

## One Injured In Head-On Collision Here Thursday

One person was injured Thursday at noon in a two-car collision at the edge of Woodville on the Chester highway.

Henk Henni, an employee of J. B. Best and Company department store, suffered multiple cuts and bruises in the accident.

He was taken to Tyler County Hospital in an Edwards Ambulance. He was reported to be doing satisfactorily Thursday afternoon, and his condition was not thought to be serious.

The accident occurred when Henni, who was on his way to a friend's house for Thanksgiving dinner, apparently attempted a left turn into a driveway.

His small foreign car was in a head-on collision with a station wagon driven by Mrs. Lawrence Smith. Neither Mrs. Smith nor a passenger in her car, her grandson, were injured.

However, the impact broke a gasoline line in the station wagon, which caught on fire.

The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department was called to fight the gasoline fire, which spread down the gutter as gasoline ran from the car.

The front of the station wagon was practically melted by the heat of the fire.

## Over 300 to Attend From 12 County Area

The Annual Meeting of the Trinity-Neches Council of the Boy Scouts of America will be held Tuesday night at the Camp Umland dining hall beginning at 7:00 p. m.

Over 300 persons, including all executive board members, registered Scouters and others from the 12-county area served by the council are expected to attend.

Principal speaker for the meeting will be Dr. Walter Kerr of Tyler, Texas. Dr. Kerr is a nationally known speaker and entertainer. He is well known for his work with youth groups. Dr. Kerr is currently the Director of the National Youth Foundation with headquarters at Tyler. Dr. Kerr prepared for law at the University of Texas. He served on the legal staff on the Governor of Texas. It was from this position he was called to the ministry. He has served 21 years as a Methodist Minister. During this time he distinguished himself by being elected to represent the Methodist Church on several world-wide radio and television programs. Early in his career Dr. Kerr toured the country as a member of the famous Cowboy Band at Abilene's Hardin Simons University. He spent a year in New York working professionally in radio and theatre. Even today, he is considered by many to be one of the finest guitarists and ballad singers in the country.

Leonard Menius, of Beaumont, is serving as Chairman of the Annual Meeting Committee. Members of the Committee are H. R. Sontag, Alan Hastings, Charles Huddleston, Jr., of Beaumont; Victor Norvell of Silabee, and Allen Peebles of Livingston.

The new officers of the Council for the year 1964 will be elected at the Annual Meeting. Four Silver Beaver Awards will be made for outstanding service to boyhood. The Council is currently serving some 7,500 boys in the Cub Scout, and Explorer programs.

## Poll Tax Is Available In 7 Towns

A. L. (Pete) Thornton reminded Tyler County voters again this week that they must have a poll tax receipt in order to vote in the 1964 elections.

While there are several weeks left in which poll taxes may be paid, Mr. Thornton urged county voters to purchase the receipts early in order to avoid the usual last-minute rush.

Poll tax substations have been set up in seven county communities for the convenience of poll tax purchasers. They are:

Doucette; International Paper Company office.  
Colmesneil; Dean's General Store.

Rockland; Dean's Grocery.  
Chester; J. L. Veal Store.  
Warren; School tax office.  
Fred; Jenkins Grocery.

Spurger; Spurger Mercantile.  
Poll taxes are still \$1.75. Those over 60 years of age do not need to secure an exemption certificate in Tyler County.

Persons becoming 21 years of age and entitled to their first vote free must come to the tax office in Woodville to pick up a certificate of exemption.

## Student Panel Discusses Problem of Dropouts

A panel discussion on the problem of school dropouts was held by high school students at the meeting of the Tyler County Council of Parent-Teacher Associations in the fellowship room of the First Baptist Church here Thursday, Dec. 21.

Members of the panel were Sharon Allison, a senior, and Charles Blanks, a junior, of Kirby High School, Woodville; Glen Phillips and Judy Pavia, seniors, of Warren High School; Laurann Jordan, a sophomore, and Peyton Sheffield, senior, of Spurger High School.

Some of the reasons for dropouts discussed were: Lack of encouragement to stay in school from parents; economic necessity to help family; poor scholarship; lack of interest in program offered by the school; the enticement of quick money now; lack of parental authority; lack of understanding from teachers; desire to get married and be their "own boss"; lack of participation in school activities.

The students on the panel offered these possible solutions: Involving the parents in the program of the school to bring about better understanding of its policies;

Providing a more varied school program, especially aimed at those who do not intend to go to college; identifying possible dropouts as early as possible in order to try to hold them; providing a work-school program for those who need to earn money so they can work part time and attend school part time and thus be able to finish;

Providing special instructions for those who make low grades to help them keep up; good students showing concern and friendliness to those who have not adjusted to school.

Bennett Hanna of Kirby High School moderated the panel and B. M. Minter, county school superintendent, evaluated the program.

The next meeting of the PTA Council will be held in Chester High School auditorium on January 16. Mrs. Walter J. Morris, program chairman, promises a surprise program.
