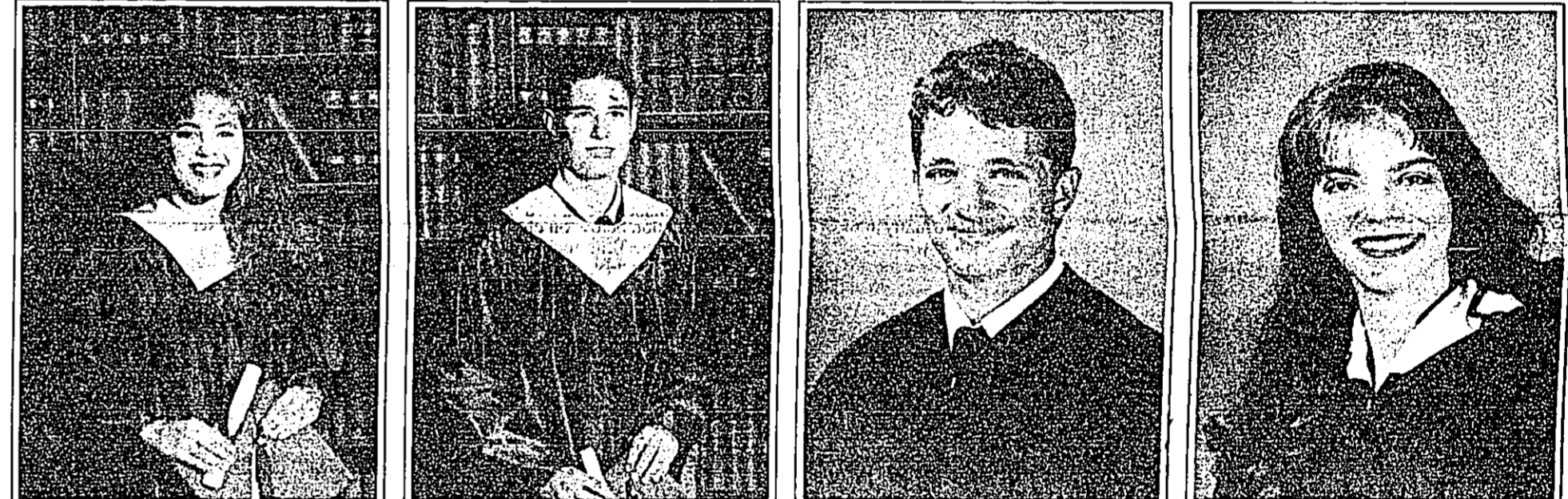

## Jams, jellies just as good made without sugar

**WOODVILLE** — Jam and jelly don't have to be "forbidden fruit" to people on sugar-restricted diets. Just use artificial sweetener instead of sugar when making them.

If an artificial sweetener is used, only a form of succharin and/or 124-K can be used. Aspartame such as Nutra-Sweet or Equal products cannot be heated without destroying the sweetener.

Diet jams and jellies must be refrigerated or frozen unless they are made by the long boil method. And storing them in the freezer keeps the natural color and flavor of Texas strawberries, peaches or dewberries at peak quality. Leave at least one-half inch head space in the container before freezing.

Fresh strawberry jam can be made to suit special dietary requirements. To prepare fruit jam, sort and wash fully-ripe fruit. Remove any stems or caps. Crush the fruit.

For jams, the method of combining ingredients varies with the form of pectin used. Powdered pectin is mixed with unheated crushed fruit, and liquid pectin is added to the cooked fruit

## Homemaker Hints

**Mayhaws - an old favorite**

Mayhaws, a member of the rose family and hawthorn genus, produces small apple-like fruit that ripen during late April and early May in East Texas. Mayhaws trees are small to medium-sized with beautiful white blossoms and attractive fruit and are desirable as ornamentals and for wildlife cover and forage.

The fruit of hawthorns were eaten as a food and made into wine throughout Europe since the Middle Ages. The historic Mayflower ship was named after this plant. Recent world interest has occurred because today many laboratory tests and a number of clinical trials support its use by demonstrating that hawthorn leaves, flowers and fruits contain chemical compounds that increase blood flow to the heart muscle, as well as positively affect other aspects of cardiovascular health.

For many East Texans, Mayhaws are highly prized for jelly. Here are two recipes to delight your taste buds.  
Mayhaw Syrup

• For hot cakes, etc: 1 cup mayhaw juice (as for jelly); 1/2 cup sugar; 1/2 cup white Karo (to prevent jelling). Rapid boil 18-20 minutes

• For ice milk: Decrease sugar and Karo to 1/3 cup each.

**Mayhaw Jelly**

• To cook mayhaws: 1 food gallon of mayhaws and 1 food gallon of water; Cook till tender; strain through a cloth; squeeze out all juice possible. A food gallon cooked should make 10 cups of juice. If not, add enough water to make 10 cups.

• To make jelly: 5 cups of juice; 7 cups of sugar; 1 box of Sure-Jell. Cook as directed on Sure-Jell strip. This is not intended to endorse or discriminate against any product. It does not ensure reliability.

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## Preventing mildew growth

When the humidity is high, we may find mildew growing in our homes. Mildew produces a discoloration that looks like dirt and has an unpleasant musty odor. Unchecked, it can continue to grow and stain textiles, books, walls, tile and other components of the house. Mildew is a mold with spores that exist almost everywhere.

The optimal temperature range for mildew growth is 77 to 86 degrees Fahrenheit, although growth can occur anywhere between 32 and 95 degrees. Mildew requires moisture because it thrives where the relative humidity is above 70 percent. Light is not required for mildew growth, so growth can continue indefinitely in dark places. Mildew grows slowly at first, however, after growth begins it is very rapid.

As always, prevention is the best medicine. Keeping the house clean by washing surfaces to get rid of grease, smoke and soap residue will help keep mildew from getting started. Ventilating closets and cabinets by leaving the doors open or installing over-the-door improves air circulation and inhibits mildew growth. Use exhaust fans in the kitchen when cooking, and in bathrooms during bathing or showering to get rid of excess moisture. Be sure that vents go outside and not into an attic or crawl space.

Air conditioning in the summer reduces the temperature and humidity to levels that inhibit mildew growth. In a closed area with no air conditioning, a dehumidifier can be used to reduce humidity levels. However, the dehumidifier must be emptied frequently

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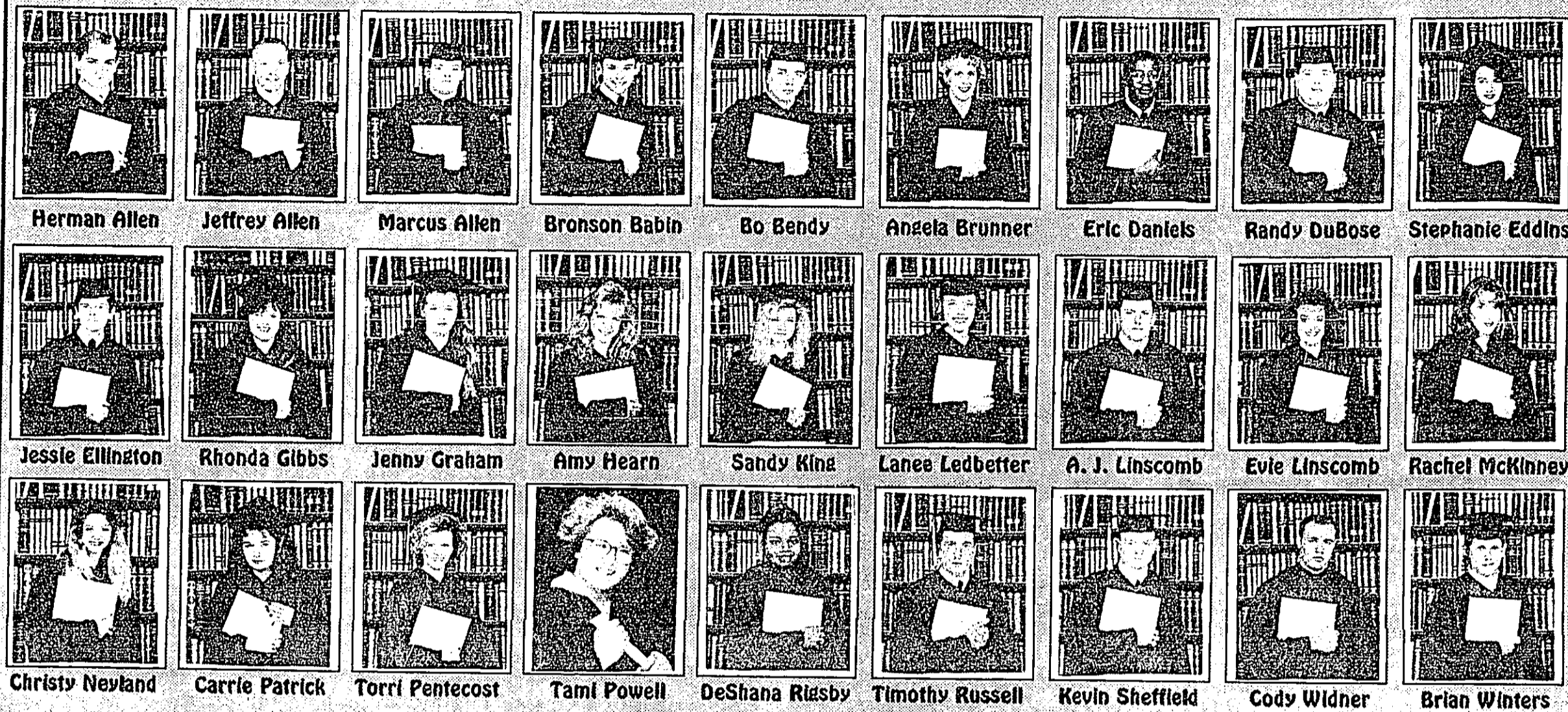

Navy's James Owens

## Navy's James Owens re-ups for six years

WOODVILLE — In May of 1980, James Walter Owens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney B. Owens of Woodville, graduated from South Park High School in Beaumont. On June 8, 1980 Owens left for San Diego, California where he received training for services in the U.S. Navy.

In August of 1980 Owens graduated from boot camp and was transferred to Millington Tennessee for technical training on aircraft hydraulic and pneumatic systems. In November he graduated from this school. After spending a brief two days at home for Thanksgiving he left for Jacksonville Florida where he would be stationed for the next four years with Attack Squadron 83 at Cecil Field Naval Air Station.

In March of 1981 Owens and his squadron deployed aboard the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Forrestal (CV-59) for six and a half months to the Mediter-

ranean Sea where the Forrestal would soon be a key factor in a dispute with Libya in what would later be remembered as the guns of August.

In 1983 Owens was moved up to the intermediate maintenance level as an aircraft tire and wheel mechanic responsible for taking bad tires, break them down, clean/inspect and rebuild for service.

At this time Owens and the air wing he was attached to was sailing aboard the U.S.S. Saratoga (CV-60). In 1984 Owens completed his first four years of Naval service.

Petty Officer Owens re-enlisted in the Navy for six years. He was assigned to attack training squadron 174 for his first two years, responsible for performing maintenance and necessary inspections required to keep the aircraft flying.

In 1988 Owens received new orders

to AIMD SEA OPDET again working at the intermediate maintenance level and was responsible for the repair of all hydraulic and pneumatic parts for all aircraft in carrier airwing six. These aircraft included the F-14 Tomcat, F-18 Hornet, A-6 Intruder, EA-6B Prowler, S-3 Viking, E-2C Hawkeye, and SH-3H Sea King. Owens was one of 12 personnel working in this work center.

For the first six months Owens was going aboard the U.S.S. America (CV-66) in what is known in the Navy as the DET concept and was later moved back to his old friend the U.S.S. Forrestal (CV-59) where he made two deployments to the Mediterranean Sea in '89-'90 where Owens and Forrestal was part of history when President George Bush met with the Russian President at the floating Malta Summit peace talks. This deployment was

six and a half months long, and the 1991 deployment found Owens and Forrestal in Operation Desert Storm and Provide Comfort for the Kurdish refugees. This deployment was for a week short of eight months.

At the end of 1991 Owens re-enlisted for three more years and in February 1992 departed Cecil Field N.A.S. in Jacksonville, Florida to Naval Air Station Norfolk, Virginia where he would be assigned to the Air Operations Department as material and supply supervisor responsible for six budget opiar logs with a dollar range of 100-150,000 dollars. Owens is also a drug and alcohol counselor responsible for working with personnel having problems in these areas. He is also a certified American Heart Association CPR instructor.

Since being assigned at Air Operations, Owens has earned his third good conduct award for over 12 years service, a pistol qualification ribbon, and was named Petty Officer of the Month for all Naval Air Station Norfolk for the month of November 1993.

Owens has also earned the Navy's enlisted aviation warfare wings and is a warfare qualiter and board member. In August 1994 Owens re-enlisted for six more years with the Navy, receiving orders to fighter squadron 41, the Black Aces, at Oceana Naval Air Station, Virginia Beach, Virginia. For the first four years he will work the famed F-14 Tomcat and in March 1995 his squadron will deploy for the Mediterranean Sea aboard the U.S.S. Roosevelt (CVN 71). The end of this six year tour will bring his career to 20 years.

## Woodville sailor recruits for Navy

SAN DIEGO — At no other time in our history has the Navy been able to boast about a higher quality of recruits, both men and women, than it can today. One reason for this is recruits like Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Darrell W. Perkins, the 32 year old son of Beverly Perkins of Woodville.

Perkins is assigned to Navy Recruiting District Houston. Although Perkins is a Navy radar and navigation specialist, he now focuses all of his efforts on attracting quality people to the Navy. The Navy requires successful and experienced Sailors to serve as recruiters to help enlist the men and women for a year, is playing a pivotal role in this effort.

"I am a general duty recruiter re-

sponsible for attracting people into all enlisted ratings," said Perkins.

With it high-tech ships, submarines, aircraft and equipment, the Navy offers a variety of programs to prospective recruits.

"The Navy offers skills training, educational and travel opportunities and money for college. It also gives people management and leadership skills, discipline and respect for this fine country," said Perkins, a seven year Navy veteran.

The goal of Perkins, and other recruiters, is to attract and enlist the brightest and best young men and women. Although the Navy has reduced the number of Sailors in its payroll over the past couple of years, it has not stopped recruiting.

"Many people today have the erro-

neous view that the Navy has stopped hiring, and the defense cutbacks have lessened the military as a viable employment opportunity for high school and college graduates," said Cmdr. Patricia Dislane, the commanding officer of Naval Recruiting District Houston. "This is just not true. We're still hiring. The reality is that the Navy currently has more than 57,000 new jobs available for men and women annually in more than 90 different career fields."

With so many job vacancies to fill, Perkins works some very long hours, but finds the job both enjoyable and

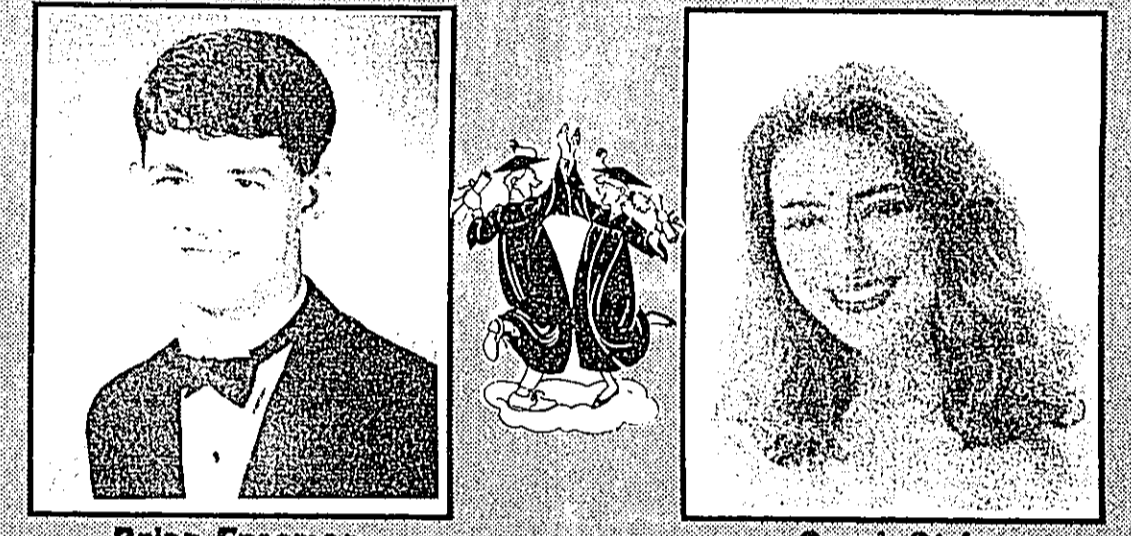
challenging.

"I find satisfaction by giving an outstanding career opportunity to those that qualify. Through the Navy, people will have a lot of doors opened for them," said Perkins. "The biggest challenge in recruiting is the fact that some parents think that military is still a last resort for 'problem' children and do not support their children's decision. They haven't taken the time to educate themselves on today's Navy."

Even though the Navy offers the Sailors a wide array of benefits and oppor-

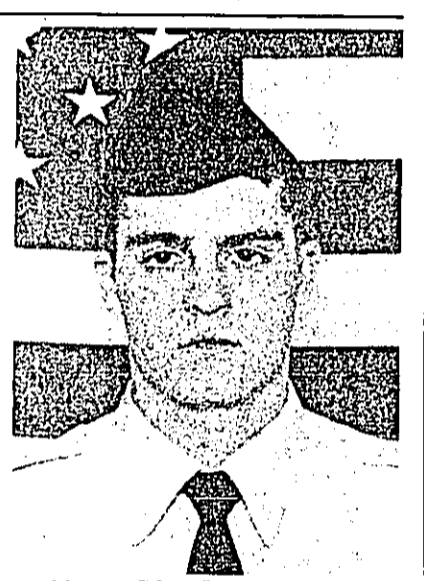
## Westmoreland graduates

## Pirates topple Chester in bi-district play

WOODVILLE — In a textbook game pitting two of the top county schools edged each other, the Spurger Pirates against the previously number one rated Chester Yellowjackets, 4-1, Friday to capture a class A bi-district title.

With the win the Pirates advanced on to the area championship game that was to be played Tuesday afternoon against Cushing, a team with an 18-5 record. The winner of that contest advances to the regional semifinal next week most likely against Trinidad, a state finalist last year.

The Spurger-Chester match-up was near perfect baseball, with Jacob Conner of the Yellowjackets matching the Pirates' Bubba Winkle on the mound. There were only five walks and one error in the seven inning contest that was highlighted by solid defenses on both clubs.

It wasn't until the bottom of the sixth inning, with Spurger holding a 2-1 lead, that one team finally got an edge in the game.

Marcus McCabe of the Pirates led off the inning with a single to center that was followed by a bunt single by Michael Hatton. A pass ball moved both runners into scoring position. J. P. McKee, Spurger's number nine hitter, then hit a soft grounder to second to score McCabe and give the Pirates a 3-1 advantage. Jason Winkle then promptly ripped a double down the third base line to drive in Hatton, and Pirates had what they needed.

In the top of the seventh the Yellowjackets refused to quit, getting an out infield single by Matt Standley and a single to center by Jesse Sneed.

Allen and a run scoring ground out by Herman Allen.

In the fourth the Bulldogs and Bandy scored again, this time on a fielder's choice, a stolen base, an Evadale error by Hare and a fielder's choice rbi by B. J. Stewart.

The last two Colmesneil runs came on Bear's single, a walk to Herman Allen, three stolen bases and a pass ball.

Joey Brown took the mound loss for the game with a losing record of 8-10. Things started off bad for the Bulldogs in the bi-district clash and progressively got worse.

Evadale built up a 4-0 lead in the top of the first inning before the Bulldogs could nail an out, and were behind 7-0 before they got to bat for the first time.

Evadale pitcher Joey Hare did most of the damage in the first inning with a three run home run following an unearned run. Another Colmesneil error brought in 5-0 before Evadale's fourth hit of the inning brought in two more tallies.

Colmesneil didn't quit, scoring solo runs in the first, second, fourth and fourth, but a 10-run outburst by Evadale in the top of the fifth was enough to stop it after five. The Bulldogs gave in one last hurrah with a pair of runs in the bottom of the fifth.

Another run came across in the third on a walk and two stolen bases by Jeff

Winkle struck out the next two Chester hitters and got the third on an un-assisted tag at second to give the Pirates only their second bi-district baseball title in the history of the school.

First year Spurger baseball coach Neil Hennigan felt that his Pirates kept pressure on Chester every inning with good defense and the competitiveness of pitcher Bubba Winkle.

"Bubba didn't have his best stuff," admitted Hennigan, "but he is such a competitor he wouldn't let us lose."

Chester coach Rusty Minyard complimented both teams, saying that his "jackets" played about as good as we have all year," and that Spurger has "what it takes to go the distance."

Both coaches felt the key to the game came on one play in the second inning

with both teams scoreless. Chester's Mark Franks opened the inning with a double to right. Seconds later Matt Standley shot a line drive to second where the Pirates' Michael Hatton was ready. Hatton snagged the liner and then tagged Franks for a double play.

Hennigan said that a scouting report on Standley helped. "We knew that he had a habit of hitting the ball to second base. Hatton was ready."

In the bottom of the inning the Pirates scored their first run of the game on a single by Marcus McCabe, a balk, and a run scoring single by Herman Laurent.

The Pirates made it 2-0 in the bottom of the third on a walk and a stolen base by Justin McCabe and a single to right by catcher Jason Spurlock.

Chester scored its only run of the game in the fourth inning after a walk to Jeremiah Barnes and a bunt single by Franks. After Standley advanced Barnes to third with a fly out to right field, Sneed brought the run home on a grounder to second.

One of the top defensive plays of the game was by Chester third baseman Paul Johnson in the top of the fourth inning. Johnson robbed Spurger's Jason Winkle of a sure hit that would have given the Pirates another run when he snagged a hot grounder and threw out Winkle at first to end the inning.

Chester was held to five hits by Bubba Winkle who improved his record to 6-2. The Pirate senior had six strikeouts and walked three Yellowjacket batters. Besides giving up the solo run in the fourth inning, Winkle's only trouble from Chester came in the seventh when the Yellowjackets opened with a pair of hits. He promptly struck out the next two hitters before getting a ground out to end the game.

Conner took the mound loss for Chester, giving up seven runs in five innings of work. He struck out four and walked two. He was relieved in the sixth by Mark Franks who gave up a single and a double in one inning of work.

Spurger second baseman Michael Hatton topped all hitters in the game with three singles in three trips to the plate.

Marcus McCabe, the Pirates' right fielder, also had a good day at the plate with two hits and two runs scored.

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

Woodville felon sentenced in Federal court

BEAUMONT — United States District Judge Richard Schell sentenced a Woodville man to seven years in federal prison on Monday, May 19, without parole for being a convicted felon in possession of a firearm. Judge Schell also ordered 34 year old Ricky Lynn Addison to pay \$60 in restitution to Phillip's Pawn Shop in Jasper and be placed under supervised release for a period of three years after completing his prison term. Addison is not eligible for parole since parole in the federal system was abolished in 1987. On February 24, 1995, Addison pleaded guilty to the charge. In his plea, Addison admitted that on December 4, 1992, he illegally possessed a .38 caliber revolver and subsequently owned the firearm. Addison's prior criminal history includes three burglaries, two in Jefferson County and one in Shelby County, dating all the way back to 1983. This case was investigated by agents with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, and deputies from the Tyler County Sheriff's Department. Assistant United States Attorney Lovita Morris Daniels prosecuted this case.

Whitney's "Buddy" character has already become a favorite among our school groups, as he tells them first hand stories from the Village's time period.

The Village has so much to give, so much to present, so much to teach, and we know there are men and women throughout Tyler County who could give us the benefit of their own talents, while we lend you some of ours.

If you'd like to work with us in helping Heritage Village interpret Tyler County and East Texas history, join us on Thursday, June 1, at the Hamm House at Heritage Village Museum and at least listen to what we have to say.

It's covered dish, so don't forget. Medically speaking, Dr. Gayle Burton said he didn't realize there had been so many doctors who had practiced in Tyler County. Well, Doctor, there are more.

In the August 12, 1899 issue of the

Tyler County Times, published each Saturday by E.A. Perry in Colmesneil, we found ads for: Drs. D. Hamilton and A. J. Turner - "NO CURE - NO PAY" - Best that one if you can. Also Dr. J. I. Ellison, Physician and Surgeon, Dr. W. V. (Van) Stewart, Physician and Druggist and W. P. Chapman, M.D. - Yes, of course, Dr. William Cruse Fuqua, a Beaumont surgeon, called and, among other things, told us he used to come to Woodville to do surgery at Dr. Barclay's.

The main reason Dr. Fuqua called was to tell us he had a copy of the Cruse Family History he wanted to share with us. It was written in the early 70's by Ebel Cruse, daughter of Thomas Jefferson Cruse, the youngest son of Squire and Piety Cruse, whose journey to Tyler County has become legendary.

Dr. Fuqua is the great grandson of Squire and Piety. His grandfather was Judge William W. Cruse of Beaumont. The Cruse History was first published in "Records of East Texas," and an edited version of Squire and Piety's personal story can be found in Lou Ella Moseley's "Pioneer Days of Tyler County."

The main reason for bringing it up at this time is to reveal another list of Tyler County doctors who belonged to or married into the Cruse family.

Dr. John Burr (Jack) Cruse 1876-1943, son of E. A. and Ida Johnson Cruse, great-grandson of Squire and Piety. He was "one of the best doctors of Woodville and East Texas, known and loved far and near."

John W. Cruse 1858-1900, brother of E. A., son of John and Elizabeth Barclay Cruse. He married a Turner from Kountze and practiced there. Woodville, who was prepared to furnish board while treating chronic cases, the only one saved in the Mississippi River tragedy.

Judge Barclay Cruse 1869-1935, another John and Elizabeth son, lived in Woodville but later moved to Beaumont.

Dr. Anderson Barclay, son of Ellen Cruse, daughter of Squire and Piety. Dr. John Roberts, who married Elba Cruse, daughter of John and Elizabeth and a Dr. Anderson, who married Sara Cruse, granddaughter of John and Elizabeth.

Dr. Charles Stewart, "a prominent and beloved East Texas doctor," who practiced in Huntington. He married Fannie Mae Cruse, one of Squire and Piety's many granddaughters. And finally, Dr. Willie Pedigo, who married Ida Cruse, daughter of Anderson P. Cruse and granddaughter of Squire and Piety. Dr. Pedigo and his son, Dr. Paul Cruse Pedigo operated the only hospital in Strawn, Texas, for many years.

As for the Cruse Family History, we found we did have a copy at the Village. I didn't realize it until I saw it, but we're obliged to Dr. Fuqua for sending us an extra for outside research. We'll be back with more on his Tyler County connections in the very near future.

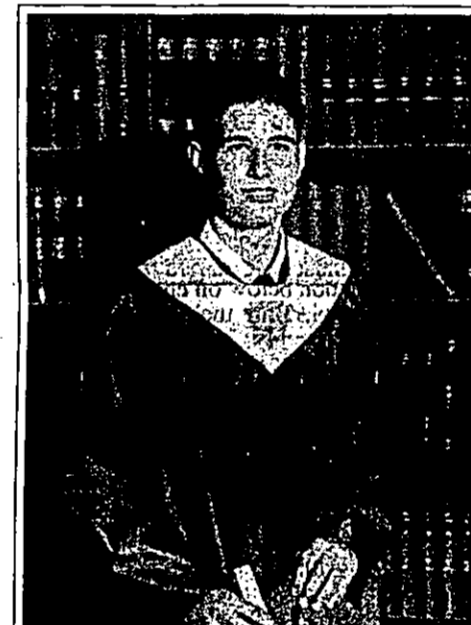

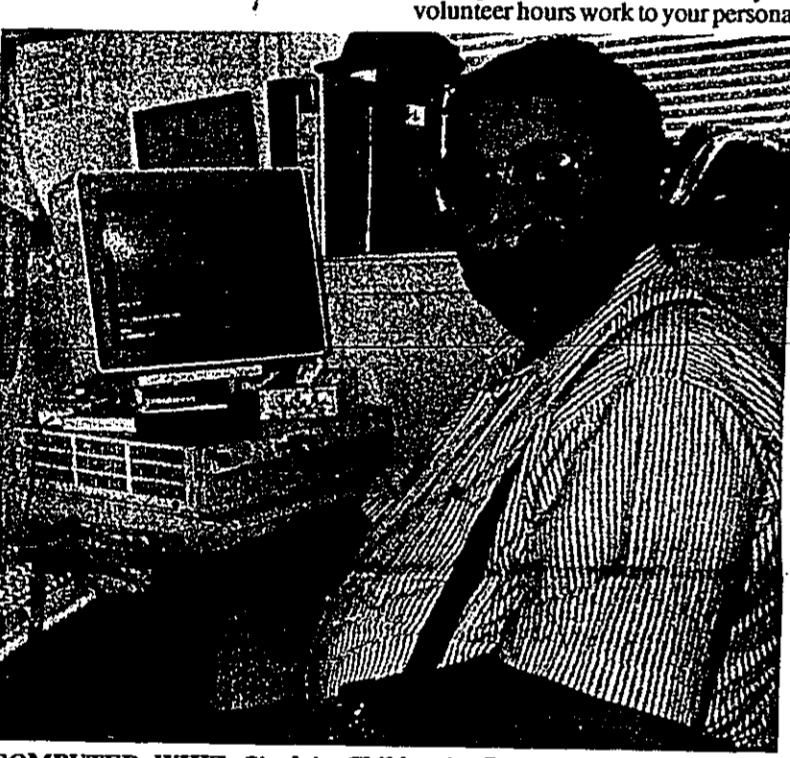

They're thinking about how they could use the money to pay bills or plan for the children's college education. At the time, Social Security isn't a ticket item on the family agenda. But the illness or injury - or even the death of a parent in a family - with young children can suddenly make Social Security a very important part of the family's survival. Those paycheck deductions for Social Security taxes could make it possible for the family to stay together. For example, some families can get as much as \$2,000 a month when the worker is disabled.

When people think of Social Security benefits, they usually think of older men and women who are retired or who are widows or widowers. 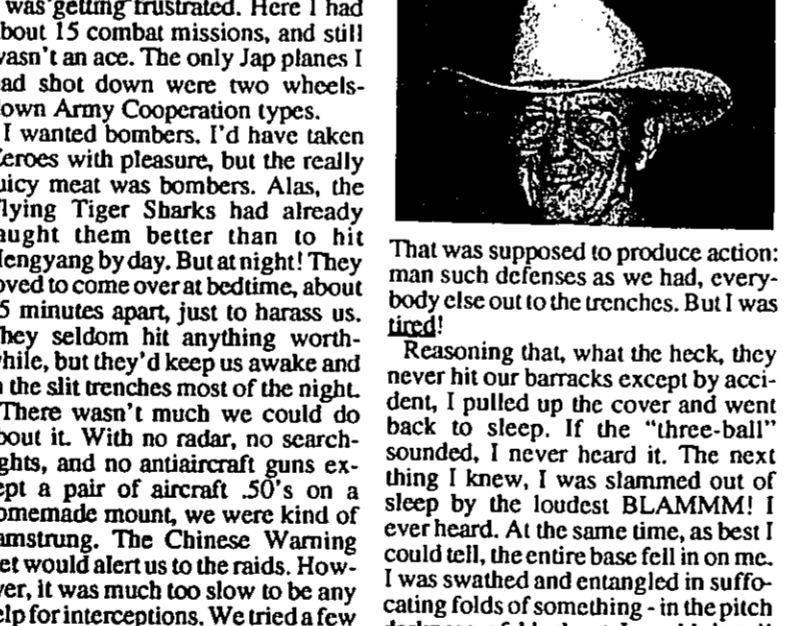

## PROfessions Ace in the hole

Early June, 1944: Hengyang, China. I was getting frustrated. Here I had about 15 combat missions, and still had an ace in the hole. The only Jap planes I had shot down were two wheels-down Army Cooperation types.

I wanted bombers. I'd have taken Zeroes with pleasure, but the really juicy prize was the B-29 Superfortresses. Flying Tiger Sharks had already taught them better than to hit Hengyang by day. But at night! They loved to come at bedtime, about 15 minutes apart, just to harass us. They seldom hit anything worthwhile, but they'd keep us awake and in the air trenches most of the night. There wasn't much we could do about it. With no radar, no searchlights, and no anti-aircraft guns except a pair of aircraft .50's on a homemade mount, we were kind of hamstrung. The Chinese Warning Net would alert us to the raids. However, it was much too slow to be any help for interceptions. We tried a few now and then, but the only damage was to our pride.

This particular night I was tired. I had flown two long missions that day, hot and sweaty hard work. Finally cleaned up and fed, I got ready to hit the sack.

Our beds were of Chinese manufacture. A rectangular wooden frame was woven with ropes to form a sort of bedspring. Wooden pegs held this frame inside the bedstead. Our bedding was a thin cotton mattress, a sheet, and a blanket. A mosquito net was absolutely routine: a British-style tent of open-weave material, suspended by a hoop from the ceiling and tucked securely all around under the mattress. It was voluminous and heavy.

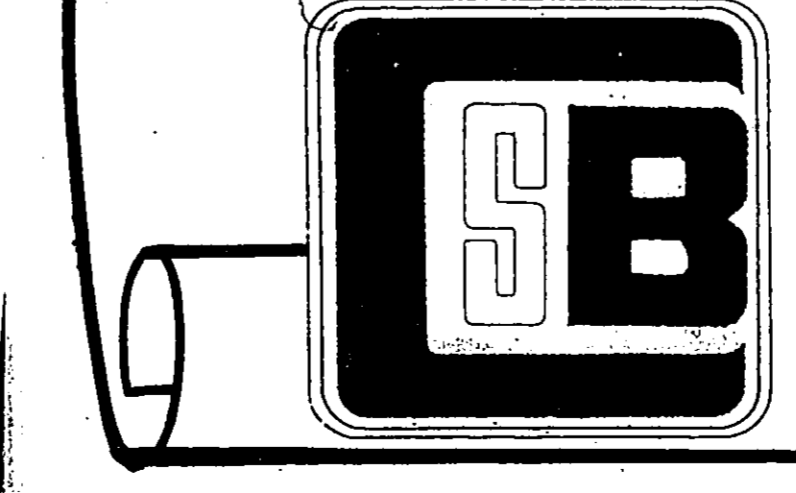
I had barely got to sleep when the "one-ball" jingbao alarm sounded. That was the word for "wake up!" The alarm was a tinny, tinny alarm, with societal expectations of self-sufficiency. Above all, telling students to study hard and stay in school so they can get a good job expresses a culturally valued reason for working at their current "job," learning.

## Jams, jellies just as good made without sugar

WOODVILLE — Jam and jelly don't have to be "forbidden fruit" to people on sugar-restricted diets. Just use artificial sweetener instead of sugar when making them.

If an artificial sweetener is used, only a form of saccharin and/or 12d-K can be used. Aspartame such as Nutra-Sweet or Equal products cannot be heated without destroying the sweetener.

Diet jams and jellies must be refrigerated or frozen unless they are made by the long boil method. Allow for additional thickening as the product cools. Jams made without sugar tend to be thinner than those made with the addition of sugar. Also, when preparing jams, be sure to stir constantly to prevent scorching the fruit. STRAWBERRY JAM WITH PECTIN: 1 3/4 oz. pkg powdered fruit pectin, 3-4 tablespoons liquid sweetener, 1 Tablespoon lemon juice, red food coloring as desired.

Crush the strawberries in a one and one-half quart sauce pan. Stir in artificial sweetener, food coloring, powdered pectin and lemon juice. Cook the mixture to a temperature of 220 degrees Fahrenheit.

Jams made by the long boil method require another procedure. Tasted jam recipes made by a long boil method may be followed without the addition of pectin.

Cook the fruit with liquid sweetener until jam is of desired consistency. Substitute two Tablespoons of liquid sweetener for each cup of sugar called for in the original recipe. Pour the boiling hot jam into clean, hot jars and seal each jar as soon as it is filled.

For making strawberry jam by the long boil method, take four cups of crushed strawberries, eight Tablespoons of liquid sweetener. Measure crushed strawberries into kettle. Add sweetener and stir well. Boil rapidly, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens. Fill and seal containers. Process in a boiling water bath for five minutes. One Tablespoon provides 10 calories.

# Mayhaws - an old favorite

Mayhaws, a member of the rose family and hawthorn genus, produce small apple-like fruit that ripen during late April and early May in East Texas. Mayhaws trees are small to medium-sized with beautiful white blossoms and attractive fruit and are desirable as ornamentals and for wildlife cover and forage.

The fruit of hawthorns were eaten as a food and made into wine throughout Europe since the Middle Ages. The historic Mayflower ship was named after this plant. Recent world interest has occurred because today many laboratory tests and a number of clinical trials support its use by demonstrating that hawthorn leaves, flowers and fruits contain chemical compounds that increase blood flow to the heart muscle, as well as positively affect other aspects of cardiovascular health.

For many East Texans, Mayhaws are highly prized for jelly. Here are two recipes to delight your taste buds.

**Mayhaw Syrup**

• For hot cakes, etc.: 1 cup mayhaw juice (as for jelly); 1/2 cup sugar; 1/2 cup white Karo (to prevent jelling). Rapid boil 18-20 minutes.

• For ice milk: Decrease sugar and Karo to 1/3 cup each.

**Mayhaw Jelly**

• To cook mayhaws: 1 food gallon of mayhaws and 1 food gallon of water. Cook till tender; strain through a cloth; squeeze out all juice possible. A food gallon cooked should make 10 cups of juice. If not, add enough water to make 10 cups.

• To make jelly: 5 cups of juice; 7 cups of sugar; 1 box of Sure-Jell. Cook as directed on Sure-Jell strip. This is not intended to endorse or discriminate against any product. It does not ensure reliability.

## Preventing mildew growth

When the humidity is high, we may find mildew growing in our homes. Mildew grows on a discoloration that looks like dirt and has an unpleasant musty odor. Unchecked, it can continue to grow and stain textiles, books, tile and other components of the house. Mildew is a mold that spores that exist almost everywhere.

The optimal temperature range for mildew growth is 77 to 86 degrees Fahrenheit, although growth can occur anywhere between 32 and 95 degrees. Mildew requires moisture because it thrives where the relative humidity is above 70 percent. Light is not required for mildew growth, so growth can continue indefinitely in dark places. Mildew growth is slow to start, however, after growth begins it is very rapid.

As always, prevention is the best medicine. Keeping the house clean by washing surfaces to get rid of grease, smoke and soap residue will help keep mildew from getting started. Ventilating closets and cabinets by leaving the doors open or installing louvers improves air circulation and inhibits mildew growth. Use exhaust fans in the kitchen when cooking, and in bathrooms during bathing or showering to get rid of excess moisture. Be sure that vents go outside and not into an attic or crawl space.

Air conditioning in the summer reduces the temperature and humidity to levels that inhibit mildew growth. In a closed area with no air conditioning, a dehumidifier can be used to reduce humidity levels. However, the dehumidifier must be emptied frequently.

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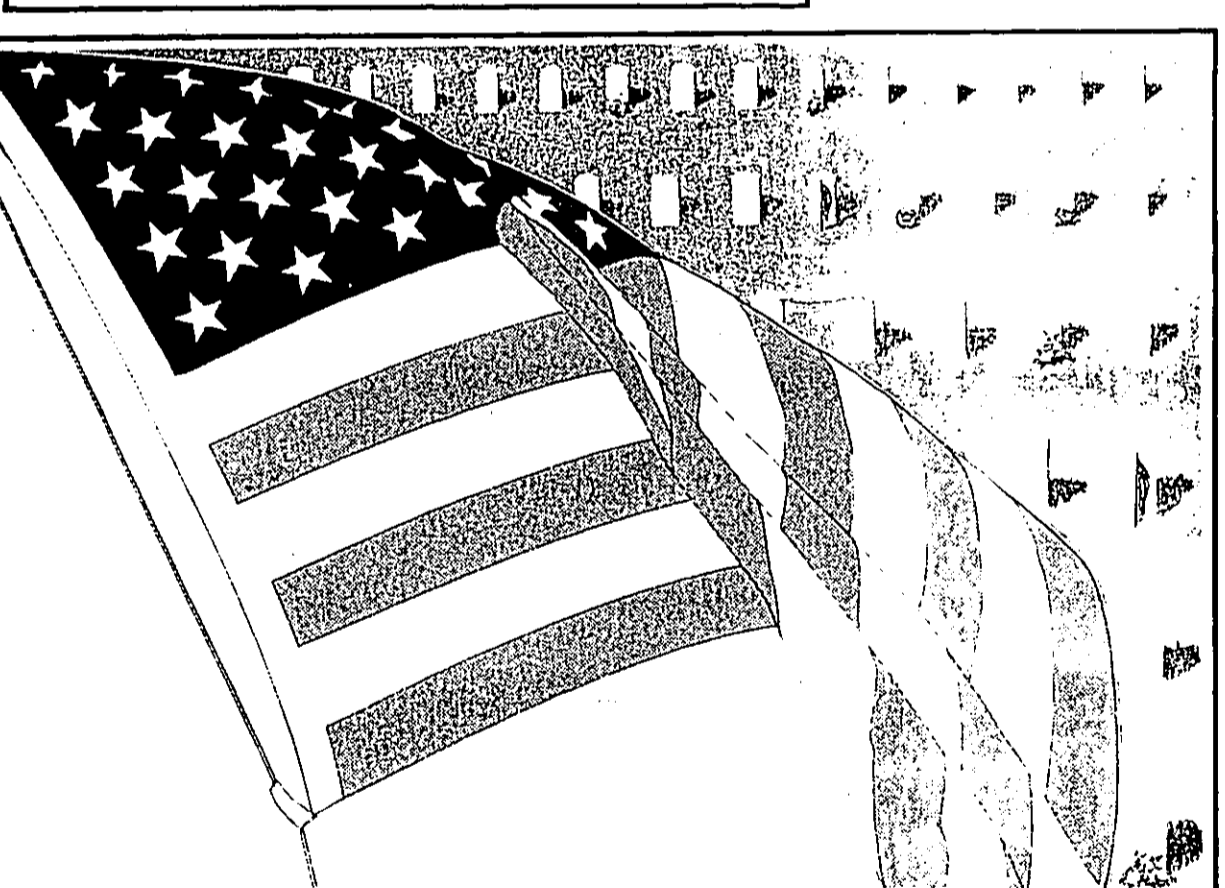

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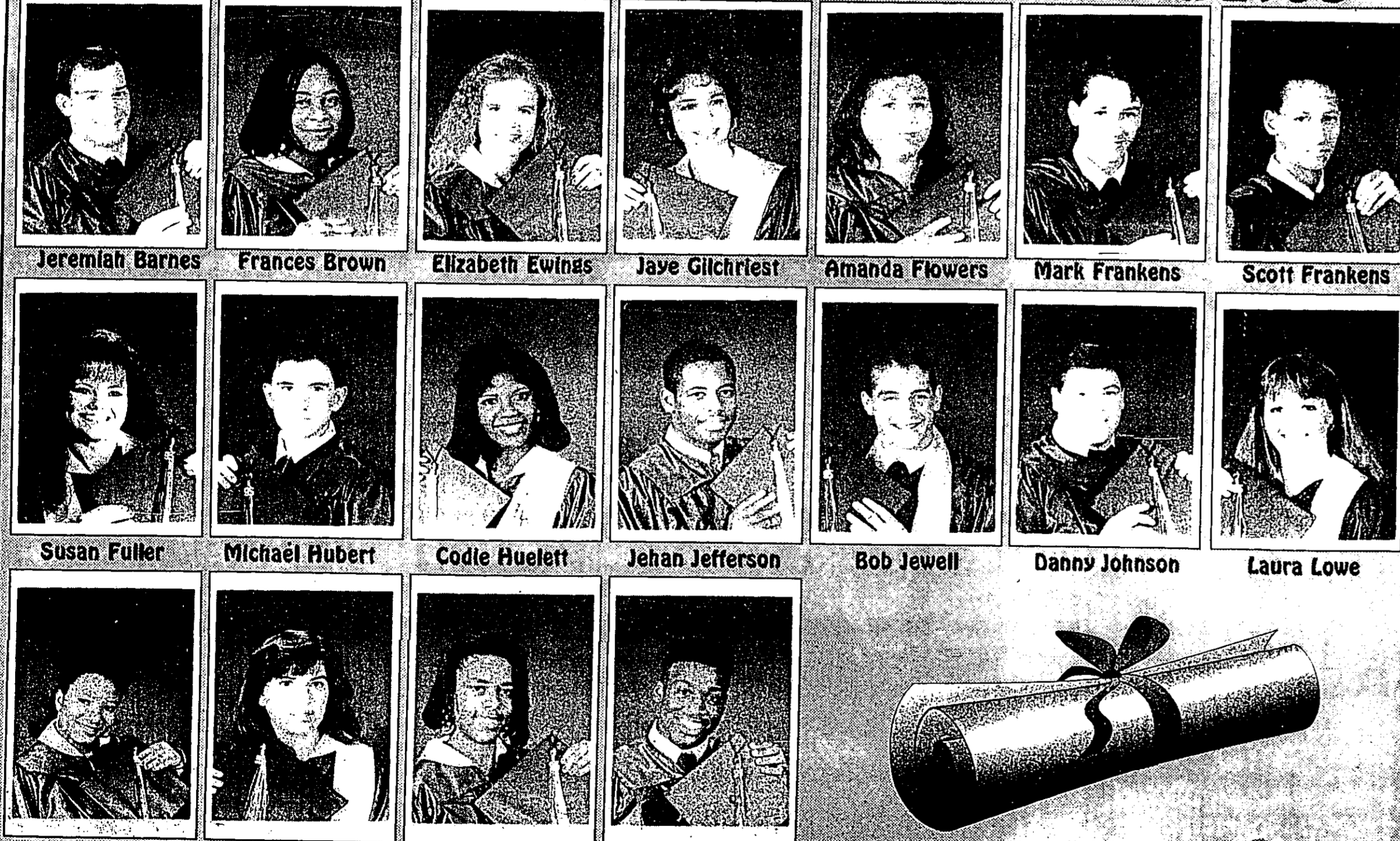
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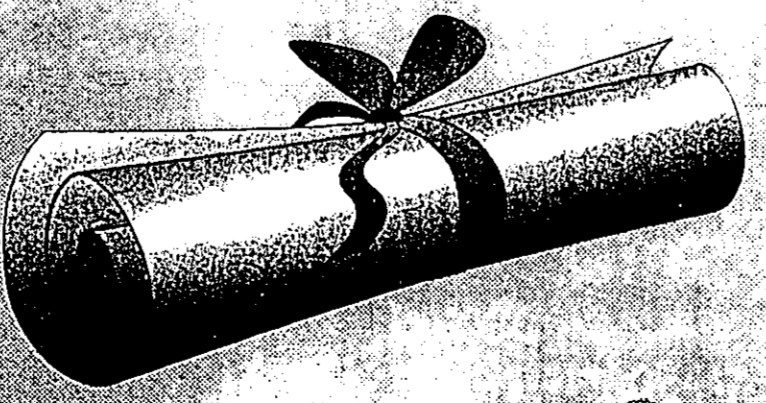

# Navy's James Owens re-ups for six years

**WOODVILLE** — In May of 1980, James Walter Owens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney B. Owens of Woodville, graduated from South Park High School in Beaumont. On June 8, 1980 Owens left for San Diego, California where he received training for services in the U.S. Navy.

In August of 1980 Owens graduated from boot camp and was transferred to Millington Tennessee for technical training on aircraft hydraulic and pneumatic systems. In November he graduated from this school. After spending a brief two days at home for "Thanksgiving" he left for Jacksonville Florida where he would be stationed for the next four years with Attack Squadron 83 at Cecil Field Naval Air Station.

In March of 1981 Owens and his squadron deployed aboard the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Forrestal (CV-59) for six and a half months to the Mediter-

ranean Sea where the Forrestal would soon be a key factor in a dispute with Libya in what would later be remembered as the guns of August.

In 1993 Owens was moved up to the intermediate maintenance level as an aircraft mechanic responsible for taking bad tires, break them down, clean/inspect and rebuild for service.

At this time Owens and the air wing he was attached to was sailing aboard the U.S.S. Saratoga (CV-60). In 1984 Owens completed his first four years of Naval service.

Petty Officer Owens re-enlisted in the Navy for six years. He was assigned to attack training squadron 174 for his first two years, responsible for performing maintenance and necessary inspections required to keep the aircraft flying.

In 1988 Owens received new orders

to AIMDSEA OPDET again working at the intermediate maintenance level and was responsible for the repair of all hydraulic and pneumatic parts for all aircraft in carrier air wing six. These aircraft included the F-14 Tomcat, F/A-18 Hornet, A-6 Intruder, EA6B Growler, S-3 Viking, E-2C Hawkeye, and SH-3H Sea King. Owens was one of 12 personnel working in this work center.

For the first six months Owens was going aboard the U.S.S. America (CV-66) in what is known in the Navy as the DET concept and was later moved back to his old friend the U.S.S. Forrestal (CV-59) where he made two deployments to the Mediterranean Sea in '89-'90 where Owens and Forrestal was part of history when President George Bush met with the Russian President at the floating Malta Summit peace talks. This deployment was

six and a half months long, and the 1991 deployment found Owens and Forrestal in Operation Desert Storm and provided comfort for the Kurdish refugees. This deployment was for a week short of eight months.

At the end of 1991 Owens re-enlisted for three more years and in February 1992 departed Cecil Field N.A.S. in Jacksonville, Florida to Naval Air Station Norfolk, Virginia where he would be assigned to the Air Operations Department as material and supply supervisor responsible for six budget opar logs with a dollar range of 100-150,000 dollars. Owens is also a drug and alcohol counselor responsible for working with personnel having problems in these areas. He is also a certified American Heart Association CPR instructor.

Since being assigned at Air Operations, Owens has earned his third good conduct award for over 12 years service, a pistol qualification ribbon, and was named Petty Officer of the Month for all Naval Air Station Norfolk for the month of November 1993.

Owens has also earned the Navy's enlisted aviation warfare wings and is a warfare qualified crew and board member.

In August 1994 Owens re-enlisted for six more years with the Navy, receiving orders to fighter squadron 41, the Black Aces, at Oceana Naval Air Station, Virginia Beach, Virginia. For the first four years he will work the famed F-14 Tomcat and in March 1995 his squadron will deploy for the Mediterranean Sea aboard the U.S.S. Roosevelt (CVN 71). The end of this six year tour will bring his career to 20 years.

# Woodville sailor recruits for Navy

**SAN DIEGO** — At no other time in our history has the Navy been able to boast about a higher quality of recruits, both men and women, than it can today. One reason for this is recruiters like Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Darrell W. Perkins, the 32-year-old son of Beverly Perkins of Woodville.

Perkins is assigned to Navy Recruiting District Houston. Although Perkins is a Navy radar and navigation specialist, he now focuses all of his efforts on attracting quality people in to the Navy. The Navy requires successful and experienced Sailors to serve as recruiters to help enlist the men and women for a year, is playing a pivotal role in this effort.

"I am a general duty recruiter re-

sponsible for attracting people into all enlisted ratings," said Perkins.

With its high-tech ships, submarines, aircraft and equipment, the Navy offers a variety of programs to prospective recruits.

"The Navy offers skills training, educational and travel opportunities and money for college. It also gives people management and leadership skills, discipline and respect for this fine country," said Perkins, a seven year Navy veteran.

The goal of Perkins, and other recruiters, is to attract and enlist the brightest and best young men and women. Although the Navy has reduced the number of Sailors in its payroll over the past couple of years, it has not stopped recruiting.

"Many people today have the erro-

neous view that the Navy has stopped hiring, and the defense cutbacks have lessened the military as a viable employment opportunity for high school and college graduates," said Cmdr. Patricia Driscoll, the commanding officer of Naval Recruiting District Houston. "This is just not true. We're still hiring. The reality is that the Navy currently has more than 57,000 new jobs available for men and women annually in more than 90 different career fields."

With so many job vacancies to fill, Perkins works some very long hours, but finds the job both enjoyable and

challenging.

"I find satisfaction by giving an outstanding career opportunity to those that qualify. Through the Navy, people will have a lot of doors opened for them," said Perkins. "The biggest challenge in recruiting is the fact that some parents think that military is still a last resort for 'problem' children and do not support their children's decision. They haven't taken the time to educate themselves on today's Navy."

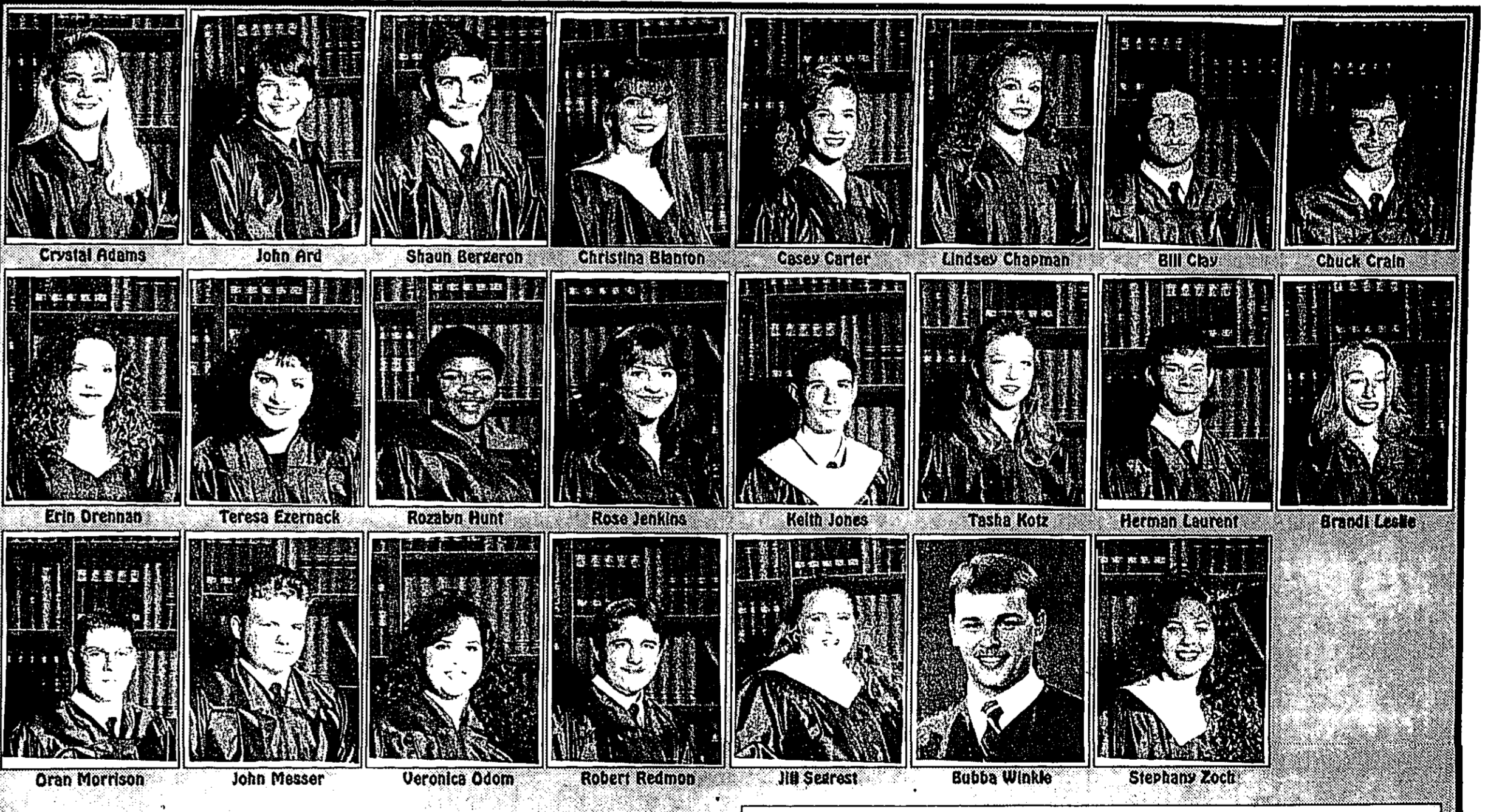

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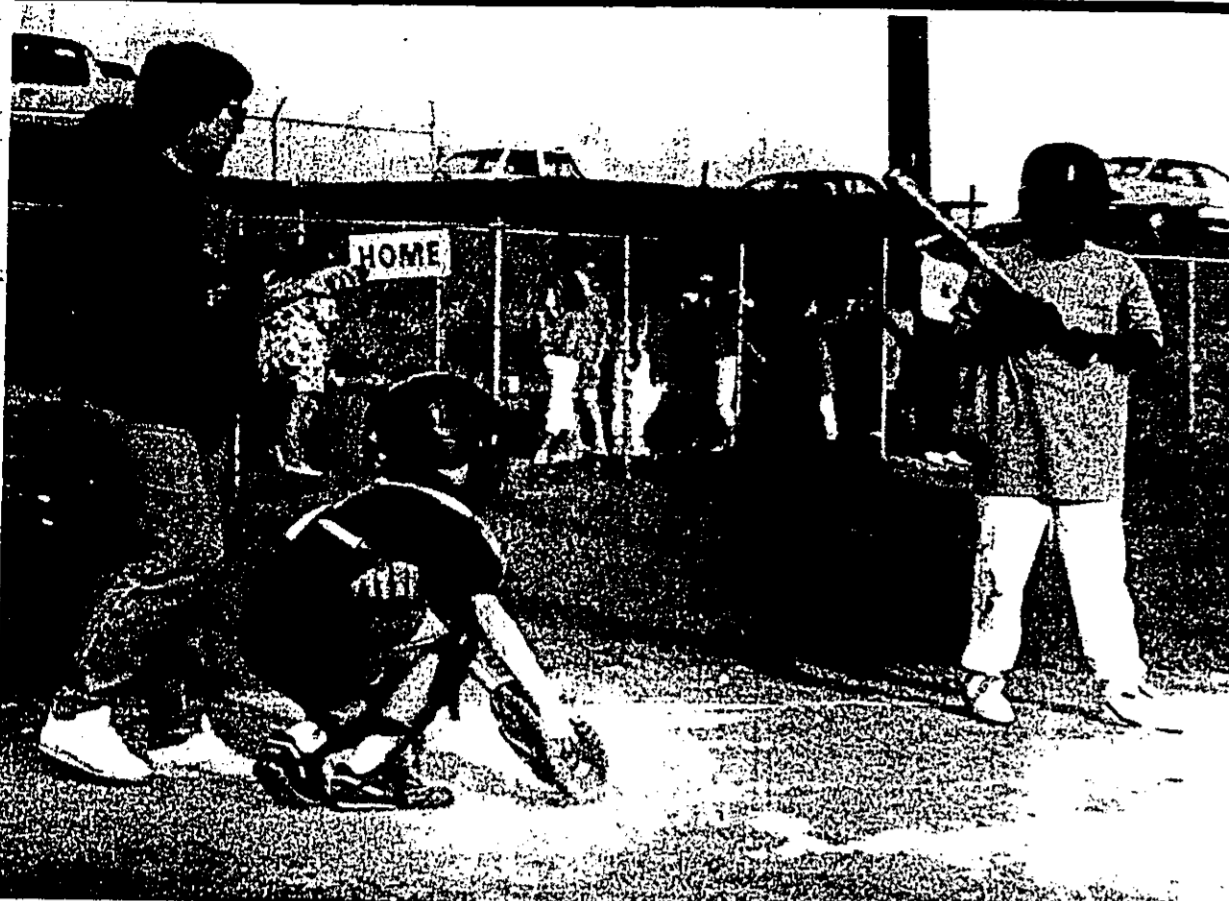

**Pirates topple Chester in bi-district play**

WOODVILLE — In a textbook game pitting two of the top county schools against each other, the Spurger Pirates edged the previously number one ranked Chester Yellowjackets, 4-1, Friday to capture a class A bi-district title.

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
