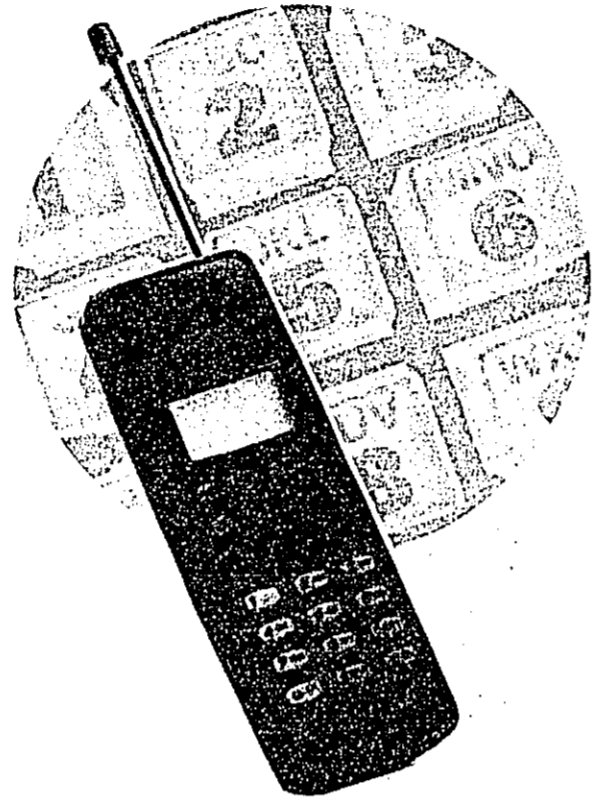

**Marcus Gill family  
 heading for Okinawa  
 to visit incarcerated son**

The family of Navy Seaman Marcus Gill, of Woodville, will be heading to Okinawa, Japan soon hoping to see their son who has already pled guilty to the rape of a 12 year-old schoolgirl while on duty. The military accomplices pled guilty to lesser charges.

"I'm not going to lay down and die," said Ester Gill, who believes it would be easy to do that, "in the face of present circumstances," but she keeps getting new positive information about the case and encouragement from friends and relatives to go.

"There's always a ray of hope," she said Monday, and we're not giving up. There are no words for the gratitude I feel.

The Seaman's Mom set up a Family Expense Fund at Community Bank where people could donate toward the defense of Marcus Gill.

The family will be leaving for Japan on Nov. 29, to see her son as a result of efforts from the Atlanta, Ga., based Center for Democratic Renewal which has taken the on trial and is assisting all the families of the servicemen involved.

A meeting was held Monday in Woodville where the Gill family and friends met to discuss local strategies in the defense of Seaman Marcus Gill.

According to Donald Coleman, who is personally assisting the Gill family at his own expense, "This case just doesn't fit the profile of a kid who was raised up in Woodville, Texas, all his life. It doesn't fit for these boys to have committed such a hideous crime. Coleman said he believes it is possible the three were coerced into pleading guilty.... They were young and a long way from home," Coleman said. "Also, the quality you find in the church community in Woodville, of which Marcus was a part, and the good neighbors we have here...it just doesn't fit."

The U.S. Government is just passing the buck," Coleman said. "According to a Gill family friend, Harold Gregory, "The expediency of this trial is a key...normally these things take much longer. The three Gills don't matter," he said, what matters is those bases. I believe that our Ambassador to Japan Walter Mondale and Secretary of Defense William Perry were wrong to offer an apology and offer to pay reparations before the case was actually tried. In some ways they owe the military families an apology. The U.S. Government is refusing to get in touch with the families."

"I'd like to support the family," said Doris Blackmon, "I know Marcus since he was a baby...I'm a mother myself. I'm here out of a mother's love to see about this child and to do what I can to help the family. We've all got to help each other. God gave us these children."

According to Deltra Rawls, "I feel sad for the young girl, but I don't think they should just grab someone. They haven't proved that our kids are the ones who did that."

Maggie Mitchell said, "I don't think I could handle the pain of a mother not being able to see her son. The more I think about it...I don't think there was a rape."

The group gathered at the meeting decided Monday to put on a Community wide Garage Sale Saturday to benefit the Gill family, at the corner of M.E. and Hyde Streets. Persons who would like to donate items for the sale may contact Deltra Rawls at 283-6753 or Doris Bartlow at 283-7027. The Gill family of three members needs approximately \$10,000 in order to visit their son in jail.

Some \$1,200 has already been contributed to assist the family.

**City Council examines proposals for Hike/ Bike trail,  
 submits plans for waste water treatment project**

 Woodville City Council met Monday in a marathon session to consider several major project proposals and housing related issues.

Four firms submitted engineering proposals for the Dogwood Hike & Bike Trail. Being considered for the project are Goodwin & Lester of Austin, Klotz Engineering of Houston, Everett Griffith & Associates of Lufkin, and Kyle Engineering of Dallas. Representative from the three firms present gave a short presentation on how their firm would engineer the project. A committee consisting of Mayor Billy Rose, City Secretary Don Shaw and Councilman Tom Knapp was appointed to review these proposals and report back to the Council with a decision this Friday, November 17.

The Dogwood Hike & Bike Trail which is funded by a grant of \$348,000 from the Texas Department of Transportation and matched with \$87,000 of city funds will result in an all-weather trail along scenic Little Turkey Creek from Highway 190 to Highway 69/287. It will include picnic tables, benches and several foot bridges. Construction of the project is expected to be complete in late 1996 at a cost of \$435,000.

Bob Kyle of Kyle Engineering, pointed out that the trail and the waste water plant project involve construction along the same section of Little Turkey Creek. He indicated that since his firm is already involved in the waste water project it could dovetail construction details of the two projects. This would allow a cost savings to the city which could be used for more or better facilities along the trail.

Council also opened proposals for the financial audit for fiscal year 1994-1995. Proposals were received from three firms including Crowell Pipes in Nacogdoches, Alexander Landford & Hines in Lufkin, and Junker McMillan & Maynard in Beaumont. Each firm made a short presentation before council. The audit is expected to require about 250 hours to complete. All firms indicated an ability to meet the cities completion date. A committee consisting of Councilman Larry Phillips, Bill Nichols, and Ken Weaver was appointed to review the proposals and report back to the council with a decision this Friday, November 17.

Progress is being made on the new waste water treatment plant. City officials voted at the meeting Monday to submit plans to the new plant to the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission and the Farmers Home Administration for approval of each agency. The next major task

which must be completed locally is obtaining several dozen easements necessary for construction of the project.

Bids were opened for a 1996 police car. Only one bid was received and efforts to insure all dealers in the town were aware of this request for bid. The bid from Orange Ford Lincoln Mercury for a 1996 Crown Victoria at a price of \$18,298 was accepted. Council budgeted \$17,000 for this purchase. Police Chief Scott Vosko said the remaining funds could be transferred from the task force budget.

Council heard requests for two hardship mobile home permits under the new mobile home ordinance. Gabe Stewart spoke for Virginia Williams who purchased a lot on South Beach street near Cobb Mill Road just prior to passage of the mobile home ordinance and purchased a triple-wide manufactured house. She stopped actual installation of the home when the issue was discovered. Council recognized this as a situation where enactment of the new ordinance had created a hardship on a citizen who was acting in good faith and approved a hardship permit in this case.

Council also heard from Eddie Harrison who spoke for Gracie Holland. Her request was based on a desire to put her mother in a 14x60 foot trailer in her back yard on Holly street. Councilman Larry Phillips noted that this did not seem to fit the definition of "hardship" contemplated in the ordinance. Council rejected this request on that basis.

No action was taken on a request for hardship permit from Durrell Citizen since he was not available to make a presentation before the council.

City Secretary Don Shaw said he is in the process of sending letters to mobile home and manufactured housing dealers in the area informing them of Woodville's ordinance. This should reduce the likelihood of homes being purchased for placement contrary to city ordinance.

Council heard from Billy Don Everett of T.M.S. Group. He made a presentation for a process the city could use to increase the amount of needed housing in the area. This would not be low income or public assistance housing, but would add to the already existing housing inventory with some 15 duplexes. This plan involves the city creating a Housing Finance Corporation. The city would appoint the members of the corporation board. The corporation would sell bonds to pay for construction of a number of duplex apartments. The bonds are repaid by rents collected on the duplexes. After

the bonds are retired the property can continue to be owned by the Housing Finance Corp. or it can be transferred to the city and managed under contract.

In other business the Woodville Housing Authority requested speed limits be reduced to 20 m.p.h. on streets fronting housing authority projects. Council members voted to improve the reduced speed limit. Councilman Philbin, Bluebird, Albert, Shivers, Jackson and Alico are on the South Beach street was excluded from this change due to traffic issues. Council also voted to authorize installation of a stop sign on Village at Lyle Oak. Only Traffic on Village will be required to stop.

Don Forsie submitted a sub-division plat for a sub-division on Highway 69 South. Council voted to accept the plat into the city but noted that the developer is required to install utilities in a "reasonable amount of time" in a "reasonable business. Council took no action at this time on a request presented by Calvin Harris, to provide water service to residents of West Haverling road, an area just outside of the city limits. **Commissioners hear 9-1-1 update**

 Tyler County Commissioners Court heard an update Monday from Kevin Carrigan of United Aerial Mapping Inc. of San Antonio regarding the 9-1-1 rural addressing project. Plots of the county have been prepared and workers are about 20 percent complete in the map verification and address collection field work Carrigan said.

He said the balance of the field work will be completed on or before February 15. Next month's update will include a demonstration of the computer database and how it works.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Maxie Riley had requested the firm give monthly updates to the court on the progress of the 9-1-1 project. Riley said the total project cost would be \$139,000 in addition to a \$40,000 match from Tyler County. The main portion of the "physical" work Tyler County is to perform includes the installation of several thousand road number signs and the poles needed for each location.

An interesting and lifesaving attribute of the new 9-1-1 plan is that medical emergency vehicles will carry an "on-board atlas" with the road number and residence number plus a pre-measured distance calculation from road intersection to driveways. This will enable more timely arrivals in emergency situations with an additional \$250.

Commissioners estimate the project completion date to be in the last quarter of 1996.

In other business, the court heard from the airport committee regarding the taxability of hangers at the airport. Recommendations for lease fees and policies regarding use and any new hanger construction are to be expected at the December meeting of the Commissioners Court. The airport committee includes County Treasurer Tina Bump, Precinct 2 County Commissioner Pete Barnes and Chief Appraiser for the Tyler County Appraisal District Eddie Chalmers.

Commissioners approved the expenditure of \$750 to join the U. S. Highway 190 coalition project of which

County Judge Jerome Owens is a member. The goal of the coalition is to make 190 a major thoroughfare between Newton and Bryan. Funds will be used for tapes and a live presentation to be made before the Texas Highway Commission by the City of Woodville. It is also sharing in the coalition cost with an additional \$250.

Commissioners also approved hiring an attorney concerning encroachment on county roads in Precinct 4. Precinct 4 Commissioner Earl Sawyer said that there were about three encroachments that needed to be dealt with.

Commissioners amended the budget for computer purchases for the Shivers Library to comply with terms of a grant from the Temple Foundation. The action raises the budgeted amount for 1995 from \$4500 to \$6000 but actually saves \$3000 over two years. The funds will be transferred from the county's heating and cooling budget funds.

The court voted to keep Commis

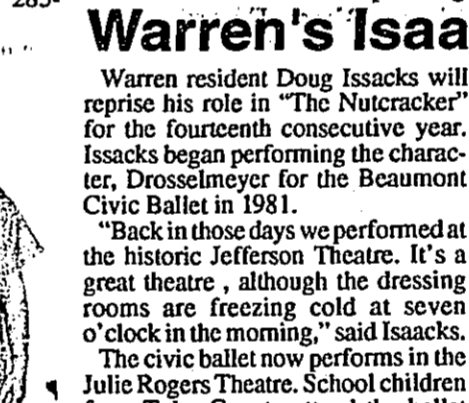

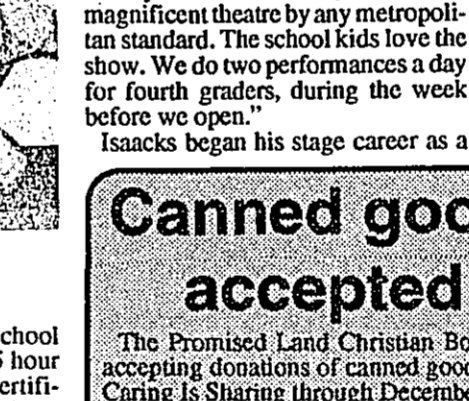

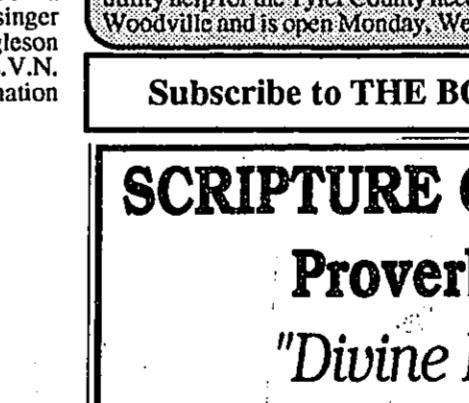

## Woodville falls in finale to Orangefield

ORANGEFIELD—Woodville coach Ty Quick said it best after his Eagles fell to the Orangefield Bobcats, 58-40, in the season finale Friday night. "We couldn't stop them, and they couldn't stop us."

Quick and his Eagles had hoped to finish the season with their seventh win, but one of the wildest offensive shows in Southeast Texas football proved otherwise. Instead, the Eagles fell for the fourth time, three coming in District 21-AAA warfare.

"I don't have any regrets," noted the Woodville coach after the game, "but I do wish we could have beaten Orangefield."

As usual, the Woodville offense ran roughshod up and down the field. The Eagles finished the season with 358 points, and average of almost 36 points per game, a modern day school record.

Both Kevin Mitchell and Allen Adams rushed for over 200 yards in the contest. Mitchell had 208 yards on 19 carries and scored three times on runs of 76, 12, and eight. Allen had 209 yards rushing on 21 carries and scored on a 42 yard gallop.

White Mitchell and Adams took care of the ground attack, quarterback Demarcus White hit on three of eight passes for 119 yards and two touchdowns.

Byron Rigby caught two passes for 84 yards, one of which was a 70 yard touchdown. Gerrod Betts caught the other pass on a 35 yard touchdown aerial.

Betts and Mitchell also grabbed two point conversion passes from White.

But while the Woodville offense was going wild, the Orangefield defense was again having its problems, especially in the second period when the Bobcats scored 24 points and basically got enough margin for the win.

"We gave them 21 points," lamented Quick after the loss. "We turned the ball over three times in our own end of the field."

The Bobcats scored 17 points in a two minute span before halftime. Besides a 37 yard field goal by Rodney Arceneaux, the Bobcats scored on a nine yard pass from Jeff Terry to Brian Lytle and a 20 yard pass from Terry to Shon Jones.

Jones led Orangefield's offensive attack with 220 yards and four touchdowns. Jeff Ledoux added 83 yards on 11 carries.

With two minutes to go in the second period, the Orangefield victory the Bobcats moved to 5-5 for the season and 5-2 in district play, good for third place behind Newton and Stephen F. Austin.

Woodville had 10 seniors playing their final game. Seniors included Allen Adams, Justin Sturrock, Sonny Hilliard, Charles Odom, Darth Buttice, Billy Cauds, Chad Fleicher, Nick Marshall, and James By.

Quick had 23 players suited up for the final game of the season. "We ended up with a bunch of good kids. That's what we wanted to develop character on," added the Woodville coach. "We wanted the strength to be the quality of the people out there. I admire the ones who stayed with it."

Quick said that the highlight of the season was the Eagles' win over Har-din-Jefferson. "We played a complete game," said Quick.

## Warren falls to Kirbyville in season finale

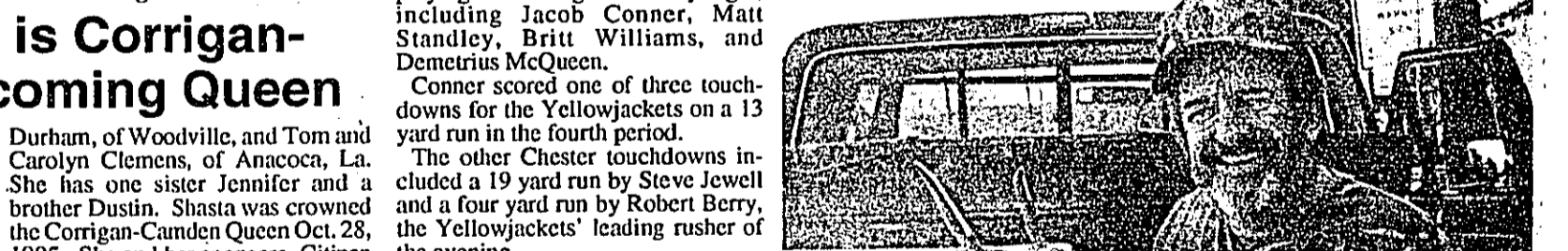
The Apple Springs' runner scored twice more in the second half, once on a 20 yard run by Terrance Deason.

The University Interscholastic League's Legislative Council voted last month to allow girls to try out to play baseball. Under current policy, girls are allowed to participate on boys' teams if a corresponding sport is not offered. The council gave the determination that baseball and softball have unique differences and should be viewed as separate, not corresponding sports.

Girls should be given the opportunity to participate in the full range of UIL programs," UIL athletic director Charles Breithaupt said. "This change is positive in that it allows girls to try out for and, if selected, participate in every UIL activity."

If the change is ratified by the State Board of Education, girls would be allowed to try out for baseball teams beginning with the 1996-1997 school year, but could not play baseball and softball at the same time.

A proposal was also approved to alter the penalty structure for coaches who are ejected from contests in baseball, basketball, soccer, softball, volleyball and football. The change allows a coach who was ejected the option of having their name placed in the Leaguer for one publication or receiving a one game suspension from the next scheduled contest in addition to a public reprimand and one year probation.

**The real reasons to stay away from Marijuana**

As a parent and activist in the substance abuse prevention and treatment field, I am deeply concerned about the resurgence in the popularity of marijuana. I am just as concerned with the difficulty parents, teachers, counselors and other adults are having in trying to communicate with teenagers why they should not use marijuana. There seems to be a consensus of agreement about the dangers of cocaine, heroin and even cigarette and alcohol, but not marijuana. What are the real dangers with it and how do you handle responses such as, "marijuana is an herb," "it is harmless," "it is used as a medicine," or "it's organic." One famous rap group member feels it can make him more creative and that he can write and perform better.

What all drugs have in common is they each contain a poison molecule. The poison molecule in marijuana is tetrahydrocannabinol (THC). It is the THC in marijuana causing the high or enjoyable feelings being experienced as well as the problems. What are the real problems with pot?

**Ambition:** Here lies the greatest danger to your youth. The loss of ambition is so obvious yet often overlooked. Ambition is the very thing in which a person acquires his success in life. A cigarette smoker loses his life to lung cancer while the alcoholic is constantly hung-over and often looks and smells bad. The heroin addict is usually in disastrous physical health exposing himself from overdose as well as hepatitis, AIDS and other diseases. What is obvious about the chronic smoker of marijuana? With chronic use all else becomes less important or secondary to the use of marijuana. Ambition is lost.

The ambition and personality of the chronic smoker of marijuana becomes altered as with all drugs. The loss of ambition is at the top of my list because this point is so important in the life of a teenager as it can halt and/or alter emotional and educational development. Simply put, marijuana can interrupt a child's drive and development in sports, music, reading and school subjects, hobbies, etc. This result is seen over and over in drug treatment centers such as Narconon.

**Memory:** It has been stated in the past that marijuana use causes "short-term memory loss." It is more than this. Using marijuana as well as other drugs affects concentration, mental recording and the recalling of previously recorded mental images. All one has to do is spend some time with someone who has been using marijuana to hold a serious discussion on a serious or complex subject. It will become all too obvious that marijuana affects the memory. Where a breakthrough comes into play is in the area of his or her "attention." Drugs internalize or "interiorize" one's attention as one is feeling and enjoying the drugs effect on the body. Without proper attention, a good memory does not occur in the first place and makes recalling what you did record mentally more difficult.

**Education:** Individuals, especially teenagers, consuming marijuana with any regularity are going to have problems educating themselves either inside or outside of the classroom. The mind is your computer and it depends on attention, concentration, recording, recalling and memory. Grades and test scores will be low. The marijuana user smoke today will be for many days, weeks, months and possibly years to come. Is marijuana a "herb" or not? It probably could be used to spice food and it does have some limited medicinal use, but this certainly does not justify recreational use of the drug. When a teenager is consuming marijuana with any consistency the results are not that of a food spice or medicine. This drug will put the teenagers future at risk.

**The real reasons to stay away from Marijuana:** Is marijuana "organic?" Yes, but so what. Most drugs are from plants and this does not make them safe drugs. Heroin, cocaine, LSD as well as cigarettes and alcohol all come from plants. They too are "organic" molecules. Is marijuana "harmless?" No. Not if you honestly look at all of these.

**Tiredness:** One of the more observable side effects to the smoking of pot is tiredness. This sort of goes hand in hand with lack of ambition, but I feel there are two parts. Loss of ambition is more mental and tiredness is more the physical effect. Nevertheless, it certainly happens. There has also been medical treatments. But these medical facts do not make the recreational use of marijuana safe, especially for our youth.

**Is marijuana good for creativity?** This is a harder question to answer and should not be answered hastily. When a person has taken a drug and feels good they may feel more creative. This may be the first time they have felt a drug induced creativity and for them the answer is yes. This may be all that is necessary for them to believe that marijuana is the creative answer in their life. What I try and point out is that if a drug can make you feel creative then you can be creative on your own. You do not need a drug to be creative. No one does.

**Callers can help Social Security improve customer service on 800 number lines**

The Social Security Administration (SSA) is credited with providing the best overall 800 number telephone customer service of the organizations in a recent national survey. The Boston-based financial publisher DALBAR Corp. included in leading companies and SSA in its study. Social Security ranked first or second, except in the area of how long callers were left on hold before their calls were answered. It is this last area that has been one of the primary objects of SSA's recent efforts to improve the customer service.

Social Security receives between 250,000 and 300,000 calls each business day at its toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. With this heavy volume of calls during business hours, the circuits get busy and, at times, callers may have to wait to speak with a telephone representative to complete their business.

Social Security recognizes that every call is important and having to wait to reach a representative isn't what you, our customers, want to do. To help reduce waiting times, additional employees are being trained to answer calls, and more services are being added for you to choose from when you call.

But you, too, can help reduce the extent of the problem. When you use the toll-free number, think about the timing of your call. Do you need to speak to someone now? Could you save time by calling at another less busy time? The choice you make can help keep more lines open for calls that must be made during peak hours.

The 800 number lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month. If, for example, you check in at least three days late, you should call early in the month-not to delay this type of call. If, however, you have a general question about an SSA program or you want to sign up for direct deposit, you may want to wait until a later time if you call late in the day or late in the month.

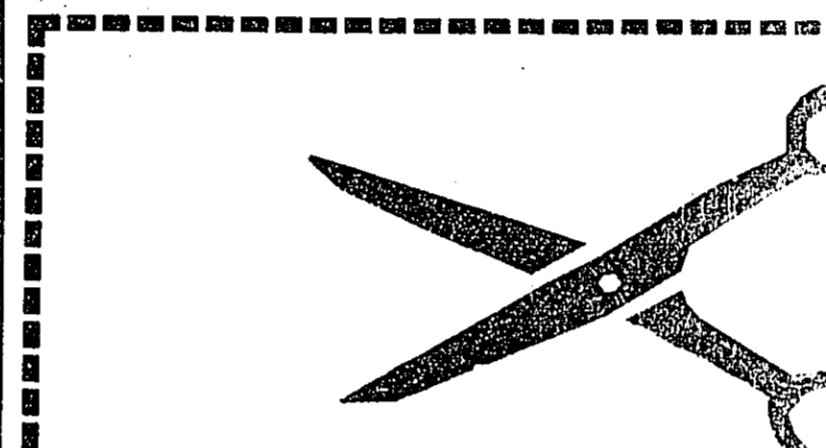

## TNRCC offers seminars for petroleum tank owners

It costs an average of \$126,000 to remove a single leaking petroleum storage tank and clean up the soil that surrounds the tank. Tank owners and operators who are required to reimburse as they are eligible to apply for reimbursement from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission's (TNRCC) Petroleum Storage Tank Rehabilitation Fund.

But petroleum storage tank owners who have not repaired their tanks with the TNRCC by December 31, 1995, will be ineligible for reimbursement in the event a spill or a leak occurs. Owners of unregistered tanks will be responsible for all costs of corrective action.

In addition, since deductibles on reimbursement claims will begin rising in 1996, storage tank leaks should be reported as soon as possible to avoid additional costs and possible penalties. Also, any leaks reported after December 31, 1995, will not be eligible for reimbursement and the TNRCC reimbursement program ends on September 1, 1996. House Bill 2587, passed by the Texas Legislature this year, was intended to provide tank owners and operators with an incentive to quickly address their leaking storage tanks.

The TNRCC will offer a series of 31 free seminars across the state to help tank owners determine whether they have tanks that should be repaired, and to register them.

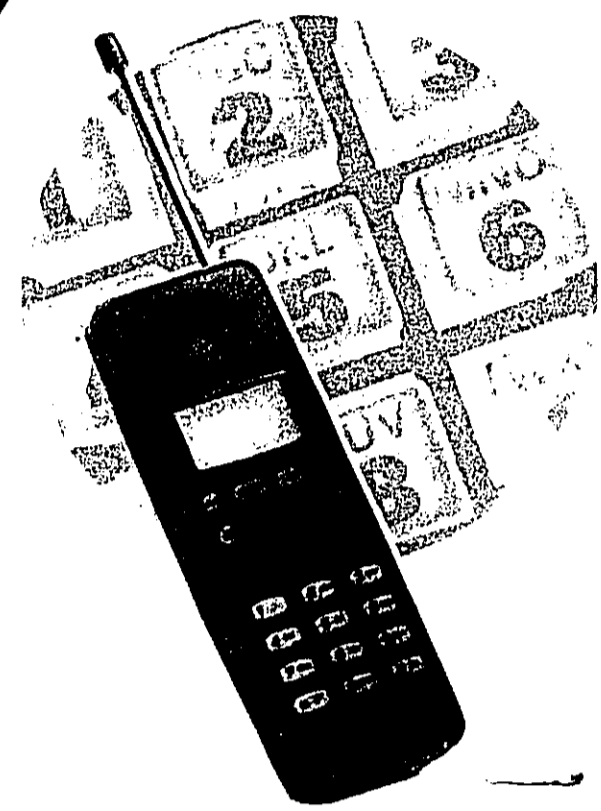

**Marcus Gill family heading for Okinawa to visit incarcerated son**

Friends and relatives came to show support and voice their opinions about the situation.

The family of Navy Seaman Marcus Gill, of Woodville, will be heading to Okinawa, Japan soon hoping to see their son who has already pled guilty to the rape of a 12-year-old schoolgirl while two other military accomplices pled guilty to lesser charges. "I'm not going to lay down and die," said Esther Gill, who believes it would be easy to do that, "in the face of present circumstances...but she keeps getting new positive information about the case and encouragement from friends that keeps her from giving up. "There's always a ray of hope," she said Monday, and we're not giving up. There are no words for the gratitude I feel.

The U.S. Government is just passing the buck," Coleman said. According to a Gill family friend, Harold Gregory, "The expediency of this trial is key, normally these things take much longer. The three G.I.'s don't matter," he said, what matters is these bases, I believe that our Ambassador to Japan, Walter Mondale and Secretary of Defense William Perry were wrong to offer an apology and offer to pay reparations before the case was actually tried. In some ways they owe the military families an apology. The U.S. Government is refusing to get in touch with the families.

"I'm here to support the family," said Doris Blackmon. "I've known Marcus since he was a baby...I'm a mother myself. I'm here out of a mother's love to see about this child and to do what I can to help the family. We've all got to help each other. God gave us these children." According to Deltra Rawls, "I feel sad for the young girl, but I don't think they should just grab someone. They haven't proved that our kids are the ones who did that."

Maggie Mitchell said, "I don't think I could handle the pain of a mother not being able to see her son. The more I think about it...I don't think there was a rape."

**City Council examines proposals for Hike/ Bike trail, submits plans for waste water treatment project**

Woodville City Council met Monday in a marathon session to consider several major project proposals and housing related issues. Four firms submitted engineering proposals for the Dogwood Hike & Bike Trail. Being considered for the project are Goodwin & Lawlor of Lufkin, Klotz Engineering of Houston, Everett Griffith & Associates of Lufkin, and Kyle Engineering of Dallas. Representative from the three firms present gave a short presentation on how their firm would engineer the project. A committee consisting of Mayor Billy Rose, City Secretary Don Shaw and Councilman Tom Knapp was appointed to review these proposals and report back to the Council with a decision this Friday, November 17. The Dogwood Hike & Bike Trail which is funded by a grant of \$348,000 from the Texas Department of Transportation and matched with \$87,000 of city funds will result in an all-weather trail along scenic Little Turkey Creek from Highway 190 to Highway 69/287. It will include picnic tables, benches and several foot bridges. Construction of the project is expected to be complete in late 1996 at a cost of \$435,000.

Bob Kyle of Kyle Engineering, pointed out that the trail and the waste water plant project involve construction along the same section of Little Turkey Creek. He indicated that since his firm is already involved in the waste water project it could dovetail construction details of the two projects. This would allow a cost savings to the city which could be used for more or better facilities along the trail.

Council also opened proposals for the financial audit for fiscal year 1994-1995. Proposals were received from three firms including Crowell Pipes in Nacogdoches, Alexander Landford & Hines in Lufkin, and Junker McMillan & Minyard in Beaumont. Each firm made a short presentation before council. The audit is expected to require about 250 hours to complete. All firms indicated an ability to meet the cities completion date. A committee consisting of Councilmen Larry Phillips, Bill Nichols, and Ken Weaver was appointed to review the proposals and report back to the council with a decision this Friday, November 17.

Progress is being made on the new waste water treatment plant. City fathers voted at the meeting Monday to submit plans for the new plant to the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission and the Farmers Home Administration for approval of each agency. The next major task

which must be completed locally is obtaining several dozen easements necessary for construction of the project. Bids were opened for a 1996 police car. Only one bid was received despite efforts to insure all dealers in the area were aware of this request for bids. The bid from Orange Ford Lincoln Mercury for a 1996 Crown Victoria at a price of \$18,299 was accepted. Council budgeted \$17,000 for this purchase. Police Chief Scott Yasko said the remaining funds could be transferred from the task force budget.

Council heard requests for two hardship mobile home permits under the new mobile home ordinance. Gabe Stewart spoke for Virginia Williams who purchased a lot on South Beach street near Cobb Mill Road just prior to passage of the mobile home ordinance and purchased a triple-wide manufactured home. She stopped neutral installation of the home when the issue was discovered. Council recognized this as a situation where enactment of the new ordinance had created a hardship on a citizen who was acting in good faith and approved a hardship permit in this case.

Council also heard from Eddie Harrison who spoke for Gracie Holland. Her request was based on a desire to put her mother in a 14 X 60 foot trailer in her back yard on Holly street. Councilman Larry Phillips noted that this did not seem to fit the definition of "hardship" contemplated in the ordinance. Council rejected this request on that basis.

No action was taken on a request for hardship permit from Darrell Cichon since he was not available to make a presentation before the council. City Secretary Don Shaw said he is in the process of sending letters to mobile home and manufactured housing dealers in the area informing them of Woodville's ordinance. This should reduce the likelihood of homes being purchased for placement contrary to city ordinance.

Council heard from Billy Don Everett of T.M.S. Group. He made a presentation for a process the city could use to increase the amount of needed housing in the area. This would not be low income or public assistance housing, but would include the already existing housing inventory with some 15 duplexes. This plan involves the city creating a Housing Finance Corporation. The city would appoint the members of the corporation and the corporation would sell bonds to pay for construction of a number of duplex apartments. The bonds are repaid by rents collected on the duplexes. After

the funds are retired the property can continue to be owned by the Housing Finance Corp. or it can be transferred to the city and managed under contract.

In other business the Woodville Housing Authority requested speed funds be released by 20 p.m. on streets forming authority projects. Council members voted to approve the reduced speeds on Cardinal, Robin, Bluebird, Albert, Shivers, Jackson and Alice street. South Paces street was excluded from this change due to traffic issues. Council also voted to authorize installation of a stop sign on Village at Live Oak. Only Traffic on Village will be required to stop.

Don Forsythe submitted a sub-division plat for sub-division on Highway 69 South. Council voted to accept the plat into the city but noted that the developer is required to install utilities in a "reasonable amount of time". In other utility business, Council took action on this matter presented by Calvin Harris, to provide water service to residents of West Henninger road, an area just outside of the city limits. These residents are

In other business, the court heard from the airport committee regarding the taxability of hangars at the airport. The airport committee includes County Treasurer Tina Bump, Pct. 2 County Commissioner Pete Barns and Chief Appraiser for the Tyler County Appraisal District Eddie Chalmers. Commissioners approved the expenditure of \$750 to join the U. S. Highway 190 coalition project of which

**Commissioners hear 9-1-1 update**

County Judge Jerome Owens is a member. The goal of the coalition is to make 190 a major thoroughfare between Newton and Bryan. Funds will be used for tapes and a live presentation to be made before the Texas Highway Commission. The city of Woodville is also sharing in the coalition cost with an additional \$250.

Commissioners also approved hiring an attorney concerning encroachment on county roads in Pct. 4. Precinct 4 Commissioner Earl Sawyer said that there were about three encroachments that needed to be dealt with. Commissioners amended the budget for computer purchases for the Shivers Library to comply with terms of a grant from the Temple Foundation. The action raises the budgeted amount for 1996 from \$4500 to \$6000 but actually saves \$3000 over two years. The funds will be transferred from the county's heating and cooling budget funds.

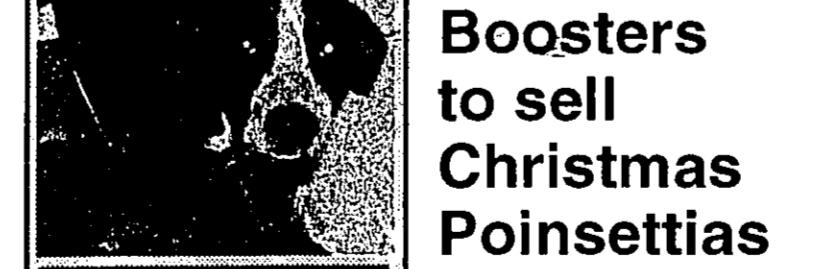

Simply stated you can carry a concealed hand gun, with in the law, for self protection. As we have witnessed the thin blue line is stretched to it's max. In some cases their best is not enough and they are in trouble for trying to protect the public. With the right to carry we as individuals are given a vast amount of responsibility for our actions. As in the case of the police officers, even in saving our lives, we could be held liable for the irrespon-

## Federal law helps fight mail fraud

A law to combat mail scams, called the Deceptive Mailings Prevention Act, gives the United States Postal Service (USPS) specific power to stop delivery of certain mail solicitations.

Under this authority, mailings promoting the purchase of goods or services, or asking for donations, will not be delivered by the USPS if the public might reasonably be misled into believing that the mailing comes from the Government or is somehow approved by the Government.

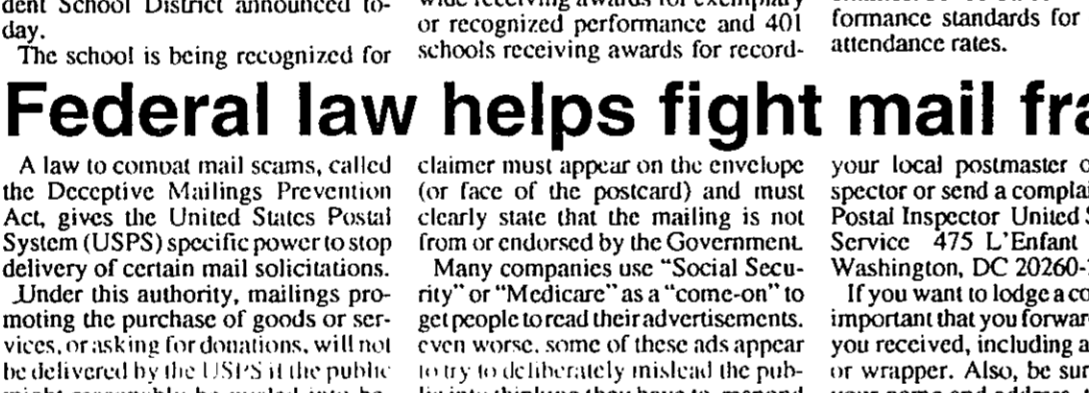
The law says that any envelope (or the face of any postcard) that includes a name, seal, insignia, term, or symbol that could reasonably be mistaken for a Government-issued mailing will not be delivered unless it also has a prominent "disclaimer." The disclaimer must appear on the envelope (or face of the postcard) and must clearly state that the mailing is not from or endorsed by the Government.

Many companies use "Social Security" or "Medicare" as a "come-on" to get people to read their advertisements. However, some of these ads appear to be delivered by the USPS if the public into thinking they have to respond or they might lose Social Security or Medicare benefits. The Social Security Administration supports this law because it should deter mailings designed to take advantage of people who are concerned about their Social Security or Medicare benefits. What should you do if you get mail that seems to be from the government, but actually isn't? You can either take it to your local postmaster or postal inspector or send a complaint to: Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza, S.W., Washington, DC 20260-2100.

If you want to lodge a complaint, it's important that you forward every thing you received, including any envelope or wrapper. Also, be sure to include your name and address, the nature of your concern about the mailing, and the date you got it in the mail. All of the information will help the Postal Inspector take action.

Citizens desiring Social Security information are urged to contact their nearest Social Security office or call the toll free number 1-800-772-1213. All Social Security information is free.

# Chester I. S. D. gets good report card and \$1,000.

Chester, Texas - Monetary awards in amount of \$1,000.00 were made to Chester High School in the Chester Independent School District as part of the Texas Successful Schools Awards Program (TSSAS). Rodney Clements, superintendent of the Chester Independent School District announced today.

The school is being recognized for gains in student performance in indicators that are part of the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS), more commonly known as the state's school report card.

The Chester ISD school is among 1,166 cash-winning schools statewide receiving awards for exemplary or recognized performance and 401 schools receiving awards for record-gains in their performance over last year.

The awards are based on schools' spring 1995 performance on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test, which measures performance in reading, writing and mathematics. Schools also had to meet performance standards for dropout and attendance rates.

To be eligible for a significant gain award, schools had at least 25% of all students in each student group passing each section of the TAAS. In addition, a school's gain in performance from spring 1994 to spring 1995 had to be in the top 20% of the school's demographic group on overall gain for all students and each student group and average at least 5% gain across all subject areas for all students and each student group.

Under law, the AEIS computes a demographic index based on economically disadvantaged, limited English proficient, and highly mobile students and the wealth of the school's district. The index is used to array campuses and form 24 groups of roughly equal size. A school's performance is compared to other schools that are in its same demographic group. A total of \$5 million is being awarded to schools this year under the TSSAS program.

## The real reasons to stay away from Marijuana

As a parent and activist in the substance abuse prevention and treatment field, I am deeply concerned about the resurgence in the popularity of marijuana. I am just as concerned with the difficulty parents, teachers, counselors and other adults are having in trying to communicate with teenagers why they should not use marijuana. There seems to be a consensus of agreement about the dangers of cocaine, heroin and even cigarette and alcohol, but not marijuana. What are the real dangers with it and how do you handle responses such as: "marijuana is an herb," "it is harmless," "it is used as a medicine," or "it's organic." One famous rap group member feels it can make him more creative and that he can write and perform better.

What all drugs have in common is they each contain a poison molecule. The poison molecule in cocaine is caffeine, in tobacco it is nicotine and in alcohol it is ethanol. Cocaine is a poison molecule found in the coca plant and morphine is a poison molecule found in the opium poppy. The poison molecule in marijuana is THC (tetrahydrocannabinol). It is the THC in marijuana causing the high or enjoyable feelings being experienced as well as the problems. What are the real problems with pot?

**Ambition:** Here lies the greatest danger to our youth. The loss of ambition, it is obvious yet often overlooked. Ambition is the very thing in which a person acquires his success in life. A cigarette smoker loses his life to lung cancer while the alcoholic is constantly hung-over and often looks and smells bad. The heroin addict is usually in disastrous physical health exposing himself from overdose as well as hepatitis, AIDS and other diseases. What is obvious about the chronic smoker of marijuana? With chronic use all else becomes less important or secondary to the problems. Ambition is lost.

The ambition and personality of the chronic smoker of marijuana becomes altered as with all drugs. The loss of ambition is at the top of my list because this point is so important in the life of a teenager as it can halt and/or alter emotional and educational development. Simply put, marijuana can interrupt a child's drive and development in sports, music, reading and school subjects, hobbies, etc. This result is seen over and over in drug treatment centers such as Narconon.

**Memory:** It has been stated in the past that marijuana use causes "short-term memory loss." It is more than this. Using marijuana as well as other drugs affects concentration, mental recording and the recalling of previously recorded mental images. All one has to do is spend some time with someone who has smoked pot attempt to hold a serious discussion on a serious or complex subject. It will become all too obvious that marijuana affects the memory. Where the breakdown comes into play is the ability of his or her "attention." Drugs internalize or "interiorize" one's attention as one is feeling and enjoying the drug's effect on the body. Without proper attention, a good memory does not occur in the first place and makes recalling what you did record mentally more difficult.

**Education:** Individuals, especially teenagers, consuming marijuana with any regularity are going to have problems educating themselves either inside or outside of the classroom. The mind is your computer and it depends on attention, concentration, recording, recalling and memory. Grades drop because usually marijuana is the regular use of marijuana. Again, we see here the deathening of ambition. Those that succeed in life do it because they do not let marijuana take them over. To educate oneself takes ambition.

Unfortunately, many teenagers do not understand the value of educating themselves early in life. Many teenagers do not have the same incentives or have problems studying, making education more difficult. While you as an adult can see the damage that marijuana can do to the education process, it is difficult for many teenagers to understand the importance of educating oneself. A lot of teenagers have not set education and career goals and thus do not have the same incentives or demands for themselves as adults have.

**Personality:** Marijuana, like all the recreationally used drugs, changes one's personality. It can make the shy feel outgoing, the weak strong, the inhibited feel uninhibited, especially concerning drugs like cocaine and methamphetamine. It can even make you feel smart for temporary periods of time. Is this bad? What we should work on is how to accomplish feeling strong, brave and smart on our own without drugs. Instead we become dependent on the drug to make us feel these feelings. And that is always disastrous.

**What it doesn't do and why that is dangerous:** Marijuana does not cause some of the reactions commonly seen with alcohol and even drugs like heroin, cocaine and methamphetamine. Hangovers, nausea, dizziness, headaches, and other ill effects are not part and parcel to using drugs. These are not found with marijuana use. This is often used to defend its use while ignoring the more important problems addition to marijuana creates. This itself can be part of the problem of marijuana use if the user thinks marijuana is not a drug because it does not make him vomit or cause these other obvious ill effects.

It has been my opinion that the mental problems caused by marijuana are a far greater danger than the physical dangers that occur. This does not mean there is no physical dangers, as there are, but marijuana is not as toxic as some of the other recreationally used drugs. It can be just as addictive and dangerous.

**Lungs:** The most obvious physical effect and danger lies in the area of pot's damage to the lungs. Any drug consumed via smoking whether it is the nicotine found in tobacco, THC found in Marijuana, crack cocaine, heroin or ice (smokable methamphetamine) it is going to have an adverse effect on the lungs. The lungs are not designed to be coated with tars full of poison molecules. They are tender tissues and over time we can see the result through biopsies in tobacco smokers. There is no reason to think that smoking marijuana cocaine, heroin or methamphetamine is not doing similar things in the lungs. Quite the opposite, marijuana is packed with untested chemicals and it is deeply inhaled and held for longer periods of time. Pot probably is harder on the lungs than tobacco, but more research is needed here. Meantime, let's not be naive about the dangers here. They exist.

### Tiredness: One of the more observable side effects to the smoking of pot is tiredness. This sort of goes hand in hand with lack of ambition, but I feel there are two parts. Loss of ambition is more mental and tiredness is more physical effect. Nevertheless, it certainly happens. There has also been some discussion of a possible negative effect on the immune system.

**Does marijuana have medical uses?** Yes it does. Marijuana can be used for the eye disease glaucoma and it can be used as an anti-emetic for nausea. Cancer patients have found marijuana relieving of the nausea caused by medical treatments. But these medical facts do not make the recreational use of marijuana safe, especially for our youth.

**Is marijuana good for creativity?** This is a harder question to answer and should not be answered hastily. When a person has taken a drug and feels good they may feel more creative. This may be the first time they have felt a drug induced creativity and for them the answer is yes. This may be all that is necessary for them to believe that marijuana is the creative answer in their life. What I try and point out is that if a drug can make you feel creative then you can be creative on your own. You do not need a drug to be creative. No one does.

**Accumulation:** Last but not least marijuana stays in the body for along time. It is a fat soluble drug naturally attracted to the fatty tissue of the body. ## Callers can help Social Security improve customer service on 800 number lines

The Social Security Administration (SSA) is credited with providing the best overall 800 number telephone customer service of the organizations in a recent national survey. The Boston-based financial publisher DALBAR Corp. included in leading companies and SSA in its study. Social Security ranked first or second, except in the area of how long callers were left on hold before their calls were answered. It is this last area that has been one of the primary objects of SSA's recent efforts to improve the customer service.

Social Security receives between 250,000 and 300,000 calls each business day at its toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. With this heavy volume of calls during business hours, the circuits get busy and, at times, callers may have to wait to speak with a knowledgeable representative to complete their business.

Social Security recognizes that every call is important and having to wait to reach a representative isn't what you, our customers, want to do. To help reduce waiting times, additional employees are being trained to answer calls, and more services are being added for you to choose from when you call.

But you, too, can help reduce the extent of the problem. When you use our toll free number, think about the timing of your call. Do you need to speak to someone now? Could you save time by calling at another less busy time? The choice you make can help keep more lines open for calls that must be made during peak hours. The 800 number lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month. If, for example, your check is at least three days late, you should call early in the month to delay this type of call. If, however, you have a general question about an SSA program or you want to sign up for direct deposit, you may spare yourself waiting time if you call late in the day or late in the month.

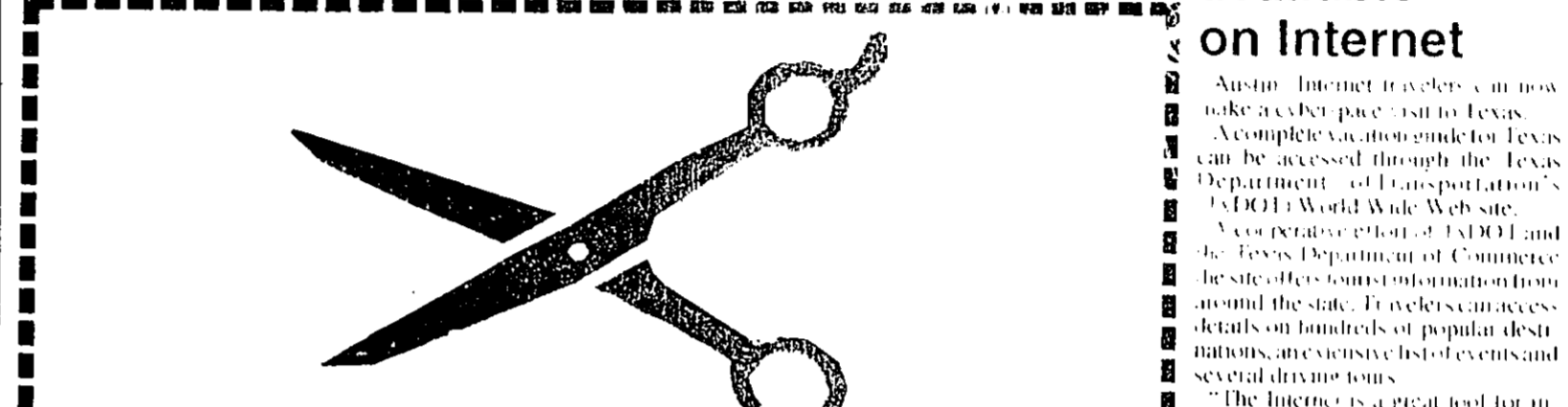
