

# Bladder cancer options given

Houston (July 27, 1995)—Many women afflicted with bladder cancer now have a life-enhancing option once thought unavailable to them. "In the past, when women developed invasive bladder cancer and the treatment decision was to remove the bladder," said Dr. Seth P. Lerner, a uro-

logist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, "the standard procedure was to remove the urethra, too." That was because the urethra frequently was thought to be cancerous also. Recent studies of bladder-cancer specimens, however, indicate that the urethra, the canal carrying urine

from the bladder to the outside of the body, is cancerous in as few as one-fourth of the cases, Lerner said. This knowledge has opened up new possibilities. "If the urethra can be spared, the women are candidates for bladder reconstruction, a surgical procedure that can make a big difference in their every-day lives."

If the urethra can remain in place, surgeons can construct a bladder from intestinal tissue, connecting the new bladder to the urethra. Without an intact urethra, reconstruction of the bladder is not an option, and an afflicted woman must rely on other forms of urine removal.

The effect on the woman's every-day life is dramatic, Lerner said. "Rather than needing a stoma and an external appliance to collect urine or to catheterize an internal pouch, the woman can urinate in a normal manner."

Lerner said, "a major step forward in quality of life for female bladder-cancer patients."

ant is conducted directly with the representative. Representatives should not be confused with representative payees - who are approved by SSA to handle benefits for beneficiaries who, because of physical or mental limitations, are unable to manage their own affairs. Nor should representatives be confused with relatives or friends who merely assist claimants in conducting their Social Security business. Representatives who charge a fee for their services must have the fee approved by SSA. A form for this purpose is also available at any Social Security office. The law restricts the amount of the fee.

## Fair earns record \$65,000

The 1995 Annual Tyler County Fair Livestock Auction began with a record \$6,100 for the grand champion steer and record breakers for all but one grand champion animal but many other auction prices failed to match last year's record prices but the sale concluded with a respectable sum of \$42,599.93 representing the second highest Fair Auction total for the counties 4-H and FFA students some \$7655.95 less than the 1994 all-time record auction total of \$50,284.88.

Another \$22,360 was raised from the sale of animals which did not make the cut for the auction but were sold "under the barn", raising the overall total for animals sold at this year's Fair to a record total of \$64,959.93 which is an increase of \$2,045.05 over last year.

The grand champion steer this year was shown by Kachel Rebbe, of the Spurger 4-H Chapter, and was sold to Mott Brothers, RPM and Martin Dies Bevelport Farms at a record \$16,100 up from the previous record of \$5,500. The Rebbe family has shown the grand champion steer every year since 1990, except for 1994 at the Tyler County Fair. Kachel Rebbe, of the Spurger 4-H Chapter, and her sister Nicole Rebbe had shown the grand champion steer in 1993 and 1991. Nicole had shown the grand champion steer. Last year in 1994 Kachel had exhibited the grand champion lamb.

Showing the grand champion barrow this year was Chelanie Schultz of the Colmesneil FFA Chapter. It sold for \$2,900 to E. & L. Lumber Company, second highest sum after last year's record \$4,300.

Grand champion lamb for 1995 was exhibited by Jennifer Currie of Warren FFA and was sold to Brookdale Brothers for a record \$2,400 topping last year's record of \$1,900.

Leigh Ann Neal of Warren FFA exhibited the grand champion poultry and was paid a record \$2,100 for the bird by Temple Inland Corporation topping last year's record price of \$920. Exhibiting the grand champion rabbit this year was Kim Greenwood of Warren FFA who was paid a record breaking \$1,300 for the meat pen by Double R Rock - Robert Birdwell. Last year's record price was \$570.

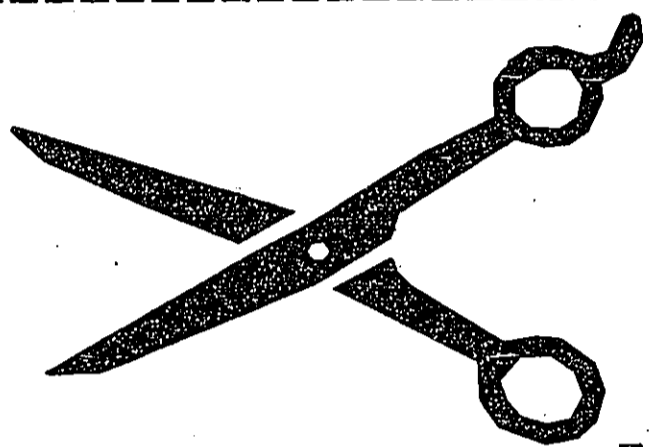

## Gib Lewis Unit Prison in-line with 20 for major expansion

Austin - Texas Department of Criminal Justice officials said Monday that the next round of expansion of the prison system will focus on 6,021 high security prison cells to be built at eight existing prison sites in 1996-97.

Snyder, Woodville, and Teague/Fairfield.  
Construction is expected to cost \$200 million. The first of the units is expected to open in September '97 and the remainder to be phased in over the following 12 months.  
The new units will have 669 cells per building and require about 200 staff.  
In locating new units, TDCJ requires the receiving city or county to provide infrastructure without cost to the state, including access to electric, water and sewer utility services and roadways to the prison sites.  
Stiff recommendations for the co-located units will focus on the bank at the Criminal Justice Board meeting Oct. 16 (463-8250)

Otis Allison, a Texas, podner, was born there and, with the exception of a couple of hundred thousand miles by air, spent most of his life living in the southeastern part of the Lone Star state. During his school years, he was the son of a builder and foreman of saw mills, he moved frequently and lived in many different communities, but was graduated from Woodville, Texas, High School. After he completed his schooling, Otis went to work at one of the mills as a steam engine operator to make enough money to further his education. Then he attended Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College at Nacogdoches, Texas, and it was here that he had his first taste of flying. In 1940-41 he entered and completed his first CPT (Civilian Pilot Training) program and later, took secondary CPT while attending Texas A & M College for a period of six months.

He had a private license when he entered the Air Corps Cadets while at A & M in 1941. Otis had soloed his first airplane when only 15 years old. After being inducted into Cadets, he was sent to the West Coast to be graduated from Stockton AFB, Calif. and receive his wings. Otis finished advanced training in May, 1942, and was sent to Albuquerque, N. Mexico to join in the formation of a B-17 group the 301st Bomber Group.

From New Mexico, he flew to England and his was the second group to go to England from the U.S. In July, 1942 he made his first mission over France and Belgium. The months that followed were just more days and nights of briefing and bombing. Then Otis found himself in North Africa in November of the same year, shortly after the invasion. It was here that he completed his missions—50 of them—and was returned to the U. S. and Alexandria, La., to become a B-17 crew-training instructor. He kept this assignment until December '44 and then went to the 5th Ferry Group at Dallas, Texas. While with the ferry group he attended DC- and pursuit school at Homestead, Fla., and Greenwood, Miss., respectively. When he was transferred to Kickenham Field, Honolulu, in December, 1946 he carried with him a B-17, which he piloted while he was qualified for four-engine and pursuit ferrying duties.

And Gooney Birds  
 Then Otis started a two-year cruise of the beautiful Pacific. He was operations officer on Kwajalein, Eniwetok, and Johnson Islands. Once he was C-47 pilot on and Atomic Weapons Test. After these two years of island hopping, land-crab dogging, and gooney-bird watching he finally turned again to the U. S. and a release from the Air Force as a Major in the reserves.

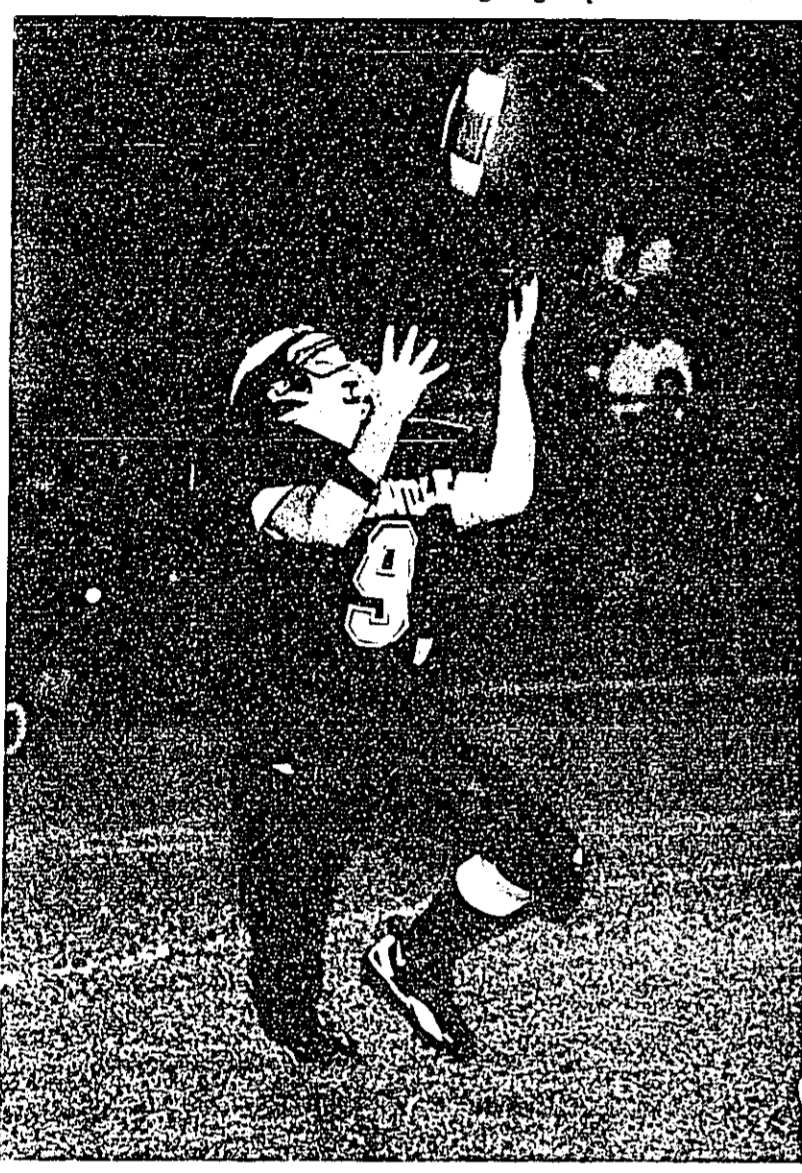

**Woodville falls to state ranked Newton**

 Woodville - The Woodville Eagles are fast finding out that it is near impossible to beat a good team, let alone a state ranked power, when they turn the ball over close to a half dozen times in the game.

Friday night the Woodville Eagles fell to the Newton Eagles, 33-12, but when it was all said and done, they did more damage to themselves than the opponents did to them.

Newton cashed in on six Woodville turnovers, three of which led to touchdowns. To improve their record to 4-1 for the season and take a major foothold toward the district title.

The loss by Woodville pushed them to 2-2 for the season. A two point conversion by Raymond Thomas gave Newton a 21-6 lead with just under eight minutes to go in the half.

Shaking off two turnovers, Woodville retaliated with its second and last score of the night on its next possession. Juan Mitchell, who finished the night with 108 yards on 17 carries, did more damage to the Eagles than the Newton's 50 yard drive with a fifty five yard run with under four minutes remaining in the half. He also had a 29 yard run during the night play drive, a run in which he broke two tackles on his way to the Newton 10 yard line.

Another Woodville miscue on a fumbled snap kept the Eagles from a two point conversion.

After Newton was forced to punt on its next possession, both teams went into the locker room for a halftime break with Newton holding 21-12 lead. But even behind on the scoreboard, Woodville coaches and players felt positive about their chances in the second half.

"I felt like we had the momentum," said Quick. "It should have been 21-21. I thought we stayed with them in the first half. We were ahead in all the stats."

But while two turnovers gave Newton a nine point advantage in the first half, two more in the second spelled defeat for the Eagles.

Newton took the second half kickoff and methodically moved down the field on 12 plays that netted less than 50 yards. After controlling the clock for almost seven minutes they finally gave the ball to Woodville on downs at the Newton 7 line. Woodville's 25 But back to back fumbles by Woodville, the second recovered by Newton, gave the defending district champions new life. Five plays later Desmond Gason churned his way across the goal line to give Newton a 27-12 edge.

Woodville's quick strike offense nailed Newton with a 39 yard pass from Demarius White to Byron Rigby moments later, but another Woodville fumble stopped the threat.

Newton closed out its scoring with a

six yard run by Thomas with less than two minutes to go in the game after Woodville failed to make a desperation fourth down play at their own 37. Ironically, Woodville never punted in the game and came within 30 yards of matching Newton in total offense.

Woodville had 205 yards on the ground and 50 more through the air, while Newton had 254 yards rushing and 31 passing. Woodville had a total of six turnovers.

**Derek beats the odds**

 Covering the Woodville-Newton game Friday night, I ran across Derek Hennigan at Eagle Stadium. It was good to see him, especially in light of the fact that he is the starting center for the McNeese State Cowboys in Lake Charles and they are ranked the top team in 1-AA football.

In case you missed Derek and are a new comer to Tyler County, he is one of the few Woodville players that have gone on to play college ball. He is also the son of Tyler County Sheriff Gary Hennigan, and his mom, Debbie, makes sure everybody's mail gets in the right bin at the Woodville post office. He also has an older brother that coaches baseball at Spurger High School.

Since there were a couple of ladies in serious conversation with Derek at the ball game and because I had work to do too, I told him that I would talk with him later in the weekend. So Sunday morning I made sure he was up in time for church by calling him about 8:30. He sounded like he was already awake, but his mom didn't. She was the one who answered the phone.

There were several things I wanted to find out from Derek: one of which was his advice for high school athletes trying to get college scholarships. He said that student activities need to have a plan. "Start working on it now," he emphasized. "Don't wait."

Derek was fortunate to be able to get a scholarship to play college football. First of all he has size (he is now 6-3-270) and he has talent. But even that wasn't enough. He also had to have someone to make sure that people knew about him and saw his potential. That is where his father came in.

Being not only an efficient law officer, Gary Hennigan, is also a promoter. In some circles he would be called a mover and a shaker. If he believes in something, whatever the challenge, he will get it done. That is why Tyler County has one of the best baseball complexes in Southeast Texas. So helping his son get a scholarship was just a natural thing for Derek's dad.

While Woodville's coaching staff was going through a change, Gary got a film of Derek and got on the phone. He talked with Spike Dikes at Texas Tech, people at S.M.U. and University of Houston. By the time he was finished, Derek had offers from all the aforementioned schools, plus Sam Houston State, McNeese, and several others.

"It's very important to have contacts," added Derek. "And you've got to have someone who knows what they're talking about."

The reason that Derek chose McNeese over the rest of the schools was because the Cowboys offered him the best scholarship. "And keep in mind that McNeese or any of the rest of the schools didn't offer him a scholarship because of his father. They offered him a scholarship because he is talented, and they found out about that talent because of his father."

In high school Derek played tackle, but at McNeese he plays center. After being held short his freshman year he was the deep snapper on extra points and field goals last year. This year he is starting center.

"When I asked him why he didn't snap for punts, he sheepishly replied, 'I'm too slow. They want someone who can get down field real fast to cover kicks.'"

The reason he was switched from a high school tackle to a college center had to do with the size. Most college tackles are in the 6-4-5-290-300 range he says.

And while Derek may be a little slow for snapping on punts, he is definitely not slow in the classroom where he is studying physical therapy. He carries close to a three point average while taking courses like calculus, chemistry, and physics. When he graduates he must be accepted to medical school and study two more years to get his certification.

Hitting the books and the practice dummy doesn't leave much time for other activities. The Woodville grad says that the hardest thing is not enough time to study, and as far as social time, "There's sorta whole lot," he admits.

Derek starts his day at 7:30 in the morning and finally gets back from practice and dinner at 7:00 at night. "I'm really study after that," he says.

Not that he would have time for it, but one thing that I was unaware of was that Derek, nor any other full scholarship player in college, can have a part time job. Their only source of income is their scholarship. Spending money can come in handy, especially on road trips where the Cowboys have traveled to Montana and Virginia. Last year McNeese traveled to Montana and lost in the second round of the playoffs by one point on a last second field goal. But this year they won nine games. This year they played James Madison at Harrisonburg, Virginia. He said that both colleges are located in mountain areas of their respective states, and both trips were the best that he has had at McNeese.

McNeese defeated James Madison, then ranked in the top ten. They also have beaten Central Florida, another ranked team that gave Florida State all that they wanted earlier this year. Another victory, the defending 1-AA national champions last year, was Youngstown of the Cowboys this season.

Right now McNeese is 5-0 and will play Portland State and Sam Houston State at home the next two weekends. But don't plan on going unless you already have tickets. McNeese's stadium seats 15,000, but the last two games have seen almost 22,000 in attendance. "Your best bet to see Derek is to travel to Nacogdoches to watch the Cowboys take on Stephen F. Austin. By the way, the Lumberjacks are also nationally ranked, so you might be better off catching McNeese at Sam Marcos when they play Southwest Texas on November 4."

If the Cowboys get into the playoffs they will be coached by record and opponents played. From that point it will be a matter of McNeese and the other schools involved in the playoffs bidding for the players to be played at the stadiums.

Derek adds that about 90 percent of the 75 scholarship games at McNeese are from Texas, and that the difference between high school and college ball can't even be compared. "The players are bigger, stronger, faster, and the level of competition is tremendous," he says.

And what about the pros? "If it happens to happen," he says. "One thing about it, if there is somebody that could break the odds, it would be Derek. He has already done it once. It wouldn't surprise me at all if he does it again."

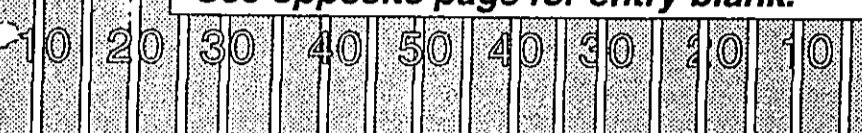

# Bladder cancer options given

Houston (July 27, 1995)—Many women afflicted with bladder cancer now have a life-enhancing option once thought unavailable to them. "In the past, when women developed invasive bladder cancer and the treatment decision was to remove the bladder," said Dr. Seth P. Lerner, a urologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, "the standard procedure was to remove the urethra, too."

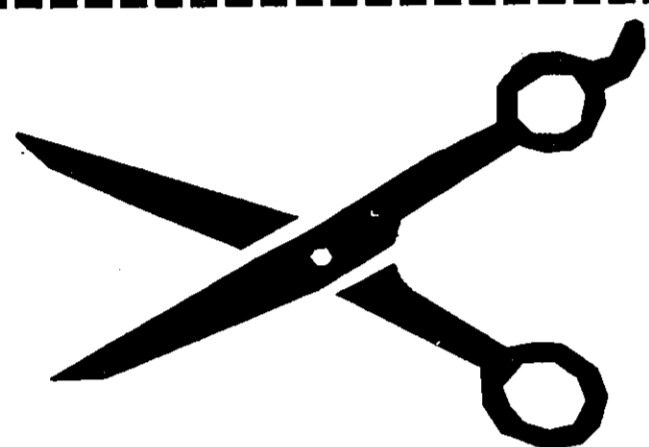
That was because the urethra frequently was thought to be cancerous also. Recent studies of bladder cancer specimens, however, indicate that the urethra, the canal carrying urine from the bladder to the outside of the body, is cancerous in as few as one-fourth of the cases, Lerner said. This knowledge has opened up new possibilities. "If the urethra can be spared, the women are candidates for bladder reconstruction, a surgical procedure that can make a big difference in their every-day lives."

# Representative Payees For Social Security Beneficiaries

Representative payees (RP's) are those appointed by SSA to handle the funds of beneficiaries who, because of physical or mental limitations, are unable to conduct their own affairs. Of the 38 million Social Security beneficiaries, about 5.5 million have RP's. SSA sees the role of representative payee as one of great responsibility.

In the selection process, candidates are screened not only for their ability to manage the funds of others but also for their genuine interest in the beneficiaries' welfare. Close relatives often meet these requirements but many beneficiaries do have non-relatives as payees. To carry out their responsibilities, RP's must always be aware of the beneficiaries' current and future needs. Thus, a person who lives with, or near, the beneficiary and has daily contact with them, meets this important condition, since the RP's first responsibility is to make certain that the beneficiaries' day-to-day needs for food, clothing, shelter and personal expenses are met. Only after day-to-day needs are met, may benefits be used for any special needs such as school expenses, medical expenses, insurance premiums, or payment on property in which the person has an interest.

Representatives should not be confused with representative payees - who are approved by SSA to handle benefits for beneficiaries who, because of physical or mental limitations, are unable to manage their own affairs. Nor should representatives be confused with relatives or friends who merely assist a claimant in conducting their Social Security business. Representatives who charge a fee for their services must have the fee approved by SSA. A form for this purpose is also available at any Social Security office. The law restricts the amount of the fee. More information about representatives, or any Social Security topic can be obtained by calling the Social Security toll free number 1-800-772-1213.

## Fair earns record \$65,000

The 1995 Annual Tyler County Fair Livestock Auction began with a record \$6,100 for the grand champion steer and record breakers for all but one grand champion animal but many other auction prices failed to match last year's record prices but the sale concluded with a respectable sum of \$42,599.93 representing the second highest Fair Auction total for the counties 4-H and FFA students some \$7655.95 less than the 1994 all-time record auction total of \$50,254.88.

Another \$22,360 was raised from the sale of animals which did not make the cut for the auction but were sold "under the barn", raising the overall total for animals sold at this year's fair to a record total of \$64,959.93 which is an increase of \$2,045.05 over last year.

The grand champion steer this year was shown by Kachel Rebbe, of the Spurger 4-H Chapter, and was sold to Mott Brothers, RPM and Martin Dies Beepart Farms for a record \$6,100 up from the previous record of \$5,500.

The Rebbe family has shown the grand champion steer every year since 1990, except for 1994 at the Tyler County Fair. Kachel has shown the grand champion steer in 1993 and her sister Nicole Rebbe had shown the reserve champion. In 1992 and in 1991 Nicole had shown the grand champion steer. Last year in 1994 Kachel had exhibited the grand champion lamb.

Showing the grand champion barrow this year was Chelanie Schultz of the Colmesneil FFA Chapter. It sold for \$2,900 to E & L Lumber Company, second highest sum after last year's record \$4,300.

Grand champion lamb for 1995 was exhibited by Jennifer Currie of Warren FFA and was sold to Scarborough's Service Brothers for a record \$2,400 topping last year's record of \$1,900.

Leigh Ann Neal of Warren FFA exhibited the grand champion poultry and was paid a record \$2,100 for the bird by Temple Inland Corporation topping last year's record price of \$920.

Exhibiting the grand champion rabbit this year was Kim Greenwood of Warren FFA who was paid a record breaking \$1,300 for the meat pen by Double R Rock - Robert Birdwell. Last year's record price was \$570.

The reserve champion steer was shown by Daniel Davis of Warren FFA and was sold for \$2,500 to Lansey Whitebairn and Troy Blackney exceeded only by last year's price of \$4,000.

### County buys sheriff's cars

Tyler County Commissioners voted to purchase four (4) 1996 Crown Victoria's from Knap Ford at a cost of \$18,668.50 each for a \$74,674 total. The Sheriff will not be taking delivery until Jan. 1, 1996.

In other business the court heard a proposal from Bob Hogan of the Hogan Company, of Dallas, in consideration of that firm making application for grants and loans on behalf of Tyler County to install water and sewer improvements in economically distressed areas here. Hogan said that Tyler County was listed as a candidate for receiving the Economic Disaster Area Program Funds. The court decided to table the proposal for further study.

In other business the court elected Maxie Ritey as a director on the Aging Services Center Board and the remaining commissioners then appointed Wali Davis, Leonard Schoenmacher and Paul Walker to respectable board positions. New by-laws for the operation of the Nutrition Center were recently put in place.

### Gib Lewis Unit Prison in-line with 20 for major expansion

Austin - Texas Department of Criminal Justice officials said Monday that the next round of expansion of the state prison system will focus on 6,021 high security prison cells to be built at eight existing prison sites in 1996-97.

Allan B. Polunsky of San Antonio, chairman of the Texas Criminal Justice Board, said that "economic conditions and efficiency of operations dictates that the new units be co-located with existing units."

The 6,021 new cells will be designed for use as either single cells or double-bunked, potentially giving the system potential additional capacity of 12,042 cells.

James A. Collins, TDCJ executive director, said that co-locating of new units "is critical to insure that we have adequate staff trained to handle the high security inmates and to reduce our need to mix inmates of different security classes within a unit."

Collins said the staff is studying the cost effectiveness of co-locating at existing 1,000 - bed and 2,250 bed units in Abilene, Amarillo, Beaumont, Gatesville, Huntsville, Karnes County, Livingston, New Boston, Palestine, Wichita Falls, Childress, Colorado City, Cleburne, Dalhart, Lamesa, Pampa, Snyder, Woodville, and Teague/Fairfield.

Construction is expected to cost \$200 million. The first of the units is expected to open in September '97 and the remainder to be phased in over the following 12 months.

The new units will have 669 cells per building and require about 200 staff. In locating new units, TDCJ requires the receiving city or county to provide infrastructure without cost to the state, including access to electric, water and sewer utility services and roadways to the prison sites.

Staff recommendations for the co-located sites are expected to be made at the Criminal Justice Board meeting in November.

The '96-'97 expansion program was authorized by the Legislature earlier this year to be built from bonds approved by the voters in 1993. This expansion is small by comparison to the aggressive program of the past four years which cost \$1.5 billion and added capacity from less than 50,000 in 1991 to 131,000 today. The combined prison and state jail systems will have a capacity of 146,000 when the current expansion program is completed in January.

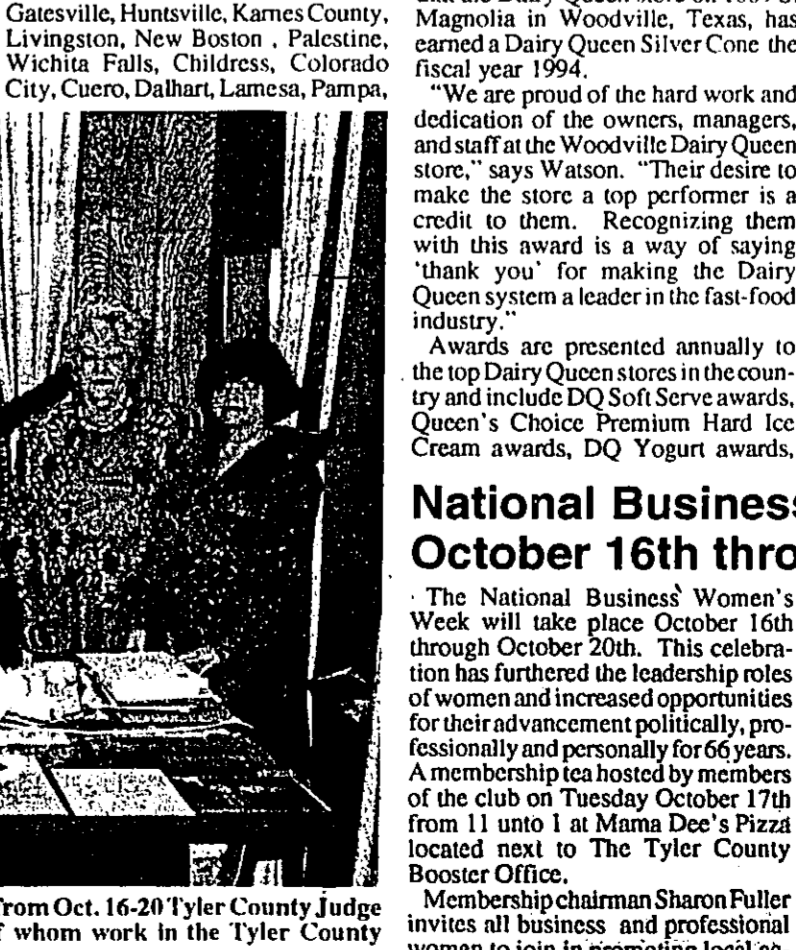

Tyler County Commissioners voted to purchase four (4) 1996 Crown Victoria's from Knap Ford at a cost of \$18,668.50 each for a \$74,674 total. The Sheriff will not be taking delivery until Jan. 1, 1996.

In other business the court heard a proposal from Bob Hogan of the Hogan Company, of Dallas, in consideration of that firm making application for grants and loans on behalf of Tyler County to install water and sewer improvements in economically distressed areas here. Hogan said that Tyler County was listed as a candidate for receiving the Economic Disaster Area Program Funds. The court decided to table the proposal for further study.

In other business the court elected Maxie Ritey as a director on the Aging Services Center Board and the remaining commissioners then appointed Wali Davis, Leonard Schoenmacher and Paul Walker to respectable board positions. New by-laws for the operation of the Nutrition Center were recently put in place.

## Colmesneil Homecoming, Woodville-Kountze top weekend grid card

County - Something is bound to give this weekend. After all four county schools fell together for the second time this season last week, they all find themselves in pressure games this week.

Woodville and Kountze go at it in a must win game for the Eagles. Colmesneil hopes to rebound to capture a humongous victory and start district play off on the right foot, and both Warren and Chester are still searching for their first victories of the year.

**Woodville-Kountze**  
In what might have been a victory on paper at the beginning of the year for Woodville, the Eagles now find themselves in a game that is virtually a toss up, especially in lieu of the fact that the Lions have the home field advantage.

The Lions have been impressive in recent weeks, blasting Warren, 41-0, and giving Stephen F. Austin all they could handle before falling, 34-13. If the Warriors are going to catch one this season, this one would be it. The Warriors are definitely struggling, but so are the Cougars who have only one victory this season.

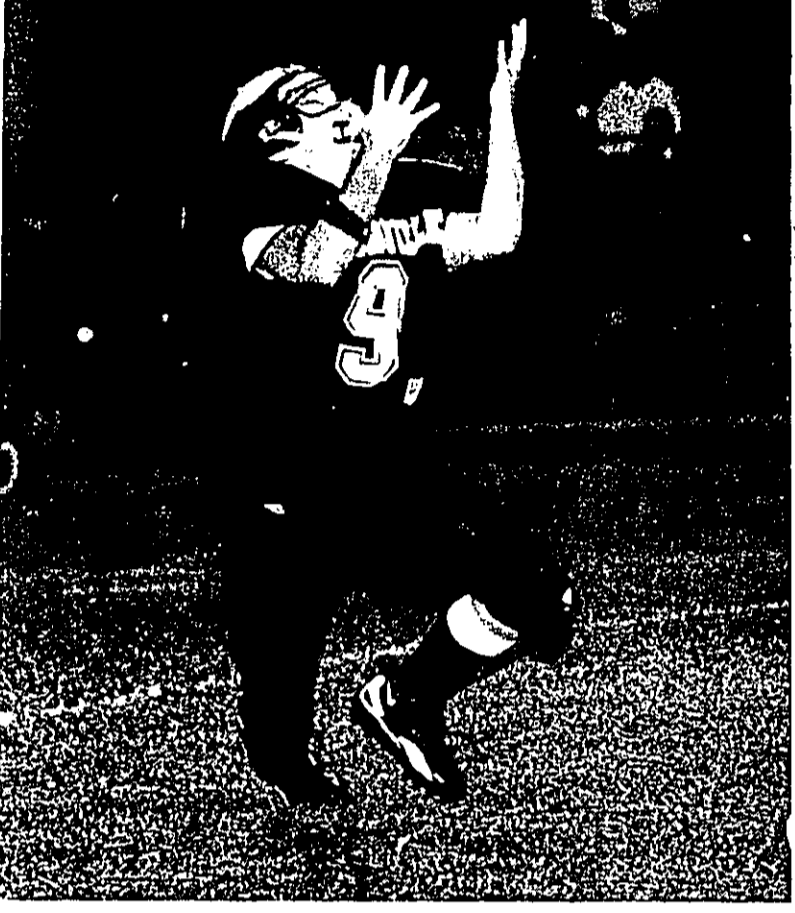
While Warren got hammered by Kountze last week, Buna was getting

## Woodville falls to state ranked Newton

Woodville - The Woodville Eagles are fast finding out that it is near impossible to beat a good team, let alone a state ranked power, when they turn the ball over close to a half dozen times in the game.

Friday night the Woodville Eagles fell to the Newton Eagles, 33-12, but when it was all said and done, they did more damage to themselves than the opponents did to them.

Newton cashed in on six Woodville turnovers, three of which led to touchdowns, to improve their record to 4-1 for the season and take a major foothold toward the district title.

The loss by Woodville pushed them to 3-2 for the year and evened up their district mark at 1-1 with surprising Kountze on the horizon.

"There is no doubt about it," lamented Woodville coach Ty Quick, "the difference in the game was the turnovers."

Woodville opened the game as if Newton's top 20 ranking in the state meant nothing, taking the ball at their own 37 and scoring in just four plays. Brad King broke on a 38 yard touchdown punt after Juan Mitchell had moved the Eagles into Newton territory on a pair of runs that netted 26 yards. The point after try failed due to a bad snap.

King's celebration of the touchdown cost Woodville 15 yards on the kickoff, and Newton responded with a eight play, 57 yard drive that gave Newton the lead. The drive was capped on a third and goal play from the Woodville 20 yard line following a 15 yard Newton penalty. Split end Andre Horn zipped around from his right to his left on a reverse that caught Woodville off guard for Newton's first score. The point after kick gave the Newton 7-6 lead, one that they would not relinquish for the rest of the night.

Woodville quickly stomped back, driving down field to the Newton 13 yard line on eight plays, but a Newton interception in the endzone killed the treat and eventually paved the way for a 13-6 Newton lead.

Newton quarterback Eric Davis increased the visitor's lead on a one yard drive. The play capped a 60 yard, seven play drive.

Following another Woodville inter-

ception, this time at the Newton 20 yard line, the state ranked Eagles quickly moved in for another score on just five plays. The clincher came on a 31 yard pass from Davis to tight end Chris Brooks. A two point conversion by Raymond Thomas gave Newton a 21-6 lead with just under eight minutes to go in the half.

Shaking off two turnovers, Woodville retaliated with its second and last score of the night on its next possession. Juan Mitchell, who finished the night with 108 yards on 17 carries, did most of the work. He finished Woodville's 60 yard drive with a fifty five yard run under four minutes remaining in the half. He also had a 29 yard run during the eight play drive, a run in which he broke two tackles on his way to the Newton 10 yard line.

Another Woodville miscue on a fumbled snap kept the Eagles from a two point conversion.

After Newton was forced to punt on its next possession, both teams went to the locker room for a halftime break with Newton holding 21-12 lead. But even behind on the scoreboard, Woodville coaches and players felt positive about their chances in the second half.

"I felt like we had the momentum," said Quick. "It should have been 21-21. I thought we stayed with them in the first half. We were ahead in all the stats."

But while two turnovers gave Newton a nine point advantage in the first half, two more in the second spelled defeat for the Eagles.

Newton took the second half kickoff and methodically moved down the field on 12 plays that netted less than 50 yards. After controlling the clock for almost seven minutes they finally gave the ball to Woodville on downs at the Newton 7-6 lead, one that they would not relinquish for the rest of the night.

Woodville's quick strike offense nailed Newton with a 39 yard pass from Demarcus White to Byron Rigby moments later, but another Woodville fumble stopped the drive.

Newton closed out its scoring with a six yard run by Thomas with less than two minutes to go in the game after Woodville failed to make a desperation fourth down play at their own 37. Ironically, Woodville never punted in the game and came within 30 yards of matching Newton on total offense.

Woodville had 205 yards through the air, while Newton had 254 yards rushing and 31 passing.

Woodville had a total of six turnovers.

## Derek beats the odds

Covering the Woodville-Veneta game Friday night, I ran across Derek Henigan at Eagle Stadium. It was good to see him, especially in light of the fact that he is the starting center for the McNeese State Cowboys in Lake Charles and they are ranked the top team in 1-AA football.

In case you missed it, Derek and a newcomer to Tyler County, he is one of the few Woodville players that have gone on to play college ball. He is also the son of Tyler County Sheriff Gary Henigan, and his mom, Debbie, makes sure everybody's mail gets in the right bin at the Woodville post office. He also has an older brother that coaches baseball at Spurger High School.

Since there were a couple of ladies in serious conversation with Derek at the ball game and because I had work to do, I told him that I would talk with him later in the weekend. So Sunday morning I made sure he was up in time for church by calling him about 8:30. He sounded like he was already awake, but his mom didn't. She was the one who answered the phone.

There were several things I wanted to find out from Derek, one of which was his advice for high school athletes trying to get college scholarships. He said that student activities need to have a plan. "Start working on it now," he emphasized. "Don't wait."

Derek was fortunate to be able to get a scholarship to play college football. First of all he has size (he is now 6-3, 270) and he has talent. But even that wasn't enough. He also had to have someone to make sure that people knew about him and saw his potential. "That is where his father came in."

Being not only an efficient law officer, Gary Henigan, is also a promoter. In some circles he would be called a mover and a shaker. If he believes in something, whatever the challenge, he will get it done. That is why Tyler County has one of the best baseball complexes in Southeast Texas. So helping his son get a scholarship was just a natural thing for Derek's dad.

While Woodville's coaching staff was going through a change, Gary Henigan and Derek got on the phone. He talked with Spike Dikes at Texas Tech, people at S.M.U. and University of Houston. By the time he was finished, Derek had offers from all 11 of the aforementioned schools, plus Sam Houston State, McNeese, and several others.

"It's very important to have contacts," added Derek. "And you've got to have someone who knows what they're talking about."

The reason that Derek chose McNeese over the rest of the schools was because the Cowboys offered him the best scholarship. And keep in mind that McNeese or any of the rest of the schools didn't offer him a scholarship because of his father. They offered him a scholarship because he is talented, and they found out about that talent because of his father.

In high school Derek played tackle, but at McNeese he plays center. After being red shined his freshman year he was the deep snapper on extra punts and field goals last year. This year he is starting center. When I asked him why he didn't snap for punts, he sheepishly replied, "I'm too slow. They want someone who can get down field real fast to cover kicks."

The reason he was switched from a high school tackle to a college center had to do with the size. Most college tackles are in the 6-4-5, 290-300 range he says.

And while Derek may be a little slow for snapping on punts, he is definitely slow in his classroom where he is studying physical therapy. He carries close to a three point average while taking courses like calculus, chemistry, and physics. When he graduates he must be accepted to medical school and study two more years to get his certification.

Hitting the books and the practice dummies don't leave much time for other activities. The Woodville grad says that the hardest thing is not enough time to study, and as far as social time, "There's not a whole lot," he admits.

Derek starts his day at 7:30 in the morning and finally gets back from practice and dinner at 7:00 at night. "I mostly study after that," he says.

Not that he would have time for it but one thing that I was unaware of was that Derek, nor any other full scholarship player in college, can have a part time job. Their spending money has to come from home.

Spending money can come in many ways. Some players have parents that the Cowboys have traveled to Montana and Virginia. Last year McNeese traveled to Montana and lost in the second round of the playoffs by one point on a last second field goal. The temperature was nine degrees. This year they played James Madison at Blacksburg, Virginia. He said that both colleges are located in mountain areas of their respective states, and both trips were the best that he has had at McNeese.

McNeese defeated James Madison, then ranked in the top ten. They also have beaten Central Florida, another ranked team that gave Florida State all that they wanted earlier this year. Youngstown, the defending 1-AA national champions last year, was another victim of the Cowboys this season.

Right now McNeese is 5-0 and will play Portland State and Sam Houston State at home the next two weekends. But don't plan on going unless you already have tickets. McNeese's stadium seats 18,000, but the last two games have seen almost 22,000 in attendance. Your best bet to see Derek is to travel to Macomb, Texas to watch the Cowboys take on Stephen F. Austin. By the way, the Lumberjacks are also nationally ranked, so you might be better off catching McNeese at San Marcos when they play Southwest Texas on November 4.

If the Cowboys get into the playoffs they will be seeded by record and will play either Texas Tech, or Texas A&M, or Oklahoma State. And the other schools involved in the playoffs bidding for the games to be played at their stadiums.

Derek adds that about 30 percent of the 75 scholarship players at McNeese are from Texas, and that the other 45 percent are from other schools and colleges but can't even be compared. "The players are bigger, stronger, faster, and the level of competition is tremendous," he says.

And what about the pros? "If it happens, it happens," he says.

One thing about it, if there is somebody that could break the odds, it would be Derek. He has already done it once. It wouldn't surprise me at all if he does it again.

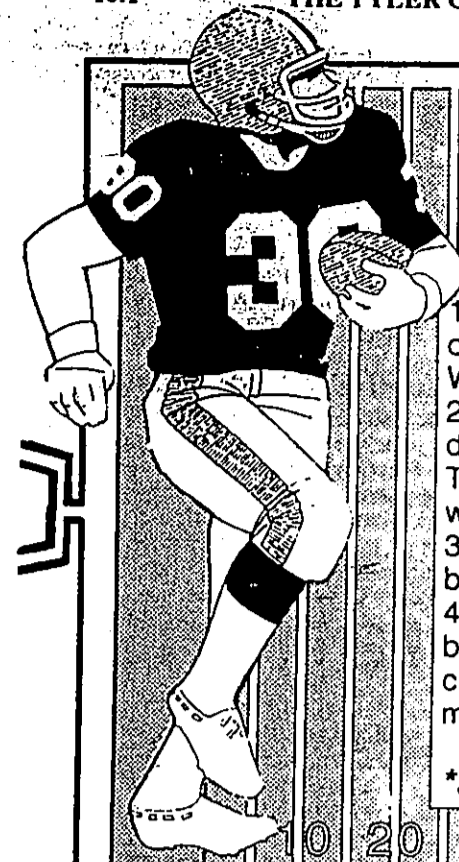

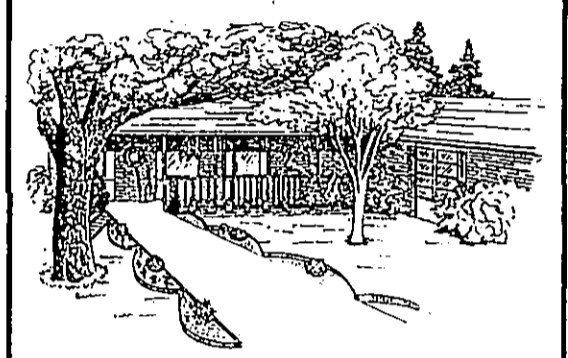

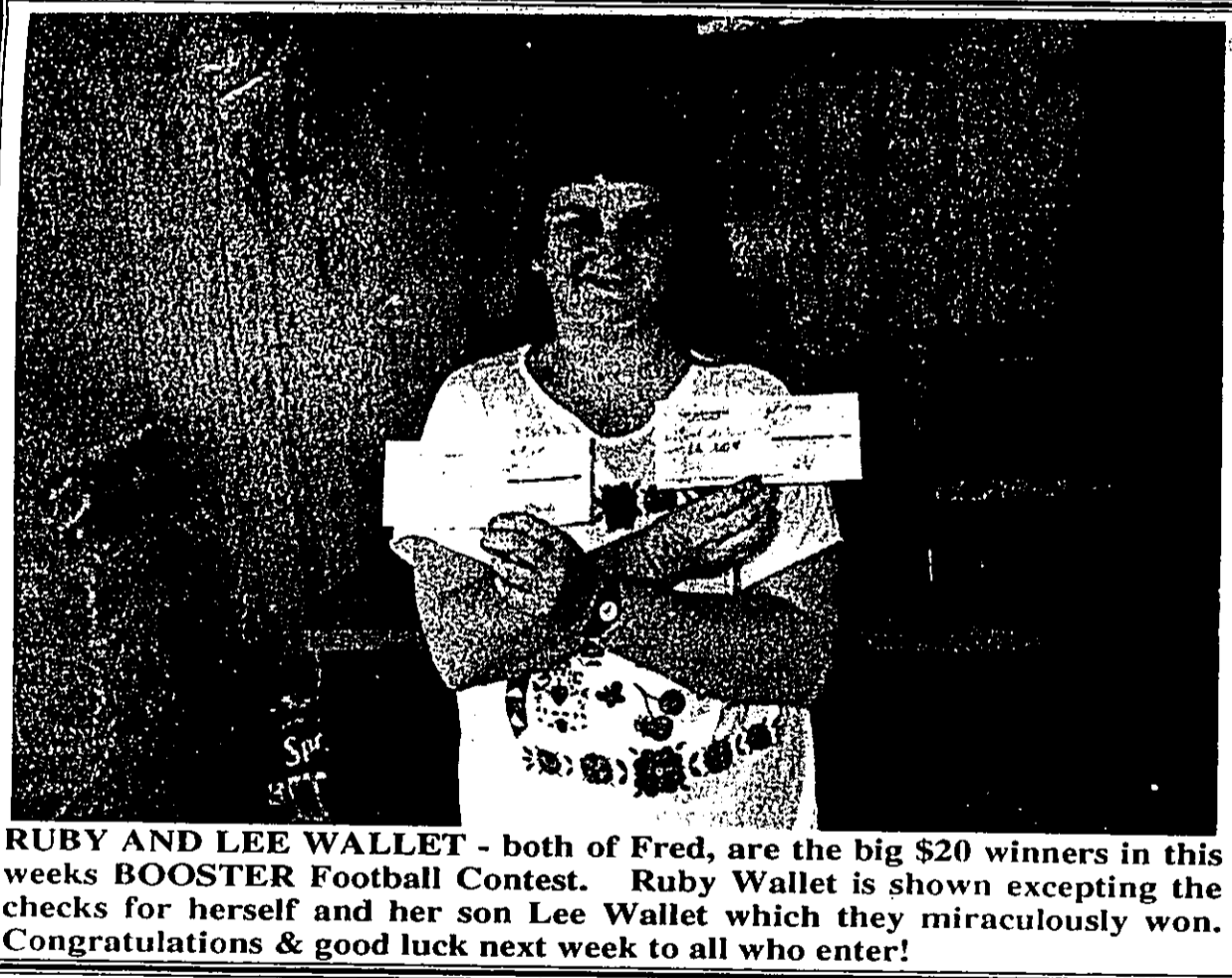

**Muscle cramp may mean enzyme deficiency**

Houston—(Sept. 19, 1995)—Muscle cramps during exercise are often the first sign of an enzyme deficiency that can ultimately cause kidney failure. "People often ignore this problem by attributing the muscle cramps to a lack of conditioning," said Dr. Yalolah Harati, a professor of neurology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "These cramps should not be confused with normal muscle cramps that occur when we are at rest or after exercise."

Pain occurs in the exercised muscle usually five to 20 minutes into exercise, Harati says, and is often severe enough to cause a person to slow down or to stop completely. The cramps are the first indication that the muscle is not converting glycogen, the sugar stored in muscles, into lactate, the sugar needed for strenuous muscle activity. The condition is one of several forms of glycogen storage disease.

"Many different enzymes work in the conversion of glycogen to lactate," Harati said. "If any one is deficient, the muscle does not produce lactate and cannot provide the energy needed to move. Why this causes pain still remains a mystery."

Ignoring the condition can lead to muscle breakdown and severe kidney problems. "If exercise is continued, the muscle breaks down and releases the meat of the muscle, myoglobin, into the bloodstream," Harati said. "As the body tries to rid itself of myoglobin, the large molecules can clog the kidney and eventually cause kidney failure." Persons experiencing severe muscle breakdown often have cola-colored urine. The injury also is reflected in elevated blood levels of the muscle enzyme creatine phosphokinase, or CPK.

"Since people attribute the problem, to weakness and tend to minimize exercise, diagnosis is often delayed. We diagnose the problem by using a special forearm exercise test and muscle biopsy," Harati said. The exercise test involves measurement of lactate in the blood before and after exercise under controlled conditions. "The muscle biopsy, Harati says, reveals enzyme deficiencies when evaluated using specialized techniques.

Although there is no cure, patients can lead a normal life by exercising within their limits, avoiding occupations that involve strenuous activity and modifying their diet. "Decreasing carbohydrates and including more proteins, like meat or fish, provides an alternate source of energy," he said. Enzyme deficiencies are usually hereditary, so early knowledge of the
