### Children may not be getting enough fiber

HOUSTON - Children may not be getting enough dietary fiber, says a utritionist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"The U.S. dict is highly refined, and overprocessing removes much of the natural fiber that children and adults need," said Janice Stuff, a research instructor at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Fiber or roughage is an essential part of a healthy diet. It aids in digestion, may reduce cholesterol, and protect against colon cancer. Fiber can also correct constipation, a common medical complaint in children.

Stuff says a 40 pound child needs 10 grams of fiber daily, compared to 15-20 grams for teens and 25-35 grams for adult

"A child can get 10 grams of fiber whole wheat bread, a medium apple o pear, a 1/2 cup serving of vegetables and a 1/2 cup serving of beans or lentils," she said.

Parents concerned that children are not getting enough fiber can make a ew simple additions to their child's menu. Stuff provides the following suggestions

 Add raisins or berries to wholerain cereals Add whole-grain flour to pancake

· Use whole-wheat bread for toast or andwiches

 Serve fresh fruit, such as pears or pples with the skin

 Offer nectarines and bananas Serve chili with beans • Make bean nachos using baked

ortilla chips Stir granola or berries into plain

 Serve vegetables such as cooked corn, green beans, broccoli or carrots Add vegetables to pizza toppings

and spaghetti sauces · Keep carrot sticks on hand for snacks


 Offer popcorn as a snack food Parents should increase amounts of dictary fiber slowly and encourage their child to drink plenty of water. "If the body is not used to it, fiber can cause gas and stomach cramps at first,"

she said. Stuff urges parents not to become too zealous about fiber.

"Remember, a child's requiremen s only one-third as much as an adult. and fiber should be balanced with other nutritional sources. Too much fiber can cause children to feel "full" before they get all the calories they need." she said.

Stuff says there is evidence that too much fiber can prevent absorption of needed minerals, such as calcium, iron

and zinc. "When children learn to balance their diet with high-fiber foods, they are beginning good habits that will offer

### **Rockets=Team= Success**

By Don Stevenso I sure hope the Houston Rockets win another NBA championship hope they win, not only because they are from Houston and they are the defending champions and all, but because the Rockets are the best example of any TEAM in the NBA. To be honest, I am not a big pro basketball fan. In fact, throughout

the season I don't even watch them. But I got hooked on the Rockets last year during the playoffs, and I have been with them ever since. Throughout this season Houston played somewhat better than average ball, but never played like they were defending world champions. So I waited until the playoffs to see what would happen. Sure enough

they have done it again, defying all odds in the process. How have they done it? Some folks will say they are lucky. Others will point to Hakeem Olajuwon or the trade for Clyde Drexler. But when their success is all boiled down, what is left is an underrated coach and a group of talented athletes that play as a TEAM. That's right . . . the Houston Rockets, a group of highly paid athletes have found the formula to winning is to play as a TEAM. And putting all of that mix together is a coach whose first name reminds us of another overachiever who played at Notre Dame and whose life was eventu-

ally made a movie. Texas Monthly had a feature story on Rudy Tomjanovich after the Rockets won the world championship last year. It gave a splendid insight of how the Houston coach thinks. His high school coach told him that he wasn't good enough to play for the team, but he ended up being a star player anyway. Same thing in college. Same thing in the pros. He overcame what other people thought, regardless of the odds. Some way, maybe by example, he has taken that "I can" attitude and developed into a "we can" attitude for the Houston Rockets.

In this day of the Dennis Rodmans, the Charles Barkleys, and yes, even the infamous Shaquille O'Neal, it is more than refreshing to see a group of players like the Rockets who put the TEAM before themselves

It is obvious that Rodman's whole concept to basketball is that the court is his stage and he is there to play it. In one sense he is good for the game in that he brings more attention to it. But in doing so he also destroys TEAM play and harmony.

Rodman reminds me of a circus performer. They are interesting t watch, but I wouldn't trust them as far as I could throw them. And what kind of example is he for kids?... Dyed hair that makes him look like Bozo the clown ... Tattoos all over his body that tell you he is either drunk a lot or he doesn't like the way God made him. Put all of that together and add in that he has questions about his manhood, and a role model for kids is out of the question.

And while Barkley and O'Neal are more team oriented, they still have enough showmanship to get the spotlight on them instead of it focusing on the team for which they play.

Barkley says that he is not a role model, then goes out and gets almost \$10 million worth of endorsements because, that indeed, is what he is. And while on one hand he plays hurt and sets a positive example one way, he castigates his teammates and second guesses his coach and sets a bad example on the other. Maybe I shouldn't have added O'Neal into the same category with

Rodman and Barkley, but if he doesn't watch it, in another two years or so he will be like them ... unless he shuts out what the media is trying to make him to be. But there are already hints that the big "Me" has taken hold. When the Rockets play the Magic during the playoffs, look at the tattoo on O'Neal's arm. It is a Superman seal. That is what he thinks he is. In fact he said it the other day. When Christopher Reeves, the actor who became famous with his Superman portrayal, went down with a broken neck, O'Neal said that he hoped that Superman would recover soon.

Then he added that he was Superman II Does anyone hear that kind of talk from the Rockets? I don't think so. What is coming from the Rockets is that they play "hungry and humble." That stage setter is Olajuwon, who turned down a big endorsement contract with Nike to sign with Spaulding. Why? Bccause Spaulding would sell athletic shoes in the \$30-\$40 range for cids instead of the \$100 plus range that Nike does. Now THAT sounds like a role model.

And have you listened to the post game interview during the playoffs? I don't think anyone has heard any big "I's. All the Rocket players give credit to the others. There is confidence that they can win regardless of the odds or circumstances.

I thought the half time interview of the Rockets' Robert Horry during the Magic-Pacer game was interesting, not only by what he said, but how he was dressed. He could have worn a shirt or a ball cap with a message on it, but instead he wore a white shirt and tie. Classy. When asked about how HE was able to do all the things he has done, he put it in perspective by saying that one game he gets the job done and another game it is someone else. Again, the message that was given was that the Rockets play TEAM basketball.

Even though the Rockets won the NBA championship last year not many people across the nation have jumped on the band wagon. Why? Besides many people thinking there is nothing in Houston but mosquitoes and NASA, there is also a problem with their star players. Both Olajuwon and Drexler played college ball at the University of Houston. Olajuwon is Nigerian and speaks with an accent. Before coming to Houston, Drexler played in Portland. Add in the fact that the Rockets do not promote themselves market wise like the Cowboys and you can see why they are ignored by a lot of people.

Not that I've got anything against the Magic, but here is hoping that the good guys win another one. They did it once when no one was watching. Those who watch them said it was a fluke. But if they do it this time, people should finally take notice. And what they will notice, hopefully, is that the Rockets did it because each player put the TEAM before themselves. In this day of pampered prima donnas, that is the message that needs to be sent our kids.



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



Children may not be getting

enough fiber HOUSTON - Children may not be

getting enough dietary fiber, says a nutritionist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"The U.S. diet is highly refined, and overprocessing removes much of the natural fiber that children and adults need," said Janice Stuff, a research instructor at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston

Fiber or roughage is an essential part of a healthy diet. It aids in digestion, may reduce cholesterol, and protect against colon cancer. Fiber can also correct constipation, a common medi-

cal complaint in children Stuff says a 40 pound child needs 10 grams of fiber daily, compared to 15-20 grams for teens and 25-35 grams

ethibs ar "A child can get 10 grams of fiber each day by eating a sandwich usin whole wheat bread, a medium apple or pear, a 1/2 cup serving of vegetables and a 1/2 cup serving of beans or

lentils," she said. Parents concerned that children are not getting enough fiber can make a few simple additions to their child's menu. Stuff provides the following

suggestions: Add raisins or berries to wholegrain cereals

 Add whole-grain flour to pancake • Use whole-wheat bread for toast or sandwiches

• Serve fresh fruit, such as pears or apples with the skin

 Offer nectarines and bananas Serve chili with beans — \*\* • Make bean nachos using baked

tortilla chips Stir granola or berries into plain ogunt • Serve vegetables such as cooked

corn, green beans, broccoli or carrots Add vegetables to pizza toppings and spaghetti sauces Keep carrot sticks on hand for

snacks Offer popcorn as a snack food Parents should increase amounts of dictary fiber slowly and encourage

their child to drink plenty of water. "If the body is not used to it, fiber can cause gas and stomach cramps at first," she said

Stuff urges parents not to become too realous about fiber. "Remember, a child's requirement

is only one-third as much as an adult, and fiber should be balanced with other nutritional sources. Too much fiber can cause children to feel "full" before they get all the calories they need." she said.

Stuff says there is evidence that too much fiber can prevent absorption of needed minerals, such as calcium, iron

and zinc. "When children learn to balance their dict with high-fiber foods, they are beginning good habits that will offer

healthy benefits over a lifetime," she said.

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
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

### **Rockets=Team= Success** By Don Stevenso

I sure hope the Houston Rockets win another NBA championship. I hope they win, not only because they are from Houston and they are the defending champions and all, but because the Rockets are the best example of any TEAM in the NBA.

To be honest, I am not a big pro basketball fan. In fact, throughout the season I don't even watch them. But I got hooked on the Rockets last year during the playoffs, and I have been with them ever since. Throughout this season Houston played somewhat better than average ball, but never played like they were defending world champions. So I waited until the playoffs to see what would happen. Sure enough they have done it again, defying all odds in the process.

How have they done it? Some folks will say they are lucky. Others will point to Hakeem Olajuwon or the trade for Clyde Drexler. But when their success is all boiled down, what is left is an underrated coach and a group of talented athletes that play as a TEAM. That's right . . . the Houston Rockets, a group of highly paid athletes have found the formula to winning is to play as a TEAM. And putting all of that mix together is a coach whose first name reminds us of another overachiever who played at Notre Dame and whose life was eventu ally made a movie

Texas Monthly had a feature story on Rudy Tomjanovich after the Rockets won the world championship last year. It gave a splendid insight of how the Houston coach thinks. His high school coach told him that he wasn't good enough to play for the team, but he ended up being a star player anyway. Same thing in college. Same thing in the pros. He overcame what other people thought, regardless of the odds. Some way, maybe by example, he has taken that "I can" attitude and developed into a "we can" attitude for the Houston Rockets.

In this day of the Dennis Rodmans, the Charles Barkleys, and yes, even the infamous Shaquille O'Neal, it is more than refreshing to see group of players like the Rockets who put the TEAM before hemselves.

It is obvious that Rodman's whole concept to basketball is that the court is his stage and he is there to play it. In one sense he is good for he game in that he brings more attention to it. But in doing so he also destroys TEAM play and harmony.

Rodman reminds me of a circus performer. They are interesting to watch, but I wouldn't trust them as far as I could throw them. And what kind of example is he for kids?... Dyed hair that makes him look like Bozo the clown ... Tattoos all over his body that tell you he is either drunk a lot or he doesn't like the way God made him. Put all of that together and add in that he has questions about his manhood, and a role model for kids is out of the question.

And while Barkley and O'Neal are more team oriented, they stil have enough showmanship to get the spotlight on them instead of it focusing on the team for which they play.

Barkley says that he is not a role model, then goes out and gets almost 10 million worth of endorsements because, that indeed, is what he is. And while on one hand he plays hurt and sets a positive example one way, he castigates his teammates and second guesses his coach and sets a had example on the other.

Maybe I shouldn't have added O'Neal into the same category with Rodman and Barkley, but if he doesn't watch it, in another two years or so he will be like them ... unless he shuts out what the media is trying to make him to be. But there are already hints that the big "Me has taken hold. When the Rockets play the Magic during the playoffs look at the tattoo on O'Neal's arm. It is a Superman seal. That is what he thinks he is. In fact he said it the other day. When Christopher Reeves, the actor who became famous with his Superman portrayal, went down with a broken neck, O'Neal said that he hoped that Superman would recover soon.

Then he added that he was Superman II. Does anyone hear that kind of talk from the Rockets? I don't think so. What is coming from the Rockets is that they play "hungry and humble." That stage setter is Olajuwon, who turned down a big endorsement contract with Nike to sign with Spaulding. Why? Bccause Spaulding would sell athletic shoes in the \$30-\$40 range for instead of the \$100 plus range that Nike does. Now THAT sound like a role model.

And have you listened to the post game interview during the playoffs? I don't think anyone has heard any big "I"s. All the Rocke players give credit to the others. There is confidence that they can win regardless of the odds or circumstances.

I thought the halftime interview of the Rockets' Robert Horry during the Magic-Pacer game was interesting, not only by what he said, but how he was dressed. He could have worn a shirt or a ball cap with a message on it, but instead he wore a white shirt and tie. Classy. When asked about how HE was able to do all the things he has done, he put it in perspective by saying that one game he gets the job done and another game it is someone else. Again, the message that was given was that the Rockets play TEAM basketball.

Even though the Rockets won the NBA championship last year no many people across the nation have jumped on the band wagon. Why? Besides many people thinking there is nothing in Houston but mosquitoes and NASA, there is also a problem with their star players. Both Olajuwon and Drexler played college ball at the University of Houston. Olajuwon is Nigerian and speaks with an accent. Before coming to Houston, Drexler played in Portland. Add in the fact that the Rockets do not promote themselves market wise like the Cowboys

and you can see why they are ignored by a lot of people. Not that I've got anything against the Magic, but here is hoping that the good guys win another one. They did it once when no one was watching. Those who watch them said it was a fluke. But if they do i this time, people should finally take notice. And what they will notice, hopefully, is that the Rockets did it because each player put the TEAM before themselves. In this day of pampered prima donnas, that is the message that needs to be sent our kids.
